Lastly, we hereby appoint Principal J. S. Zeigler executor of this, our last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by us made.

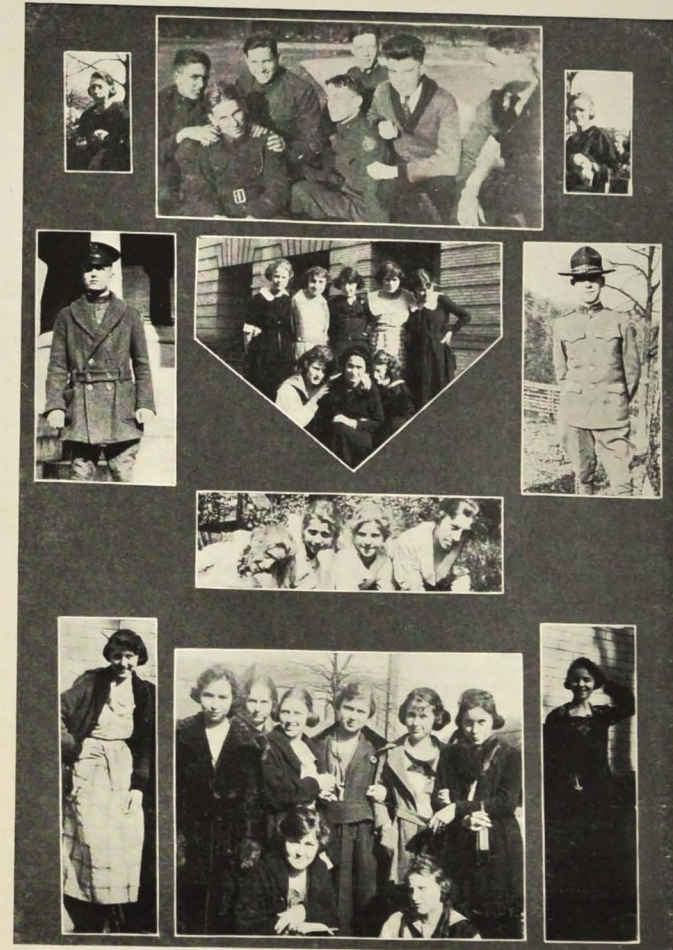

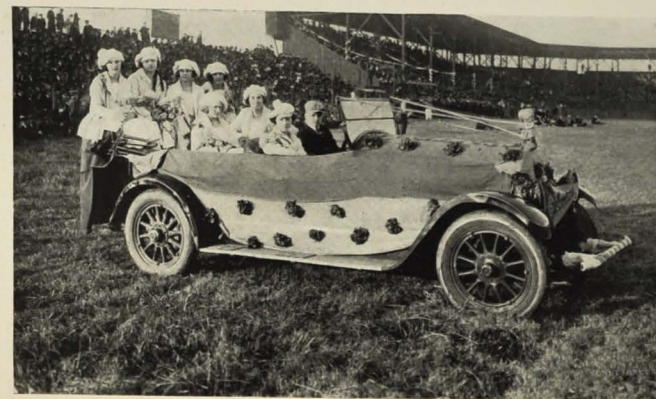
The society has also many members who have ably sustained its reputation in dramatics. The society did not get to present an individual play this year but was well represented in every play presented by the student body.

Baseball

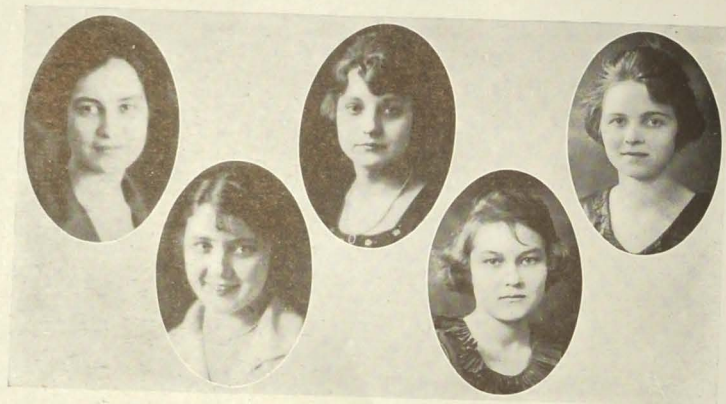
