With much enthusiasm and excitement, Central students, present and past, attend a pep rally.






Putting all these feelings together not only created a mass sensation, but also "the pulse and pounding of a people..." of Central, our school, our nation. Something great was about to happen.




Countdown to Celebration













Franklin County edged by Central 6-0 in the first game of the season for both teams. All through the first half it was a battle of defenses with neither team scoring, but opening up the second half, Franklin drove the ball 80 yards for six points and the margin of victory. But the Pounders kept fans excited on their next possession, moving the ball down to Franklin's 8-yard line before a fumble halted the drive.


Central's offense was led by Randy Clark with 34 yards, while juniors Stan Owen and Terry Payne led the defensive platoon with nine tackles apiece.

In their first contest at Central's stadium, the Pounders got

a taste of victory with an 28-27 nerve-shattering win over East Ridge.

Leading an explosive offense were backs Port Raulston and Tommy Cope, romping for two touchdowns each, and Tracey Hay booting four equally important extra points. Then after East Ridge's fourth score the Pounders were met with a game-deciding and safety Chuck challenge, Cronon was there to meet it, stopping the two-point conversion and wrapping up the victory. Leading an impressive defense was junior Terry Payne, coming up with one interception, fumbles, and seven individual tackles.

Central Record 1-2 After 3 Decisions





As the first chilly winds of fall crept into Central's stadium, they brought with them bad news. The bad news was fired-up Notre Dame, who shut out the Pounders 14-0 in a defensive battle. But one bright spot for Central was a sterling defense that recovered three fumbles and one interception while holding Notre Dame to a respectable 158 yards total offense. The Irish hit early in the game with a 54-yard scoring pass but were totally shut off after that until late in the fourth quarter. Leading the Purple offense was Port Raulston, rambling for 34 yards, while Mark Matlock and Stan Owen sparked a tough defensive unit.

On Hixson's first possession, the Pounders fumbled and turned the ball over at mid-field. From there it took Hixsonnine plays to punch it in.

On the Purple's first possession of the second half, they fumbled again; only this time Hixson's defense scooped up the ball and raced into the end zone. Then a spark of life hit the Purple Pack and they pushed the ball down the field for the score, with Danny Crosland ripping out the last four yards.

On Central's next possession quarterback Chuck Cronon hit Alan Pressley on a swing pass that moved the ball to Hixson's one-yard line, but it was called back for illegal procedure. So when the final seconds ticked off the clock, the Pounders had again been upset, 14-7.

After the cancellation of Friday night's game, the Lions met at Central on Saturday night and zipped to a victorious score of 35-8.

After a connection between Red Bank's Bobby Bureau and Andy Holland, the Lions began their scoring action.


Junior halfback Kevin Dove put Central on the scoreboard when he connected on a 27-yard touchdown pass to Jimmy Manis.

Red Bank added two more touchdowns in the second half, but Central did not get a chance to score again.


As Brainerd runs the ball, Central's Kevin Dove accomplishes the tackle.

Pounders Rivaled by Four

The opening minutes of the Central-Bradley game were disastrous for the Pounder football squad. On the second play from scrimmage, Bradley County forced a Central fumble on the 38-yard line, turning it into one of only two touchdowns scored by Bradley.

As the second drive faultered for Central, the punting unit came on the field. Again the Bradley defense generated a drive and scored for their last time.

With 4:54 gone in the first quarter, both defenses stiffened and didn't allow another score until late in the fourth quarter when senior Danny Crosland took it in with 1:14 left on the clock, making the final score, 15-6.

Kevin Dove led the running attack while Stan Owen and Jeff Wallace sparkled on defense.


The opening kickoff was doom for the Pounders as Charles Cook of Brainerd rambled 94 yards for the touchdown. Stalling the whole night, the Central offense could not generate enough momentum and had to turn the ball over to Brainerd. The Rebels took advantage and forced a drive of 64 yards, consisting of seven plays and a score.

Opening up the second half, the Purple Pride just couldn't get anything going and had to give the ball to the Rebels again. For the fourth consecutive time, the opposition crossed the goal line to make the score: Brainerd-27, Central-0.

At the Homecoming game, junior Jimmy Manis catches a pass for a long gainer against Brainerd.






Spirit High Despite Season

History repeated itself Friday night, October 24th, at Soddy-Daisy as the opposing team struck early in the game and went on to post a 28-0 victory over the injury-riddled Purple Pack. With less than 4 minutes gone in the first quarter, Soddy-Daisy scooped up a Central fumble and raced 14 yards to pay dirt. But while fumbles and penalties plagued the offense, a stout defense brightened things up a little, allowing the Trojans to score only on broken plays. Leading the defense were juniors Jimmy Ledford and Jimmy Manis while freshman Greg Humphreys led the offense with his bullish running.



On Halloween the Central gridmen experienced their 1th consecutive loss since their victory over East Ridge. This time it was at the hands of Mc-Minn County, who at the time of this writing was ranked No. 2 in the state. On their first possession Central moved the ball down to the Cherokee 32-vard line before a fumble halted the drive. Then the Cherokees took over and three plays later tailback Joey Grubb broke off right tackle and scampered 65 yards to pay dirt. Then, while McMinn Co. continued popping big plays, the Pounders simply couldn't get a drive started. So when the final buzzer sounded the score was McMinn 40, Central 0. But there were bright spots for the Pounders as noseguard Stan Owen and linebacker Jeff Wallace led the defense with 8 tackles apiece and Kevin Dove rushed for a respectable 43 yards.

For the fourth consecutive season Central met defeat at the hands of City High. This time it was to the tune of 38-2. For most of the first period it was a tightly played ball game, but City finally opened up the scoring with a 56-yard pass. They hit for six points two other times in the first half and took a comfortable lead into the dressing 18-0 room. Then opening up the 2nd half, Central started a drive of its own, only to be halted by a fumble at City's 38-yard line. From there City took the ball down the field for another score and eventually built the lead to Central finally hit the scoreboard when Frank Zimmerman tackled a City player in their own end zone for a safety. Leading the defensive unit was Stan Owen and Buck Gosnay while Kevin Dove dug out 56 yards for the Pounder offense.


Boys State and Girls State delegates and alternates were chosen on the basis of leadership, scholarship, and school service.

At camp the CHS Cheerleaders again received their share of honors by winning three superior ribbons, one ribbon of excellence, and two spirit sticks.


To defray costs of camp and uniforms, the squad spent much time washing cars, selling soap, and sponsoring a Junior Cheerleading Clinic.



The Central team, capturing the title with this win, finished the season with 14 wins and 9 losses.










First Girl's Squad Since 1960













Season Openers Successful



In early January they were guests at the Ryan Invitational and returned with 5th place.



Males, as well as females, gave their support to Central's athletics.













Royalty in a Patriotic Spotlight

















The Latin Club had several money-raising projects over the course of the year, including a bake sale and a car wash. The funds from these projects went for a Roman Banquet, which was held in the spring.



























Many Expressions of School Spirit


By offering such courses as accounting, recordkeeping, shorthand, typing, and general business, the business department prepared students for jobs such as secretaries, clerks and accountants.











Girls are always hearing about how busy their mothers are as homemakers, and members of Central's Future Homemakers of America got a taste of their future this year.








Leaders of Progressive Pounders

Due to its active administration consisting of Dr. W. Hobart Millsaps and Coach Stanley Farmer, Central High School has made much progress, achieved distinction, and received numerous awards. Some of Central's most outstanding accomplishments were pointed out by Dr. Millsaps as he reflected on Central's growth. Its faculty, students, and administration have been honored with thirty-nine Freedoms Foundation Awards, and in 1963 Central was the National Bellamy Award winner. Central has been State Also, Football Champions ten times.

In 1964 it was recommended that the old Central be renovated, which would cost one and one half million dollars. Thoughtful members of the administration, however, requested the money be spent toward a new school. In 1969 Central moved into a new school. Recently the school grounds have been improved by additions of sidewalks and steps and by a fence around the baseball field.

More honor came to Central when in 1972 Dr. W. Hobart Millsaps was chosen president of the National Association of Secondary School Principals. Still, according to Dr. Millsaps, there comes a challenge, the challenge to make Central, with all its assets, distinctions and awards better than it ever has been. This idea is voiced in his words, "Today is better than yesterday, but not as good as tomorrow."










Black Comedy




Motivated Candy Sellers

Juniors met October 21 to take the PSAT-NMSQT, the Merit Scholarship test which is the first test of its type taken by those students who plan to enter college.






The Spirited Class of '77

Active freshman Pam Sumners speaks on the topic, "Why I Am Proud to Be an American" at the B. Y. D.



To all of these people that have brought more recognition to the school, Central says, "Thanks!"
















The pulse and the pounding never weakened at Central, for there was always something new to get ready for: another class, another day, another season, another year.
