The 7:40 bell sounds. Students rush to first period classes. A voice from the intercom begins the day. "We will now observe a minute of silence." Whether it is a strong religious heritage or a deep respect for that voice, the chatter slows and then subsides in the halls and rooms of CHS. Mr. Charles Preston has just launched a typical school day. Beside him stands a student to lead the pledge of allegiance. He or she has probably been tapped for this job during Mr. Preston's walks around the central pod on morning patrol.

One morning on such a walk, he is stopped by two chatty girls who just want to talk. He pauses by the snack machine to see why a young man rattles it rather violently. Farther on, he directs a student out of B pod and back to the commons until the 7:30 bell. Some principals spend most of their time in their offices shuffling paper, taking care of phone calls, or checking on athletic activies. Mr. Preston is a different kind of principal. It is not that he doesn't care for papers and phone calls and athletics; he does, but he prefers being where the students and teachers can be found.

Because of his strong organizational skills, he is able to divide responsibilities among office staff members, departmental chairpersons, and assistant principals. This leaves him time to participate in the Beta Club Talent Show as a white jump suit clad Elvis, and to attend most pep rallies where he makes brief talks in support of athletic events. If needed, he instructs students on minding their manners. Why do students readily heed his directions? It comes to one word - respect - a respect tempered with affection rather than fear. 
improvements to education. He also encourages a total athletic program including teams for girls and guys from soccer to golf.

The coronation over, the crowd settled to a normal hum and watched the Pounders. Following the game, collective interest turned to family, friends, and the Homecoming Dance the next evening.











We've won several events already, but not even half of our high school days are gone. We are ready and willing to tackle any challenge placed before us — so everyone beware!



FLEX SCHEDULE DRAWS MIXED OPINIONS

Students And Teachers Discuss Pros And Cons

This year Central High initiated the flex schedule day. No other Hamilton County schools participated in this experiment. The flex schedule works like this: Monday, Thursday and Friday are regular days, with seven periods. Then, on Tuesdays, first, third, fifth and seventh period meet while on Wednesdays second, fourth, fifth and sixth meet. Fifth meets daily because that is the lunch period.

Each student and teacher has his own view on the extended periods. Some students and teachers enjoy "Flex" while others don't. Students like the new schedule because they have more time to focus and concentrate on particular subjects, they don't see as many teachers in one day and they get to have an hour and a half rather than forty-five minutes with their favorite friends and teachers. Teachers like the change because they have a longer planning period, are able to cover more material and have a chance to get to know their students better.

The extended periods have proven beneficial to several required and elective courses. The science classes have more time to complete labs, art is given more time to get supplies out and work on artwork and driver's education has extra driving time. The Yearbook Staff and Literary Magazine have also benefitted from the flex schedule, because it gives them more time for deadlines. The flex day has been advantageous to World Studies and American Studies by giving more time to lectures, group projects and test-taking time. Gym classes can play longer, playing eight minute quarters instead of six minutes. Speech class has extra time to debate and polish speeches while chorus has more time to practice and perfect performances. Drama uses the time to get into character and focus on parts. Although the flex schedule has proven to help most classes, there are still those who oppose the schedule. Students say they lose interest, and more homework is usually assigned. Teachers say they have a hard time keeping the students' attention, minds begin to wander and nothing is learned or accomplished. Teachers say that their fifth period classes get cheated because they never have an hour and a half, and on some days the time is needed.

Students and teachers have said that they feel the flex schedule should be initiated all over the county, along with the seven period class. Some think this would be a bad decision. Although the schedule is not liked by everyone, it has proven to be beneficial. It would be foolish to think that all teachers and students could agree on the pros and cons of the flex schedule but it never hurts to try.
















A Winning Season





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The limited edition of the Champion had a press run of 625 copies containing 224 pages. There are twenty-two pages of full color and eight pages of spot color.

The cover is a high gloss litho material #478, white with process color applied. It is an original school artwork Type C de-

signed by April Mraz. The front and back lid are laminated 150 point Davyboard. The binding is on round and backed 150 point Davyboard. Namestamping is in black foil #386. The endsheets are bright yellow #107 with die cut and black dot screen. The paper is an 80 lb. gloss #191.

Senior portraits, underclassmen pictures and various events such as dances and ceremonies were photographed by Jim Jolly Incorporated.
