

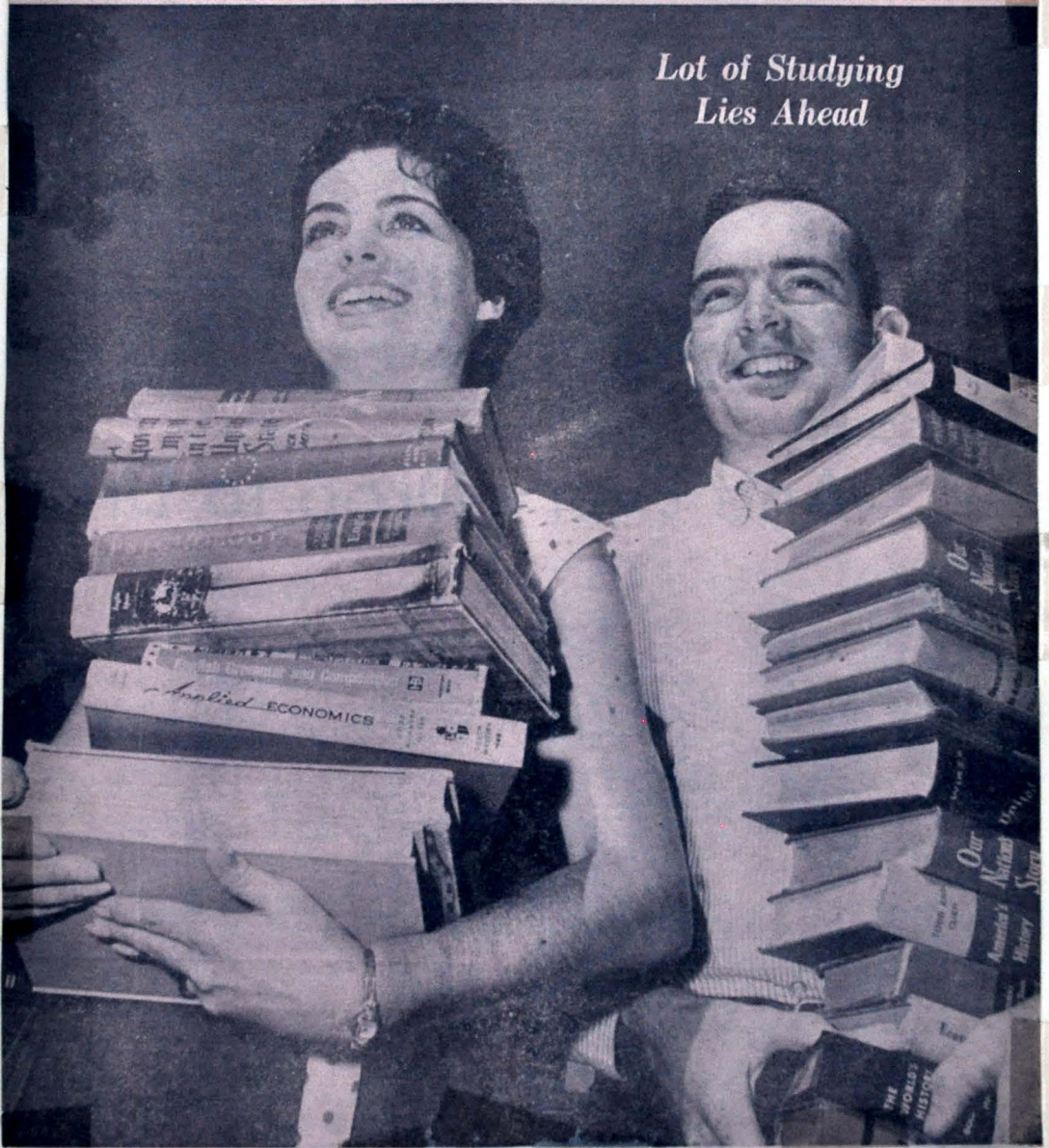

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# Two-Platoon Football Returning At Central; 21 Lettermen in Camp

(This is the first in a series of preview articles on high school football teams in the Greater Chattanooga area.)

Central's Purple Pounders will open the 1964 football season with two main assets—depth and spirit—and a new innovation, the two-platoon system.

Head coach E. B. (Red) Etter is going to start the season with two balanced starting teams, but says, "I'm sure we'll have two teams, but I'm not sure where one team will be offense specialists and the other defensive specialists or maybe both teams will go both ways."

The Pounders' depth—at least two deep at each position—is the reason Etter is installing the two platoons. "Our depth is good, and we have 21 lettermen back, but don't let that fool you. We lost 15 boys through graduation and a great many of the boys that lettered saw only limited action last year," comments Etter.

"The split this year is wonderful," he continued. "With one or two exceptions every one of the boys reported to practice in playing condition. This confidence could be our best asset."

At quarterback junior Larry Shelley, regular last year, is returning and will guide the offense. Backing up Shelley are Larry Llewellyn and Bob Slaten. "Both Shelley and Llewellyn are good passers and Shelley is a great scrambler and a good runner, a real two-way threat," summarized Etter. Soph Denny Painter completes the variety quarterback corps.

Three boys lead the race for the halfback positions on the two units. Captain Steve Thompson, Bill Harless, and Ed Hudson, all return, and will guide the offense. Fighting for the fourth job are David Shelton, David King, who also is Central's extra point kicker, and Ronnie Tucker.

Continuation of the halfback position brings a gleam to Etter's eyes.

The Pounders have two lettermen returning and neither is a senior. Phil Lewis, a 5-8, 175 blockbuster, is the only two-way starter remaining from last year. Junior Champion, 10 pounds lighter, also saw considerable action on offense and was a starter on defense. And as Etter says, "the best part of it is that both of them are just juniors."

Another position that appears to be a Pounder stronghold is the center. Two lettermen, both juniors, are battling for the starting nod. Joe Hanesifer, a rugged 175-pounder who saw a lot of action at line-backer last year and Bruce Elrod, a hefty 185-pounder, provide depth at center.

The rest of the line is characterized by good depth and little playing experience. Lettermen are returning at each position, but few have had actual game experience.

Co-captain Max Smith and Bryant Millsaps, a pair of 215-pounders, John Ettien, Ken Hudson and Leslie Wright, all seniors, head the tackle corps.

"Our tackles are of fair size and have some game experience, but are slow foot," Etter said. "Smith could be one of our outstanding players and Millsaps will do most of our place-kicking. All in all I guess you could say they're a good group."

Only Mike Randolph, a 185-pound senior, has experience among the guards. But three veterans, Steve Carroll, Gary Caswood and Ernie McCarron, along with Randolph, give the Pounders good depth at the position, although all are short on experience.

The end position, too, is long on depth and short on experience. Gary Randall, 6-foot-2, 180 pounds, could be one of the best pass catchers in the area, and John Edge, a tough 150-pounder, could be one of the best on defense, according to Etter. Letterman Richard Saylor, Ed Austin, Chris McNitt and David Gault are others slated to see considerable action.

Central, defending champion in the Hamilton interscholastic League, will, Etter says, have a well-balanced team with no outstanding stars.

According to Etter, "The local league (the HIL) is a very balanced set-up. Every team is tough. I, personally, don't think that any team will go through the season undefeated in league play, but we'll do our best to win our games and retain our title."

## Pack's PATs Margin Over Central, 14-12

### Crucial Runs by Dick Ellis Set Up Tullahoma's Victory

TULLAHOMA, Tenn.—Bruising fullback Dick Ellis broke Chattanooga Central's back with two big runs and Bill Pack kicked two extra points that spelled the difference as Tullahoma edged the Pounders, 14-12, here Friday night.

Ellis raced 59 yards to for Bennie Garrick and the first Tullahoma touchdown as ET Central attained a 6-0 half-time edge.

Then on the last play of the third quarter, Ellis romped into the end zone from the 16 on a fourth- and-nine situation and once again Pack kicked the point.

Central came back on Larry Shelley's passing to John Edge and Chris McNitt to move to the Tullahoma 20 and then on fourth-and-eight, he hit Eddie Hudson on a screen pass for the score.

Early in the game, Central stopped a Tullahoma drive on the Pounder one-foot line, but Central dominated the statistics with 12 first downs to the hosts' four.

## HIL CONTEST SET FOR TONIGHT AT 8

"We saw them (City) play Notre Dame and they looked real sharp," remarked Central Coach E. B. (Red) Etter. "City's speed was impressive and it looked as if they have a hard-hitting and hustling team."

"We expect a tough battle from them with both teams trying to bounce back. I feel the boys will be up for this one. We have a good team if it can eliminate some of its mistakes."

City Coach Rudy Rohrdanz was just as complimentary saying, "Of course Central has a good football team. The loss of that first game must have been a slip up." They have size and, (Larry) Shelley, one of the best quarterbacks.

### Spirits High

"Our spirits have been high and we have showed much improvement in our practices this week," Rohrdanz finished.

City still is bothered by several injuries. Captain and guard Johnny Allen is out while end Tommy Milligan suffered bruises against East Ridge and will be slowed somewhat. However, Rohrdanz does hope to have guard Addy Hardin, injured in a pre-season scrimmage, back in the lineup.

City has had four men to break into the scoring column so far. Mike Sherrell, Donnie Oliver, John Keene and David Kaplan have all romped to touchdowns in the first two games for the Dynamoes and should pose a threat to the Pounders' defense.

Central will have two fine backs to go along with Shelley, Eddie Hudson and Phil Lewis each scored against Tullahoma and will again be the threats as Central tries to get a win streak going.

This will be the 45th game in the series with Central holding a 33-9 margin. Four games have ended in ties. The Pounders won 23-7 last year and City's last victory came in 1939, 7-0. The two clubs played to a 12-12 draw in 1940 and since that time the Dynamoes have had little luck.

## Tullahoma Winner, 14-12 Over Chattanooga Central

TULLAHOMA, Tenn.—A pair of placements by Bill Pack spelled the difference Friday night as the Tullahoma Wildcats handed Chattanooga Central a 14-12 defeat in the first game of the season for both teams. A defensive battle from the opening whistle, Central was in trouble early, fighting off a Tullahoma drive at the 1-foot line.

The first time the Wildcats had the ball and that was the pattern of one game. Both of the victors' touchdowns came in the third period. Bennie Garrick plunged over from the 1 after Dick Ellis had cut 59 yards off tackle to set it up.

Then on the last play of the period, Ellis again cut off tackle from the 16 on a 4th-and-9 situation. Once again, Pack's toe was true.

Central roared back. Larry Shelley took to the air, hitting ends John Edge and Chris McNitt three straight times for a first down on the 20. Then on 4th-and-4 at the 18, Shelley hit Eddie Hudson on a screen

# Harless' Runs Pace 19-0 Central Victory

## Pounders Grab Quick Lead, Hold on To Down East Ridge in HIL Tilt

The kind of rain that wet Chattanooga Friday was not a quick storm punctuated by lightning and thunder, but Central's Bill Harless provided that for the Pounders as they inundated East Ridge, 19-0, in a Hamilton Interscholastic League football game Friday night.

Harless ripped off a 59-yard scoring run the first time Central got the ball. Then after the Pioneers held East Ridge following the kickoff and forced punt, the little speedster took off on a 75-yard bolt to the East Ridge five.

Rayne LaFevor stymied a touchdown there with a cutoff

touchdown. David King converted. That East Ridge pass offense clicked twice on tosses good for 39 and 15 yards to carry the Pounders to the Central 10 in the first quarter.

But Chris McNutt ended that threat by dropping tailback Mike Odum for a 14-yard loss. Again in the third period East Ridge drove to the Central 13, Ed Austin recovered a fumble there to stop the move.

And in the final quarter, Odum teamed with LaFevor on some aerial heroics that seemed to have the Pounders marching, but Steve Thompson intercepted one at midfield to halt one move and another moments later to seal the outcome.

Max Smith, Harles, Thompson and LaFevor stood out for the Pounders. Odum, LaFevor, Paul Pierce and John Jeffrey, who recovered two fumbles, shone for East Ridge.

It was the second straight Hillsboro triumph for Central. The loss made East Ridge's record 1-2, all in Hills.

Mighty Kingsport comes calling on Central at Chamberlain Field and Steve Dame sees after his fourth straight victory at East Ridge tonight in the top two games of an attractive high school grid menu. Both contests have set 8 p.m. kickoffs.

There are a number of other games to be played in Chattanooga that will bear watching. Rossville, unbeaten in three starts against Georgia clubs, visits City High at Kirkman. Meanwhile Brainerd, also 2-0, tests a winless Tyner club that could prove tougher than most people think.

Chattanooga Valley, sporting three victories and a tie this fall, tries to keep its string going when it entertains Coosa. The visitors will run into high scoring half-back Sonny Day and his crew, one of the best teams in Valley's history.

Winless Red Bank, one of the beefiest clubs in town, is at home to McMinn County. The Lions have dropped three straight decisions to Hixson, Baylor and Notre Dame — three clubs which between them were eight and lost but one.

Hixson, having scored two triumphs, goes for a third at Whitwell in an effort to keep its unbeaten string going. Booker T. Washington is at Calhoun of Ansonia, Ala., Kirkman tries for its second victory at Meigs County. Lakeview invades DeKalb County in quest of triumph No. 3 and Ooltewah is at Ringgold.

### Kingsport Rated Fifth

Kingsport is rated fifth in the state and has racked up three victories so far in the 1964 campaign. Central has drawn mention among the state's top clubs in a 14-13 loss to No. 1 ranked Tullahoma dulled the Pounders' chances to make the first ten. Central has won two straight since its opening loss to the Wildcats.

"I don't know anything special that we can do to get ready for Kingsport," said veteran Central mentor E. B. (Red) Etter. "We have no injuries so we'll be ready in that capacity." Since Etter has taken over the reins at Central in the early 1940's, the Pounders hold a 10-9 edge in the series with two games ending in ties. However, since 1958 Central has a 9-4 advantage with one deadlock occurring. Last year Kingsport edged the Pounders 6-0 while the Chattanooga men 26-7 in 1962, at Chamberlain Field.

### Central, Signal Mountain Undefeated in Junior High Grid Loop

Signal Mountain and Central pulled away from the pack in the second week of Hamilton County Junior High football, winning their second consecutive games to become the only undefeated teams in the league.

Signal Mountain dropped previously undefeated Saddy-Daisy 21-0 as Hal Ganaway scored twice, and Central defeated Ooltewah 6-0 as Mike McCoy raced 60 yards on a reverse to the Owl 4 and Gary Hamrick took it over for the only TD.

In other games, Hixson rolled over Red Bank 39-7 behind four touchdowns by Ronnie Higgins and Terry Braden scored twice to lead Tyner to a 19-0 defeat of East Ridge.

Signal Mountain broke open a scoreless game in the third quarter, marching 68 yards against the Twins to paydirt, with Ganaway scoring. The third Signal Mountain TD came on an 82-yard pass interception-return by Brick Abrams.

Don Abrams was the top defensive man for the boys from Signal Mountain, while Clifford Hall made several crucial tackles. Joe Stevens and Billy Hicks were the best for Saddy-Daisy.

Central came close to losing or tying the game against Ooltewah as the little Owls drove to the Baby Pounders' 1-yard line before fumbling into the end zone, where Central recovered for a touchdown. Mike Perkins and Hamrick were the top defensive players for Central while Teddy Smith and Mike Wilson, Ooltewah linebackers, were tough for the losers.

## BABY POUNDERS WIN 4TH IN ROW

### Defeat Signal Mountain 19-14 on Late Passes—Higgins, Braden Star

Undefeated Central pushed its County Junior High League record to 4-0 Tuesday as last-minute passes from Gary Hamrick to Mike McCoy and to Mike Perkins moved the ball 50 yards in less than a minute to defeat second-place Signal Mountain 19-14 in a game which determined the league leadership.

Hamrick put the first points of the game on the board in the second quarter with a 10-yard return of an intercepted pass and Steve Eaton twisting 14 yards for another in the third quarter.

Signal Mountain came back with Donny Kell going 20 yards in the third quarter for a score and Steve Eaton twisting 14 yards for another TD.

With time running out, Hamrick hit McCoy for 30 yards and a first down at the nine then fired a strike to Perkins for the winning margin.

Saddy-Daisy led Red Bank all the way until the final half-second, Brad Hogan and Joe Young scored touchdowns for the Twins while Phillips ran for one touchdown and passed to Whitesburg and to Gary Armstrong for the others.

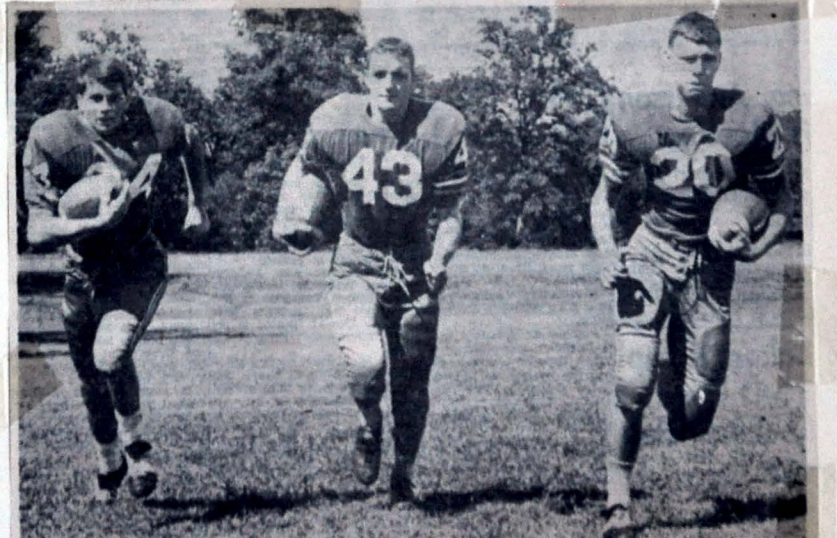
Higgins counted on runs of 54 and 31 yards for Coach Willard Mitchum, running his league-leading scoring total to 98 points. Braden, scoring on runs of 20 and two yards, took a pass for 45 yards and a touchdown from Gary Johnson and returned a punt 85 yards for a TD, raising his total points to 45, good for second place in the league.

## POUNDER DRIVE IS HALTED ON 6

Millspass' Field Goal Try in 4th Quarter Falls Short and Wide

Two of East Tennessee's oldest powers—Chattanooga Central and Kingsport's Bobbys Bennett—battled to a 0-0 tie Friday night before a sparse crowd at Chamberlain Field as Central's Bryant Millspass' last-minute attempt to put three points on the Pounders' side of the scoreboard fell short and to the left from the 13.

For most of the 48 minutes of hard-knocking, thrilling football, Central's quarterback Larry Shelley and Kingsport's signal caller Nick Showalter fought it out in a head-to-head duel, with both bowing to the opposition's strong defensive line.

Central waded down field against the beefy Indian line, in the first quarter, going from the Pounders' 23 to the Kingsport 31 where Showalter recovered a fumble after Shelley hit halfback Eddie Hudson with a flat pass only to have him fumble after a yard gain.

Showalter took his team from its own 29 to the Central 29 in time ran out in the first half. Rolling out for large gains and hitting on two passes, the Indians marched down the field until two muffed pass receptions and a penalty helped the clock stop the drive.

### Standoff

The third quarter was a standoff with neither team making much of a dent but Showalter got the visitors moving again in the fourth, guiding the Indians to the Central 34—piling up large bunks of yardage by himself—before John Edge jumped out for a fumble on a hand-off to stop the march.

From this point, Central began the only serious scoring threat of the night.

Hudson broke up the middle for eight and Shelley sneaked for the first down on fourth down. Two plays later Shelley connected with Edge on a pass across the middle then drilled one to Hudson in the flat for another first down.

Fullback Phil Lewis rambled through a large hole in the Indians' forward wall for 16 yards to the seven yard line, giving the Pounders first and goal.

Lewis got two to the five but was stopped for no gain on a piledriver effort up the middle. Shelley then rolled right against the 6-5 Kingsport defense and lost a yard and left the ball on the right hashmark for Millspass' last-ditch field goal attempt.

The bulky Pounder put a lot of foot in it, lofting it high into the air, but it was just a foot short and a foot wide to the left.

Both defensive units were superb in the clutch. Edge, Max Smith, Steve Thompson and Terry Champion came up with strong tackles when the Indians knocked at the door.

Showalter was the big noise for the Indians on offense also, recovering the fumble and intercepting a pass, as well as coming from nowhere to bat down a sure touchdown in the second quarter.

## Central and Kingsport Fight to 0-0 Deadlock

### Statistics Even, Each Slips on Big Scoring Opportunity in Tense Duel

The statistics were even, the score was even and two scoring opportunities—one each—went aglimmering in Central and Kingsport's 0-0 tie at Chamberlain Field Friday night.

Each team had a total offense of about 195 yards. Each team had 10 first downs. Each team lost a fumble. And each team will look at films of the game Monday and see that BIG opportunity go down the drain and wish it could happen one more time . . . with different results.

Kingsport got its chance first when classy quarterback Nick Showalter intercepted a Central pass on the Kingsport 29 late in the second period.

Showalter carried four times and passed to Andy White once to get the ball to the Central 29 with about 20 seconds left. Then on a gorgeous pattern, Tom West angled through the Pounder secondary and Showalter hit him perfectly at the 10 Kingsport, No. 5.

On a pass with which he was sure to score, but he dropped it. It was just as late in the second half that Central got its big opportunity, this time when David Shelton Showalter recovered a fumble both offensively and defensively.

With Phil Lewis, Ed Hudson and Bill Harless running and Larry Shelley passing, the Pounders moved to the Indian 7 with 1:57 left. Harless zipped 16 up the middle to this point for the big move.

But then on third and goal—two tries into the line had been stopped right in front of the goalposts—Shelley rolled out to his right and was hit for no gain.

Central is 2-0 in the HIL and 3-1-1 on the year, the loss being by 2 points to Tullahoma and the tie being 0-0 with Kingsport.

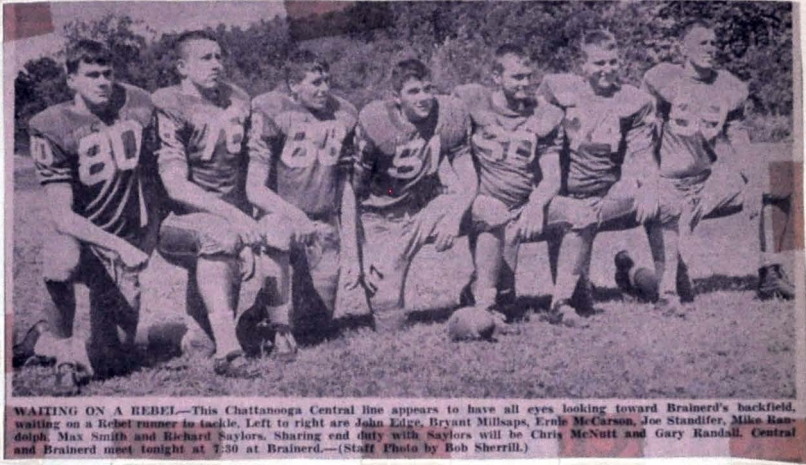

Before the 1964 high school football season started, it was the appraisal of most Hamilton Interscholastic League coaches that the league champion would not be able to go through undefeated.

Right now, Brainerd and Central are the only remaining teams in the seven-member loop without a loss. They meet tonight at 7:30 and then there will be only one—barring a tie.

That one left still will face a major obstacle in Notre Dame, however. The Irish meet Brainerd next week and Central on Oct. 30. And another which could throw a wrench in the works is Soddy-Daisy. The Trojans still have five league games to play, including Notre Dame on Oct. 23 and Central on Nov. 13. They already have dropped a 16-0 decision to Brainerd.

So things boil down to that crucial meeting tonight at Brainerd—the winner will be in the driver's seat in the HIL. Central has tradition and prestige on its side—the Pounders have not lost to a Chattanooga high school team in 54 games since 1939.

Brainerd will have a slight advantage in line weight, despite the loss of regular Ed Jennings, who injured a knee. Replacing him will be 200-pound Bill Henry.

Backfield speed will be about equal, matching the Rebels' slicky Charles Robertson and the Pounders' Bill Harless; the Rebels' pounding David Slaughter and the Pounders' Phil Lewis; the Rebels' slippery Bill Pemberton and the Purples' Ed Hudson.

One key will be the quarterbacking—Larry Shelby will handle the job for Central and Danny Brown for Brainerd. Both are juniors; both are slick passers and both are fine ball handlers.

### Five Straight Victories

Brainerd has racked up five straight victories but they might all go for naught should the Rebels slip in this one. Coach Ray Coleman's crew has been hampered by the loss with knee injuries of tackle Ed Jennings and halfback Gary Estes. But end and captain Kerry Perkinson is returning after an absence since pre-season practice when he broke an ankle.

"We always look forward to playing a team like Central," noted Coleman as he watched his charges limber up Thursday. "We know they are well coached, well versed in football and in good condition. But the boys are up for it, and though it is most certainly a factor in league play, you must not count Notre Dame out."

Central has a 3-1-1 mark under its coach, E. B. (Red) Etter. And the Pounders have a tough backfield quartet of quarterback Larry Shelby, halfbacks Eddie Hudson and Bill Harless and fullback Phil Lewis to test the rugged Brainerd line.

"I think they'll (Brainerd) be the best team we've played. Certainly they will be the biggest. Whoever wins this one is in a good spot for HIL honors but Notre Dame is certain to be reckoned with in the future," explained Etter.

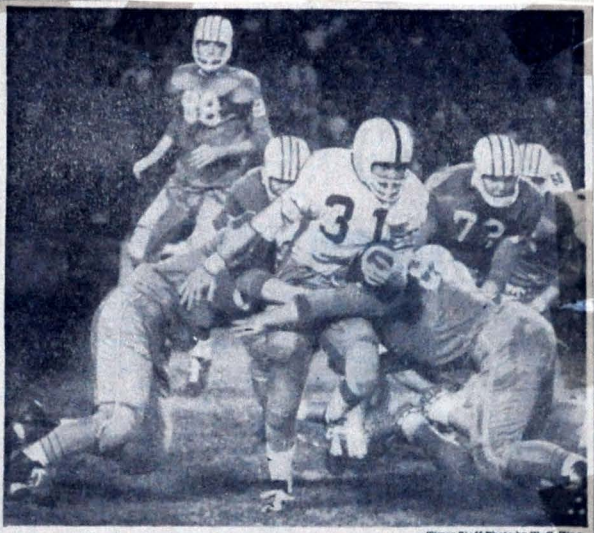
After a short Central kick, Central opened the air when for the 8,000 cold fans assembled to watch the game.

There have been only a few recorded instances of the dead being recalled to life, but Brainerd's Rebels almost wrote a modern-day chapter before succumbing, 21-14, to Central's sharp Pounders in a Hamilton Interscholastic League game Friday night that gave Red Etter's crew the league lead and the inside track to a second straight title.

For 45 minutes, Central ran over, under, around and through the Rebels to pile up a comfortable 21-0 lead. 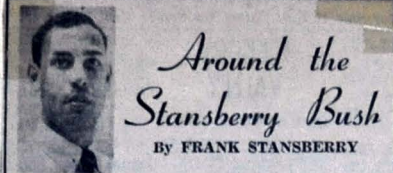

## Red Nearly Is Blue

It was cold Friday night at Brainerd, and Central Coach E. B. (Red) Etter was shivering. But it was not the icy wind that made the Pounders' mentor turn blue. He had watched his team lose a 21-0 lead in less than 120 seconds and was in danger of losing the victory which seemed so certain only two minutes before.

Central took over undisputed possession of first place in the Hamilton Interscholastic League with a 21-14 decision over Brainerd but there are a few fans in Brainerd who will tell you the Pounders were lucky to get out without a tie.

Central was not lucky. The Pounders form a well-coached team with abundant talent. They deserve the lofty place they so often frequent. But Brainerd could easily have come out with a tie.

With about one minute left on the scoreboard clock, Danny Sandlin fired a pass into the Central end zone seeking the Rebels' third touchdown in three minutes. The ball was only a foot off its mark, but in the 12 inches was the lean frame of Eddie Hudson and defied the Rebels.

A crowd of more than 8,000 assembled in the cold wind to watch the battle for Chattanooga football supremacy with quite a few leaving in the third or fourth quarter. These faint-hearted fans missed most of the action, because both teams put together long-range scoring efforts in the final quarter that could be equaled nowhere for sporting excitement.

Hudson, a work horse for Coach E. B. (Red) Etter all year, streaked nearly 50 yards in the last quarter to set up the winning margin. Larry Shelley rumbled left for 25 yards and the score. Little Bill Harless sprung him with a timely block at the line.

Sandlin fired passes of 49, 32, 25 and 17 yards in the two scoring marches and the Brainerd line came to life for a while, recovering two onside kicks and blocking magnificently for Sandlin when he was firing the desperation bombs.

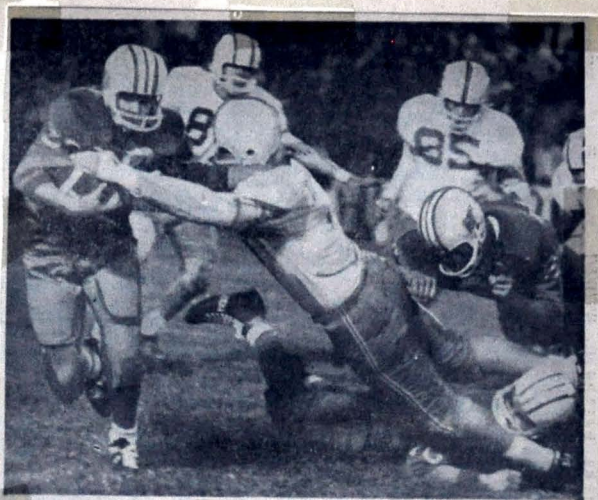
## Wind Was a Factor

The wind, so uncomfortable to the fans and players, took an early toll on Ray Coleman and his team. Central kicked off with the wind behind the boot and Bryant Millaps' foot set the ball nearly to the goal line.

Brainerd could not budge the heavy Central defense and Sandlin punted only 23 yards into the wind, giving Central the ball at midfield. Seven plays later the Pounders led 7-0.

The wind came back to help Brainerd in the final quarter, catching a spiraling kickoff and carrying it spinning into the arms of a Rebel lineman downfield, setting up the second TD.

The fans all cursed the wind; so did both coaching staffs. But in spite of the unexpected cold, the ball game—especially the final quarter—will remain one of the topics of conversation when whirl-wind finishes are discussed.

## 'Etched on Faces' ... Central Representative Describes Bellamy Pride

Bobby Johnson, representative from Central High School to the 23rd annual Bellamy Award presentation to the state of Wisconsin and Wausau Senior High today, extended congratulations and recalled the "pride etched on the face of each Centralite as he reverently witnessed the presentation of the Bellamy flag to Central and the Volunteer state of Tennessee."

Central was last year's recipient of the signal honor, a first for Chattanooga.

Central's representative was accompanied by W. Hobart Millaps, Central principal; Dr. Sam P. McConnell, Hamilton County school superintendent; Miss Mildred Major, Central's Student Council Association sponsor, and Miss Patti Averitt, delegate to Wisconsin.

The text of Johnson's speech, made this morning at the presentation ceremony, is as follows:

"Tennesseans, especially those from Chattanooga, the All-American city, understand the price of our heritage. It was purchased with the blood of our great-grandfathers on the Chickamauga Battlefield and the rocky cliffs of Lookout Mountain in the Battle Above the Clouds. Now this famous landmark may be reached by an incline, the world's steepest railway, propelled by TVA power. Today Chattanooga, the Dynamo of Dixie, has become the electrical center of the nation since TVA and its surrounding recreational facilities have become a national tourist attraction.

"The school spirit of Central was born in 1907 when Central High first opened her doors to 269 county students and has grown to be the largest Hamilton County school. Since the first graduating class of 1908, the school spirit has become a great tradition. This exuberant spirit expressed in pep meetings is extended throughout every phase of the school, sub-

stantiated by our enviable athletic record of winning several state championships and being recognized as No. 5 in football in the nation in '43.

"The quiet, diligent spirit is further exemplified by the service clubs, dedication of alumni and faculty members, and winning of 13 Freedoms Foundation awards.

"Climaxing a distinguished history of honors, the Bellamy Award served as a magnet attracting other outstanding awards, including the presidency of the State Association of Student Councils, National Council of Teachers of English runner-up award, and second in the National ROTC rifle meet. Also, in 1964 two Central students were on the 3rd Army ROTC rifle team that beat West Point for the national championship.

"Just as our school reached its maturity Oct. 11, 1963, so today you, too, understand the meaning of our principal's memorable words, 'This is Central's finest hour.'"

Taking the opening kickoff and driving for a touchdown, Central's Purple Pounders walked Red Bank 34-0 in an Hill, correct Rankin in the first game, a damper on an otherwise gay homecoming celebration being held by the Lions Friday night.

The victory, Central's fifth in the year against a home defeat and one tie, kept the Purple Pounders on top of the Hill with a 4-0 mark. For Red Bank, it was the fifth quarter, seven games.

The story of the game was simply a matter of speed—a commodity that Central's backs possessed and one which the Red Bank team didn't have and again the crowd of 4,000 watched as Pounder runners either ran wide and outdistanced their would-be tacklers or knifed through the middle for long gains.

Central started the game on its own 40 after the kickoff. And it took the fast Ponder, Larry Shelley, Eddie Hudson, Phil Lewis and Bill Harless—just seven plays to reach Red Bank's end zone. Harless scored when he ran wide around left end and falloped over from the Lion 24.

Lewis' two runs, that netted 32 and 12 yards, respectively, in the second quarter, sparked the second touchdown drive. Shelley lofted a 21-yard pass to Hudson for the score.

**Scores Again**  
Before the half ended Central back scored again on the Red Bank 20 to paydirt in 12 plays. Lewis' 26-yard run set up the touchdown and then he carried over from the one.

The Lions held during the third stanza but the Pounders started scoring again in the final period. Harless exploded through center on the quarter's first play and scored 34 yards for the only touchdown. David King added 50 third extra point to make it 34-0 for Central.

The Pounders wouldn't let up, and tallied the last touchdown on the final play of the game. After adding Red Bank at the Lion 43, Central took over and drove into the end zone in eight plays. Substitute quarterback Larry Llewellyn inched over the goal line from the one as the gun sounded.

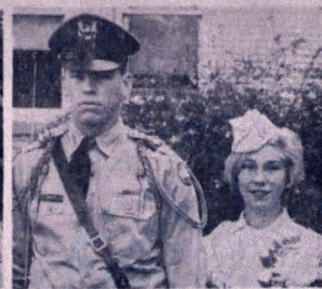

# Central Pounds Away at 1 Hole, Bumps Soddy-Daisy in 14-7 Tilt

Remember that little fellow who stuck his finger into the hole in the dike to save the dam breaking and washing away his town? Well, there are 11 holes in a football defense and Soddy-Daisy filled 10 of them Friday night, but that was all the fingers available and Central's Pounders flooded through that other hole at will to rack up a 14-7 victory that gave them a second straight Hamilton Interscholastic League title.

The hole Central found was at left tackle and Larry Shelley exploited it all night. With Ken Hudson leading the blocking, Shelley first would give to Phil Lewis who would crash pell-mell for yardage. Then Shelley would fake to Lewis, keep it himself and roll around end in crucial situations.

the Central victory against a charged up Trojan defense.

Shelley got 7 yards on a third-and-6 in the first quarter; Shelley got 30 on a third-and-2 in the third period, and he got 23 on a third-and-9 situation in the fourth period.

Central finally got on the scoreboard in the third period, taking the kick-off in just four plays. After Shelley got his 20-yard run on third down, he dropped back immediately and hit Ken McNutt on the long pass for the touch-down.

Ty Coppinger couldn't move the Trojans and as soon as he kicked, Central moved for another score. Lewis carried eight times in a nine-play drive, finally going over from the 4. Soddy-Daisy ended the third period on a big note by recovering a fumble at the Central 20, Kenny Bolea pouncing on it.

Coppinger did move his team this time, Robbie Carpenter getting a big 12-yard dash up the field to the 8 and Butch May then taking a quick pitch around left end for the score.

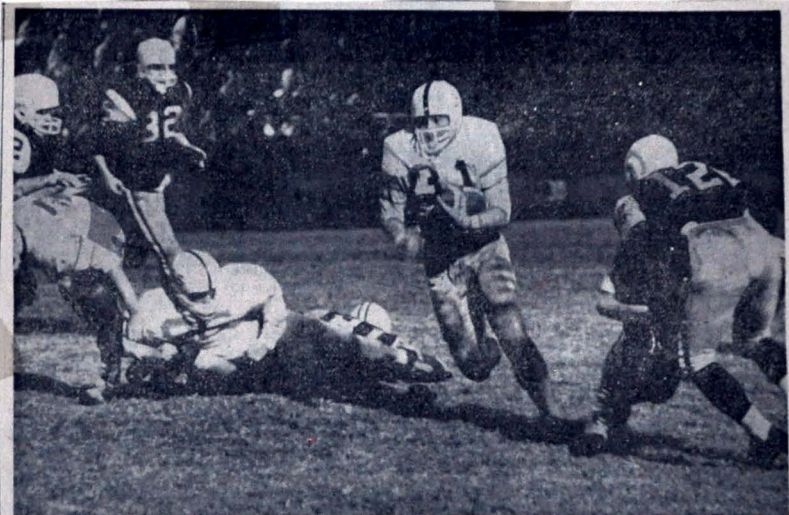
That was it, point-wise, but the teams traded pass interceptions in the final minutes. The Central grab, by McNutt, produced the highlight of the game.

McNutt ran from sideline to sideline and faked playing after player to the ground and killed 22 seconds on the clock to preserve the victory.

Nifty quarterback Larry Shelley, hard-charging fullback Phil Lewis and a very smart end named Chris McNutt combined efforts and paced Central's sixth-ranked Pounders past Soddy-Daisy, 14-7, in an HIL football game at Chamberlain Field before 4,500 fans.

For their efforts, the Pounders captured their second straight HIL title in the two-year old sport. And they also stretched their domination of Chattanooga High school football teams to an amazing 58 games. In that span, the Pounders have reeled off 65 victories against only three ties.

The Trojans were pushed all over the field in the first half, but the Pounders never could cross the double stripe for a touch-down and the two teams left in a scoreless tie.

That's when Shelley got into the act. Playing the same kind of ball that has made him one of Chattanooga's top prep signal callers this season, he guided his club straight down the field with the second half kickoff.

The Pounders started on their 25 and thanks to Shelley and McNutt, they scored in four plays. Two runs netted only eight yards. Then Shelley burst through center and sped 31 yards past the wide-eyed Trojan defenders.

### Goes for Bomb

Obviously remembering three drives stopped by Soddy-Daisy in the first half, Shelley went for the bomb. And he got it with a beautiful fake to Lewis and then a floating pass to McNutt who was all alone in the end zone. David King added the extra point and it was 14-0.

The Trojans, whose offense was stopped for most of the night by the tenacious Central defense, were unable to move. Ty Coppinger got a 35 yard punt off to the Pounders' 25. A fair catch was interfered with on the punt and that gave Central some breathing room on its 40.

This time Lewis took over as he led the Pounders on a 60-yard drive that took 10 plays. Nine times Lewis carried and on his last trip he lugged the ball over from the four. Phil personally accounted for 31 yards while Shelley got the other nine on a run.

On the last play of the third quarter, Shelley failed to complete a handoff to Lewis and the ball dropped on the 20-yard line where Soddy-Daisy's Kenny Bolea fell on it.

### Trojans Score

The Trojans burst into the scoring column on the fifth play of the last period as Butch May poked the ball around left end from the seven. Joe Varner booted the extra point and it was 14-7.

Time, however, was against Soddy-Daisy. Central used about six minutes on a drive that ended when Randall Hise intercepted a pass for the Trojans on their nine.

Just over four minutes remained in the game and Soddy-Daisy came driving out, picking up three first downs as the clock ticked off the seconds. With 30 seconds left and the ball on the Trojan 48, Coppinger dropped back for his first pass on the march and it was picked off by McNutt.

Chris might have scored. He had a good chance, but elected to run the clock out and pranced from sideline to sideline for the last 22 seconds, giving the Pounders their ninth victory against one loss and a tie.

Defensive stars were abundant on both sides. Joe Varner headed the Trojans with one of his finest efforts while Central's entire line was just short of sensational. Coppinger's punting should also be mentioned as he averaged 34.3 on five kicks with a 49-yarder being called back.

The game took just one hour, 40 minutes to play, probably the fastest contest in Chattanooga this year.

Soddy-Daisy's defense did something none of the Pounders' other nine victims could do — stop Central with less than three touch-downs.

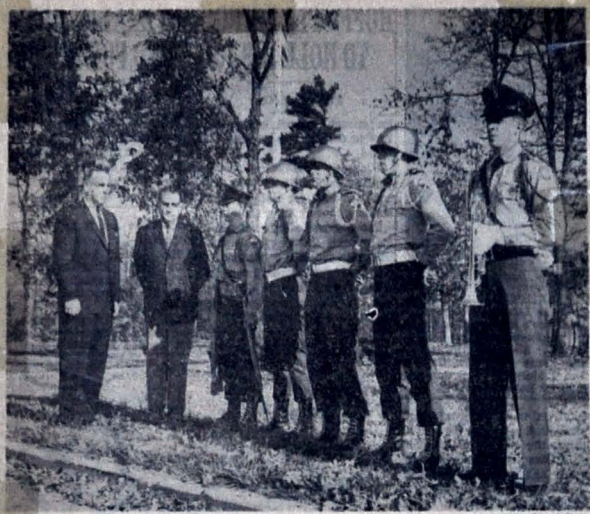

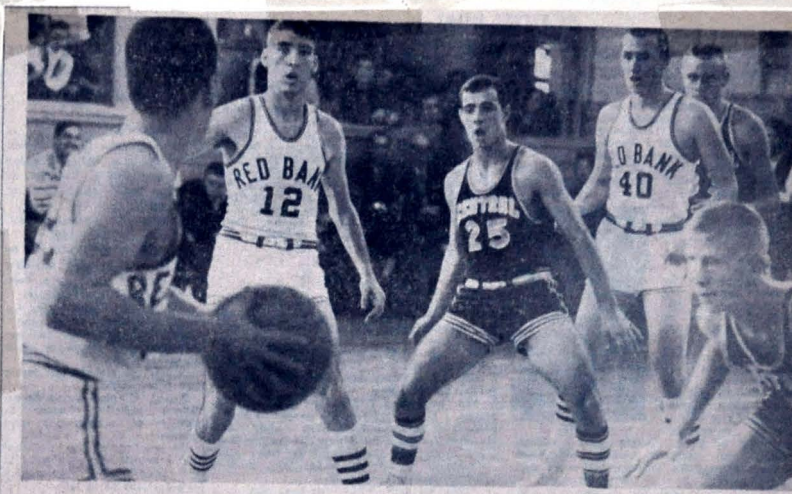

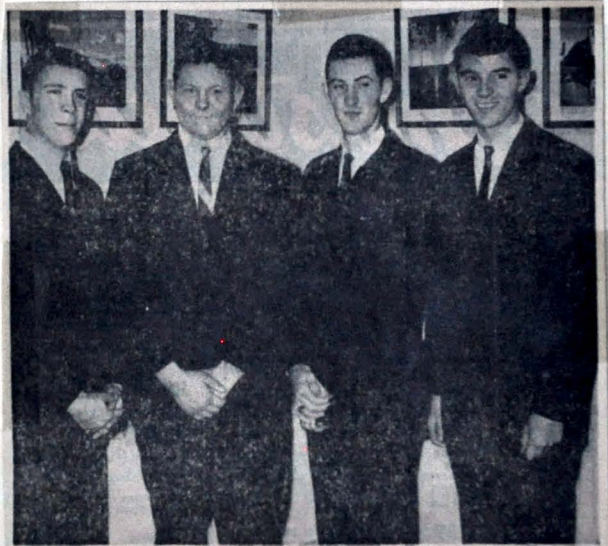

Each school has three delegates to the organization, one of whom is the school's council president. Central's representatives are Bryant Millsaps, Jane Norris, and Bobby Slaten.

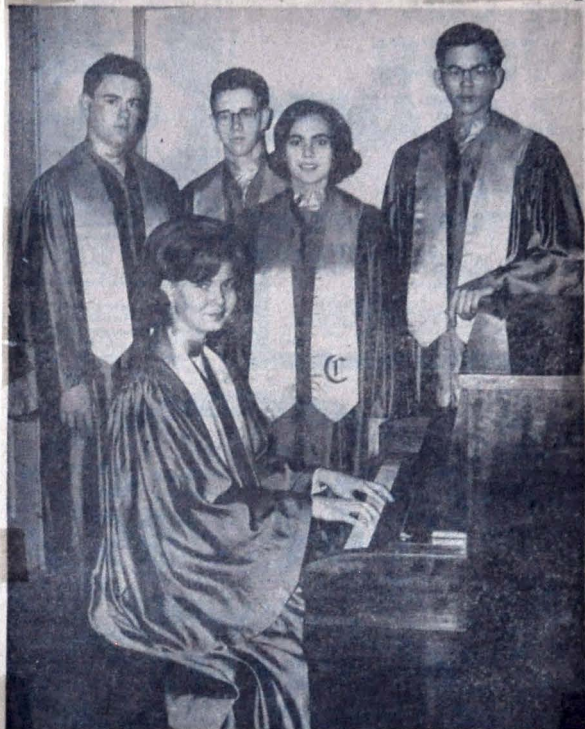
The constitution was drawn up by the executive committee composed of the presidents of member councils, and the club plans to take an official vote on it next Monday night.

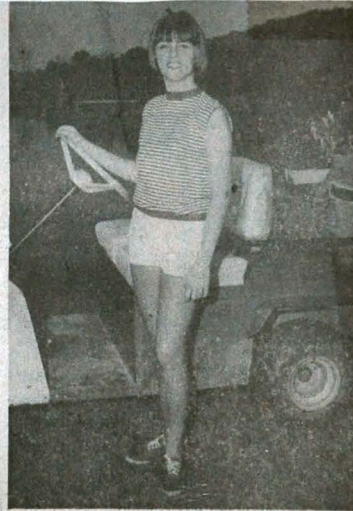

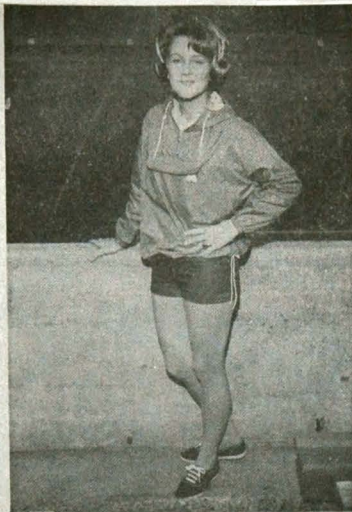

# PURPLES TOPPLE SODDY-DAISY '5'

Dynamos Get 5th Triumph  
by 68-41 Over Lions,  
Pounders Win 54-29

City High School toppled Red Bank 68-41 and Central throttled a cold shooting Soddy-Daisy outfit 54-29 for opening night victories in the City High School Round Robin basketball meet Wednesday on the Dynamos' home court before over 1,000 fans.

The second part of the big cage festival is set for this evening with City and Soddy-Daisy opening action at 7. Central and Red Bank follow at 8:30 while the third and last evening will be run on Saturday.

Central and City were completely different teams — giving no hint as to what will happen when the two clash on Saturday for the first time this year.

The Pounders played a tight defensive game, got into early foul trouble and actually coasted in the victory when the Trojans missed 21 of 28 free throws.

**Hot Shooting**  
The Dynamos, picking up victory No. five against a lone setback to potential Kingpoet, used a hot shooting hand to rip the Lions. City sank 29 of 59 from the floor for a torrid 49.3 percentage.

The 21 missed free throws for the Trojans only half tell the story of all the chances they had to make a game of it. Soddy-Daisy blew 14 shots on the chance of a one-and-one meaning the Trojans could have had a first at 14 more points had they hit their charity shots.

Meanwhile the Purples, in gaining their sixth straight victory since two opening losses, took advantage of the Trojans cold hand. Jim Dillard was the offensive hero as he sank 19 points, hitting seven of 13 field attempts.

Central, using its usual aggressive defense, was in foul trouble most of the way. Starters Bobby Johnson, Bobby Burns and Vic Lund all had four fouls on them with 3:02 left in the second period.

Johnson, Central's 6-5 rebounding and scoring ace, sat out the third period and didn't re-enter until early in the fourth quarter. He ended with 12 rebounds, but picked up nine of them in the first period. He had 10 points.

Lund also lent a helping hand to Johnson and Dillard. He jumped in 10 points on five of 11 shots.

Soddy-Daisy had no one in double figures. Ronnie Masterson, Jimmy Grant and Tommy Fox all hit six while Grant picked off 10 rebounds for the Trojans.

City's scoring was balanced for the most part with guards Hubert Fowler and Eddie Wiseman leading the way. Fowler hit 15 points while Wiseman added 10.

Bryan Fozo was the leading Dynamo rebounder with nine and had a like number of points, but a like number of fouls. Fowler came in, hit six points and pulled off eight rebounds to help out Coach Jim Phillips' outfit.

"The guards looked real good to us tonight," said Phifer, "but the whole team played well. This was one of our better games of the season."

Red Bank, which could not match the hot-shooting City outfit, hit only 13 of 50 from the field for an icy 26 per cent. Eddie Remro was the showpiece for the Lions as he netched 15 points and led all rebounders with 15.

Soddy-Daisy now has a 2-9 record while Red Bank is 1-6 going into tonight's action.

## KUNTZ GLITTERS FOR PURPLE CLUB

Hits 14, Snags Rebounds for Winners—Hubbuck Leads Irish '5'

John Kuntz, a slender 6-3 forward who has spent most of the year on the Central bench with a painfully bruised leg, slammed home seven field goals in 10 attempts to lead the Pounders to a 42-29 HIL AA basketball victory over Notre Dame Tuesday on the Purples' floor.

Enjoying his best day since coming to Central from Clarendon, Tenn., as a transfer, Kuntz picked off 13 rebounds. Pounder center Bobby Johnson collected the same number of rebounds, added eight points and joined Kuntz in pacing the Purples to their eighth victory in 11 games.

John Shinesaw scored 11 points to lead Central over the Irish 43-40 in the B game.

For the Notre Dame varsity, playing for the first time without captain Greg McCall who has moved out of town, George Hubbuck shot on a stellar shooting exhibition that nearly brought the Irish victory.

While the game ended with 13 points difference between the two clubs, Notre Dame fought to within one point of the Pounders at 27-26 with 6:20 left in the game. Then came a late Central push as the Purples romped well away from the dangerous Irish outfit.

It was another top defensive effort for Central, which had limited teams to just 41.5 points a game. Time and again, Johnson and his mates would block Irish shots and Coach Dub Rowlett crew a 42-29 floor mistake under the tight man-to-man guarding by the Purples to keep the total down.

**Fine Defensive Game**  
Notre Dame also played a top-notch defensive game, leaving on Johnson, the Purples' best 6-5 scoring ace, the Irish permitted him only 13 shots, four coming in the second half.

But Kuntz, who is just now coming around after sitting out most of December, slipped near the bucket numerous times and his teammates responded by throwing the ball to him for easy layups. He ended by sending 14 points through the hoop.

Notre Dame was never ahead and Kuntz' first fielder, a three-foot bank shot, put the Purples in front for good at 4-2.

Hubbuck led the second-half charge with 10 points and hit a 20-footer that whittled Central's margin to one in the fourth quarter.

But Johnson netched a 10-footer, Jim Dillard slipped in for a layup, Kuntz followed with another layup, Tom Lawhorn shot in a 10-footer and Kuntz got another basket to push Central out front 37-26 with 2:24 left.

For the game, Notre Dame hit 12 of 39 shots for a cold 30.8 per cent while the Pounders swished 18 of 31 for 58.3 per cent. In the rebounding department, Central held a 42-30 edge. Brian Cook led Irish rebounders by hauling in 14, tops for the day.

Bobby Johnson, a 6-5 senior who was all-anything last year in schoolboy basketball here, was the big difference Tuesday night as Central came from behind to defeat Notre Dame 38-30 in a fine HILL defensive battle.

It was a tight Notre Dame man-to-man defense against an even tighter Central press at Stigmater Gym which was as crowded as a dime store on Christmas Eve.

### AA Battle

Bob Johnson, who finished as the game's high scorer with 17, hit six in the opening period to pace the Pounders to a 12-3 lead.

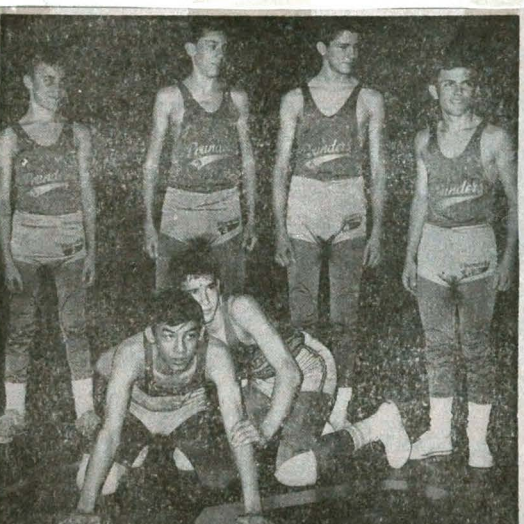
In the second stanza Jim Dillard grabbed the scoring reins, pumping in 10 points, to push Central to a 30-17 halftime margin.

Central was penalized with 26 personal fouls and 6-5 Bobby Johnson, Bobby Burns and Vic Lund all had four personal fouls before the half.

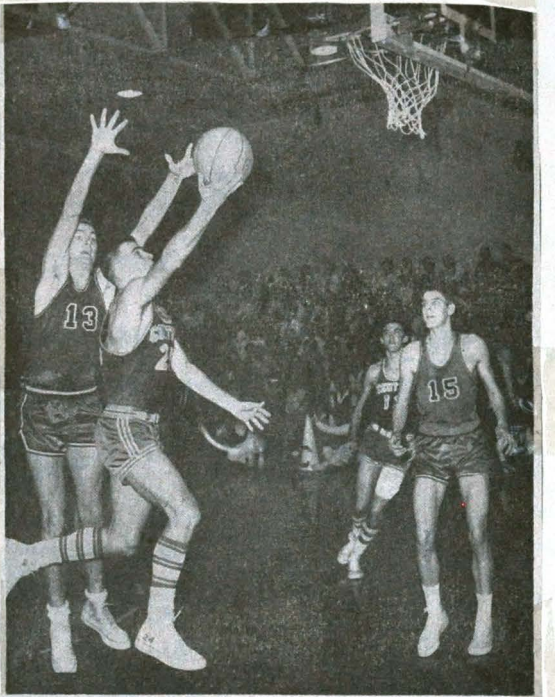

# Johnson's Record Performance Leads Central; City Five Wins

Records are made to be broken, but Bobby Johnson may have pushed the individual total performance in the Round Robin past the ordinary limits, too far for it to be touched again. 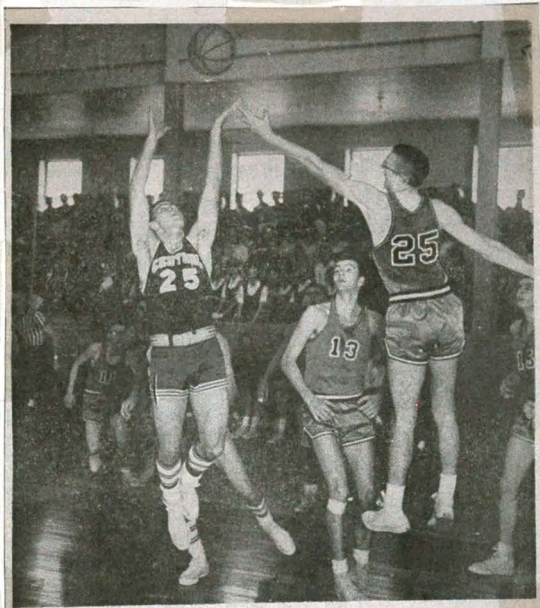

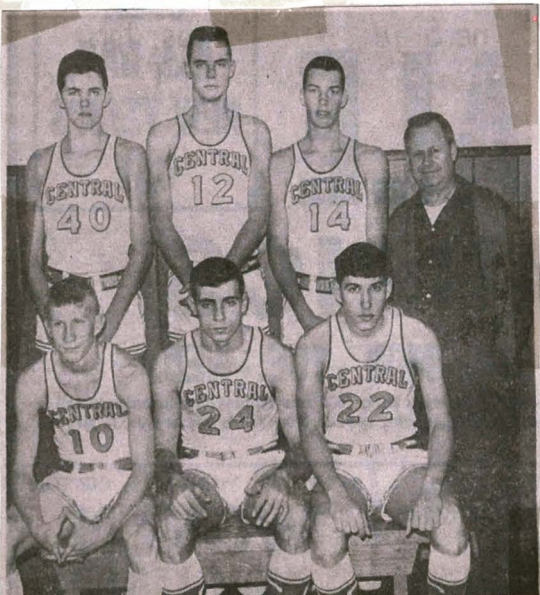

Soddy-Daisy, Red Bank in Opening Tilt Beginning at 7 P.M. at City

The season's first meeting between arch-rivals City and Central brings down the curtain on the Round Robin basketball meet at the City High gym tonight starting at 8:30. However, the Dynamos-Daisy battle will not be the only long-time rivalry renewed. ## Round Robin Finale Appears About Even

### City, Central Have Nearly Alike Records, as Do Lions and Trojans

What a difference a couple of weeks makes. If Central and City had played a fortnight ago, the Dynamo probably would have been a big favorite. But when they meet tonight in the Round Robin, following the 7 o'clock Red Bank and Soddy-Daisy game, you can flip a coin.

Central has come on strong to win seven straight games by margins of 12 and 13 points and Kingsport. City has posted a 6-1 mark with the lone loss to Kingsport.

The big difference for Central right now, however, is that Jimmy Dillard, Tommy Lawhorn and others are providing some points to help keep the defense spread more and prevent it ganging up on 6-5 Bobby Johnson.

Dillard has 34 in two games of the Round Robin so far. Johnson has 40.

Central coach Gordon Smith would like one more present — to have forward John Kuntz return to the Pounder lineup. Out before the Founders had even taken the floor, Kuntz' absence has made a hole Smith shift his plans.

Central, holding opponents to 43.7 points per game in racking up a 5-2 mark, is now a defensive club because Kuntz was expected to be one of two scoring cogs along with center Bobby Johnson. Central Grapplers Dump City for 3rd Victory of Young Season

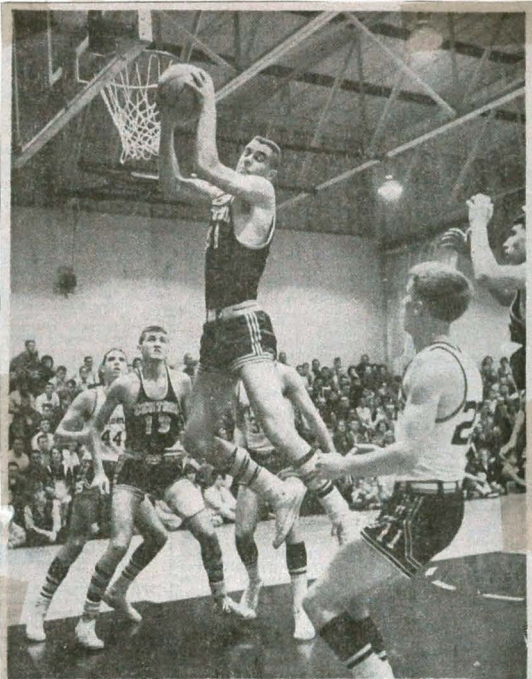

It was the Pounders' third team victory in as many dual meets this season. Previous mat victories came over Brainerd and the McCallie B-team.

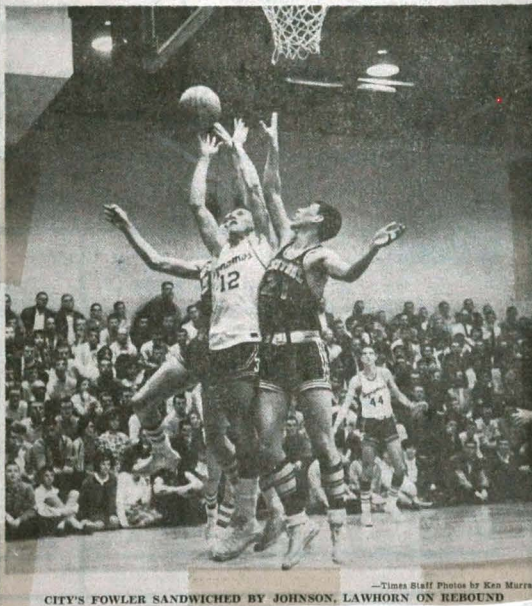

Hampton used four last quarter floor mistakes by Central and became the first high school basketball team in Tennessee to win 20 games this year as it tipped the Ponders 38-36 on the Purples' floor Friday afternoon.

Bud Winters' 10-foot jump shot from the side climaxed a Bulldog rally and provided the Ponders with their second straight defeat. With 45 seconds left it looked as if Central might prevail when Bobby Johnson swished a pair of free throws to shove the Purples ahead 35-34.

However, Hampton came down fast and Winters shoved one in from the side to knot the score with 22 seconds remaining. Then a Pounder bobble turned the ball right back to the East Tennessee victors with 19 seconds left and Winters rang up his winning points.

"We wanted Winters to take the last shot," said an elated Hampton coach, Ed Hus. "We didn't want him as far out on the side or to shoot quite so soon. But we won, so it's okay."

### Tight Defensive Battle

The game was a tight defensive battle with the Ponders' defense holding Hampton scoreless from the floor for periods of nine and six minutes at a time. The Bulldogs did hit a fielder in the first period and not until Eddie Stockton made a tip-in with seven minutes left did the Bulldogs begin to dent the Pounder bucket from the floor.

The second long stretch of frigid shooting for the visitors came in the first six minutes of the last period. But Winters hit three in the last two minutes and Dennis Stout added another as Hampton overcame a faltering Central team and had managed to keep a two-point lead.

Both teams used a full court press most of the afternoon with Central employing its man to man while Hampton stayed in a zone press. The zone also kept Johnson, the Ponders' 6-5 scoring and rebounding whiz, from getting to the boards and the Bulldog came out on top in rebounds, 24-20.

### Four of Nine

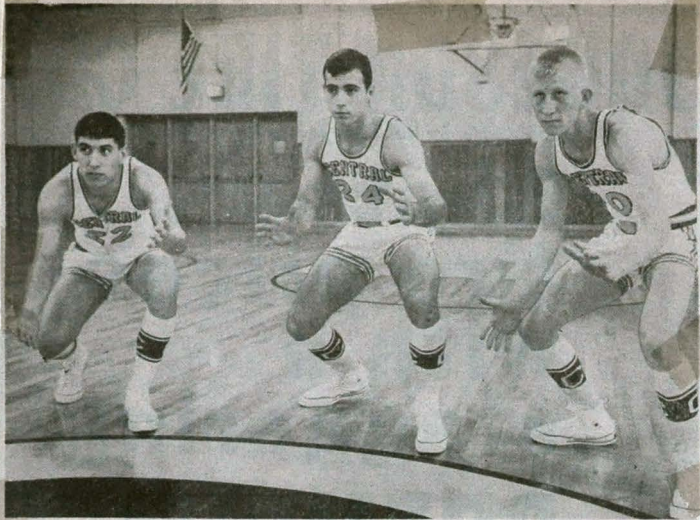
Johnson managed to hit 14 points, high for both clubs, and pull in nine rebounds, also tops for the two teams. He hit four of nine from the floor and made all six foul shots.

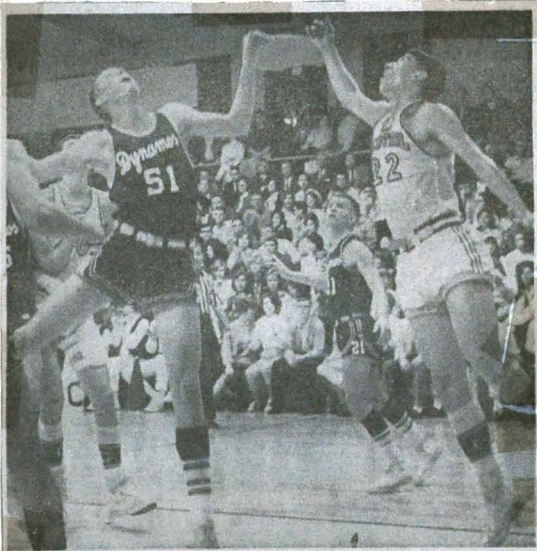

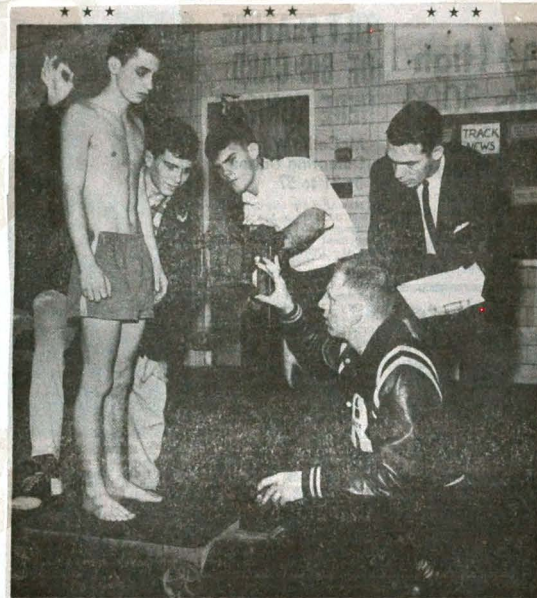

### Close In Third

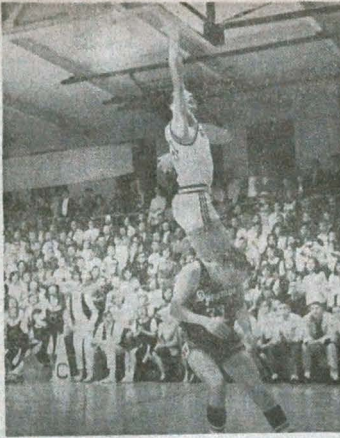
The clubs were close in the third period but shortly after the start of the last period City ran out to a six-point bulge when Fowler hit another five-footer to make it 35-29.

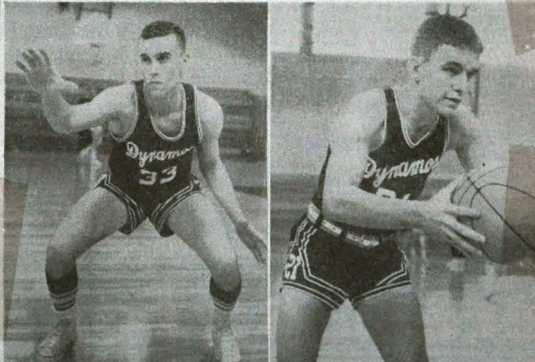
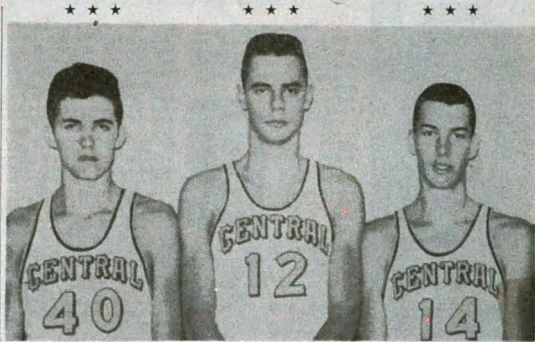
### DYNAMO WIN WILL SEW UP LEAGUE TITLE

Four Other Loop Games Scheduled; Tyner Hosts Murray

There comes a time in every sports season when it's do or die. Sometimes that moment is clouded and hardly discernible. Other times it is bright and shining as the North Star. The latter case is the situation for Chattanooga Central tonight as the Pounders challenge City's league-leading Dynamo for a piece of the lead in the HIL 'AA' race.

The crystal-clear situation is this: another Central loss and the Pounders, now 5-1, can kiss goodby their chances of repeating as league champions. For City, it is just about as clear—a victory and the Dynamo can dust off a spot in their bulging trophy case in preparation for their second HIL silverware.

A City victory in the game to be played on Central's floor will make the Dynamo 8-0 with only Notre Dame and Red Bank left in the league. The Maroons have beaten both this year although two of the games were close. But there is little reason to believe Jim Phifer's crew would blow them both, especially since the games will be played on City's floor.

# Fowler, Bryan, Brightwell Lead City Quint Past Central 48-39, Sole Lead in HIL 'AA'

A City Dynamo team, which did few things wrong and made up for them with a host of things right, has downed arch-rival Central, 48-39, and today owns undisputed possession of first place in the Hamilton Interscholastic League "AA" race on a 7-0 record. That's exactly the same mark owned by

Hixson in the 'A' division after the Wildcats' 62-32 triumph over Sale Creek. City and Central spent the first half probing for weaknesses before turning loose their 1,000 screaming spectators. Then with Bobby Johnson of Central and Tom Fowler of City matching 10-point performances in the final period, City finally pulled away in the final minute and 48 seconds for its margin after leading only 46-38 at this point.

Hixson had less trouble with Sale Creek, paddling its lead throughout as Bill Talent hit 24 points and Charles Myatt had 20.

In other games, Red Bank nudged East Ridge 57-7, Caboon took Birchwood 71-57, Tyner won an HIL decision over Ooltewah 77-32 in overtime, Soddy-Daisy surprised Brainerd in an 'AA' game, 62-51, Kirkman rolled past Chattanooga Valley, 85-50, and Rossville won from Lakeview 60-45.

## City Slows Johnson, Takes 7th Victory

City's main job was on defense and the problem was to stop Bobby Johnson. The Dynamo did that through the efforts of 6-5 David Bryan, who matched Johnson in height, and Tommy Brightwell, a 6-4 center. They, and some others who dropped out to save the Founders' pride, kept him away from the basket most of the night—and that was the difference.

Johnson finally began to move outside in the final period, shooting from 18 to 25 feet and once stole the ball and drove the ball court to put in a layup. His 10 points in the final period raised his total to 16 for the night, but through the first 37 minutes, he had just 7.

Both teams were tight at the start, trying to take the safe shots and it was 6-5 first period, Central, and 18-12 at the half, City.

Central came out in a 2-3 and 3-2 zone to start the second half and Jimmy Dillard cut the edge quickly with a driving layup and a steal which he fed to Calvin Harrison for a crip. When Bobby Burns scored on a long pass it was 18-18 Central and the lead swapped three more times until Bryan hit a 20-footer from the corner to make it 22-18 City.

The Dynamo stretched it out to 30-23 at the end of the period as Bryan added a free throw and Fowler and Eddie Wiseman added 20-footers.

In the furious fourth period, Central went in a man-to-man defense and trying to double team City's efforts to steal the ball from the Dynamo. It was a line 11 times for free throws, but on five occasions missed on 1-and-1 opportunities.

City went out in 10 points on charity tosses, however, to offset five baskets by Central as Johnson led the comeback.

After being down by 7 at the quarter, Central clinched it by just 2 at 34-32 with 5:27 left. Then Fowler hit three straight free throws after Wiseman arched another 20-footer and it was seven again.

At the end Central came back, first to 39-37 on a basket by Dillard and a three-point layup by Johnson. It was on this play that Johnson's elbow caught Bryan in the mouth and inflicted a severe cut on his tongue which required nine stitches.

He finished the game, however, and his injury was not discovered until after the game.

# City Victor Over Central 48-39-

## DYNAMOS SNATCH HIL LEADERSHIP

Fowler, Brightwell Shine in Iron Men Triumph—Overflow Thunders

Hubert Fowler led the five "iron men" of City High to a pressure-packed 48-39 HIL AA basketball victory over Central in a game full of rivalry before a thundering overflow crowd of 3,500 on the Dynamos' court Tuesday night.

Fowler, a shifty guard, put a crimp in the Founders' plans for a reversal of an earlier 32-30 defeat at the hands of City as he sank 20 of 32 free throws. This total included three vital charity tosses that he pushed through with 1:49 left to shove the Dynamos to a 38-32 lead which nearly melted in the heat of a Central press.

The victory gave City the edge in the run for the AA throne with a perfect 7-0 record. Overall, the Dynamos are 10-3. Central, sustaining its first loss in five league games, is now 10-5 for the year.

Fowler was brilliant as he pried up a falling game. He dribbled and shoved it into a lead it was never to lose. His two free throws completed an early City rally that wiped out a brief Pounder lead of 11-8 and put coach Jim Phifer's crew ahead for good at 12-11.

While the Dynamos, who only used five men all night, never relinquished the lead, they almost came apart under a frantic Central press. The first Pounder rally came early in the third quarter when a 32-25 City lead was cut back to 27-25. Jim Dillard and Bobby Johnson hit layups to cut the margin to 34-32 with 5:30 left, but the Dynamo started a spurt of their own clinaxed by Fowler's three charity tosses on a personal and technical foul.

### Came Back

"Then coach Gordon Smith's Founders came right back with its press, trimming the margin to two points again as Jim Dillard scored layup to make it 38-27. Tommy Brightwell hit a free throw but Johnson canned a pair of charity tosses to make it 40-29 with 1:48 showing.

That's when David Bryan busted down the middle to tip in a missed shot of Fowler's with 1:29 remaining and virtually clinch the game for the Dynamos. City ran out on the Founders who were fouling desperately in order to get the ball.

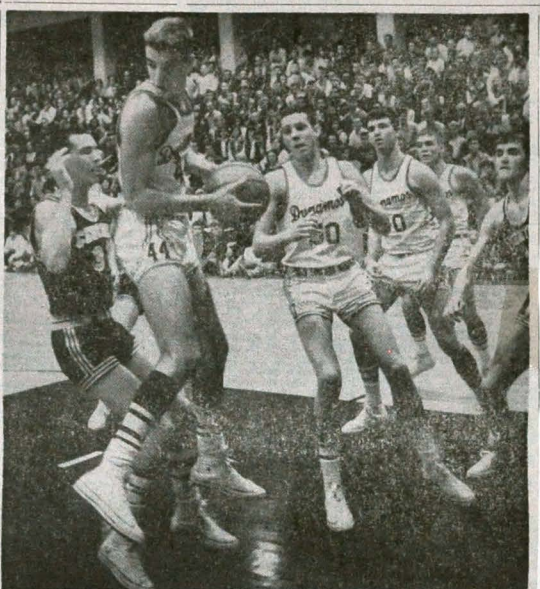
Perhaps the story of the game lay in Brightwell, a 6-3 senior center for the Dynamos. He picked off 18 rebounds and was the man responsible for City's 35-29 domination on the boards.

"Brightwell did a fine job," commented Phifer after the game. "We looked good and were a fine job on Johnson but don't let anyone tell you he's not a fine boy. He is as good as anyone around and a tremendous competitor."

Two more free throws by Johnson got the Founders within one point at 40-39 and it was here that the Dynamo pulled it out. Bryan got a tinn. Fowler hit two free throws on Johnson's final personal foul. Fowler made a fast break and got a layup and Wiseman added another layup on a steal at the game ended.

Fowler led City with 18 and Brightwell had 18 rebounds. Johnson was the only double figure for Central with his 16.

Indeed the Dynamo defense did a top-notch job on Johnson. The 6-3 scoring sensation got 18 points, his average, but was kept away from the boards so that his rebounding effectiveness was cut down. He ended with nine of the boards and he had to come through with a great lead period of 19 points which kept the Puffers alive.

"Two or three times if we had made the right layup," said a disappointed Smith, "we'd have been rich in there. But the boys made a good comeback and they didn't quit."

Fowler had plenty of help in the scoring department as Eddie Wiseman, a flashy guard, and Bryan each contributed 12 to the cause. Byron Fozo picked out on the boards as he helped off six.

City, which hit only one of seven shots from the field in the first quarter, notched 14 of 25 over the last three periods. The torrid finish gave the Dynamos 15 of 32 for 46.8 per cent. Central was cold, making only 13 of 44 for an icy 29.5 per cent.

Bryan was taken to a doctor after the game with a mouth injury. However, it isn't believed to be serious and he should be ready for Thursday's game with Meigs County.

Director of Central High to Become President of National Principals

Principal W. Hobart Millsaps of Central High School was placed in line Monday to become president of the National Association of Secondary School Principals in 1972.

Millsaps, who was chosen principal at Central High in 1959 following the retirement of the late Stacy E. Nelson, is a former president of the East Tennessee Education Association.

Central High has won many athletic and scholastic honors under his guidance. It was the recipient of the 1963 Bellamy Flag Award, given annually to one high school in the nation for all-around achievement. The award honors R. Eugene Bettam, who wrote the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

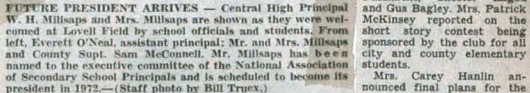

## CENTRAL STUDENT, GEORGIAN LOCKED

They Fire 75s in Opening Round—Seven Entries 1 Stroke Off Pace

Giant-sized, 18-year-old Chattanooga Central senior Larry White and little 15-year-old Macon, Ga., Stratford Academy freshman David Everett each grabbed a share of the first round lead Monday in the 29th annual Southern Interscholastic Golf Tournament.

Both fired four-over-par 75s over the rolling Lookout Mountain Golf Club course, which measures 6,375 yards and has a par of 35-36-71, but bedevils strangers more frequently with its deceptive bent-grass greens.

White, the current Tennessee high school champion and winner of both the Brainerd and LeFayette invitational tournaments against adult fields last year, had nine-hole totals of 33 and 40, while the 5-10, 150-pound Everett, who placed third in the Macon City Amateur last summer, had nine-hole breakdowns of 36 and 39.

Three-putt greens hampered both their scores. White had four and Everett had two.

Seven players, including City's Charles Taylor Jr. and Notre Dame's Prescott Richter, were only one stroke off the pace with 76s. The group also consisted of Pepper Patrick of Griffin, Ga., Boone Smith and Ben Bob Busbee of Sidney Lanier of Macon, Ga., Tommy Harper of Stratford Academy, and Bob Thompson of Greenville, S.C.

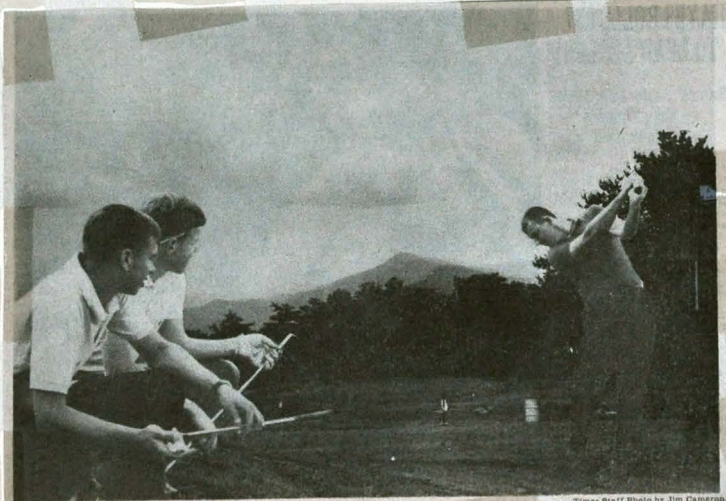

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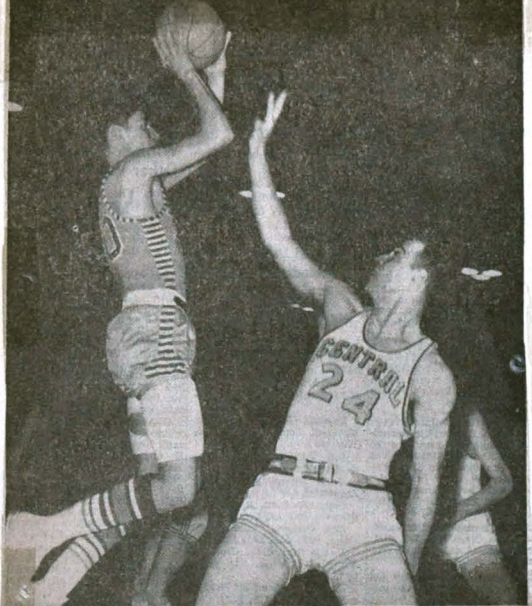

## Wildcats Rally, Win Over Soddy-Daisy By 62 to 49

Brainerd Coach Buddy Guerdon stood near a basket in the silent Rebel gym after his team's first victory ever over Central. A little boy "stomped" a paper cup and the loud pop echoed over the empty seats. A fan stuck out a hand and muttered "Congratulations." And then assistant Jay Ahlerson said quietly:

"All this won't mean a thing now unless we beat Hixson and get to the Region III tournament."

That's the next job for the Rebels, but right now they are glorying in that 44-41 beating of second-seeded Central last night. It was the first Rebel win after seven tries over five years' play. They won once before but it was nullified on a forfeit.

And the defeat stimulated a bid by Gordon Smith's Pounders for a trip to the regional for the 13th straight year. Right now, there is another team—Hixson—working on a string, however, and the Wildcats came from behind to drop Soddy-Daisy 62-49 in their first step toward a third straight regional appearance.

Brainerd and Hixson get the semifinal program under way tonight and Ben City, seeded No. 1, faces third-seeded Notre Dame. City also has been in the regional for two straight years.

Hixson won its only meeting with Brainerd this year by 63-49 while City has downed Notre Dame twice, 62-58 and 62-52.

Brainerd, which had lost to Central by two points in each of two season games, never led the Pounders until Jim Grant hit a jumper to break a 33-33 tie in the fourth quarter. The score had been tied at 64, 10-10 and 22-22 previously, but Central had managed to stay on top other than that.

Central got the edge again at 39-38 on Jim Dillard's layup with 1:24 left, but Darle Jordan, who had been "quarterbacking" the Rebel attack, suddenly became a scorer too and popped in a jumper for his eighth point of the period.

Then Jim Butler cashed four of five free throws on desperation. Central personal fouls in the final 23 seconds to ice it.

The teams were as even as you can get in just about every department. Each had 14 field on 16 of 24 free throws compared with 13 of 21 for Central. The Rebels got the extra ones when the Pounders had to foul in the last seconds.

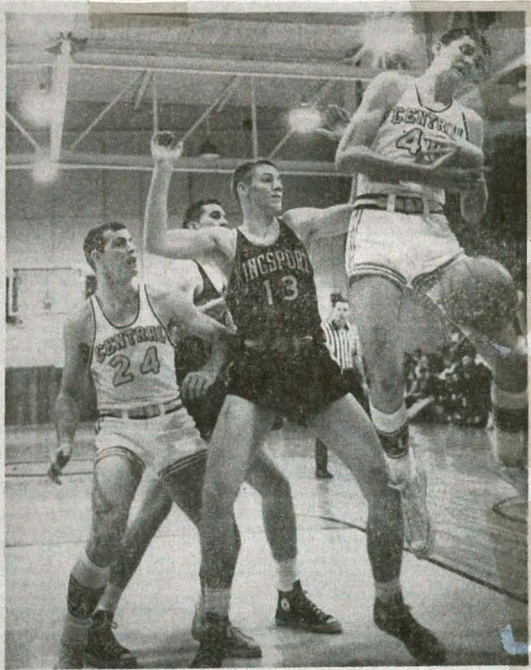

Central led most of the way, expanding its edge to nine points at 23-14 before Kingsport hit three straight baskets just before half time.

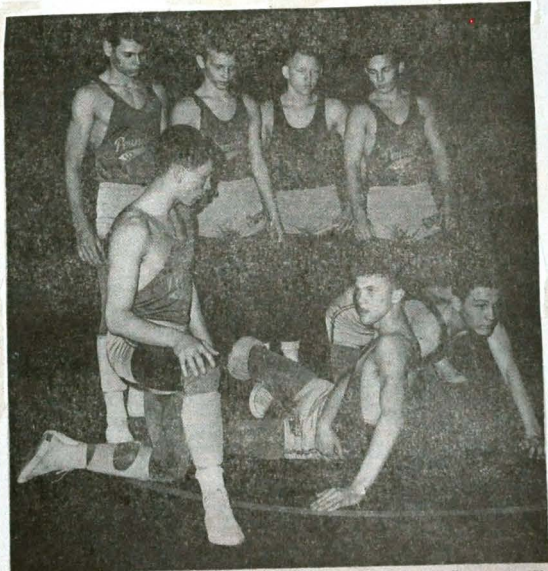

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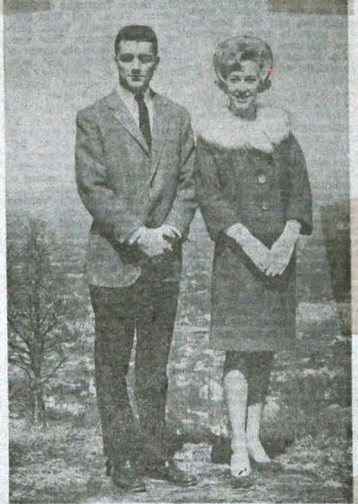

# CENTRAL HIGH CEILING FALLS

## Plaster and Laths Come Down in Hall

By GAINES HOBBS

A large section of plaster ceiling on Central High School's second floor fell shortly before noon today when metal laths holding it came loose, school officials said.

The strip of plaster and laths, estimated to be about 16 feet wide and 45 feet long, fell from the hall ceiling in the north end of the building.

No one was injured, according to Principal W. Hobart Millsaps.

The cost of repairing the ceiling will run as high as \$450, R. W. Bordwine, supervisor of maintenance for the county, said. "We're going to fix it, but it'll just come down again," declared Dr. Jack Geckler, administrative assistant in charge of the county's school buildings and grounds, after inspecting the damage.

Mr. Millsaps said there are other sections of the ceiling that sooner or later will be loose. Other ceiling sections in the 58-year-old building have fallen in the past, but the one today was described as the largest yet.

Days before the ceiling fell, was not called for an inspection of the damage.

The board chairman attributed the loosening of plaster to the age of the building, which is about 60 years old. There was no moisture in the damaged area, he said.

Dr. Jack Geckler, the county schools' building supervisor, said he felt the cause of damage was vibration. He said he felt the laths and plaster from all the ceilings must be torn down.

"Taking it down, however, is one thing in the way of expense and replacing it with sheet rock is another," Geckler observed.

The 2x12-inch wooden beams could be left exposed but might cause a light reflection problem, he continued. Smith pointed out the lack of ceilings would result in the loss of heat during winter months.

Supt. Sam P. McConnell hesitated to make a recommendation because of uncertainty over how much money might be available for the project.

"I'm upset about it too," McConnell said. "If we had the money right now to start building a new Central High School, we couldn't occupy it until September 1967."

**Expert Suggested**  
McConnell said experts had estimated the county would have to spend \$300,000 on the building to make it suitable for occupancy for just five or six more years. Geckler advised he heard the structure would be re-examined to get expert opinion on what should be done about the ceilings.

Smith said he at first considered the possibility moving Central students who live outside Chattanooga to other county high schools. Only 600 of the 1,400 students at Central are not residents of the city but all of the county's other high schools are crowded, McConnell advised.

Last year the board asked approval of \$8.5 million in bonds for the county schools. Funds for construction of a new Central High at Harrison were in the request.

But because of Tennessee law requiring the county to divide its school revenue with Chattanooga under an average-daily-attendance ratio the County Council submitted a bond issue of \$17 million to the voters last November. It was overwhelmingly rejected.

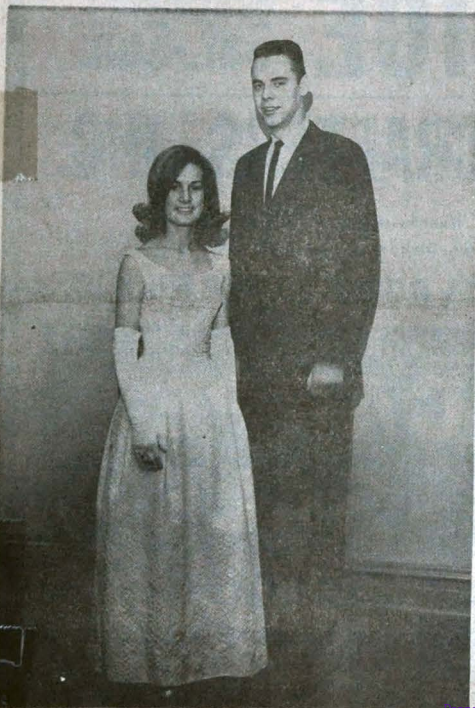

# Just Between Us Fans

## Sadness of Bales' Passing

All older sports fans have died a little when W. P. (Bang Bang) Bales passed on last week.

An admirable fellow through and through, he was a fine influence on the many athletes he coached. And while wielding this good influence, he found time to turn out a lot of winning teams in baseball and basketball by his thorough, sound coaching tactics.

We saw him play baseball before he moved to Chattanooga. He played infield for Morrristown in the old Appalachian League around 1914. He advanced to the Memphis team and when he turned to coaching he brought a well-trained knowledge of baseball. His Central and American Legion baseball teams won many city titles and went far in state play-offs. But it was perhaps in basketball that he won most coaching fame.

He had three standout teams. Talking about them to us in 1955, he sized them up this way:

"In 1940, we got hot in the tournaments after a so-so season and went to the state finals. We had that year Howard Sompayrac, Charley Saylor and Houston Braddock. We won the state championship in 1942."

"In 1929 we beat everybody in the state meet by 20 points or more. We lost one game in the regular season when we had a 10-point lead and started putting on a Celtic-style show of whipping the ball around and doing tricks. It was a really fine team—Mutt and Howard Hammond, Frank Bradford, Hopy Bennet and Ralph Olinaga."

"Then in 1943 we didn't lose a game. That year we had George Carden, Ned Thaxton, Frank Trundle, Bill Schulte, Gus Street and Ed Eitzen. We lost one game and missed the state meet, but we won anyway."

"When you get up around the top 4 or 5 teams in the state, the margin of difference is thin in the games," Bales said. "For instance in 1945, Kingsport beat us in four overtimes and they beat us 35-32. In the state finals we met them again and they bested us 36-31."

We've told this story about him several times, but here it goes once more, because it shows his character.

Central was playing at home in basketball and when a visiting player went to the foul line, the Central student booed, in hope the shooter would miss. Bales signaled them to stop. They didn't. So he asked for time out, stepped to the middle of the floor and announced that if there was any more booing of visitors while shooting fouls, he would clear the gym.

There was no more booing.

As a coach, William P. Bales expected his teams to play to win, as a teacher, he demanded that his students learn their lessons. And Central High School, where he spent 34 years, remembers him for these attitudes and attributes.

In neither area of work, however, did he simply stop with such fundamentals.

He wanted to give his basketball and baseball teams, to be sure, his own verve for playing the game fairly and vigorously imparted itself to the youngsters he coached. They went at it with all they had in them without ever losing sight of the need for good sportsmanship or the element of fun in the game.

In the classroom, where history was his forte, he wanted his pupils to know the essential facts, but beyond that he wanted them to grasp the essential meaning of the past so that they could better understand the present.

Coach and professor, he bridged the gap between the athletic field and the classroom better than most who worked with young people in both areas. He was good at both, and he never permitted one interest to overshadow the other in his own preparation.

He retired from Central in 1956; in recent years, he had suffered from a crippling ailment, but his death Sunday at the age of 77 was unexpected. He never lost interest in Central or its students, present or past. Nor did the school forget him. He was a favorite of all who knew his work or were touched by his guidance.

An athlete himself, he played professional ball in the minor leagues and later with the Southern League in Memphis. During one season he led the league in batting.

Born April 23, 1877, in Mosheim, Tenn., he was the son of Jesse Bales, well-known farmer of that area, and Mrs. Bales. He graduated from Tennessee Wesleyan College, then a junior college, and taught and coached at McMinn County High School for two years.

Mr. Bales entered the University of Chattanooga and coached at Chattanooga Central High School while studying for his B.A. degree, which he received in 1922. He went on to Columbia University and received his master's degree.

He was physical education director for the YMCA at Fort Oglethorpe during World War I. He succeeded the faculty of Central High as head of the physical department and at the same time was named basketball and football coach, launching a sideline career which was to become famous in Tennessee high school athletics. He retired in 1956.

Mr. Bales was a member of First Methodist Church, the Coaches and Officials Association, the Elks Club and the state and national units of the Retired Teachers Association.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Daphne Morris Bales of Chattanooga; one son, William Central; a daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Bales White, Oak Ridge; three grandsons, Ronald William Bales, William Eric White and James Alexander White; five nephews and two nieces.

Interment will be in Chattanooga Memorial Park. His body will lie in state at the East Chapel of Chattanooga Funeral Home.

# Coach Bales Fondly Remembered

The name of Coach William Perley Bales, widely known to his countless friends as "Bang Bang" Bales, is an honored and warmly respected one in our community.

Coach Bales, whose constructive life here was ended yesterday at the age of 77, came by his education in a period when "everybody" just didn't automatically go to college. He was born on a Tennessee farm, graduated from junior college at Tennessee Wesleyan, taught school and coached, and entered the University of Chattanooga to earn his bachelor's degree. He later

earned his master's degree at Columbia University.

In retirement since 1956, Coach Bales was not forgotten. There are many who will honor his memory today because of his outstanding service to the young people of our community.

# SOUTH IS PICKED BY CAGE MENTORS

Central Coach Will Head HIL Group—Levi and McEwen Are Named

Gordon Smith, popular Central basketball coach, was elected president of the HIL cage mentors Friday night in a meeting at Hixson High School.

Smith succeeds Tony Martino of Hixson. Also elected to offices were Sody-Daisy's Sid Levi as vice president and East Ridge's Marshall McEwen as secretary-treasurer.

Riverside and Howard both applied for admission to the HIL during the meeting. However, it was felt that because of scheduling problems, the two schools could not be admitted.

HIL member schools must play each other twice during the year or drop membership in the league. The loop consists of two divisions, AA and A, but most schools also play long standing rivalries in non-league games which they don't wish to give up.

Principals of the county and city systems limited teams to Dec. 1 starting dates last year. TSSAA rules changed at the same time and permit member schools only 22 games after that date.

Because of existing commitments and the fact that at least four more games would be necessary if Riverside and Howard were admitted, the action was tabled until a solution can be worked out.

It was also revealed that county schools will vote to hold the girls and boys tournaments together next year. This action was decided on by the county principals and because there are more county schools the two meets will once again be combined.

However, the coaches passed a motion to ask the principals to allow the tournament to start two days earlier than the last Monday in February (usual starting date of the boys district). This would mean a Friday beginning and would not leave a big schedule of games to run off in one week if the tourney started Monday.

The only other business transacted was a motion to ask the principals to move the starting date up to the week of Dec. 1 rather than on the specific date itself.

Several schedule changes will appear on the dates for the coming season. Notre Dame has scheduled Memphis Catholic

here Dec. 17 and Bradley County in late November. There is also a good chance that the Irish will meet Father Ryan here and renew a longtime rivalry.

The annual Kingsport-City and Kingsport-Central series have come to a halt when the Indians announced that because of joining a new league they would not be able to play the Dynamos and Pounders anymore.

East Tennessee Training School from Johnson City will fill the spot on City's slate with a home-and-home series. Central has not filled the open date at this time.

It is also likely that usual middle Tennessee power Clarksville will make a trip down this way playing Central and City one weekend.

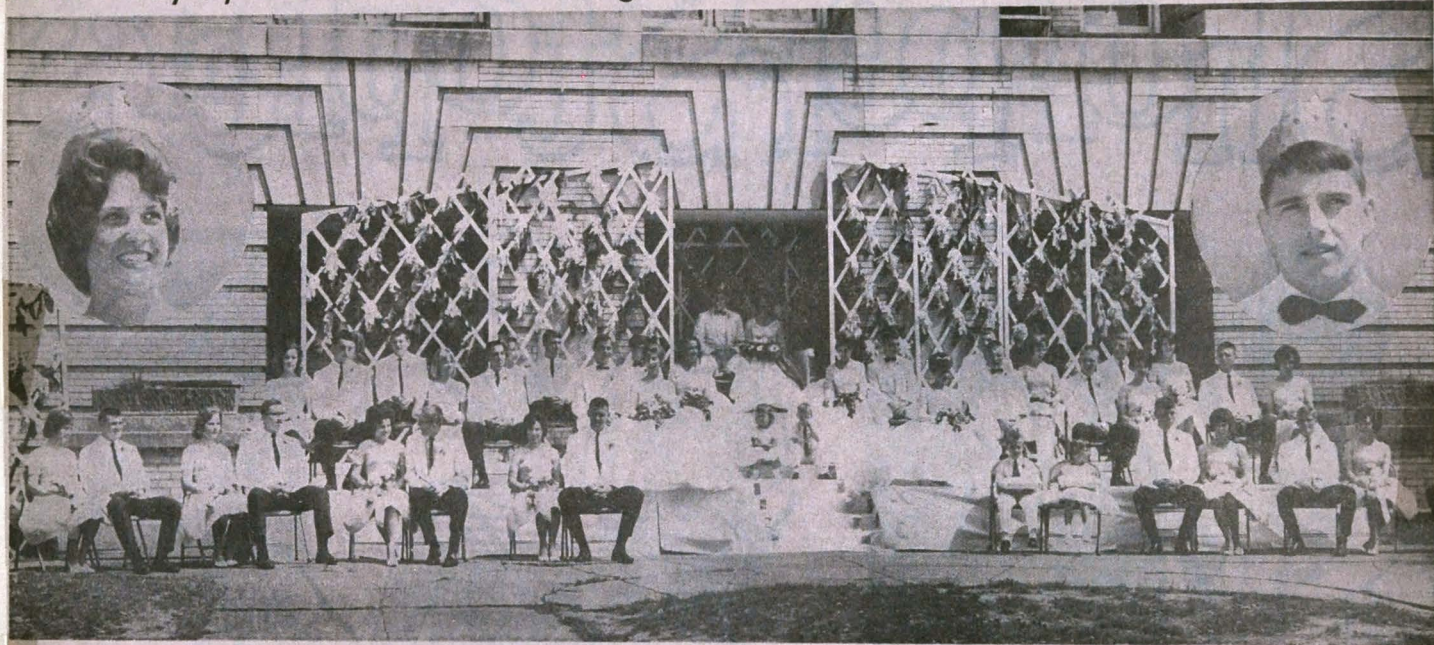
the first Pounder to hit one out of the park when he turned the trick this spring.

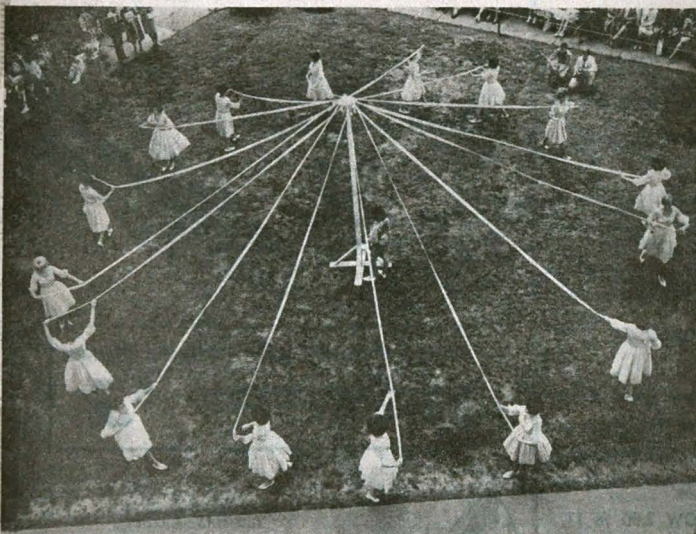

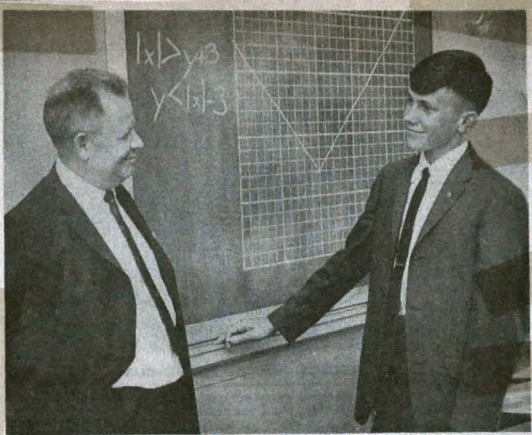

# Better Schools Spokesman States Citizens Must Know Needs, Costs

"At this time of year, when school budgets must be acted upon, the citizen has an obligation to become familiar with the financial needs of the schools and to express his opinions on those needs," according to a spokesman for Citizens Committee for Better Schools.

Mrs. E. E. Reisman Jr., state vice president of Committee for Better Schools, says that public reaction to proposed school budgets should be based upon understanding the need to improve the schools.

"The city school budget will be determined in large measure by the county school budget, therefore, city patrons who have no concern for the county budget must readjust their thinking."

"Not only are city residents citizens of the county, but the county school levy on city and county property is the basic local support of school—both city and county. The Citizens Committee for Better Schools gives persons willing to pay the price for improved schools a voice in supporting schools."

The committee presently is

conducting a membership drive to add a dollar to Better Schools, Chattanooga. The organization serves as an educational communications center by announcing school issues, making progress reports and publishing the opinions of parents and school administrators.

"The problem of school construction to meet urgent needs in the county has not been resolved as yet by our public officials," Sam McConnell, county superintendent, noted. "The officials gave the public the opportunity and they voted it down. I am of the opinion that the officials feel they have had a mandate from the public not to do any more than has been done."

The Better Schools Committee pointed out that "both short and long-term building needs must be grappled with by the citizen as well as by his elected representatives. City schools also have long-term building needs which must be dealt with in orderly fashion. Stop-gap measures to meet crises in school enrollment must not assure the safety of the student, cost the taxpayer more in the de-

long run, and cost the community untold hardships in loss of learning opportunities for the children."

Central High School is an extreme example of the needs of remodeling or condemnation. If the ceiling had fallen down ten minutes later when students were changing classes, unthinkable injuries could have resulted, the statement said. Central—a nominally enrolling 1,700 high school students, 58 years old and unsuitable for modern teaching techniques—is but the first of a long list of building needs.

The statement explained that although team teaching is a superior method of teaching twice the number of students in a conventional classroom, it requires rooms large enough to accommodate 65 to 70 students. "Dalewood was built with this in mind," the committee noted, and the new Hixson High School will have some team teaching facilities, but Central, the largest county high school, not only does not have such facilities, but cannot assure the safety of the student.

## 4 State Prisoners Touring Schools

Numbers 5, 4, 3, and 2 yesterday "argued" students at Central High School to have a worthwhile purpose in life and not to form loose patterns of behavior.

The men, four prisoners from the Tennessee State Penitentiary at Nashville serving sentences totaling 423 years, spoke to the students in a special assembly program as a part of "Operation Crime Prevention," a state wide program geared to high school students. It was their first appearance before a Chattanooga high school audience, though they have spoken to 47,000 youths across the state in the past month. They speak as often as three times a day in some cities.

"Operation Crime Prevention" is patterned after a similar program in Texas. It originated in Tennessee under the direction of Harry S. Aycock, commissioner of corrections and is run by Richard M. (Peck) Gunn. The plan was approved by the 54th general assembly of the state legislature.

"I traded my freedom and my name for a number," said Number 2, who spoke to the students first. He gave a brief recount of the childhood and events that turned him into a number.

### 'BAD HABITS'

"I had a promising future," said Number 2, "but I developed bad habits and made some mistakes. Now I have no future at all. Though I now realize I was wrong I still have to pay the penalty for what I did."

The prisoners are serving time for theft, robbery, forgery and murder.

Number 3, dressed in white like the others, pleaded with the students, "Freedom is precious freedom is priceless; don't throw it away." He described life under the prison system and said, "Although there have been many improvements and innovations, prison life is the truest form of a hell on earth."

"I've lived the golden years of my life behind prison walls," said Number 4. "I wanted nice clothes, a nice car — now I have only prison stripes and I must visualize what a new car looks like." He warned, "It will happen to you if you form the wrong attitudes."

"I was condemned to death but was pardoned only 11 hours before I was to die. It is only by the grace of God that I stand before you now," said Number 5. "I set out to live an easy and glamorous life," he

said and briefly described a trip across the country with a friend, robbery as they needed money.

### 'NOT GLAMOROUS'

"But life is not glamorous in prison. It used to be that nobody could tell me what to do. They sure do now and have been for more than half my life."

Number 4 came back, "Prison is a place where there are no trees, no flowers. The sky is just a space above the four walls."

"We hope you will notice," he said, "that not one of us had a worthwhile aim. Notice also that our being in prison was the result of an early pattern of life that we followed. We are not in prison by accident. There is no age, education, economic level exempt."

Number 3 also returned for a final word. "We hope that by looking at our lives, you can better look at your own," he said. "We are all convinced of one thing — right now while you are in high school is the most important time in your lives while you are setting your goals and patterns. Strive for something higher than we got."

Mr. Gunn's talk was recorded and will be sent to RCA Victor as an audition tape, at the request of the company.

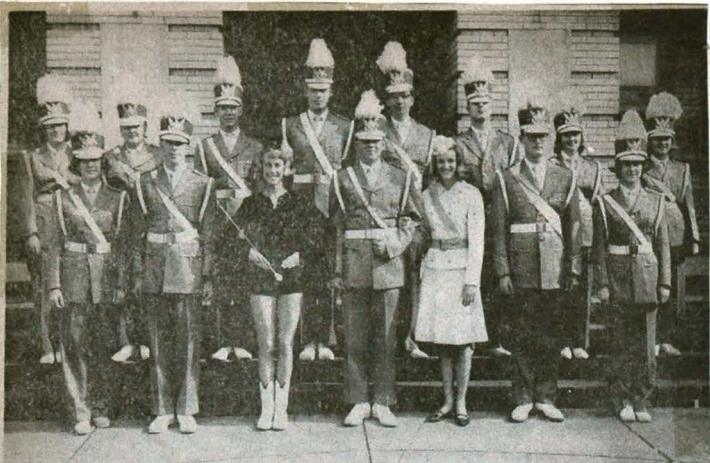

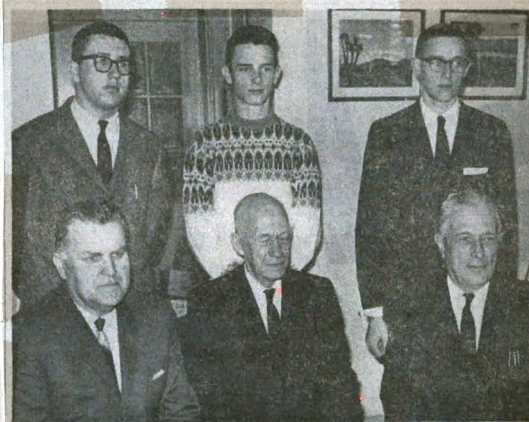

The afternoon session will begin at 1 p.m. when Principal W. H. Millsaps will present the college representatives to the visitors and the members of the class.

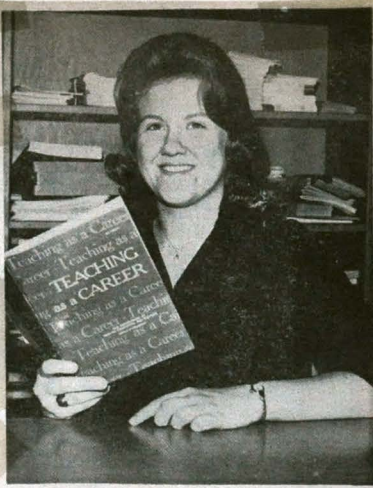

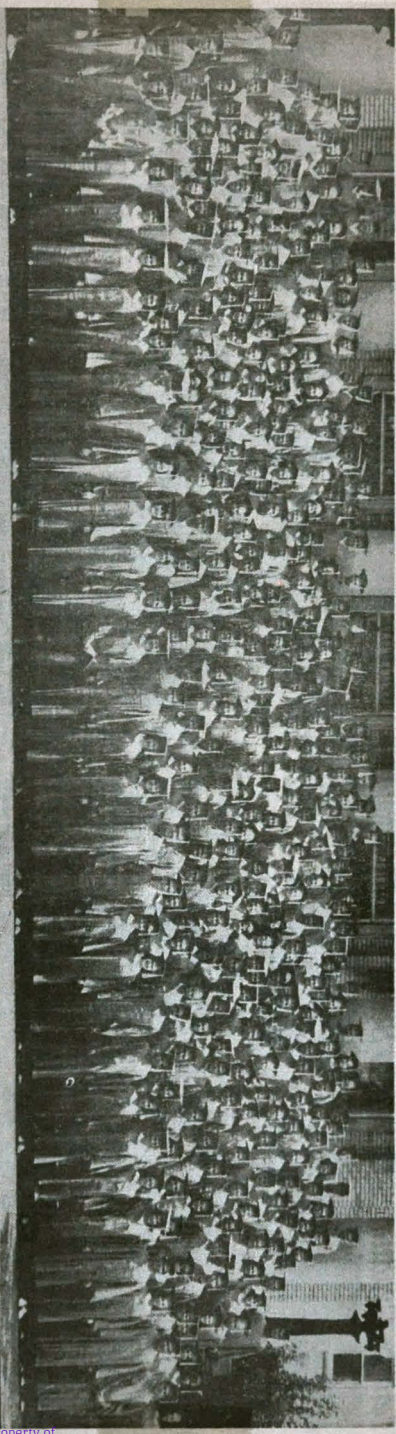
