

City Seeks First Football Win Over Central

10.000 FANS ARE EXPECTED AT HIL GAME

Both Teams Ready. Coaches Say; Howard Plays Clarksville

City High strives for its first football victory over Central in 24 years tonight at Chamberiain Field in a Hamilton Interscholas-tic League contest expected to draw some 10,000 fans.

City last downed the Pounders in 1839 by a 7-6 score. In the interim, Central has racked up 12 victories and a tie. The series was broken off after the 1930 game, resumed briefly in the Power Bowl in 1861, and then formation of the Hill.

City takes a 1-1 record into the game, having defeated Notre Dame 15-6 and lost to East Ridge 22-14. Central is 0-1, dropping a 14-12 decision to Tullahoma.










