Frank Goforth was named winner of the exams in the geometry category. He is a junior at Central.

### Larry Has a Hook

Larry White, former golf star at Central High School and now a member of the University of Houston golf team, is hopeful of gaining a spot on the Cougar delegation to the NCAA tournament next month.

But right now his hopes are looking dim. "Larry has been having his troubles lately, his father, Jim White says. "He developed a bad hook last year and has had a little trouble getting it worked out, but he's been coming along with it. I talked to him on the phone and he said he had a 71 Sunday.

Larry, described by his coach Dave Williams as a "long hitter" is a sophomore in the school of business.

White was very successful in local tournaments before going to Houston on a grant. He won the Signal Mountain Invitational last June with 71-70-69-210 and was a winner in the Brainerd Invitational in 1964 and in 1965. He was the state high school champ in 1964.

"His game has been bad all spring," the elder White says, "and everybody else on the team has been having it pretty tough lately, too."

Houston, winner of the NCAA team title for 9 of the last 11 years, will be out to make it three straight in June.

Larry has hope of making the trip to the NCAA, but being a member of the varsity team does not automatically put him in the tourney. "He will have to qualify," Jim explains, "there are three on the team that are assured of going, but the rest that make the trip have to get out there for their places."

### To Play at Signal

Young White, defending champ in the Signal Mountain Invitational, will be back on June 3 and 4 to defend his crown.

"The NCAA isn't until later in June and Larry believes that if he can get his game back and maybe win the Signal Mountain Tournament again, he will have a better chance of making the trip with the Houston team," Jim says.

"He played in a tournament a few days ago," Jim continued, and lost in a three-way play-off. Larry led the first three days of the tournament, but then lost on the first extra holes when the other two players got birdies.

Houston has lost only two golf matches in the past three years—one to Southeastern Conference champion LSU.

Howard's Edward Hammonds, unbeaten in the 100 and 200 in Hamilton Interscholastic AA League competition this season, looms as the man to beat in the short dashes of Saturday's Times-sponsored City-County track meet at Brainerd Hill. 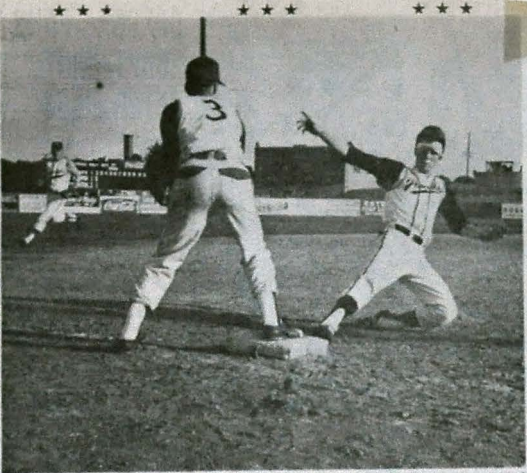

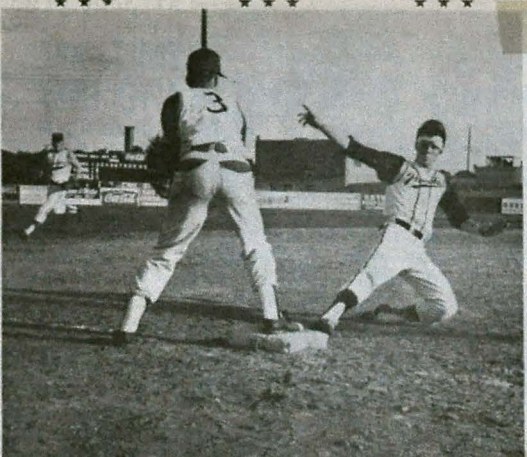

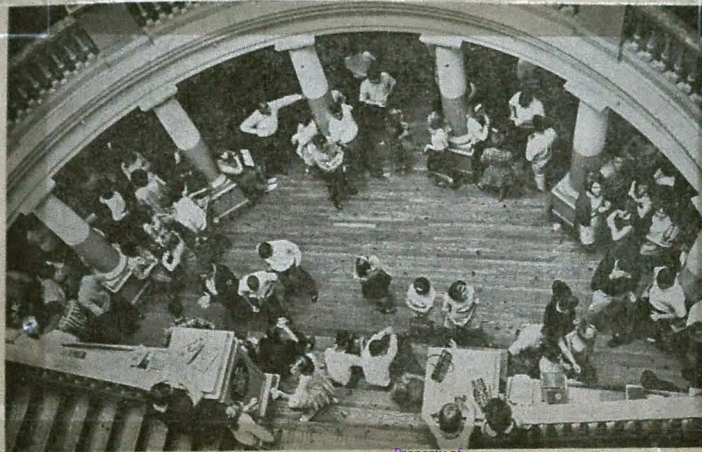

and individuals. Some 625 students, a fourth of the nation's total, received National Merit Scholarships underwritten by Ford Foundation Grants.

The 1967 awards were valued at \$8.6 million, according to John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship. He said, "It is gratifying to report that American business, industry and colleges are continuing to increase their support of these outstanding young people."

Merit Scholarships provide from \$400 to \$4,000 for four undergraduate years of college, depending on the winners' needs. They are a type of "educational insurance," since the amount of the award can be adjusted if the student's financial circumstances change.

Brainerd High School is one of eight schools in the state to produce more than one winner. Oak Ridge High School leads the list with four scholars. Other leading schools and the number of winners are: Clarksville High School and Memphis' White Station, with three; Knoxville's Young High, Memphis' Christian Brothers High School, Nashville's Overton High and Nashville's Hillwood, with two each.

Miss Ernst won a Stetson University Merit Scholarship in the nationwide competition. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Ernst of 401 Guild Drive, she is a member of the Brainerd Chamber Singers (vocal ensemble), the marching band, flag corps and the Anchor Club. She is the recipient of the 1967 Betty Crocker Award and was recently selected for the East Tennessee Choir. Her activities and interests include Girl Scouts, water skiing, swimming, sewing and playing the guitar. She is a member of Wesley Memorial Methodist Church.

Thomas Greene, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. 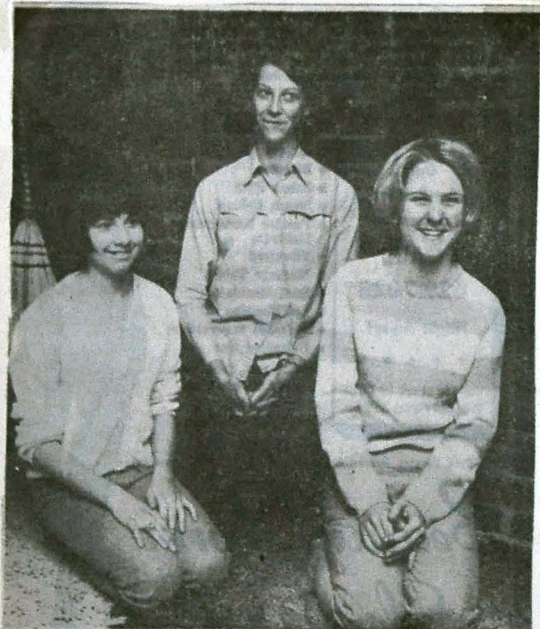

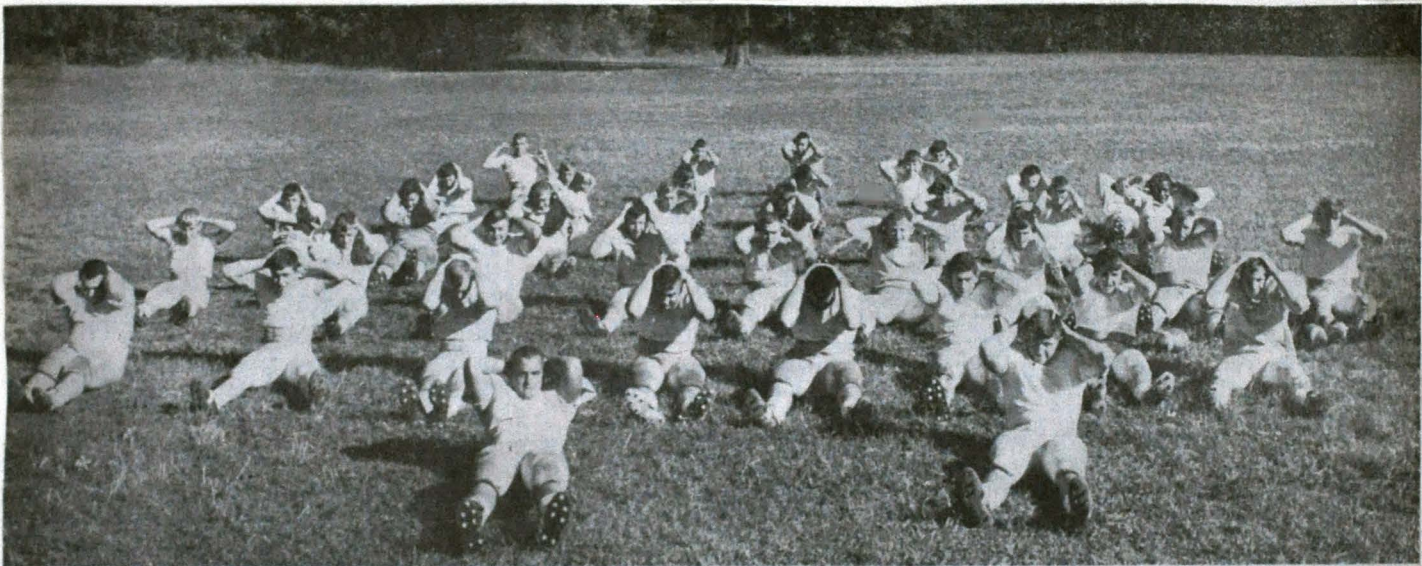

# City-Central Flashback: It is Fall, 1908

Tomorrow's the day. The love is full of excitement. The parades and pep rallies are over for now. Tomorrow night the game of games — City v. Central — will take place on what is now Chamberlain Field. The boys are ready, willing, anxious, wondering how it will end. The fans are, too.

The Central Captain is your big brother. He's promised to take you to your first football game. Last year you won 43-0. Your brother says it won't happen again. A desire to play football has been kindled in your heart.

You are Ted Cushman. It is fall, 1908.

Ted Cushman's brother, Hawley, now a retired Army colonel who was all-very-very Central, picked up a City fumble and returned it to the game's only score. Ted saw through right then and there to convince him that he wanted to play, and beat City.

But he never got his

chance. He was a bench-warmer on the 1909 team and never got in a game because Central used only one sub the entire season. Central was again in 1909 by a 16-3 margin. "The football became an intense between the schools," the retired TVA employ said Wednesday. "That the schools broke off athletic relations for awhile." Here is Ted's chance of playing against his arch enemy out the window. He even quit the game the next year, but returned in 1911 to win the big "C" that he now cherishes. He was a 122-pound left end and defensive sideback.

No Better Authority  
Today there is no better authority on or fan of Central High School athletics than Ted Cushman. He is an ever-present figure at practice sessions and games. In fact, he has missed only four games since 1905. That's a pretty strong statement for a man who soon will be 72. All he wants to know is when a d where the Pounders will play.

He will be there if he has to hitch hike. And he sometimes does.

Cushman is one of five members of the Cushman Clan which has contributed so

much to athletics here. Hawley was a member of the late Jimmy Rike's first Central team in 1908. His son, Hawley III, played on Rike's last team at Baylor. Hawley played against a City star by the name of Gordon Gambill, who later talked him into going to Georgia Tech. Ted, Albert, now deceased, and Ernest all played for the lovable Rike at Central. His sister, Nancy, got into the athletic act with two years of girls' basketball at Central. She later married Bee Greenwood who captained the first University of Tennessee basketball team to beat Kentucky at Kentucky.

But let's get back to Ted. He loves to sit around and reminisce about the Central days when Central was ready by a county school, because the city limits stopped at Central Avenue. Couldn't today a city commission have fun with its annexation ambitions with that kind of territory to work with?

Ted likes to tell about

Coach Rike who brought some of Branch Riker's football ideas with him from Ohio Wesleyan. The teams used no forward passes, no huddle. Just hard-nosed football. He was asked if the players were as big as Central's are today. "Lord, no!" he growled, "if we had a 180-pounder he was a big man!" He pointed out that the teams then did not have the diversified attack modern teams have.

Then, as now, Central had no field. The team practiced on the lot where the Mercierizing Co. is now and played on UC field. The City-Central game is believed to be the first played on the UC field which, at the time, had no grass.

Central, virtually stymied during the first half, tacked long drives onto a fumble and a pass interception for touchdowns in each of the final two periods and came away with a 15-0 victory over rival City High Saturday night.

The hard-fought contest, which was watched by about 7,000 fans at Chamberlain Field, marked the 16th time since 1939 that the clubs have met without City coming out on the long side of the score.

Neither side appeared to care about putting the football into the air, the Pounders trying only six aerials with one completion and the Dynamo made good on two of five, the last two plays of the game.

Tackle Wayne Lloyd set the wheels in motion for the first Pounder touchdown by recovering a fumble on the Central 46. On a fourth and 1 at the City 46, Danny Painter unknocked for the first drive and three plays later the lanky quarterback sprinted to the left, turned the corner and broke back toward midfield to complete a 39-yard TD scamper. Halfback Buzz Adams had a good block on the play. After Painter kicked the extra point, 3-0 remained in the third period.

With only 21 seconds left in the final period Mike McCoy, after running 25 yards on a reverse to the City two yard line, slanted over left tackle with the icing-on-the-cake marker. Painter's extra point attempt was blocked by Joe Cooper.

The Pounders, striking back quickly, pushed the ball across the goal line, climaxing a 64-yard drive with a 46-yard pass to Mike Perkins.

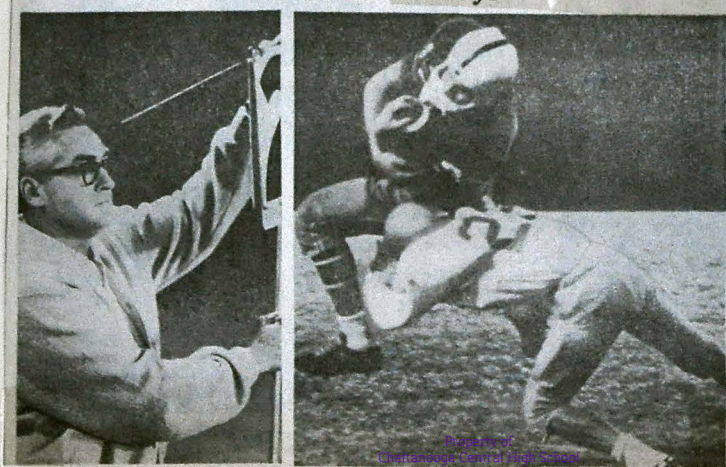

Chattanooga schoolboy football history was made at Chamberlain Field Friday night as the Howard Tigers came from behind in the last quarter to beat the Central High School Purple Pounders, fourth-ranked team in the state, 7-6.

Adams carried much of the offensive burden for Central as he rushed for 84 yards in 17 carries. Painter hit only three of nine passes, and two were for 10 and 33 yards—34 and 33 yards.

Hard-running Marvin Combs spearheaded the East Ridge attack as he carried 12 times for 89 yards.

**PIONEERS BOUNCE BACK**  
But it was the Central defensive line that perhaps saved the game for the Pounders. After Central had driven for its touchdown, East Ridge came charging right back down field. Steve Moore rammed to the Pounder 40 and Combs fought his way to the 26 two plays after the kickoff.

Combs struck at the Central line twice more and Moore got a first down at the five, but that's as far as the Pioneers got. 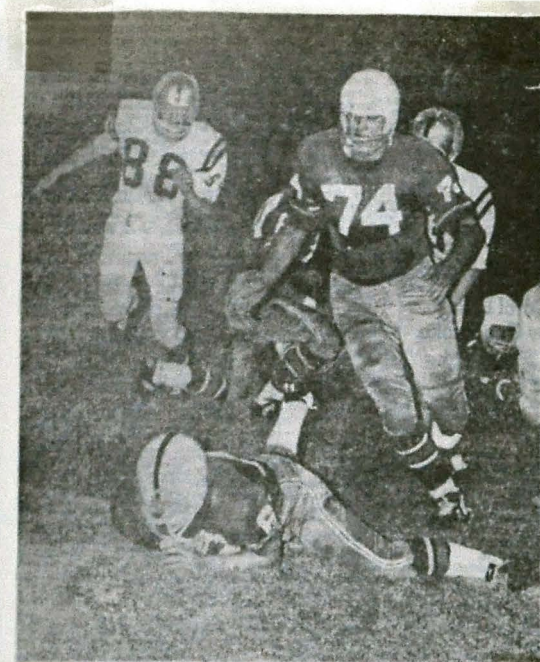
The game is set for 8 p.m. with homecoming ceremonies scheduled for halftime.

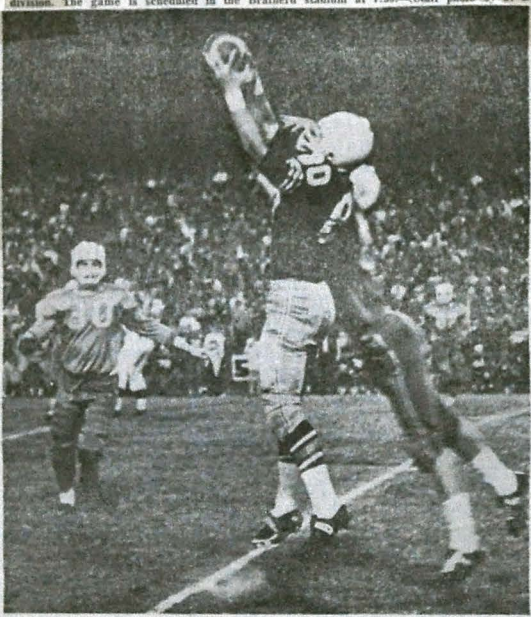

## The Etter Theory of Defense

When Central football Coach Red Etter talks about defense, people listen. Take a look at the record he has made down through the years and you figure he's just got to know something about this game. He hasn't become one of Tennessee's most successful high school coaches all by accident. His record starting the year 1959-61:

Etter has definite theories about how to play sound defensive football. "Our defense is very flexible," he says, "we try to stop up all the gaps, try to prevent the long run or pass. Our defense is not as aggressive as other teams play. We may give up two, three or four yards, but we want to stop the big play."

So far this year the Etter defense has worked better than an other in the immediate Chattanooga area. The Pounders, winners of four games, have permitted only 19 points in five games. An average of 3.8 points per game is hard to get on.

Etter's thinking concerning defense is much like that of Gen. Robert Nelyand—let the opponent have a few yards if necessary a long as there is no threat of a touchdown.

"We feel like that if a team has the ball 70 or 80 yards from our goal," Etter says, "it's unlikely that they will be able to cover that distance on a sustained drive. Unless the opponent gets a long gainer, which we try to guard against, then we believe that something will happen to stop their offense. Maybe it'll be a fumble or an interception or a penalty. As long as we stop the long run, we should be in pretty good shape."

"Of course," the Pounder coach added, "when the situation arises where the other team is in scoring position, then we have to be more aggressive and not let them have an yardage at all."

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This year's Central team isn't the best defensive unit this Etter has coached, but he admits that he and his staff have been pleasantly surprised.

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"In our last game against Bradley both tackles, Gary Locke and Wayne Lloyd, did an outstanding job, playing their positions well enough for a score of 90 per cent. We also got fine performances from our ends, Pat Booth and Houston Kibore. Mike McCoy and Buzz Adams have both done good work in the defensive backfield."

## 1962 Team Best

Etter rates his 1962 team that won the state championship as his best defensive unit. That year the Pounders posted a record of 11-0 allowing opponents only 37 points and blanking five of them.

"That year we had Dickie Phillips, Glenn Jones, Charlie Glen and George White," Etter said.

He was being modest, but he also had Bobby Etter, who played for his father and is now a place-kicking specialist for the University of Georgia.

By the same measure it can further be concluded that football strength in East Tennessee is evenly divided since there are two teams each representing the Chattanooga area, the Knoxville area and the Tri-Cities area. Of course, the only real way to tell which team is tops is put them in there jowl to jowl.

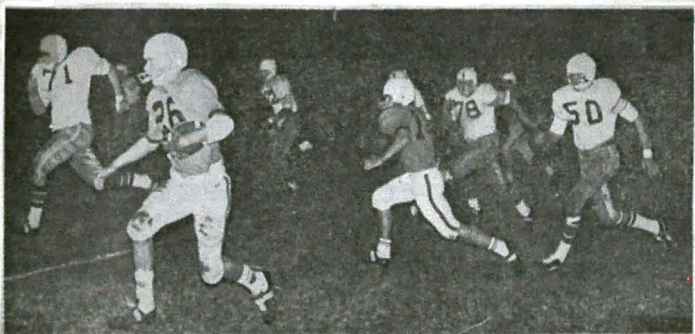
However, more costly than the losses, was an injury suffered by the top Pounder scorer, Carson McComb. The team jumped an average of just under 17 points in five games, before his injury.

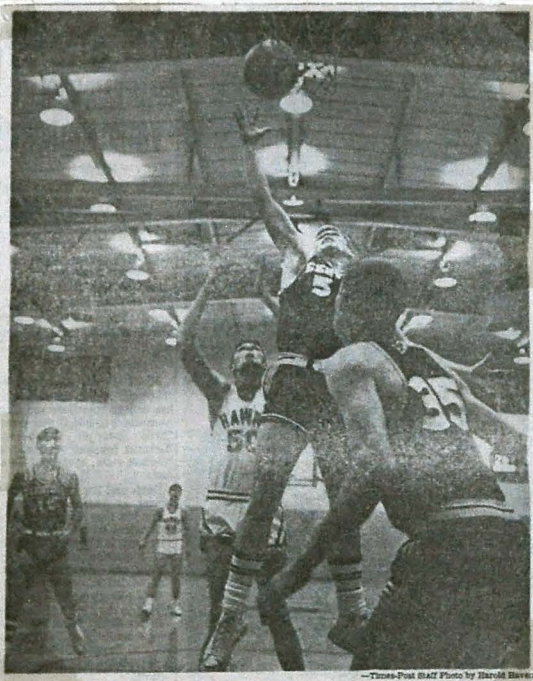

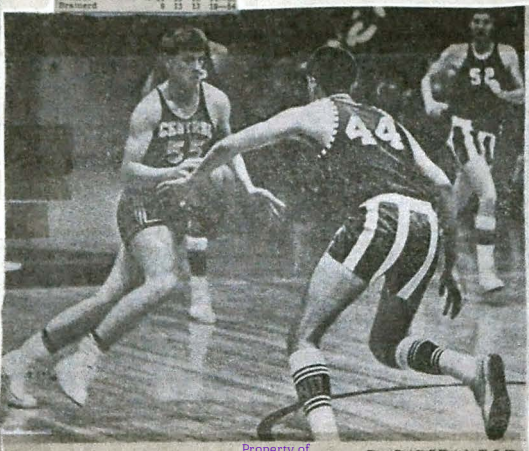

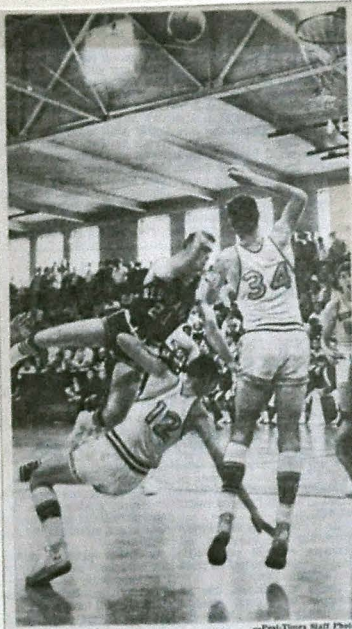

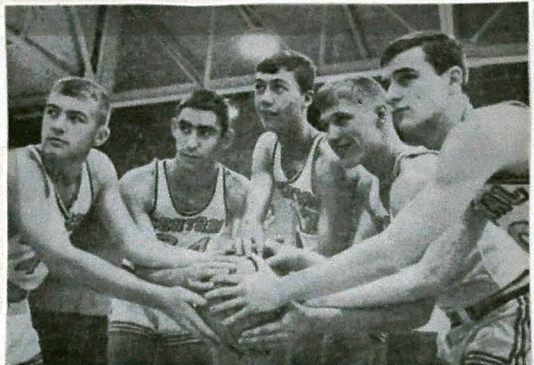

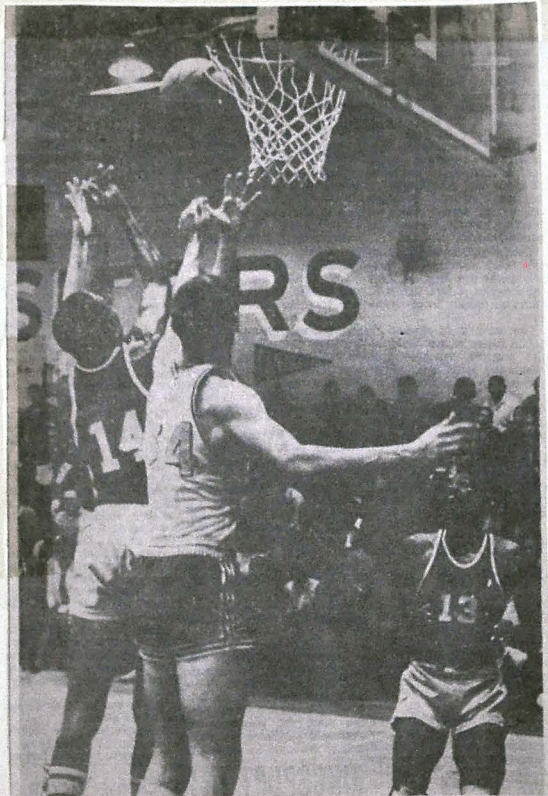
## CENTRAL HOPE FOR REPEAT AGAINST IRISH

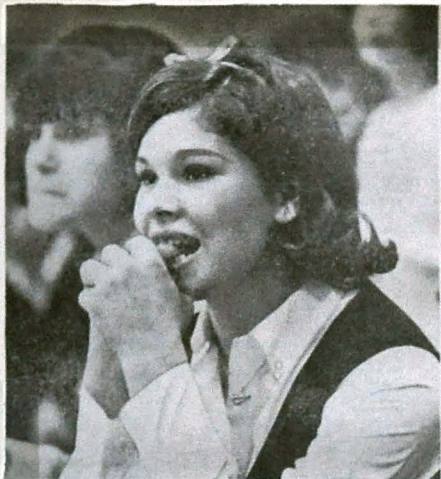

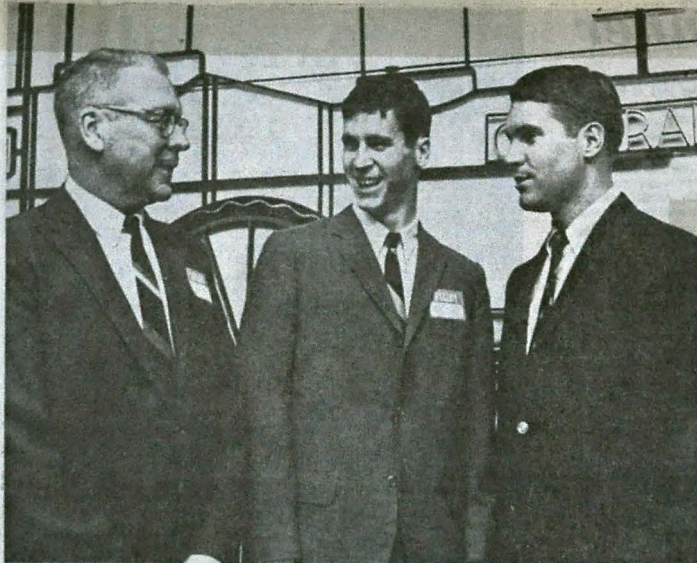

# Eter Knows How To Get 'Em Ready

Football coaches around the Chattanooga area don't have to be told that E. B. Eter doesn't miss a trick, and the old Central redhead is already trying to get one step ahead of his next opponent.

For the uninitiated, Eter will coach the East All-Stars July 28 in the TISSA's first All-Star game in Nashville.

"Putting together a cohesive unit with just 16 days of practice, especially with boys who have never played together, can pose a big problem. But Coach Eter is prepared.

"The first thing we're gonna do is send out questionnaires to every coach who has a boy playing in this game," Eter said Monday. "We'll try to find out something about every boy, if he can kick, pass, run fast, block or whether his coach thinks he'll infast, block or whether his coach thinks fast, block or whether his coach thinks he's more value to the offense or defense. We'll try to know each boy's assets ahead of time."

### Condition Important

"Later, we'll probably send a letter and questionnaire to each boy, warning him to show up in good shape. There won't be any time for physical conditioning."

Eter said the TISSA had allowed each team 10 days of practice, two a day if they preferred.

"The boys will arrive on Sunday and we'll start practice on Monday. We'll practice six days, take Sunday off, and then practice four more days before the game on Friday night," Eter continued.

"I realize that with the limited time, the offense will be somewhat limited," he said.

"But we want to get at least some variety in it. We're not going up there with the idea of having just five running plays and two passing plays. We want some variety."

This isn't Eter's first association with an all-star game. Some years ago, schools in the Chattanooga area (there were only about six or seven at the time) had a North-South game and Eter coached in that one.

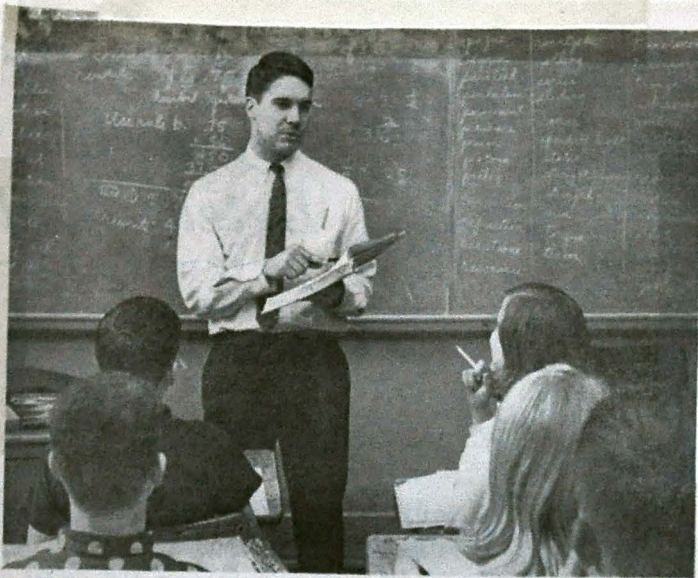

There's a wife in town who goes by the name Eddie. Well, really her name is Eddie Sue, but that doesn't make any difference. Besides being a good wife and expectant mother, one of Eddie's main interests lies in studying the old annals from Central High School.

The above should be qualified by stating that Eddie Sue's husband teaches and coaches at the home of the Purple Pounders. His last name is Etter, not Red, but Gene.

Gene, the oldest son of Pounder head football coach Red Etter, and Eddie Sue were married last summer in Dallas, Tex. But that's only half of it. The ceremony took place at home plate in the home stadium of the Dallas-Forth Worth Spurs.

"Eddie is a real sports fan," stated Gene. "She comes to most of the school's athletic contests and other extra-curricular functions. When she's home she looks through old an-

nals and then surprises a lot of people when she recognizes them and calls them by name."

Gene, 27, graduated from the University of Tennessee, where he played varsity football for the Big Orange from 1958 through the 1960 season. After completing his eligibility Gene found himself faced with one more year of school. He spent his final football season as a freshman coach with the Vols.

It turned out, however that his living was to be made in baseball rather than football. After playing with the Vols he signed a professional contract and is currently property of the Chicago Cubs as a member of the Spurs in the "AA" Texas League.

"It beats working," said the soft-spoken Etter when asked about playing pro baseball. "I really like it a lot. We play all night games so I'd get to the park around 5:30 for the game. We'd be done by 10 or 10:30 and then the rest of the time is our own.

"Last year we had a man-

ager, Pete Reiser, who called for practices in the morning," continued the slight left-fielder. "Pete was in the Dodger organization and wanted a chance to manage and he is a good friend of Leo Durocher, who is manager of the Cubs.

"Pete got in touch with Leo and ended up as manager of the Spurs," Gene went on. "Well we didn't do too well during the time Reiser was in charge and after about a month he went up to be a coach with the Cubs and we got a new manager, our third one last season.

"I want to continue teaching and play too," said Etter when asked what he planned to do about going to Chicago's spring training this year. "I don't want to go to training before the season so I can stay here and teach until the last minute.

"I'll still have to take a leave of absence from the school because the season opens April 14," signed Etter. "Still, to leave then would be a lot better

than having to go for training which starts the 12th of March. I could get just as much, or maybe even more, work done here as I help coach the baseball team.

"As things stand now I don't know if I'll be able to skip training or not," said Etter, blinking his contact lenses back in place. "I don't think the club will be too happy about it but I sure hope everything works out.

"Right now things don't look so good as far as my going up to the majors," continued Gene.

In the second game on last night's card, Central fell behind in the first quarter, but got spirited play from Carson McCord and Harvey Epperson, who came off the bench in the second period.

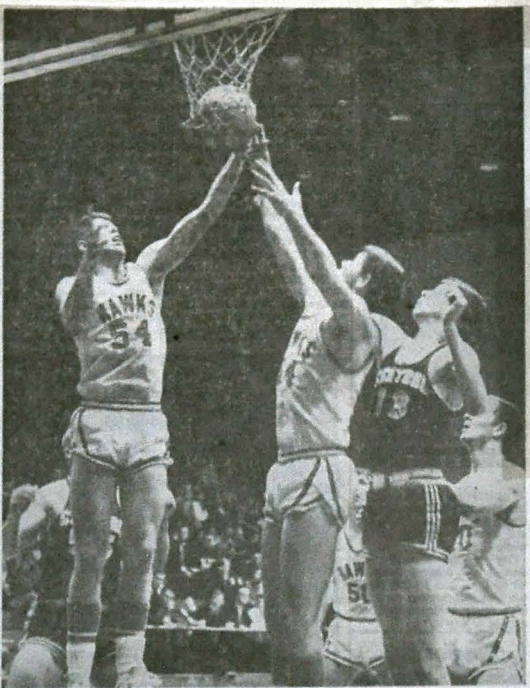

Coach Newton enjoys basketball and doesn't seem to be too concerned about which team wins. Every time an individual player makes a good play, Newton is the first to have a complimentary remark about it to make to those sitting near him.

He is proud of his work and proud of his associations through the years with people and sports. He has pride in seeing the accomplishments of some of his former players.

And he enjoys watching a youngster perform with the knowledge that, in years to come, that youngster will be a better person from having participated in athletics.

There was a lot of empty space for the opening of the district tournament. Part of these vacancies could have been filled by Red Bank. A few of their students were at the game, looking on, but they didn't have anybody to cheer for.

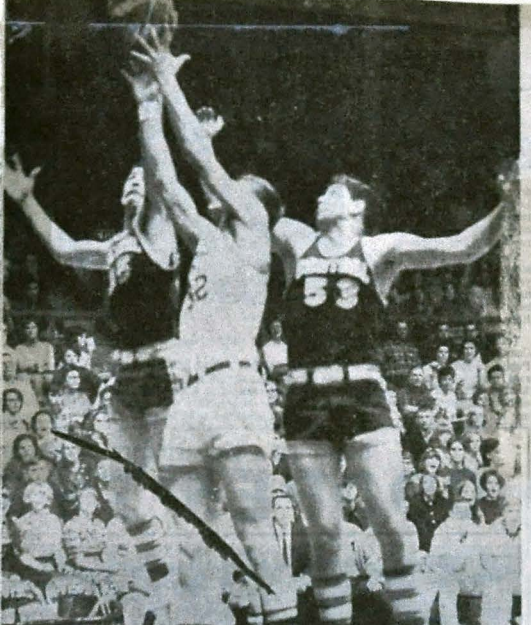

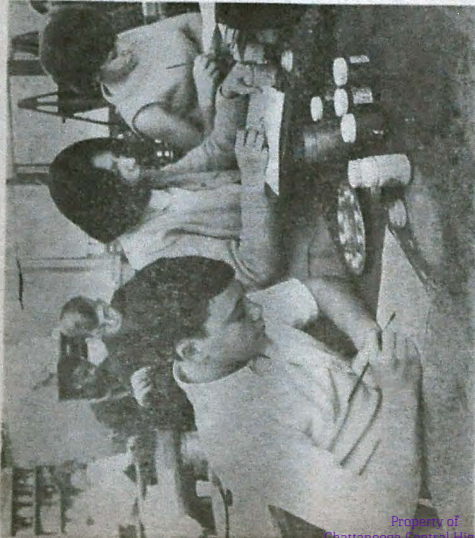

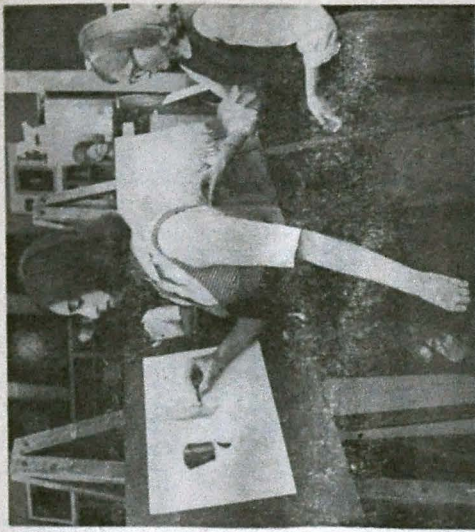

Team matches, which again will consist of four singles and two doubles matches over nine holes, will begin at 3:30 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays, with Tuesdays and Fridays assigned as makeup dates whenever weather permits. USGA rules will apply, except as amended by local club rules at the site of the match.

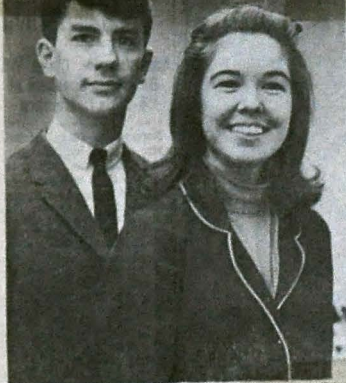

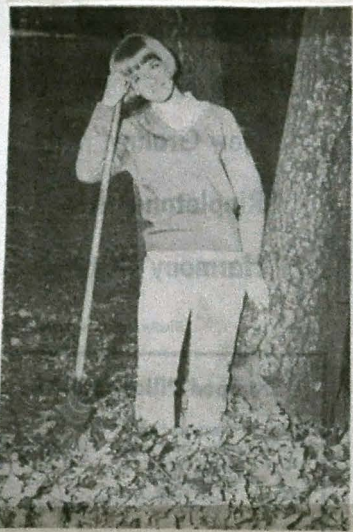

# Voters Blamed In School Crises

The chickens are coming home to roost, county school authorities say.

Those citizens who are requesting improvements in school buildings in their communities are being reminded that a few years ago when a bid bond issue to finance school improvements was put to a vote, no community gave the proposal overwhelming support and it failed to pass.

That's what County School Supt. Sam P. McConnell told a group from the Washatchie-Tiftuna-Lookout Valley area earlier this month when it appeared a school board meeting. He indicated he considers the bond issue defeat a big factor in the present over-all plight of the county school system.

That the county school board has been discussing it in private has been revealed several times recently by Dr. McConnell at public meetings of the board. He has stated that the board has shown great concern at its executive sessions where, apparently, a goodly portion of its business is actually conducted.

Just what courses of action or alternatives have been proposed or are under consideration isn't, of course, generally known since the meetings are closed to the public, but Dr. McConnell has indicated no final decisions have been made

yet, pending action by the County Council on a request for more money made a couple of months ago by the school board.

The board had been considering asking for more funds was revealed in October by the school superintendent when he told an East Ridge group, one earlier several delegations which have recently asked for improvements to school facilities in their communities, that the County Council might be asked for more bond money.

The East Ridge group was told the \$5 million bond issue authorized just after last year's sales tax referendum brought a one-cent county sales tax, would not go far enough to permit the requested school improvements there.

Then on Oct. 26 a letter was sent to the County Council asking for a new bond issue of \$1,750,000. Under state law, that amount would be required to provide the county with \$600,000. It would finance improvements at Booker T. Washington and Saddy-Daisy high schools, estimated to cost \$60,000 and \$80,000 respectively, as well as cover additional costs at the new Central High School, to be erected at Harrison.

The \$5 million bond issue which provides the county with \$2,920,000 has not been sold yet because of unfavorable market conditions. But it has been earmarked for the new Central High School, expansion of Saddy-Daisy High School, and completion of the J. R. Brown Junior High School at Harrison.

### COSTS RISE

Construction costs have risen, Dr. McConnell has explained, and have added approximately \$200,000 to the expected cost of the Central High School building. An auditorium, which school officials say is necessary if facilities at the new school are to equal those at the old building in Chattanooga, would cost about \$500,000 more.

Another expense facing the board would be for the purchase of the First Baptist Church property on Oak Street. The building there, which with extensive remodeling would be suitable for central administrative offices for the county school system, will be available when the church moves to a new building. At present the headquarters units of the school system are scattered at three different locations.

Although the matter has not been reported as having come up for discussion at a public meeting, it must have seemed too great an opportunity for the school board to pass up, and, according to reports, the school system has extended an offer of \$200,637 for a part of the church's property.

How much additional cost the renovation will require has not been reported.

The school board is being tentatively pressed by groups from East Ridge, where an auditorium is wanted; from Wau-

hatchie, Tiftuna, and Lookout Valley, where citizens yearned by movement of Central High School farther away from them, want their junior high school enlarged into a senior high school. In a recent meeting, where citizens can point to communities which do not meet state requirements and are not up to the standard of some of the schools; from Hillcrest; and by implication, from Ooltewah, as well as others.

Dr. McConnell's remarks at a public meeting earlier this month that he was reluctant to speak any more about plans under consideration by the board because, "I think that I might be inviting delegations to these board meetings just to see what we're going to do for each community," reveals the difficulties the board finds itself in.

Since the defeat of the bond issue, Dr. McConnell said, school system requests for additional funds have been confined more or less to "emergency funds." But the whole problem has been discussed, he said.

In the Lookout Valley area, where the superintendent agreed the dropout rate was "probably the highest in the county and a contributing factor" may be the long way pupils have to go now to get to high school, the superintendent expressed great concern.

"We've been looking at this and we are discussing it," he told spokesmen for school patrons there. "But when we'll ask for this money, I don't know."

He noted two meetings of the County Council have been held since the letter was sent but "we've heard nothing from school officials, the only solution." The council has not discussed the matter at its public meetings but it too, meets up to the County Council.

## Feagans Named Chairman Of All-Sports Fete Here

Ernie Feagans, prominent local sportscaster and manager of Radio Station WAPQ, Tuesday was named chairman of the Chattanooga Chamber of Commerce 1965 All-Sports Banquet.

The annual dinner, which will feature a nationally-prominent speaker, will be held in December.

Feagans, 46, who resides at 809 North Lake Terrace in Lakeview, began his radio career here in 1939 upon graduation from Central High School. Following a stint with the CBS network in New York, Feagans returned to Chattanooga, where for a number of years he conducted the popular "Feagans' Felicitas" program. He gradually moved into the sportscasting field and originated local radio coverage of both local and national golf tournaments. He also is a veteran broadcaster of both football and basketball on the high school level.

Feagans succeeds insurance executive Wesley G. Brown as chairman of the All-Sports Banquet. Howard Somayrac headed the event in both 1963 and 1964.

Golfer Arnold Palmer was the featured speaker in the inaugural dinner in 1963, while author-Nashville Banner sports editor Fred Russell followed in 1964. Atlanta Braves' manager Bobby Bragan was the speaker last year.

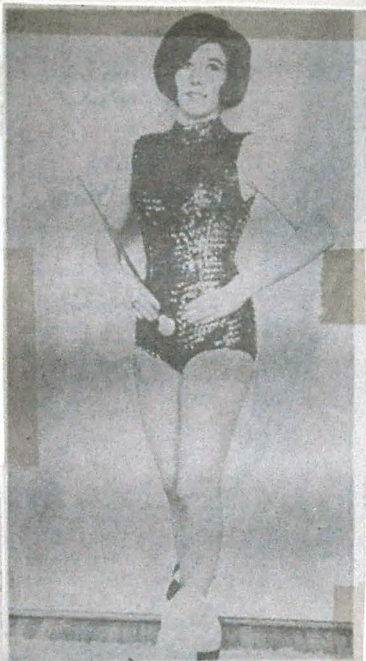

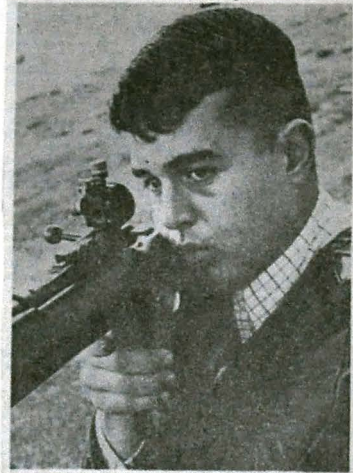

—He won second place in the National Junior Four-Position Championships, hitting 390 of a possible 400.

—He won the National Rifle Association Four-Position Smallbore Championship and the Coastal Empire Invitational Three Position Smallbore Championship.

On top of this, his Chattanooga Central High School team won the National ROTC Scholarship Championship and the Southeastern Championship.

Jim was captain of the high school team, as well as a member of the track team and the yearbook staff.

But he got his ability honestly, for his is probably the shookest family in Tennessee since the Martins stopped feeding with the Coys.

But his mother, according to Jim, "won't touch a rifle."

## High School Yearbooks Have Colorful History

Many years of history and in 1918 when a substitute publication called *The Outpost* replaced it, and in 1934, when a Klip Klan edition of *The Baylor Notes* appeared. Mr. James

Baylor's yearbook, *The Klip Klan* was first published in 1918, the year that marked the transfer of the school from Palmetto Street to its present site on the banks of the Tennessee River. The yearbook was by a sophomore, John Dayton, who received a prize of one dollar for coming up with the name. John Dayton was killed in World War I. Klip Klan actually means "the clan that lives on the cliff"—Baylor's student body.

The first edition of Baylor's Klip Klan, edited by Tom Trotter, was dedicated to the school's founder, Dr. J. Roy Baylor. Successing yearbooks were dedicated to John T. Lamton and Dr. Alex Guerry, both of whom were instrumental in the school's success. In only two years of the school's history has the Klip Klan failed to appear—

Staff members of McCallie School's Pennant are preparing Volume 46 of the yearbook for publication next fall. Actually the name "Pennant" goes back 60 years to the second year of the school, 1897, when a quarterly newspaper in the form of a brief history of school events began publication. When the first bound annual was published in the school year 1929-31, it took the name *The Pennant*.

Since that time the book, published annually, has won numerous awards, including medalist at Columbia Scholastic Press Association and first place and trophy awards from the Southern Interscholastic Press Association.

The Pennant publishes in the fall because such a schedule allows complete coverage of spring activities, athletics and commencement. Mr. Joe Warner is faculty adviser.

First yearbook of Central was published in 1911. First yearbook known as *The Champion* was published in 1914, 53 years ago, with Christine Noble (Mrs. Gandy, author of many children's books) on its staff. This year's faculty adviser is Mrs. Minnie Lee Morgan.

City High's first yearbook with pictures was called *The Maroon and White* and was published in 1911. In 1913, it was called *The Thirteen*; in 1914, *The Dial*, and in 1915 it was called *The Dynamo*, the name which was to remain for the next 52 years. Winning many awards throughout the years, the *Dynamo* of 1966 has been described by Col. Creed Bites, City High principal for many years, "the greatest high school yearbook I have ever seen."

Faculty adviser for this year's staff is Mr. Van Latture.

Consolidation Study

For years groups in Chattanooga and Hamilton County have discussed the Metropolitan plan of government. The referendum was held a few years ago after study by a group of local citizens. The results of that referendum are a part of our local history. Recently one of our distinguished citizens of our city allegedly said that it was time for a referendum on the consolidation of the Chattanooga and Hamilton County schools. Since I am a teacher in the Hamilton County school system and would be affected, I should like to submit a plan to acquaint all the citizens of both the Hamilton County and Chattanooga systems with all phases of the consolidation.

I would suggest a committee of 20 members to be appointed by the Hamilton County Council and the City Commission. Each member could appoint five members of the committee. The Commission would appoint 25 from the city and the Council the same number from the county. At least 20 of the members should be teachers and administrators. They would need to give reports of the findings of the Committee on all facets of consolidation to parents, teachers (both active and retired) as well as legislators and citizens. The membership should have mothers, fathers, labor union leaders, Negroes, whites, farmers, and professional people.

The study would require six months and then there should be community and area meetings in every part of the city and county before a referendum is held.

I am not expressing opposition or approval in this brief article. I feel that all teachers and citizens need full knowledge of the advantages and disadvantages that would be involved in consolidation.

Full familiarization with all the ramifications will remove all doubts and then the citizens can intelligently and fairly cast a vote for their honest choice.

Citizens in general today, are not sufficiently informed to conscientiously vote for or against consolidation.

I would like to challenge Mrs. O. Y. Smith's recent letter to the editor regarding Mr. Steve Conrad's ambition and "rare" dedication to civic improvement. In the Chattanooga News-Free Press of January 19, 1966, Mr. Steve Conrad is pictured reading a report from the Adult Education Council. Senator Thomas J. Dodd, 1965, in a speech made to the U.S. Senate that there was evidence of serious Communist infiltration at the chapter level throughout the committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy (SANES).

Other sponsors of the Washington march protesting the U.S. policy in Vietnam included Stewart Meacham, peace secretary of the American Friends Service Committee which was exposed by the Senate Internal Sub-committee as a well-known transmission belt for the Communist apparatus. Bayard Rustin, convicted sex pervert, who served time during World War II as a conscientious objector and was at one time a member of the Young Communist League was another connected with Mr. Gottlieb in the Washington march.

Mr. Conrad may have "rare" dedication, but I, for one, do not care for his left-wing, liberal ideas and attitudes and I feel we would be making a mistake by electing such a man.

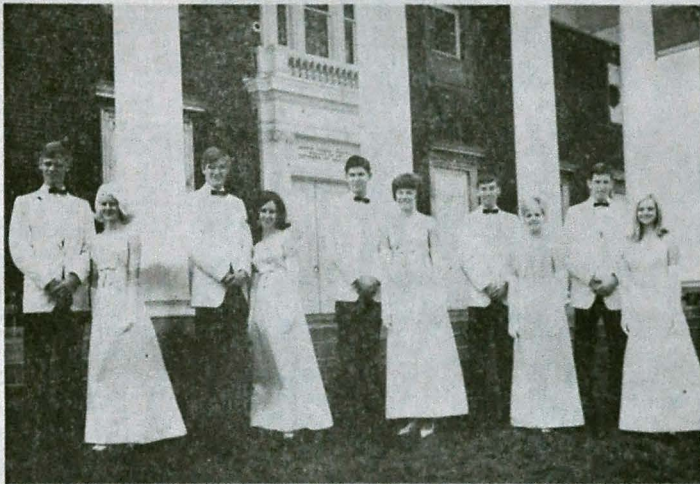

# Alcohol Called Top Youth Problem

Alcohol is the biggest problem facing youth today, according to Gary Gober, of Vanderbilt University, one of the guest speakers in the area conference on parent-youth problems held in a morning-long session Saturday at Hixson High School, under the sponsorship of Hamilton County PTA Council.

A group of 170 high school student leaders sat down with civic leaders such as Gober, Wilton Lee, Howard Sompayrac, Judge Riley Graham, Dr. James M. Foley, W. H. Millsaps and Judge Leo Britt and discussed such teen-age problems as alcohol, mental health, shoplifting, teen-age marriages, venereal disease, cheating in school, and other moral issues, compiling their questions and answers for a brochure to be published by county PTA groups and used for PTA work in parent education.

## QUESTIONS

Some of the questions discussed were:

How prevalent is teen-age drinking?

What are the main disagreements between parents and children?

Are moral standards dropping in youth or among adults?

Where are schools strong and where are they failing in dealing with youth problems?

Why do teen-agers expect their parents to finance a teenage marriage?

Do you think we should have sex education in Hamilton County high schools?

Should the legislature pass a law to enforce periodical re-examination of all automobile drivers?

If a teen-ager makes a mistake, should the parents stand by him and try to help him out?

These and many more questions were discussed by the group of 10 students chosen from the 17 Hamilton county high schools and the 19 parents chosen from each county PTA group.

Dr. Robert Abernathy, director of field services, Middle Tennessee State University, gave the welcoming address, keeping his young audience laughing as he discussed how youth and grown people don't understand each other. There are seven signs of maturity in a teen-ager, he pointed out—the ability to deal constructively with reality, to adapt to change, to handle fears, anxieties and tensions, to feel a satisfaction in giving, to build satisfactory relationships, to hide hostile feelings, to love people and to love God.

"We live in a world of change," Mr. Gober pointed out. "We have grown in toward the atom and outward to the stars."

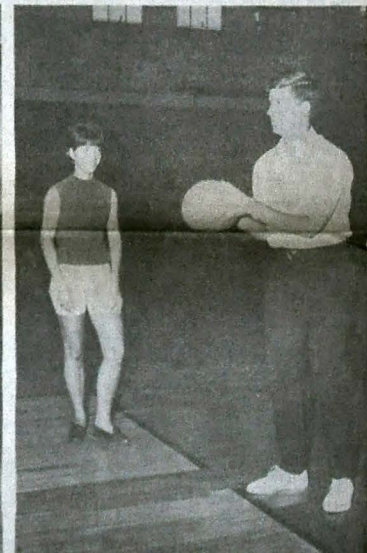

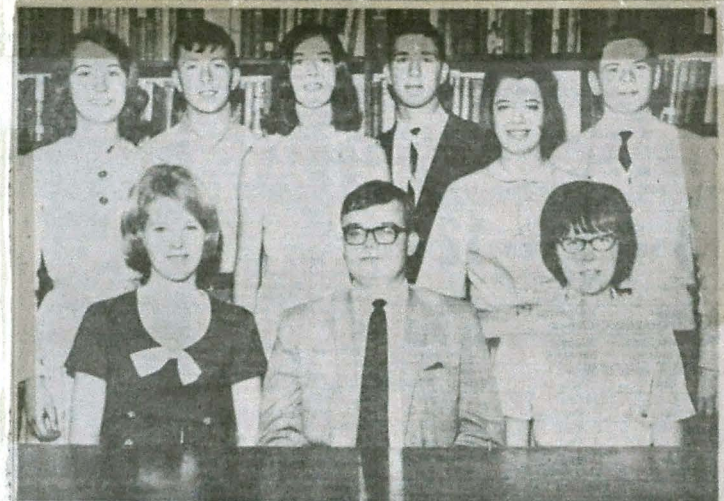
Nominations for the DAR and

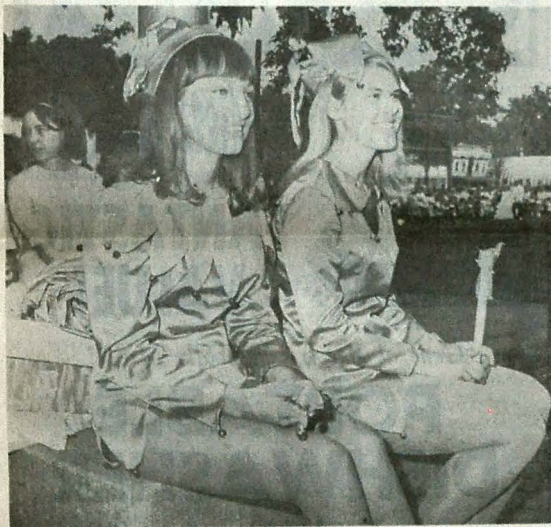

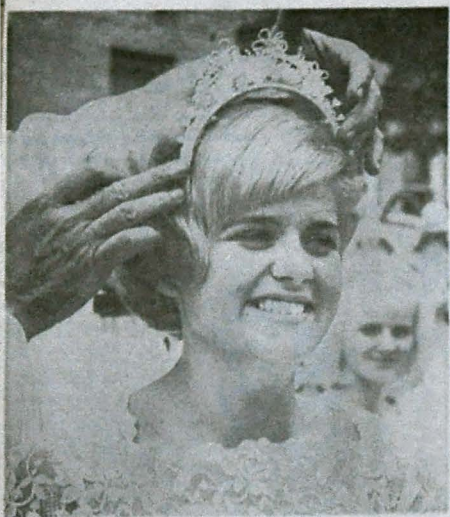

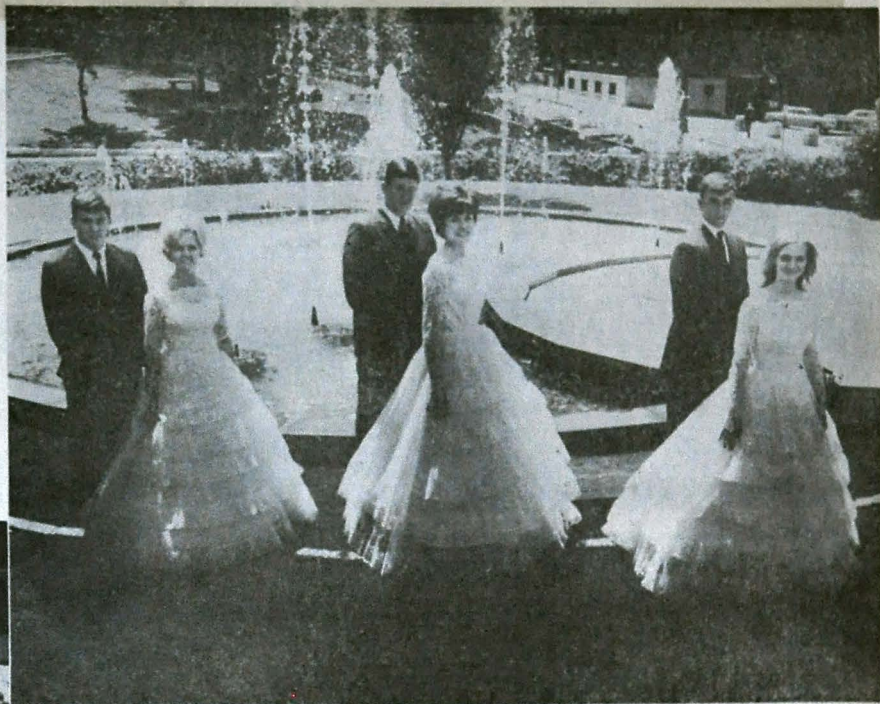

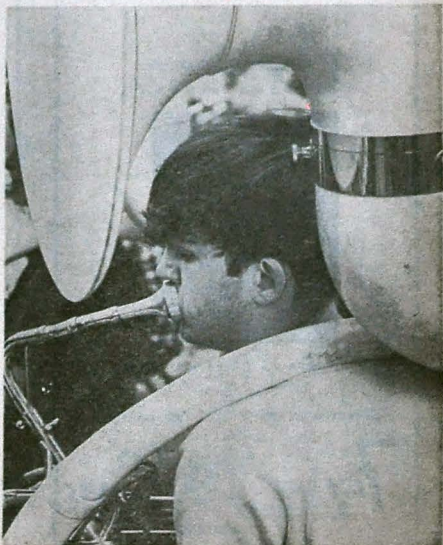

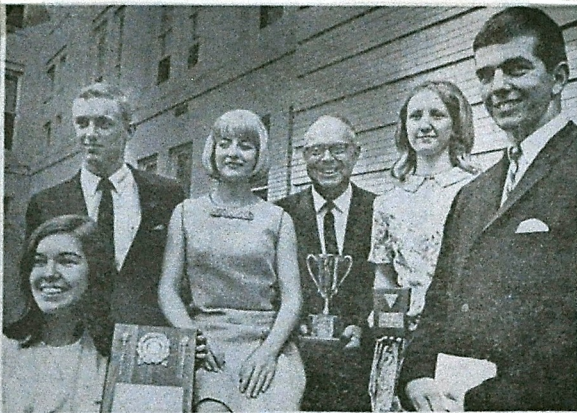
