



59-13. Etter has definite theories about how to play sound defensive football. "Our defense is very flexible," he says, "we try to stoy up all the gaps, try to prevent the long run or pass. Our defense is no as aggressive as ofter teams play We may give up two, three or foou yards, but we want to stop the big relay."

So far this year the Etter de fense has worked better than any other in the immediate Chattanoo other in the immediate chatanoo ga area. The Pounders, winners of four games, have permitted only 19 points in five games. An average of 3.8 points per game is hard to get beat on.

"Of course," the Pounder coach added, "when the situation arises where the other team is in scoring position, the we have to be more aggressive and not let them have any yardage at all."

#### A Pleasant Surprise

This year's Central team isn't the best defensive unit tha Etter has coached, but he admits that he and his staff hav been pleasantly surprised.

"So far this year we have played pretty good defense over-all." Etter claims. "We haven't had any long runs made against us so our line has been doing a satisfactory job. We have given up three long passes, though, and that's what we don't like to see happen. All the touchdowns that we have permitted were on passes."

The Central staff grades each player on every play madduring the game, Etter explained. Each coach is responsible for grading certain players.

Etter said in tolling how he rates a defensive performance.

"We give each player a rating from zero to five points on each play during a game.

If a player makes a poor play
he isn't credited with any
points. If he make a sort of half effort he gets one point. For the average play we give two points; for an excellent play we give three points and two points; for an excellent play we give three points and for a really outstanding play, such as a fumble recovery, an interception or throwing the ball carrier for a big loss, we give five points."

"We figure that a score of three on a particular play is 100 per cent effort, and that a score of two is average. For a satisfactory job, a limeman must have over 70 per cent and a defensive back 80 per cent.

Etter rates his 1962 team that won the state championship as his best defensive unit. That year the Pounders posted a record of 11-0 allowing opponents only 37 points and blanking five of them.

"That year we had Dickie Phillips, Glenn Jones, Charlie Glen and George White," Etter said.

He was being modest, but he also had Bobby Etter, who haved for his father and is now a place-kicking specialist for he University of Georgia.





#### Consolidation Study

For years groups in Chattanonga and Hamilton County have dis-cussed the Metropolitan plan of government. A refereedum wan held a few years ago after study by a group of local citizens. For a post of our local history, Recently one of the distinguished citizens our city afteredy said that it was our city allegedly said that it was time for a referendum on the contime for a referendum on the con-solidation of the Chattanooga and Hamilton County schools. Since I am at e a ch er in the Hamilton County school system and would be affected, I should like to sub-mit a plan to acquaint all the cit-cens of both the Hamilton County and Chattanooga systems with all phases of the comodidation.

I would suggest a committee of 50 members to be appointed by the Hamilton County Council and the City Commission. Each member could appoint five members of the committee. The Commission would committee. The Commission would appeint 25 from the city and the Council the same number from the county. At least 20 of the members should be teachers and administrators. They would need to give reports of the findings of the Committee on all facets of consolidation to parents, beachers (both active and retired) as well as legislators and citizens. The membershin. and citizens. The membership should have mothers, fathers, labor union leaders, Negroes, whites, farmers, and professional people.

The study would require six months and then there should be community and area meetings in every part of the city and county before a referendum is held.

I am not expressing opposition or approval in this brief article. I feel that all teachers and citizens seed full knowledge of the advan-ages and disadvantages that ould be involved in consolidation

Full familiarization with all the ramifications will remove all doubts and then the citizens can intelligently and fairly cast a vote

Citizens, la general today, are not sufficiently informed to scient-ously vote for or against consolidation.




