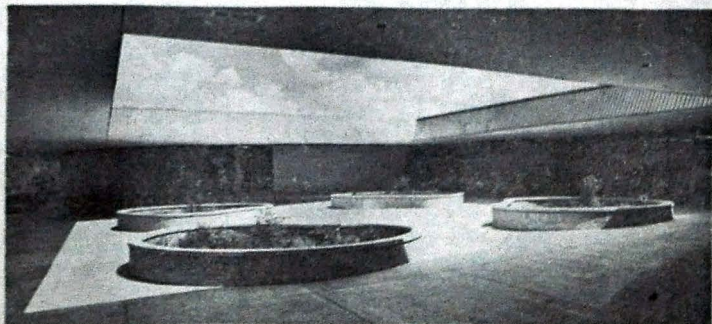

Parker to Return to UTC Post

40 Area Boys Will Attend Week-Long Boys State Meet

Forty boys from the Chattanooga area who will be seniors in high school next fall will leave Saturday for Chattanooga for the week-long Boys' State that is sponsored by the American Legion.

The mythical state will be organized and governed on the campus at Tennessee Tech by approximately 500 boys from throughout the state who have been selected by faculty members at their schools.

Bob Bradshaw, who is the chairman of the Boys' State committee of Summers-Whitehead Post 24 of the legion here, is handling the arrangements for the proceeding of the delegates from Chattanooga.

Post 34 is sponsoring 27 of the boys, one is being sponsored by James Craig Leader Post 182 in St. Louis, and two are sponsored by William E. Ray Post 95 in East Ridge.

The Boys' State program is one of the American Legion's Americanism projects. Delegates to the "state" originate from cities and counties and elect officers and a governor.

David Parker, former administrative assistant at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga will return in September as director of public relations.

The announcement of Parker's new position was made Monday by Chancellor William H. Macomber. Parker has been in graduate school in the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill since June of 1968. He expects to receive a master's degree in political science in August.

Charles W. (Chuck) Johnson, who has been serving in Parker's absence as administrative assistant and director of public relations, will assume

full-time teaching abilities in the Department of English in the fall.

A native Chattanooga, Parker graduated from Central High School and received a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Chattanooga in 1964. He majored both in English and political science. He was newspaper reporter for The Chattanooga Times until he left to join the university staff in 1965.

Macomber said he spoke for the entire university "in expressing our appreciation to Mr. Johnson for his service during the past year as director of public relations in the absence of Mr. Parker."

A native of Lake Worth, Fla.,

Johnson received his bachelor's degree from Florida State University in 1963. He received his master's there in 1967. He is presently working on his dissertation for a Ph.D. degree in Victorian literature at Florida State.

Central Backers Hoping to Play Homecoming Game at New Field

A fish fry and automobile raffle are among activities planned to aid Central High in its drive to construct a football stadium at the school.

Central Alumni Association president Jerry Summers said the plans were an outgrowth of a Monday night meeting between the alumni and Central High Booster Club.

The fish fry is planned for Labor Day on Highway 50 at a site to be announced. It will take the place of a fry held annually on Labor Day by the Men's Club of St. John's Methodist Church.

Bill Bollinger is chairman of the fry. Plates will be \$1.25 each and will be sold at 11 a.m. and 8 p.m., Summers said.

Details for the raffle will be announced later, according to the alumni president.

"They have started constructing the seats and we probably won't be able to play but one game — probably the homecoming game, in the new stadium," Summers said.

"We've lagged this summer on the building of the stadium because of vacations, but we're going hard at it again."

He said the automobile would probably be presented at the Homecoming game.

In addition, a group from the Boosters and Alumni plans to meet with county school superintendent Sam McConnell Wednesday to seek other means of financing the project.

Dunn Under No Pressure At Central

Twenty-eight years ago, Red Etter was introduced to Chattanooga football fans. In 1943 he became head football coach at Central High.

He was young and nervous, but he quickly proved he was a winner, and Central High kept him and thrived under his leadership.

In his first year, Red Etter's Pounders won eight and lost three. Three years later he won his first state championship, and Central High has been in the driver's seat of state and local football ever since.

But Etter is at Baylor now, and Central High School has another young coach. He is Joe Lee Dunn, one of the most versatile football players ever to wear a University of Chattanooga uniform.

Thursday, Joe Lee Dunn should have felt like the weight of the world was on his shoulders. Red Etter did, before his first game and Red Etter didn't have to succeed Red Etter when he became coach at Central, Joe Dunn did.

Rear Bryant's eventual successor will know the feeling. Phil Bengtson must have when he succeeded Vince Lombardi at Green Bay. I mean, how does a new coach go about improving a perennial football champion? Central is one, and Joe Dunn inherited it.

But, Joe made his debut at the helm of the Pounders Friday night, and oddly enough, he professes that Thursday was just like any other day at Central High.

"I took this job because I thought I could do the job," he said. "I guess that's why there is no pressure on me. If there is any, I haven't felt it."

A Winning Tradition

Tradition has a way of playing tricks on us. Chattanooga takes Central High for granted. It has won football games so often for so long that Chattanooga has come to expect it, and Chattanooga probably might continue to expect it 10 years from now.

A coach tells a story that might best illustrate the point. It was after City High had fallen in its 39th effort to dethrone the Pounders. It went something like this:

A youngster wearing a City High uniform strolled slumped-shouldered through the gate at Chamberlain Field, his head bowed in dejection.

"We'll get 'em next year," the youth said to a guard at the gate. "We'll get 'em next year."

"Yep, son," the guard answered, "your father said the same thing."

The last time City High defeated Central was in 1929. Since then, it has been a long, long dry spell for the Dynamo.

But, fact is, one of Central's greatest fortes is gone, and I'm not talking about Red Etter, particularly. Anyone who would argue that Etter isn't the Vince Lombardi of Chattanooga's High School football program, would argue that Grant isn't buried in Grant's tomb.

All but one of those 23 years Etter spent at Central, the school was located on Dodd Avenue almost in the heavily populated heart of Chattanooga. Naturally, first class athletes selected Central for that very reason.

But now Central is more or less a community school, located far out on Highway 58 in the Lake Hills area. And until that area becomes more heavily populated, Central High might feel the sting in athletics.

Jack Archer, the 16-year Central assistant coach who was named to succeed Etter, but accepted the head coaching job at Lakeview before his first football season, was asked if it already had begun to decline.

"I'll put it this way," he said. "I've seen Coach Etter win with teams that were thought to have been superior, but weren't. He was a great organizer.

"But I've also seen Central teams that a lot of coaches could have made champions of simply because of the school's location. Naturally, Central got the athletes.

"But, since Central was moved," he added, "I'd have to think that a lot of schools get talent that's at least equal to Central's."

Dunn admits that the school's location won't help his football program within the next couple of years, but he also believes that Central will hold its own until Chattanooga's population reaches his front yard.

In other words, Joe Dunn doesn't feel like the weight of the world is on his shoulders.

Cutoff for the championship flight was 77, with Parks winning a three-way play-off for the one vacant spot.

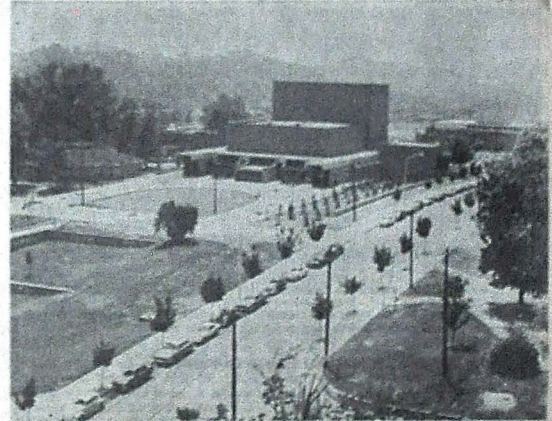

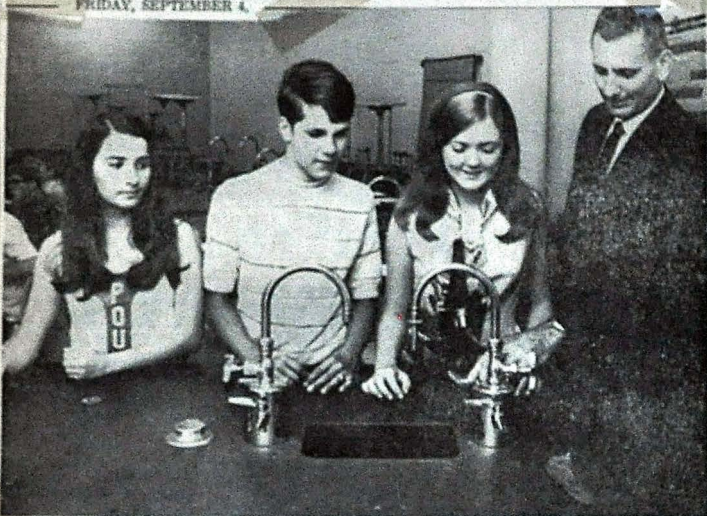

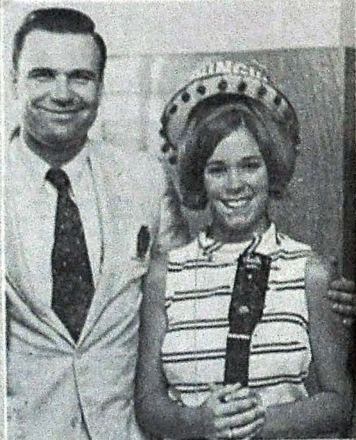

62 From Area Win Scholarship Honors

Thirty-two students in 10 high schools in the immediate Chattanooga area and 30 others from 16 schools in The News-Free Press circulation area were won honor as semifinalists in the 16th annual National Merit Scholarship Corp. program.

The program is administered nationwide in some 17,000 secondary schools in an effort to find the most intellectually able high school seniors. Semifinalist ratings were achieved on the basis of competitive tests that were given when the students were juniors last school term, and further examinations will be given to determine finalists.

The names of scholarships will be announced next May. Finalists will be considered for either one-year \$1,000 scholarships or four-year scholarships that provide a stipend of up to \$1,500 a year, depending on a winner's need.

On the basis of statistics, a semifinalist has about one chance in five of receiving a scholarship, considering that there are only approximately 3,000 scholarships and some 13,000 competitors.

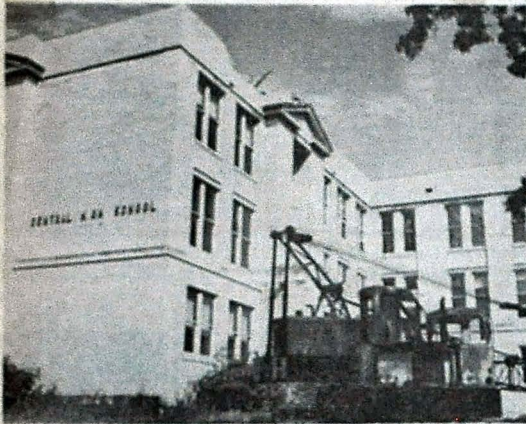

DEMOLITION STARTED WITH BRICKWORK AT TOP CENTER

Operators of a giant crane started yanking a heavy steel ball Monday to crumble the long-colored brick walls of a Chattanooga landmark — the old Central High School building on Dodds Avenue.

Built in 1907 and hallowed in the memories of thousands of former students, the Central property was sold to McCallie School several months ago by the Hamilton County Council for \$250,000. Steddale Baptist Church bought a half-block of

the property adjoining the church site for \$23,000. McCallie School bought the major portion, consisting of two blocks of land, the three-story school building and its two ad-

joining gyms, and a fenced athletic field.

Central High School moved into its handsome new building on Highway 58 in the fall of 1969. The old structure has been standing idle since, and many of the windows on its back side have been the targets of vandals.

Dr. Spencer J. McCallie Jr., headmaster of McCallie School, said the two gyms will be retained and remodeled but the major portion of the old building will be razed to make way for a new athletic field and a parking area. That entire block will be fenced, he said. The other block, already fenced, consists of an athletic field which McCallie will use for basketball.

The new athletic field will be used as a practice field for football and soccer, the headmaster explained. McCallie's varsity football and soccer games will continue to be played on school's main athletic field, he said.

One of the two former Central gyms will be completely removed and used for basketball games, Dr. McCallie said. The other will be converted into dressing rooms for the basketball players and their guests. The basement area under that one will be used for craft shops.

When the demolition of the school structure is finished the exposed walls of the two gyms will be faced with brick of matching color. Mark K. Wilson Co., general contractor, will do the remodeling work and any new construction to be done, Dr. McCallie said.

He said work has started on the gyms and that the school expects to be able to use them this fall. He declined to speculate on when the remainder of the project will be completed.

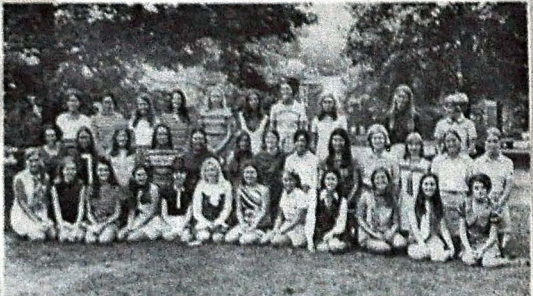
Everett O'Neal Dies; Educator

Team members will be at Central High Oct. 5 through 9 from 6 to 9:30 p.m., and if it proves necessary they will also be at the school Oct. 10 from 8 a.m. to noon.

The second phase of the study will involve parents of Brainerd High students, who will begin receiving letters and questionnaires Oct. 5. The research team will be at Brainerd High Oct. 12 through 16 from 6 to 9:30 p.m., and, if necessary, Oct. 17 from 8 a.m. to noon.

Phase three will repeat the procedure at Tyler High. The mail-out is set for Oct. 15, and the interviews will be taken Oct. 19 through 23 from 6 to 9 p.m. and on Saturday from 8 a.m. to noon.

The final phase will move the team to Red Bank High, where the mail-out is set for Oct. 12. Interviews and breath tests will be taken by the team at Red Bank Oct. 26 through 30 on the same schedule as with the other schools.

The survey is by no means an "experiment on people," Dr. Young emphasized. It is an effort to determine the relation of nitrogen oxide in the air and respiratory disease, as a means of working toward attacking the problem.

If PTA or other parent groups are interested in having a speaker to explain the program, Dr. Young said, arrangements can be made through the health department.

"He drove past and cry a lot," said my friend, an old grad of Central High.

Watching the demolition of your old alma mater, be conscious is an almost embarrassing experience. It's like witnessing an old friend — or an old enemy, depending on your viewpoint — being disemboweled by public.

There goes the room where you met in Aoms . . . There goes the room where you sat in front of you, up near the teacher . . . the one whose history class you flunked . . . you suddenly concentrate because of the fabrication of the log tuffed nails on her chin . . . It reminds you of a half-ghost's head . . .

And there goes the lab, where you spilled concentrated sulfuric acid down the side of your pants . . . you had to run home and change clothes after the pouring you took . . . you wonder if the wrecking crew found the pack of cigarettes you'd sneaked in, and dropped behind the radiator when you were about to get caught . . .

And there's the principal's office, a place you'd spend a lot of hours in . . . the time you got called on the carpet for cutting geometry class to date Camille, the Older Woman who graduated last year . . . Camille wanted to go to the lake, and she threatened to go with Walter Gregg if you didn't take her . . .

For the time you got into that sting-bait contest with Hermie Scoggins in study period . . . and the time you nearly got expelled for punching Cornelia Carter on the . . . er, stairs . . .

I know just how you guys feel about old Central High, as its once-bellied halls bite the dust and turn to rubble under the wreckers' hammers. When I was a kid, up in Wellbates, Pa., I had a similar taste of nostalgia.

The grade school and the high school sat side by side, and as we struggled our way through the grades, the high school stood there, its ivied red brick ever in our view as a goal to be achieved.

When I made it to the eighth grade, my heart sang half full its time in my mouth

as at the bell and end-all of intellectual inspiration, when your sights have been set straight and true of passing through its portals. It's sort of like being told they're going to demolish your grandfather's . . .

They sat and now as that new high school across town was, the spark was given from the learning game, for many of us. There were no stinks around to inspire us.

On the subject of tearing down a . . . co-worker Jimmie Gagliano came in the other day with a rather spooky tale.

"I've bought a house in the neighborhood just to tear it down," she told me. "In the basement, they found an old Civil War uniform."

But now she'll never know its history — what brave and ancient warrior it was who was proud enough of his part in the conflict to preserve his badge of courage."

The gal who answered couldn't remember, either. She had to look it up.

In a case you're in the same boat, our Mr. Forgettable is Harry Blackman of Minnesota. Write it down.

W. Everett O'Neal

One of the friendly figures visitors encountered in the old Central High School central office, after walking up those creaking stairs, was W. Everett O'Neal, who retired only last June 30 as assistant principal.

Everett O'Neal, in fact, was one reason people liked to visit — with Principal Hobart Millsaps, J. Pope Dyer, Red Eiter (now gone to Baylor), and all the boys and girls at Central.

Central is in transition now, with a beautiful new school on the Highway 58 area, far away from Dodds Avenue. Everett O'Neal died Thursday night at 68. He was an accomplished man, and handsome, not without but within. For he loved not only the learning process but the learners. We were not closely associated with him but on the basis of several talks we venture to say that he had a good deal to do, along with so many others, with the fine national awards won by Central High School.

Justice Prevails At MTSU; UTC Next on Agenda?

Saturday isn't becoming for UT Chattanooga, but it will be for a young man from Chattanooga who plays for Middle Tennessee State.

Reuben Justice, former Central star, is anxious to play against the Mocs.

"Reuben is really looking forward to that game," said his coach, Bill Peck, Sunday. "He's been our work horse so far." Justice carried 20 times for 77 yards Saturday night at the Blue Raiders topped Morehead State, 14-6, in an Ohio Valley Conference game.

In other small college activity, Tennessee Tech established itself as an OVC title threat by whipping Murray State 10-6; Western Kentucky assumed the favorite's role in the OVC by stopping defending champion East Tennessee State 19-6. Western Kentucky whipped Austin Peay 28-9; Tennessee State walloped Albany State 54-7. Carson-Newman defeated Emory & Henry 12-6; Hampton-Sydney blanked Sewanee 20-0; and Georgetown shut out Maryville College, 34-0.

Justice, now a sophomore, 5-9, 175-pound tailback, signed with MTSU, and he is now definitely the "big man" in their offense.

Reuben tied a school record for carries (31) in the Red Raiders' first game against UT Martin. He picked up 169 yards in that one, so he now has 227 yards rushing in two games.

"He has good speed and is very quick," said Peck of his star.

Peck, in his first year as MTSU's, is delighted with his team's start. "It's been a long

time since we've won our first two here," he said. Quarterback Bobby Gatlin and kick returner Taylor Edwards scored the Raiders' TDs Saturday.

Linebacker David Duval, senior from Crossville, stood out defensively as he made six tackles and intercepted two passes, one a key one late in the game.

Offensive guard Jim Inglis, junior from Chattanooga, had an outstanding blocking game. Peck reported a number of players incurred injuries in the game, with fullback Tommy Beene rejoining his shoulder which was previously dislocated. He will probably miss the rest of the season.

Tennessee Tech won its second straight after falling behind 7-0 in the game. Cornerback Butch Brickland made a key play with the score tied 7-7 in the fourth period. He intercepted a pass and ran it back 41 yards for a touchdown.

Matt Haug scored the first Tech TD on a quarterback sneak, and Steve Ailey, another quarterback, passed 19 yards to Roger Hill for the final score. The Golden Eagles travel to UT Martin next Saturday.

Sewanee will try and forget its nightmare at Hampton-Sydney and concentrate on Saturday's game with Maryville College. If comparative scores mean anything, then the Tigers could be in for a rough afternoon. Maryville beat Hampton-Sydney 60-11 in its opening game.

Tailback Ronnie Weir also remains on the injured list.

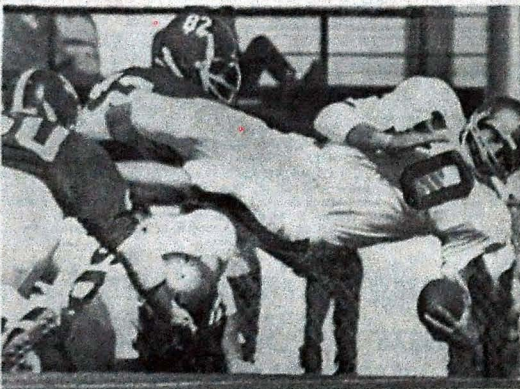
Tide Rips Vandy, 35-11

Tyner Beats Central For First Time, 8-0

Johnson Runs 64 Yards for TD; Pounder Defense Holds Up Well

It was a game for Ripley's Believe It Or Not. Except for a long run by Mike Johnson, Central's defense kept Tyner out of the end zone despite four total fumbles by an anemic Pounder offense that netted only eight yards, repeatedly given excellent field position by Central's mistake-prone offense, drove to the Pounder 8, 6, 9, 21, 24 and 27 on separate marches only to be denied any points.

Scoutback Johnson provided the only touchdown last night with a 64-yard dash on the closing play of the second half as he broke a tackle after gaining about 19 yards, regained his speed quickly and outran his pursuers.

Actually Tyner scored its initial two points on Eddie Graham's center snap that sailed over Tommy Youngblood's head and into the end zone. The

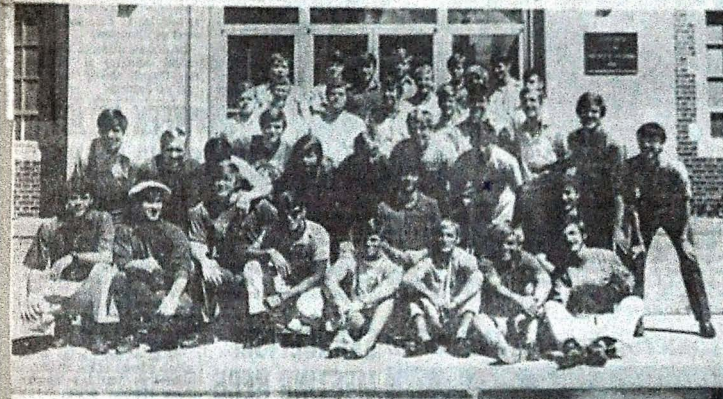

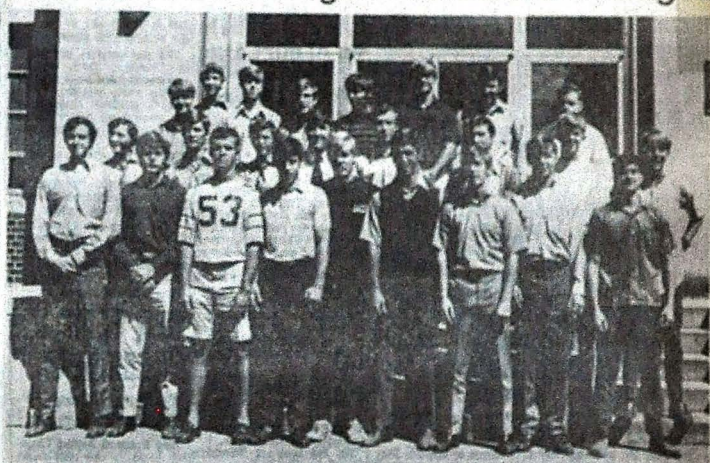

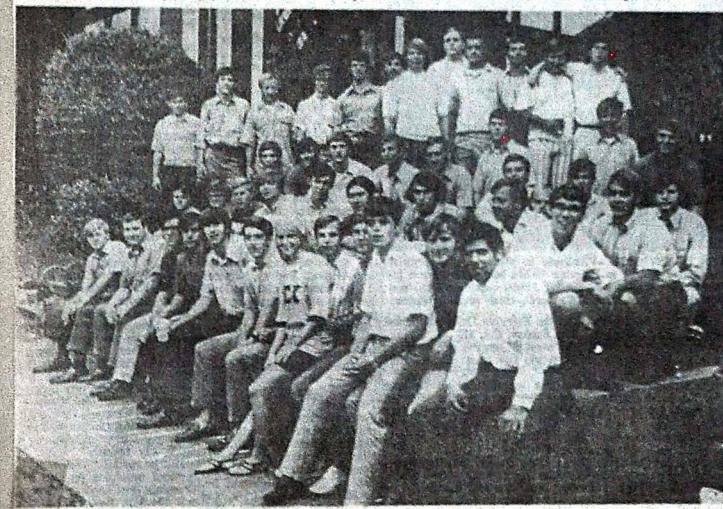

"Yes, that's him," the kind receptionist added, nodding at the 28-year-old, Red Joe Dunn, who was an honorable mention All-American at UC under Scrapy Moore, heard name of the conversion as he was busy checking over a couple of things with his athletic director.

Joe Dunn, his face-breaking like a craggy grin, did not seem like a coach at all but, instead, "one of the boys." He laughed in an easy-going manner and began to talk about Central football, in a manner that only a top-flight coach can do.

He talked in a casual tone at first but as the conversation began to get older, he leaned toward the desk in front of him and began talking in earnest. Talking as only a coach that has not won a game can do.

It was clear that he wasn't talking, nor was he making excuses. As one listened, it was plain that he had relived every game the Pioneers had played this season—over and over.

He explained how he thought the Founder defense was the best in town. He told how his boys had cried when they lost but how the spirit had not faltered in any of the Central games—or practices.

But ain't blocking folks. I need to work on our blocking red head."

"Look, everything is new. We have new plays, I'm new—everything. This is the 'greenest' team in town. (Red) Elter played 23 seniors last year and none of them are around now. None of these boys have ever played before."

"But, wait a minute, we are not running scared. I wouldn't say we are discouraged but, rather, disgusted. We are not about to doubt we can win."

Dunn continued, after telling his "home room" they'd better quit talking.

"Here's the trick to playing football," Dunn now spoke quietly, as if to one of his players. "You've gotta believe in yourself. If you can't, nobody else can." His eyes were holes through the desk top.

"I wouldn't trade this bunch of boys for anybody," he looked

up, adding, "I mean it."

"What we need now is to win. We need to win awfully bad. There is just a 'little something' somewhere we need to iron out, then we'll be OK," he flashed his grin once again.

"Get now it made no difference what Joe Dunn said, it didn't matter that he talked about stellar players like Joe Kilgore, Randy Harris and Roddy Bowman. His one phrase, the one about "believing in yourself," had struck home.

You could tell that Joe Dunn does believe in himself and that he does believe in Central. But, most of all, you could tell that Joe Dunn, the stray hair still falling, believes Central can—and will win. He believes they can beat anybody on a particular night.

He believes this with all his heart and soul and those who know Joe Dunn, know that might just be all Central needs.

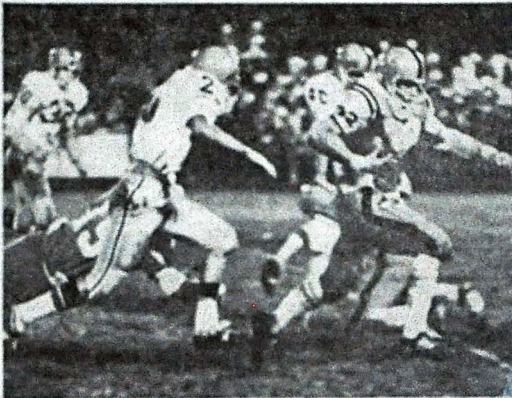

Mitchell's kick was wide, but the Pioneers led 4-0 and the smoothness of the touchdowns made the margin appear even greater.

But Central took the ensuing kickoff at the 25 and put on an offensive show of its own. Junior quarterback R. S. Harris moved the running of halfback Jim Hunt with his own talented passing arm and quickly marched the Pioneers to yardage in 9 plays. The payoff coming on a 15-yard off-tackle slant to Hunt. Tommy Youngblood's kick made it 7-4 and that margin held up until early in the final period.

Harris put the Pioneers in scoring position again just before interception when he swept end on a bootleg and raced 59 yards to the Pioneer 17 yard line. He then found Youngblood with a quick pass at the five, but the rugged East Ridge defense held off four bursts at the line and the march died at the 1-foot line.

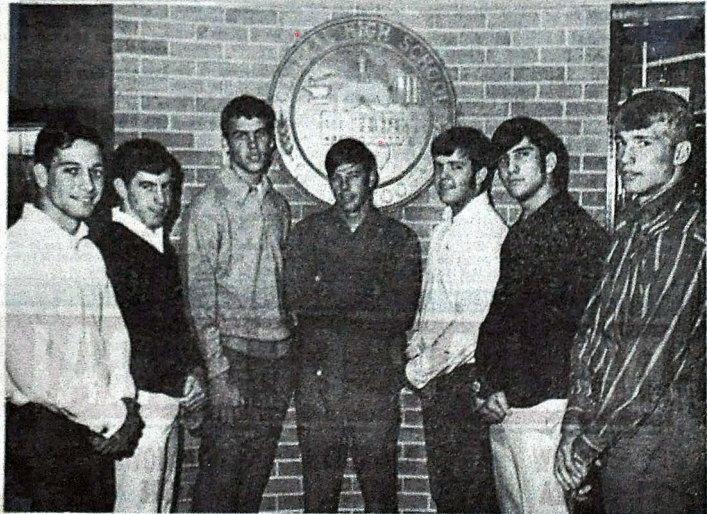

The "Dann For Governor" sign that may appear on the Central banner hoisted Monday night will apply to a small Georgian who accepted the challenge of rebuilding Central's lost football fortune and took his knocks all season while waiting optimistically for his Pounders to come of age. They grew up Friday night. Everything they did was right and because of that, practically everything the Irish tried was wrong. Jim Hunt, the "Lonesome Back" in Central's scattered-out offense, carried 15 times for two

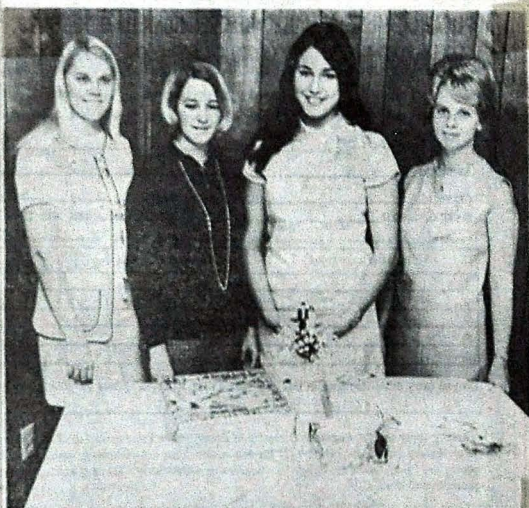

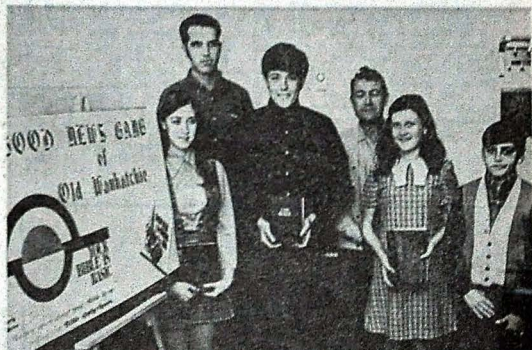

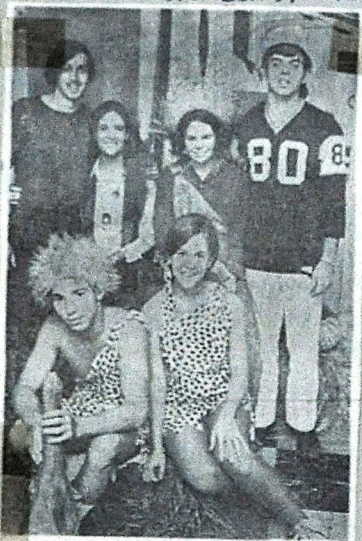

Millsaps Urges: Protect Education From Extremes

ATLANTA—It is time to return instruction to dedicated teachers and thus protect education from the fluctuating extremes of fashionable opinion.

resources for improving education."

The syndrome, he continued, is characterized by "an excessive concern to be contemporary, a constant search for the startling and unexpected and by an obsessive desire to attract attention."

In education, he said, it equates complete and constant change with progress.

He added that the syndrome is destructive for four reasons: —It can result in dilettantism, a constant pursuit of fads which, in its worst form promotes sensationalism, blindly communiting education to a kind of "show biz" and gimmickry.

—It exerts tremendous pressures for conformity. Efforts to preserve rational structure are often branded as conservatism and attempts to present some of man's achievements are labeled as escapism, escapism.

—More seriously, the syndrome wastes human resources in that the dedication, experience and professional competence of teachers are often ignored or downgraded.

Finally, and worst of all, the syndrome often restricts education by confining it within an outmoded scientific structure.

The "living curriculum," which Millsaps, Mrs. Cooper and, earlier, Miss Mildred Mator, county coordinator of language arts, discussed, is an imaginative attempt to combat the syndrome.

The curriculum, which is being developed in several Tennessee school systems, uses methods developed by the teachers that frequently are better than those that have been scientifically developed and tested by professional organizations, Millsaps said.

Education should resist attempts to confine it within inadequate scientific techniques, Millsaps concluded, by accepting the responsibility for promoting an extended and educated sense of life.

It is time to protect education from fluctuating extremes of fashionable opinion and gaping questionable scientific and industrial methods and it is time for the creative rebellion envisioned by the philosopher Albert Camus, that transforms without destroying, Millsaps said.

In her remarks, Mrs. Cooper said that the implementation of the "living curriculum" uses the concept of "funneling out, not in," better ideas for teaching. The source is the teacher who in turn has three

Millsaps spoke at a session of the National Council of Teachers of English's 68th annual convention, which has attracted more than 4,000 teachers from the U.S. and Canada.

Sharing the program with Millsaps was Mrs. Margaret Cooper, assistant superintendent for instruction in the Hamilton County Department of Education.

Millsaps, who is president of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, an affiliate of the National Education Association, spoke out against the "zero-hunting syndrome," which he defined as "a needlessly destructive disease (which) often causes widespread squandering of

sources: society, students and herself.

English teachers, she said, are not interested in what man can do but what he can be. These teachers are the ideal people, but, traditionally, they have been in the caboose of education "train," with social scientists and other specialists in the first class compartments.

"It is time," she said, "to get the English teachers out of the caboose."

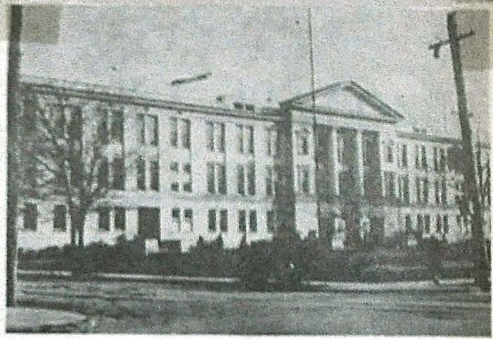
Her hobbies include tearing, dancing and cooking. She will present a twirling routine as her talent in the contest.

Atlanta's 'Old Home Week' Attracts Moc Wrestlers

By EDDIE DAVIDSON There'll be a busy Chattanooga in the fifth annual Georgia Tech Intercollegiate Invitational Wrestling Tournament next weekend, it'll seem like old home week in Atlanta.

Although entries are still being accepted, tourney director and host Georgia Tech mat coach Lowell Lange says he's already received team entries from UT-Chattanooga, UT-Knoxville, Southeastern Conference champion Louisiana State, Alabama, Auburn, Troy State, Florida, Florida State, Florida Tech of Orlando, Bravard (Fla.) Junior College, Miami-Dade Junior College and William & Mary of Virginia.

Since there's no team scoring, each participating school may enter as many wrestlers in each of the 10 weight classes as it desires. Therefore, Lange expects a total field of at least 175 individual wrestlers.

UTC, for instance, is planning to take between 25 and 30 boys — 23 of them products of local high school wrestling programs. It all depends upon the injury status at the time. Of the 23-man squad that has been working out for over a month, eight were either injured or ill at one time last week.

One of the Moc's doubtful participants is Georgia Tech tourney defending 134-pound champion Randy Fairies, who is still bothered at times by a shoulder injury he received last season. Four Chattanooga will be among the 30-man Auburn delegation. They are 1970-71 Plainsmen captains Tom Holliday and Luther Killian and sophomore 177-pounder Joe Timberlake and freshman Mike Holliday. Tom Holliday, the defending 158-pound champ at Georgia Tech, and Timberlake wrestled at City, while Killian was a national prep school champion for McCallie three years ago. Mike Holliday is a Baylor graduate.

Former Red Bank wrestler Gary Speagle is the only Chattanooga on the Georgia Tech team this year, although two-time National Prep School champion Rob

Healy from Baylor may join the team after football season is over. (Georgia Tech will play in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex., Dec. 19.)

The Tech tourney, to be held at Alexander Memorial Coliseum, will begin at 12:30 p.m. Friday. 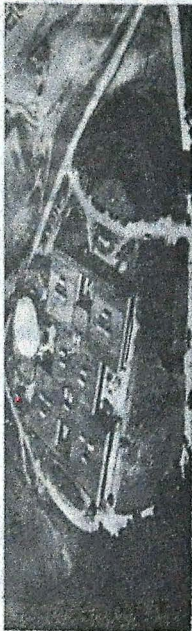

The Pounders saw their record slip to 4-5 on the year with the loss.

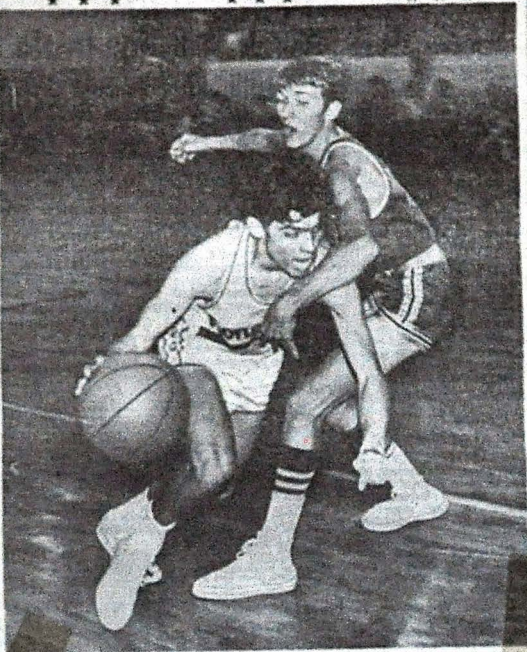

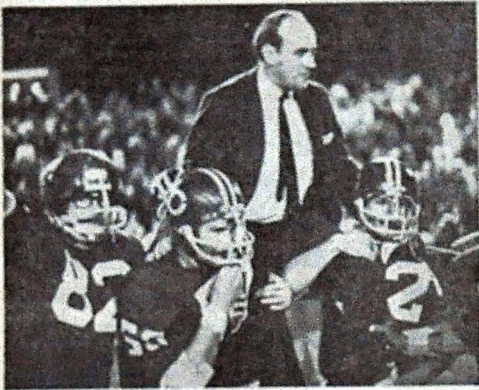

Central's 96-pound Johnny Stancell is unbeaten in six matches and this was the first decision for Stancell, having won the previous five by pins.

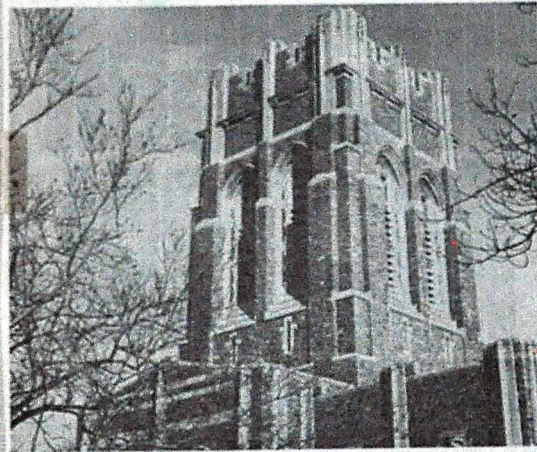

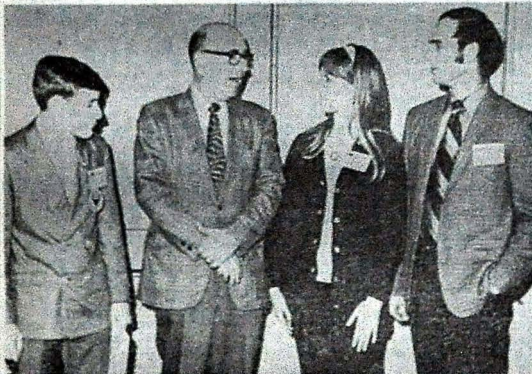

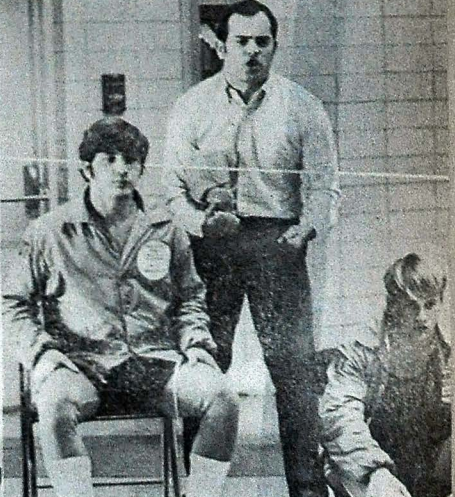

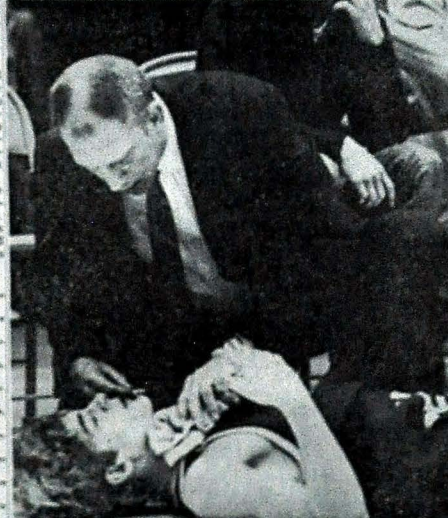

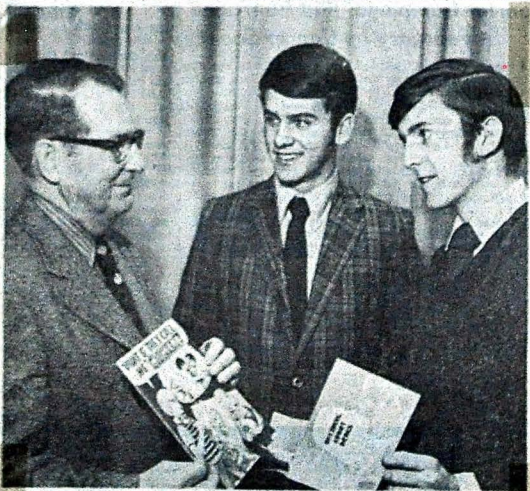

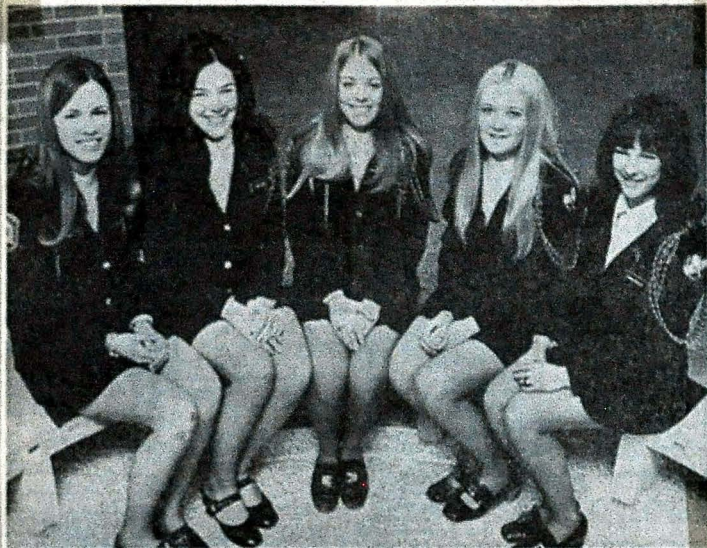

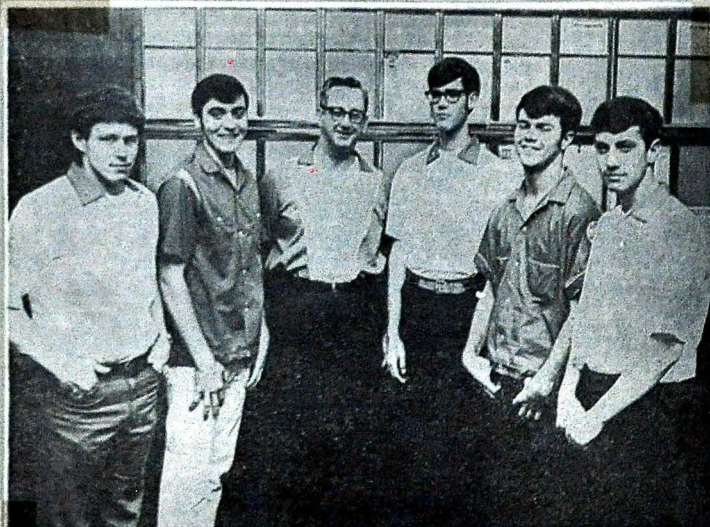

He Has Seen It All

Crime is his daily work.

The message, but in real life, he sits on a high bench and presides over a courtroom in the black robes of a judge.

In his some 25 years on the bench, Judge William Tillman Grant has seen and heard about everything. He has listened to testimony in brutal murder cases, has seen a defendant cut his throat in the courtroom, and have to be rushed to a hospital, and he has heard petty thieves try to explain why they stole. He's seen and heard it all.

It may be a cliché, but Judge Grant really believes in "tempering justice with mercy."

He tries hard to judge each case on its merits, and to treat every defendant as an individual. When he has a young defendant before him who is guilty but confused, and who may respond to efforts at rehabilitation, he makes the sentence as light as possible — and hopes for the best.

His hopes are often justified. Prisons are not necessarily graduate schools in crime. Young people do pay for their mistakes, and many, Judge Grant is convinced, resolve to change their way of life as the result of actual punishment. Several young men he has sentenced over the years have come back to see him, and have expressed gratitude for his interest in them. Not a single person he has ever sentenced has come back to threaten him.

"Some young people have to go to prison and they come out chastened criminals. Some men can't seem to do the work, and sometimes it is the first time in their lives they have had regular meals, regular clothes in the sunshine, and maybe the first time they have encountered the responsibility of work."

Judge Grant is happy that he has never been confronted with a case like the Manson-Sharon Tate murder trial in California. But he sees his share of drama — as was the case of the defendant who suddenly stood up and cut his throat. An alert officer was able to find the right pressure point to stop the bleeding, the man was rushed to nearby Newell Hospital, and he is alive today.

One of the most soul-searing cases Tillman Grant had to try was one involving a teenage girl who was murdered and her body allegedly cut up in a bathtub. It was some time later before the pieces of her body, stuffed in a canvas bag, were discovered in a field in Maricopa County. The married couple convicted and sentenced for her murder are in prison.

Tillman Grant has the reputation of being a hard-working judge who is quite willing to keep his jurists late into the night to complete a case. If it becomes obvious a jury cannot reach a decision on a matter, Judge Grant will sequester it in hotel rooms and start again the next morning. But if he thinks there's a chance the jury can agree on a verdict he will wait.

He believes, with Thoreau, that "justice delayed is justice denied."

One of the first cases he heard after he was appointed to the bench by Gov. Frank Clement in 1945 was that of a man charged with the murder of a cab driver. The man reportedly got \$1.45 from the cab driver, but he got 45 years in prison.

William Tillman Grant was born here July 22, 1909, oldest

of the seven children of Pearl Buckalew Grant and the late William T. Grant. His father was a cabinet maker with Cavalier Carp.

Tillman lived in Brainerd when it was still pretty much farmland, and he went to Sunnyside School. Later he went to Central and was graduated in 1928. He played football and was on the track team at Central. He went to Emory and Henry in Virginia, then to the University of Chattanooga, and later got his law degree from the Chattanooga College of Law.

As a high school boy, Tillman decided the best thing for him was a college education, and he worked and got it. Then he decided a legal education wouldn't hurt him, and might even help him. He got his law degree and joined Blaine Buchanan in the practice of law here in 1945.

During school here he worked — mostly in drug stores — and he even studied pharmacy for a while. He worked for Life and Casualty Insurance Co., then sold cars for Hailey Chevrolet Co. He worked for about a year for Douglas Aircraft in California, in a wage assembly plant.

When Hercules Powder Co. was named to operate the Volunteer Ordnance Works here, Tillman got a job as a guard. He moved up fast to executive lieutenant in charge of some 550 men. It was a time when VOW, Chickamauga Dam and Oak Ridge were possibly vulnerable to enemy attack in World War II.

He had been practicing law here for several years when Gov. Clement appointed him to the criminal court bench. He has since been elected to two eight-year terms without opposition.

In school Tillman met Nadine DeBard and they were married on Nov. 28, 1940. They have three sons, Larry, who is a dentist in Dalton, Ga.; Kenneth, who is in medical school at the University of Tennessee in Memphis; and Charles, who is with National Life and Accident Insurance Co. in Chattanooga.

They live at 201 N. Germantown Rd.

They have two grandsons, David, 3, son of Charles, and John, 2½, son of Larry.

Tillman is a deacon in the Brainerd Church of Christ and is director of its child care program. He is also a director of the Christian Youth Home at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, a director of Boyd-Buchanan School, a Mason, Shriner and member of the Eastern Star. He is past recalled ruler of the Elks Lodge here.

As a lawyer he is a member of the Tennessee and American Bar associations; he has been admitted to practice in the federal courts and before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Commenting on his courtroom work, Tillman says that in the interests of justice "you have to have a good working knowledge of the law — which is constantly changing — and a lot of good common sense."

"You have to keep in mind that as a judge you are representing the people of Tennessee in dispensing justice. It is the duty of the court to punish crime, but there also is the duty of a judge to consider the defendant in some terms of compassion. There is always the question of whether the man must be sentenced or whether he can be paroled or given a suspended sentence."

Judge Grant didn't set out to be a judge. But when his friends urged him he accepted the governor's appointment. He found he liked the job — it is fascinating — although he could make more money in private practice.

But after all, there is something special about being a judge. When you do the black robe and walk out into the courtroom, you are the personification of the law. It always has to be a dramatic moment. You have to look into the faces of a courtroom full of spectators, but you have the authority, you're the one in control. What you do and say is the law. Of course, you have to be right.

Then you sit there, and watch the drama of human life unfold.

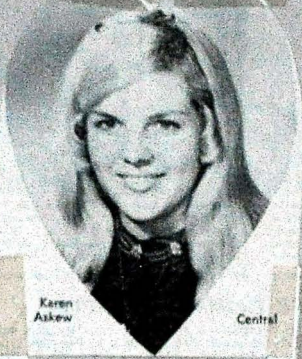

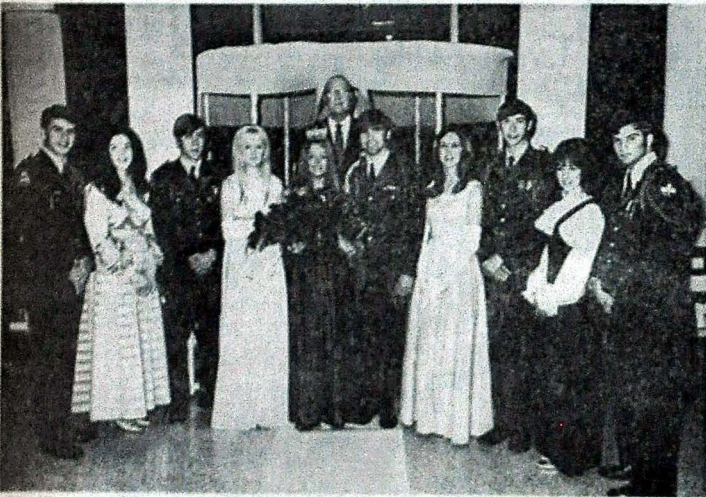

HAIR PROBLEM DECISION MADE BY DIRECTOR

Tyner, East Ridge
Nab Most Seeds;
Action Starts at 7

Today is the final day of preparations by high school wrestlers for the District 2 and 3 tournaments set under way Friday night at Central and Notre Dame High schools respectively with John Farr and Nick Weather serving as most directors at the respective events.

Action will start at both schools Friday at 7 with the quarter-final round. Saturday action will start at 3 p.m. with the semifinal to be followed by the consolation round and then the third session will start Saturday at 7:30 with the consolation finals to be followed by the championship finals.

Tyner was given four top-seeded wrestlers in District 2, while East Ridge was awarded five top-seeded matmen in District 1.

John Farr, who will also direct the state tournament, was asked to make a statement concerning the length of hair of a wrestler and he issued the following statement:

"There has been much discussion about hair and what is acceptable in the wrestling rules. Today long hair is the rule rather than the exception. It has been a problem for wrestling officials across the state and there is no uniformity and prescribed adherence to the hair. I as state tournament wrestling director am taking the liberty of specifying the limitations on the length of hair.

"These guidelines are prescribed in the best interest of the sport in our state wrestling tournament and they are not prejudicial, but are designed to establish continuity of appearance for our state competitors. No. 1, the length of hair over the forehead shall be no longer than the width of one finger above the eyebrows (approximately 1/2 inch). No. 2, the length of hair of the head shall be of such length as not to touch the external surface of the ears. No. 3, the length of hair in the back shall be neatly cut, and shall not hang over any normal dress sport shirt collar. No. 4, the length of hair on top of the head shall be of such a length that it can be enclosed in the headgear without smothering appearance."

Farr said that the final decision will be left to the head official at each tournament but that this was just a guideline to be used for the district, regional and state tournaments.

Admission to the district tournaments will be 75 cents for students and \$1 for adults for Friday night and Saturday afternoon and \$1 for students and \$1.50 for adults for the Saturday night session.

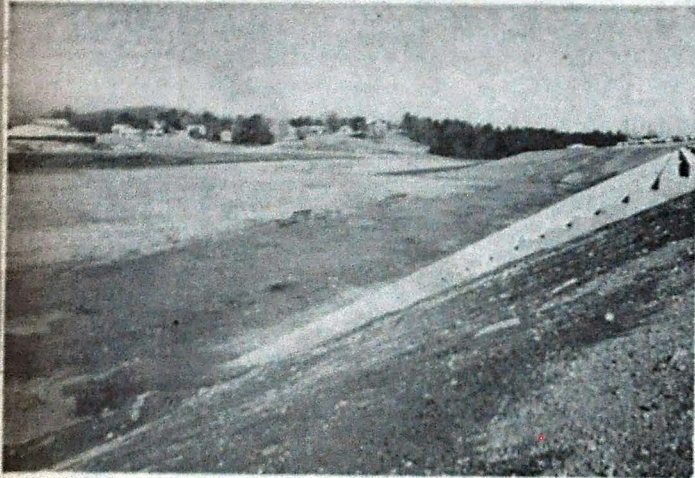

Football at Baylor and Central high school is undergoing a major facelift and the masks are scheduled to come off before Fall.

Remember Central High's never-ending scramble for game sites — 84 days at Chickasaw Field? Remember

the old "break-down" bleachers at Baylor School, the ones which seated only about 1,300 customers?

Scratch 'em. They're history.

They've poured \$50,000 worth of concrete at Central High and mounded it into the form of bleachers made to seat 3,300 fans.

The bleachers, 28 rows high, stretch out between the 10-yard lines of the new, nicely-sloped football field, which hopefully will be in playing condition by Fall.

And you'll be seeing night football at Central, too. Three light poles will be installed on each side of the playing field,

each carrying three banks of eight lights.

Just North of the football stadium is an eight-lane cinder track.

In all, some \$80,000 has gone into the new athletic facility, most of which was footed by the Central Bowlers Club.

At Baylor, carved deep into its beautiful rolling campus, similar construction is under way.

The stands aren't completed, but Athletic Director Fred Elter says they will be before kickoff time rolls around.

Surrounding the football field, a quarter-mile, eight-

lane "Grasstex" track is under construction.

On the east side of the field, between the 25-yard lines, will be 24 rows of stands which will accommodate 2,500 customers.

Three sections of 16 rows will be built into the West bank and will have a seating capacity of 1,500.

A press box, approximately 35 feet long, is included in the plans and a visitors dressing room will go up on the west side of the field.

For the first time ever, Baylor school will be playing home games at night and Elter is confident attendance will improve.

The winner of last week's PGA championship at Palm Beach Gardens has been tabbed a favorite for the \$150,000 Doral.

Two former Central High School golfers were on the firing line today as the \$150,000 Doral Open started at Miami.

The closest the now slim Nicklaus has come was a second place finish in 1964.

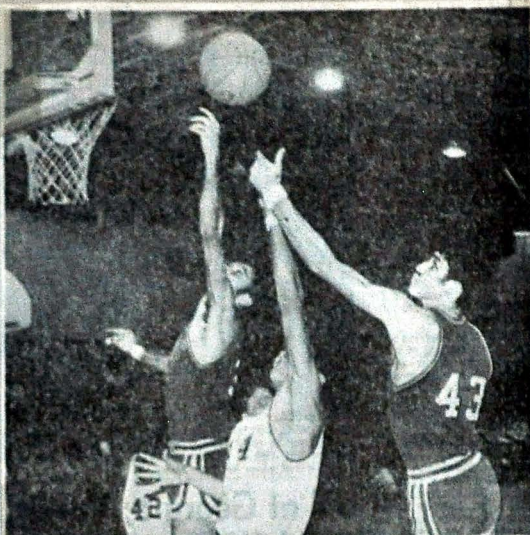

Gymnastics is one of the fastest growing sports in the South. Elementary and secondary schools, universities, clubs and YMCA's are beginning to see the value of a well-rounded gymnastic program. Teams are already organized and participating in many Southern cities and Chattanooga is no exception.

Several forces have given impetus to the growth of gymnastics. Perhaps this growth could be termed a gymnastics explosion.

In 1969, a group of men and women physical education teachers attended the Olympic Games at Rome, Italy, where they spent considerable time with the U.S. team and the coaches of women's and men's gymnastics during training periods.

These meetings prompted an invitation for an exhibition and demonstration by this same team and their coaches at the 1961 National Convention of the American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation held in Cincinnati, Ohio. This was accomplished through the United States Olympic Development Committee. At this meeting, many state gymnastic workshops were organized.

Through the cooperation of the YMCA, Chattanooga has a gymnastics team in the middle of its first year in competition. The team has a 4-1 record after traveling to the National Gymnastics Clinic in Sarasota, Fla., and competing with Birmingham YMCA, the Memphis Presbyterian team, Nashville's

Two Rivers High School and Peabody College, and a team from Oak Ridge. They have also performed routines for half-time shows at the Chattanooga High-Bradley County and the UTC-Furman University basketball games.

Team members are now in the process of preparing for the East Tennessee District Meet, which will be held in the Golden Gateway on Saturday starting at 9 a.m.

Members of the Central YMCA team under coach Scott Johnson range from ages 6-22. Their competition involves all Olympic gymnastic skills in all groups. This includes floor exercise, uneven parallel bars, balance beam, and vaulting for the girls with emphasis on flex-

ibility, ability, strength, gracefulness, and expression.

Beginning gymnasts perform compulsory exercises only in any or all of the four areas. The gymnast who advances to the low-intermediate level is required to present a compulsory and an optional exercise in each event. These regulations apply to the boy's events also, which include participation in parallel bars, rings, side horse, horizontal bar, vaulting, and floor exercise. The boys work toward the development of flexibility, agility, strength, presentation, assurance, and control.

Team members represent a cross-section of Chattanooga and Hamilton County. The youngest gymnast is little Dana Cowan, a 6-year-old student at Thrasher School. Others in the lower age groups are Debbie Shipp of Harrison Elementary; Beth Meyers, Washington Elementary; Rob Paden, Lookout Mountain Elementary; and Sally and Suzanne Eichelman, students at East Ridge Elementary.

Junior high school representatives are Bill Hertzog, Terry Miller, and Dottie Swaggy from J. B. Brown; Bonnie Jane Myers and Donna Jean Petty from Brainerd;

Mark Wrt, Delewood; Kathy Gault, North Chattanooga, and Dianne and Danny Kennell from Hixson, Laurel Eichelman and Karen Dotson attend East Ridge and Mary Decosimo and Mary Dickerson are students at Signal Mountain.

Representing Brainerd High School are Lee Olson, Robin Farrow, Roger Bank, Jeannie Each, and Valerie Mason. Karl Hall, Ellen Jayne, and Diana Rankin are students at Chattanooga High and John Carvett attends Central. Beth Davenport and Dean Paden are team members from Girls Preparatory School.

Dillard Evans, Kip Craig, Steve Twitty, and Garnett McMillan are students at University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and Stefan Beck comes in from University of Tennessee at Knoxville to join the team efforts. Completing the "Y" team are Margie White and David Pierce.

Future plans include the state gymnastic meet in Nashville, participation in the Seton Sports Vacation Travel Show at Memorial Auditorium, the YMCA Nationals in New Orleans, and the Junior Olympics in Valparaiso, Fla.

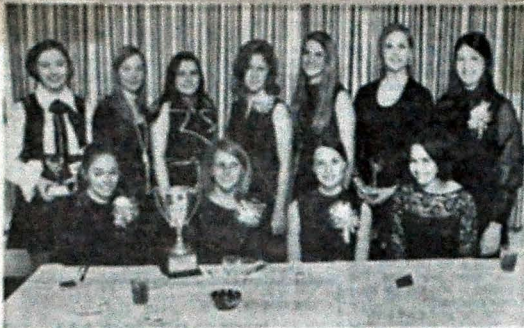

Laos Pilot CWO Fred Few Interviewed on 2 TV Nets

Chattanooga Tells War Experiences

A highly decorated young Chattanooga helicopter pilot flying support missions for the current incursion into Laos by South Vietnamese forces, CWO Fred Few, 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Few, 4308 Murray Hills Drive, was interviewed on ABC and CBS nationally broadcast television news programs Monday night.

The young Army warrant officer, who has been recommended for the Silver Star Medal, told the network newsmen that his ship had lost a copilot only the day before and that always makes us feel bad. But we always have faith that our rescue pilots will get us out."

CWO Few has reason to believe; it was his heroic ground action last August, after being

shot down and before being rescued by another helicopter, that earned him the Silver Star Medal recommendation—the third-highest decoration for heroism.

COPTER CRASHES

While in support of South Vietnamese troops his ship was hit, crashed and burned. He and his crew managed to escape the burning ship, only to be surrounded by advancing enemy troops. He ordered his crew to dismount the burning ship's guns so they could return the heavy fire, but his copilot was killed before the enemy could be driven back. He led his men through the fire to a small hill where they defended against an enemy charging to no more than a few feet away.

The citation noted that he "completely exposed himself time and time again in heavy enemy fire, protecting his crew with no regard to his personal safety."

Young Few and his men held off the enemy for almost an hour before the rescue helicopter could reach them.

His father said he has been flying in and out of Laos since Feb. 7 and that he has been "down" twice in Laos and on other occasions before that. He noted that Fred has received almost every medal that can be awarded in the field; some 49 Air Medals, two Bronze Stars and a Purple Heart, in addition to the medals for which he is recommended.

Young Few is a 1967 graduate of Central High School. He attended the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and Cleveland State College before joining the Army two years ago. He has been in Vietnam since last June.

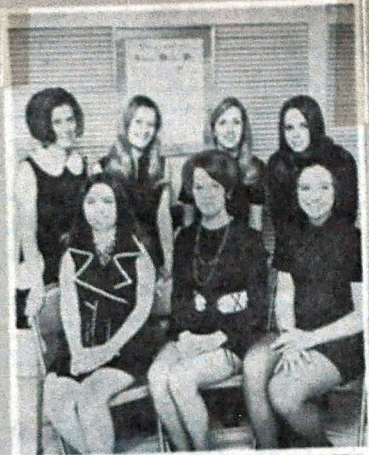

legislature and on the county court, respectively.

The proposal before the board is to transfer the 127 students in the top three grades to Central and leave the elementary and junior high schools at the present building.

It was emphasized in opening remarks by Supt. McConnell that a decision on the matter had not been made and Arnold Stulze, chairman of the board, re-emphasized that point in his initial remarks.

He told the group that the possible transfer of the students is a "problem of mutual concern. Our concerns are the same. In other words, we are on the same side, although we may have some differences in some views."

"Today our society demands a great deal from young men and women," said Mr. Stulze, and the only way they can get ahead is by selling the services or knowledge they have acquired.

Mr. Stulze pointed out that the small enrollment at Birchwood limits the number of classes that can be offered there. Supt. McConnell said there are 23 courses offered at Central which are not offered at Birchwood.

"We can't offer all the opportunities for learning in a small school like you can in a large school," said Mr. Stulze.

He also said it is more difficult for teachers in small

500 Attend Meet To Voice Views

Parents and students turned out in large numbers Monday night at Birchwood, both to protest and support the possible movement of the senior high students at the rural Hamilton County school there to Central High School at Harrison next year.

An estimated 500 came to hear the presentation made by the Hamilton County Board of Education and Supt. Sam McConnell with most of them opposing the proposed move.

However, there were some who agreed with the school board that a move to Central would be better.

Students showed their disapproval of the possible move with signs decorating the gymnasium such as "We shall not be moved," "Please don't move us," and "We love our school."

DEPRISE, HALL THERE

board had made up its mind "we would not be here tonight."

"BEST EDUCATION"

"What the people in this community have to say will be considered. We will try to give the children of this community the best education we can give them."

He also said it is more difficult for teachers in small schools because they have to prepare for many different levels of courses and different subjects.

TEACHER TURNOVER

The teacher turnover at Birchwood was said to be higher than at most other schools in the county.

"Times are changing and you must change with them or they'll leave you behind," said Mr. Stulce.

He said that the department has plotted the pick-up locations of those students needing transportation and that the 40-minute figure was only an estimated average.

One man said there was one thing "we'd like our students to get an example of tonight and that's democracy — the will of the community and not you tell us what we're going to do."

Mr. Stulce replied that if the

children of this community can be better educated we can," he continued.

One woman estimated that integration might be the "real reason" for the transfer, but was informed by Mr. Stulce that the motive for moving had nothing to do with integration.

Rep. DeFriesse asked about other possibilities and was told that there are no plans for expanding the curriculum or facilities at Birchwood if the move is not made.

"I went four years in college and it was rough," said another. "I had to fight for what I got."

Mr. Stulce was asked if a high school would be placed back at Birchwood if the community grows.

"Certainly, if the need arises and the population increases," replied Mr. Stulce.

STUDENTS OPPOSED

Several students spoke up during the meeting, none of them for the move.

Many felt they wouldn't "be happy" at Central while others talked of class superstitives.

One young man said, "If you take this high school away from us, our community is not going to grow."

David Roark, president of the PTO, presented petitions bearing 625 names asking that the three grades not be moved.

Mr. Stulce told the group that the board would try to have a "prompt" decision. The board meets Thursday night in its regular meeting.

Charged With the Chore of Choosing Chattanooga's EIL Ambassador

International understanding is a two-way street—nobody knows that better than the Experiment in International Living. And nobody on the Chattanooga EIL board knows it better than Mrs. Thomas A. Erwin Jr. She's had young experimenters coming and going.

Right now she's got them going — she is chairman of the EIL's Outbound Ambassador Program in Chattanooga. This is the program on which, every year, the Chattanooga EIL board gives \$1,500 to send some young Chattanooga to stay with a family and travel in a foreign country for several weeks. This year, it's Mrs. Dixie Erwin's job to get that ambassador. And it's not a matter of just tapping somebody and saying "You're in."

"The program is open to professionals and students between the ages of 18 and 30," she explained. "They must be in good health, and they must agree that when they return to Chattanooga they'll share the experiences they've had."

With Mrs. Robert Egan as chairman, she has, this year, got the word around town through press, radio and TV, contacted the high schools, even individuals. "We always want to get as many

people as possible interested."

She also selected a screening committee of local citizens.

Twelve young people applied this year. They were then screened by the local committee, which sent three names to EIL headquarters in Putney, Vt., where the final choice was made. Miss Fran Bender was named ambassador this year.

"The local council also gives local high school the opportunity to send representatives from their respective schools," she said. "The council works with the faculty member appointed by the principal, to get information to the students in each school. Once interested students have returned their applications, Experimenters are chosen by a committee of interested parents and citizens of the community where the school is located."

A couple of years ago she was chairman of incoming groups — the EIL tries to have three groups of young people coming from abroad to Chattanooga every year. This job means appointing people to round up families with whom these young foreigners could stay, participating in the numerous activities arranged for the visitors and keeping her own home ready to substitute for any family

that had to drop out. Host families, she said, are as carefully picked as Experimenters are, because it is a family affair.

Between her incoming and outgoing, Dixie Erwin spent a year in charge of special engagements for returned ambassadors and experimenters. And there she added, to her list of new friends, Americans in the persons of program chairmen and presidents of the city's civic clubs.

It all started for Dixie Erwin four years ago. "Not having had the opportunity to travel, we wanted to bring foreign countries into our home." So she and Mr. Erwin got in touch with the EIL, started with an Experimenters from Mexico. Since then she's been on the EIL board here every year, has made friends from Switzerland, England, France, Chile, Brazil and Japan.

She's proud of Chattanooga's interest in the EIL and the EIL's interest in Chattanooga. "Our city is headquarters for the national organization's southeast region. And she calls attention to the outstanding contributions made in this happy state of affairs by two Chattanooga's — Mrs. Jay Johnson, the first regional director, and

Mrs. James Buchanan, the 14 "Scouts and down" to present regional director. Chattanooga, she feels, has "a lot of 'ones" and, by the same received good will by opening to a "good good will to those

families and countries who open their hearts and doors after that they were always afraid to see me coming."

To Dixie Erwin, the EIL is a rewarding experience and one that fits in with the citizen's obligation to contribute to the community and help it grow.

She's done this in some other ways, too. She's now director of the primary children's division at Brainerd Baptist Church and a member of the Women's Missionary Society there. For a total of eight years she was a Red Cross Gray Lady at Memorial Hospital. And because of Thomas A. Erwin III, now a senior at Furman University, she's done her share of PTA work and end membership, not to mention carpooling.

Born in Chattanooga, she is one of the nine children of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Walker.

"My father was a Southern Railway executive, so I've always had said in my school. When I was six we moved to Rome, Ga. I went to elementary school in Georgia, Kentucky and Florida. Then we came back to Chattanooga and I had my last two years of high school at Central."

She went on to the University of Chattanooga for two years, then joined Alpha Delta Pi. "Then I went to New Jersey to visit my

brother and his wife for two weeks. And stayed two years. After that they were always afraid to see me coming."

In New Jersey she worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad and attended the State Teachers College for Women.

"One day I had a long-distance call from Chattanooga at the office. I thought somebody was dead. But it was my sister, who was a friend of Mayor Bass' secretary. The Mayor wanted me to give Lanny Ross, a famous singer then, a certificate of honorary citizenship in Chattanooga because he had made the city so famous through his singing of 'Chattanooga Choo Choo.' My sister came to New York for the event, we went to the studio and I made the presentation on the network show. My sister sat off-stage and ate raisins."

When her brother was transferred to Philadelphia, she got a transfer, too. "We lived in Narbeth. One day I went to meet a friend at the 26th Street Station. The friend came up one escalator and Tommy Erwin — with whom I'd had one date in Chattanooga — came up the other. That's where it all started. He'd gotten his law degree and come to work for the FBI in Philadelphia. We began

dating. When he was transferred to Allentown, we romanced on the "Paoli Local."

In 1943 they were married. She did Girl Scout and Red Cross work in Allentown for a year. Then they were moved to Atlanta, lived every minute of their eight months there.

When Mr. Erwin was transferred to Columbus, Ga., she worked in the First Baptist Church, affiliated with the Alpha Delta Pi alumnae group, which was a live throughout the state, and became its state chairman. She worked in a garden club and in the Junior Woman's Club, too.

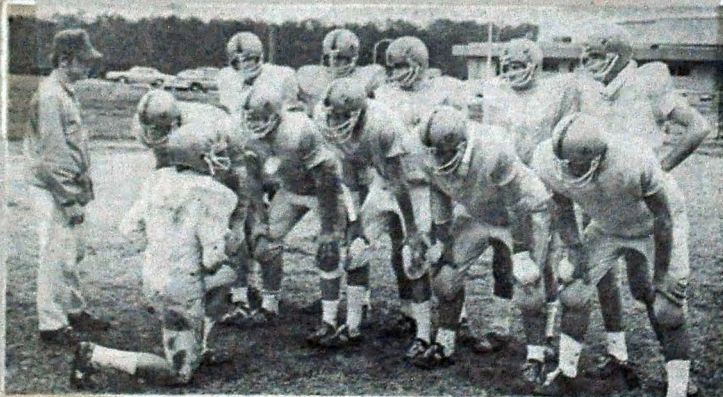

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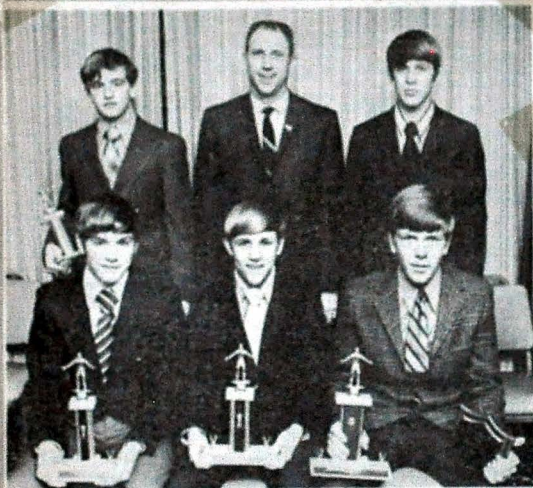

Farr Selected For Committee

John Farr, Central High wrestling coach, president of the Tennessee Wrestling Coaches Association and state chairman of the Tennessee Wrestling Federation, is one of several outstanding wrestling coaches from throughout the United States who have been selected by the National Federation of state high school associations to comprise an advisory committee to meet with high school members on the NCAA wrestling committee.

The group was to hold its annual meeting today at Auburn to coincide with the NCAA wrestling national championship meet.

Through the advisory committee, the rules knowledge of active wrestling coaches may be utilized to the benefit of the high school participants in the sport, according to the national federation.

High school members on the NCAA wrestling rules committee are responsible for adapting the intercollegiate rules to serve the needs of high school wrestlers.

A survey indicates wrestling is the fastest growing sport in the intercollegiate athletic program. There are presently 7,567 schools sponsoring competitive wrestling programs which is an increase of 717 schools since 1960.

A comparable increase in the number of participants was also noted during the two-year interval. There are 58,338 more wrestlers this year for a total of 265,029 high school participants.

A number of items were to be discussed today at Auburn by the advisory committee and rules representatives. Included are the controversial "good grooming" rule which prohibits beards, mustaches and excessively long hair on wrestlers.

Other rules changes to be discussed included clarification of the out-of-bounds rules, possible inclusion of awarding points when a wrestler's shoulders are turned toward the mat and criteria upon which to judge abusive and unsportsmanlike conduct by both coaches and wrestlers.

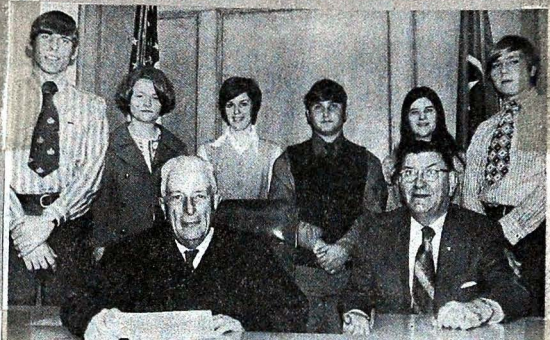

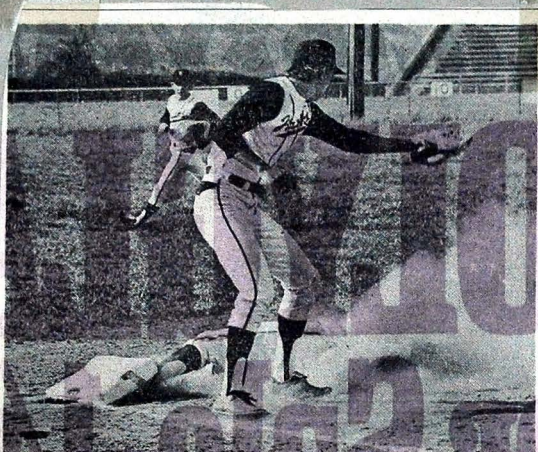

15 'Even' People Key for Central; Pounders Defeat Kirkman Foe 6-2

Don't look now, but Central could be approaching one of its finest baseball eras. At any rate, the Pounders appear to have the talent for a pleasing campaign. First-year coach Joe Dunn, who has perhaps logged as many hours as any major leaguers on various softball and baseball diamonds, wasn't a bit downcast over his material Tuesday after Central stopped Kirkman 6-2 at Kirkman Field.

Had Suffered Several Other Heart Attacks

Judge Leo Britt, 56, Hamilton County Juvenile Court Judge, died around 3 a.m. this morning in the emergency room at a local hospital.

He has had recurrent heart attacks.

Judge Britt was born in Enfield, N.C., in 1914 and came to Chattanooga at age two. He was a 1931 graduate of Central High School. He worked his way through the University of Chattanooga, receiving a bachelor of science degree in 1938.

He served as an Army artillery officer during World War II and following the war he obtained his LL.B. degree from McKenzie College of Law. Judge Britt joined the Juve-

nile Court as probation officer in 1947 and became chief probation officer in 1952.

Judge Britt became special judge on Feb. 15, 1965, following Judge Burrell W. Barker's resignation from the post due to illness. Judge Britt began his eight-year term of office at this capacity on Sept. 1, 1966.

His wife, Louise, died in 1963 and his son, Paul, died in 1967. Both were fatally injured in automobile accidents. Judge Britt then married the former Grace Allen.

He was honored in 1967 by the Chattanooga Optimist Club as its "Man of the Year" for his contributions to combating juvenile delinquency.

Judge Britt taught at Saddy-Daisy and Central High Schools after World War II and before joining the juvenile court staff in 1947.

He was a Sunday school teacher at Wesley Memorial Methodist Church, a member of the board of trustees of Bonny Oaks School, the American and Chattanooga Bar Associations, the Community Action Board and is a past president of the Tennessee Probation and Parole Association, the Tennessee Conference of Social Welfare and vice president of the Optimist Club of Chattanooga.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Grace Britt; a son, Ben Kilgrew; mother, Mrs. Josie G. Britt, both of Chattanooga; a sister, Mrs. Katherine Morrison of Cincinnati, Ohio, and a niece, Mrs. Linda Cooper.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Monday in the West Chapel of Chattanooga Funeral Home. Burial will be in the National Cemetery.

The body is at the funeral home.

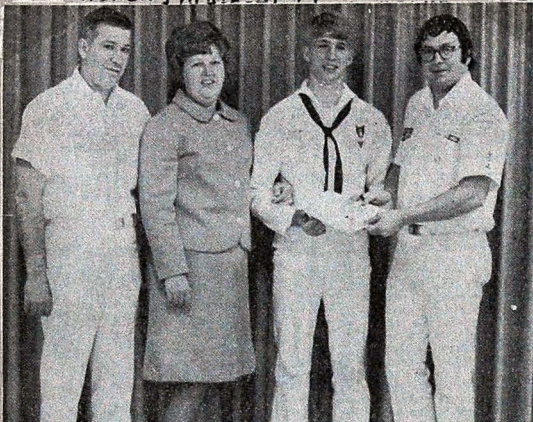

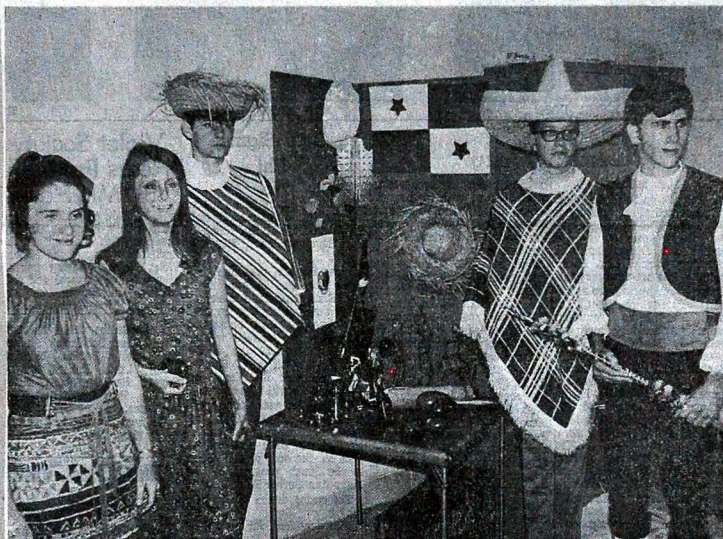

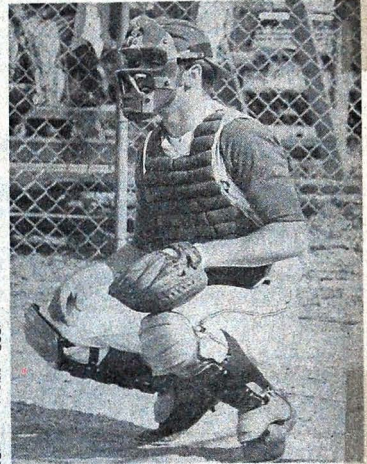

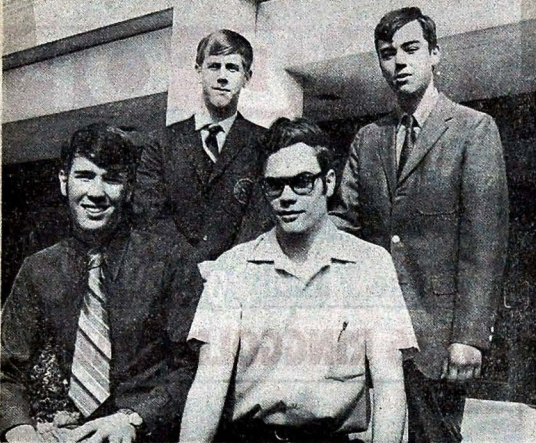

Just like a long-playing record, Tyner's powerful Rams butted challenger Hixson head-to-head, won seven events and captured the initial Hamilton County League track title with a rather surprising 80-55-29 victory over the Wildcats and Central.

It was Tyner's sixth consecutive track championship. The Rams took the last five Hamilton Interscholastic League A Division titles in which they competed. For Tyner coach Jerry Cotter, it was his third straight title.

In the other triangular meet Tuesday night at Tyner before a good crowd on a warm summer night, East Ridge won over Red Bank and Soddy Daisy, 72-47-42.

The Rams' Doug Sizemore started the title drive off by taking the 120 high hurdles in a good time of 15.8. After that, Tyner took the 2-mile relay, the 880 relay, Steve Gilbert won the 440 dash (53.7), Jimmy Beavers captured the 180 yds (21.3), Jimmy Gardner finished strong to grab the 880 (2:05.0) and the mile relay (3:39.6).

Finishing the final event, Tyner's Billy Goodroe, anchorman on the mile relay, tossed the baton in the air symbolizing his club's victory.

Hixson won only one running event, the mile with Clayton Strange winning in 4:51.4. Central's Steve Arnold took the 100 (10.1) and the 220 (22.1).

East Ridge's outstanding mile relay squad (Tom Houston, Rusty Russell, Tom Rhyne and Dennis Holland) whizzed home in 3:24.5 for the best time of the season locally.

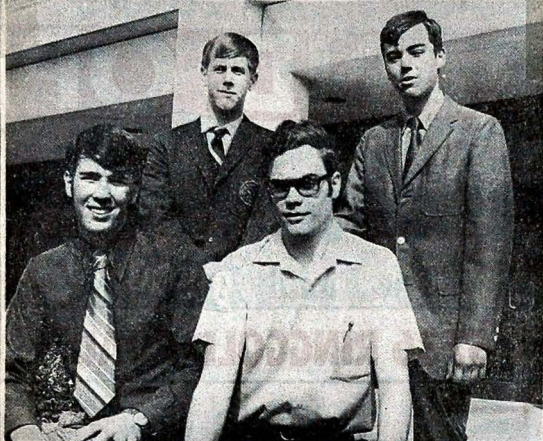

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Civitan Essay Contest Winners Speak

The Civitan Club's high school essay contest winners, led by Anne Norman in first place, agreed that citizenship is both a privilege and a responsibility, reading their essays to the club's meeting Friday at the Hotel Patten.

Miss Norman, a student at Hixson High School, called citizenship a "balance factor" in "the great pendulum of American life."

"Without this balance," she wrote, "the pendulum of the American way of life could swing to the extreme left, the complete freedom of anarchy, or the extreme right, the excessive control and duty of a dictatorship."

She concluded that "with the balancing factors of citizenship in existence and

operation, the pendulum of the American way of life cannot seriously deviate from the path of democracy."

The other winners were Miss Jama White, Hixson; Miss Carol Ketcham, Briarwood, and Rick Duncan, Central.

Miss White wrote that the privileges of stability, democracy, freedom and the highest standard of living in the world carry with them the responsibility "not only to insure the presence of this heritage in today's world, but also to insure its growth in tomorrow's world."

She said "a citizen must respect elected officials and obey established laws, even if he does not agree with them, because they are the

majority's choice." Comparing George Washington to Macbeth, Miss Ketcham asserted that the prime responsibility of every citizen is to place his country before his own ambitions.

She predicted a counter-reaction to irresponsible protestors in "young people with a definite idea of what they want and a less destructive way of getting it (who) are rising quietly against the reactionaries."

Duncan said the most "prevalent" responsibility of America's youth is to maintain America's reputation.

"America has long been noted by all the people of the world for her freedom and opportunity," he wrote. "It is up to the youth of today to continue this tradition."

Pounders Glancing At Girls

Central High School, one of the foremost names among prep athletic programs in Chattanooga, is going to take a glance at girls basketball, according to principal Hobart Millsaps.

For years, Central has been without girls basketball and with the success of Brown Junior High, the school feels it worthy to find out if girls basketball could be resumed. "We have met," said Millsaps, "as a group of interested members of the faculty, including coaches. The decision is mine and I will take the responsibility."

But don't look for Central on the varsity level, not until next year at least.

"We're not going to jump right into the varsity level," the Central principal added. "Instead, we want to get a group of girls together, play a B team schedule and see what the interest is."

Whether girls basketball can be resumed on a varsity level depends greatly on next year's scaled down program.

"There's nothing more successful than success," Millsaps continued. "And frankly, we have been disappointed here a little. We lost money in basketball and football and I feel Central is not financially able to start a new athletic endeavor at this time. If the potential develops with the girls, we'll try for varsity basketball in 1972-73. If it doesn't, we'll drop it like a hot potato."

But Millsaps appears more worried with the program as is than the girls' basketball. Financial woes have caused much concern with the veteran administrator.

"We haven't had normal attendance at boys' basketball games," Millsaps related. "We will give the girls basketball a chance on a limited basis and see how it fares. But the first thing we have to do is pay our bills. There's no need to have a Cadillac when you don't have money to buy gas for it."

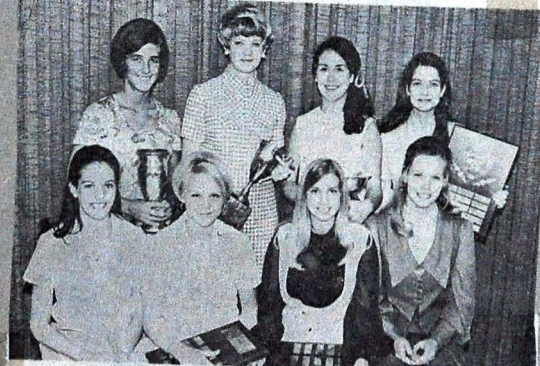

Hixson High Principal Jim Milburn Rings Final Bell on 40-Year Career

For almost 40 years, Hixson High School principal James Milburn has managed to rule with an "iron hand," but the absence of his discipline-evoking wooden paddle has remained conspicuously evident. And it's a very good bet that he will need not resort to his "board of education" in the near future either. The educator of four decades will be retiring in June.

"I've always tried my hardest to get kids to do the very best they possibly can, then to do what is right simply because it's right," Mr. Milburn said, "not because of any external pressure and I'm thinking of that board."

"Paddling is still done," he stated, "but, in my opinion, it's the very poorest type of punishment and should be used only as the very last resort."

However, Hixson's head men pointed out, there are exceptions.

Sometimes, a football player will break one of the school's rules, but if he stays after classes on detentions, the coach won't let him practice," Mr. Milburn remarked. "So, naturally, he begs me to administer a lick for each detention he has received. Then, he can go out and practice, without worrying about losing a place on the team."

"If this case should arise, I will paddle him," Mr. Milburn smiled. "But he has to beg me first."

Mr. Milburn, a resident of Lake Vista Drive in Murray Hills, has served at his present capacity for approximately seven years, following a 13-year tenure at an identical position with the Anna B. Lacey Elementary School.

"And even before that, I had taught at Central High School for 20 years," he related. "I was also a teacher at LaPort Junior High School in Indiana for one semester, prior to coming to Chattanooga."

Mr. Milburn was graduated from Indiana State University in Terre Haute ("French for 'ground high'"), Ind., where he received both his masters' and bachelors' degrees.

"I first became interested in this profession while attending a demonstration high school for teaching, where students, like myself, went to practice," Mr. Milburn recalled. "There, I would actually see the established, veteran teachers in action."

"In fact, I had one particular

teacher of whom I was extremely fond," he grinned, "and I made up my mind I would try to emulate her. Also, besides simply wanting to become a school teacher, I wanted to feel secure . . . and I always knew there would be kids to teach. Right then and there, I decided this field was for me."

"After 40 years," he said, "I feel I have been adequately rewarded, to say the least."

Mr. Milburn, the husband of a retiring East Ridge Elementary School second-grade teacher who is also vacating her post this June after 25 years in the profession, feels that, generally speaking, children "haven't changed a great deal" over the years.

"I believe that present-day kids are doing many of the same

things kids did in my days," he nodded. "It's just that there are more of them and they have more wheels under them now. Therefore, they can go some place much faster to get in trouble than they could if they walked."

"If kids had had cars back in my days," Mr. Milburn emphasized, "I guarantee you they would be doing the things kids do now."

"But hair, I guess you could say, has been on the increase," he laughed. "When I was a youngster, during the Depression period, kids wore their hair somewhat longer than had been the case in previous years and when I was in college, my peers used to comb their hair straight back . . . it may have been two inches thick on the back of their heads, but that was the style."

"However, certainly now this compares with the length of

hair today," Mr. Milburn concluded. "I'm sure of that."

The well-known highly regarded Hixson High principal says he acquires the greatest amount of satisfaction . . . from compliments.

"You get a real thrill when someone you've had the pleasure of teaching or been acquainted with in school comes up to you and says, 'You've meant a lot to me,'" Mr. Milburn beamed. "In fact, I've had a few say to me, 'You've meant more to me than any other teacher or principal I've ever known.'"

"Being told something that great just makes everything completely worthwhile," he remarked. "I don't mean to sound boastful, but that sort of thing just doesn't happen every day."

"And when you see someone you were associated with at Central High School, for instance, who maybe has gone to become a mayor . . . well, that's mighty thrilling, too."

"You know," he said, "if I had my life to live over again, there are very few changes I'd want to make . . . I guess I was just cut out to be a teacher."

According to Mr. Milburn, there has been a significant upsurge in high school attendance among teenagers . . . and the figures are rising.

"In fact, there are more teenagers attending high school now than ever before," he explained. "And there are two main factors responsible for this. First, the compulsory attendance law is being much more strictly enforced and, secondly, there are naturally more kids in the population today."

"Also, I definitely feel that

teachers are preparing themselves extremely well these days, but are generally more militant than they used to be," Mr. Milburn added. "However, here at Hixson we have both well-prepared and unselfishly-dedicated teachers — you must possess both attributes in order to be successful."

"I would like for my communities (Anna B. Lacey and Hixson) to know that if I have had any success at all," the grandfather of two praised, "I owe it to the wonderful facilities and the entire communities. It also takes a good janitor and a good cafeteria manager . . . without them you don't do well."

"Oh yeah," he smiled, "I almost forgot to tell you. I haven't been absent from school because of ill health since I began 40 years ago. I guess I'm just too mean to get sick."

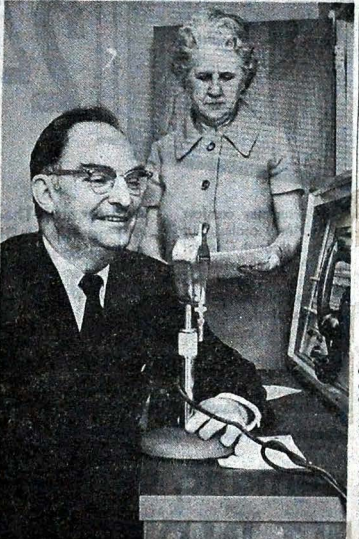
ing zone. The enemy again was engaged and destroyed by WO Few.

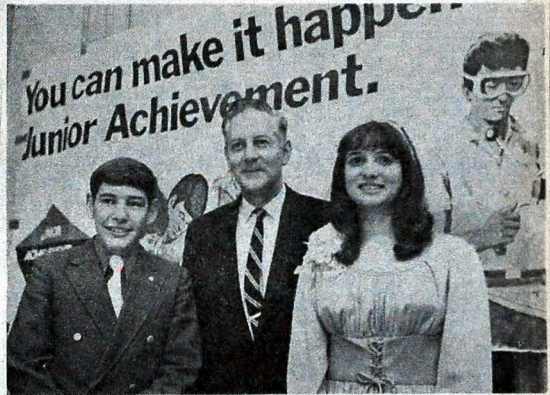

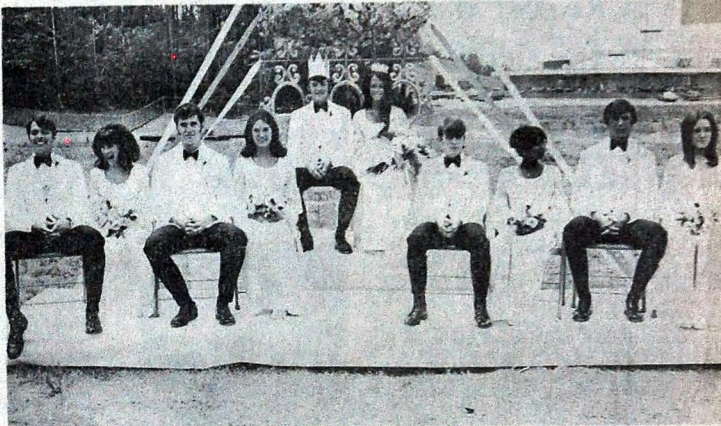

Unlike the sinking sun, no player held his head low after the battle.

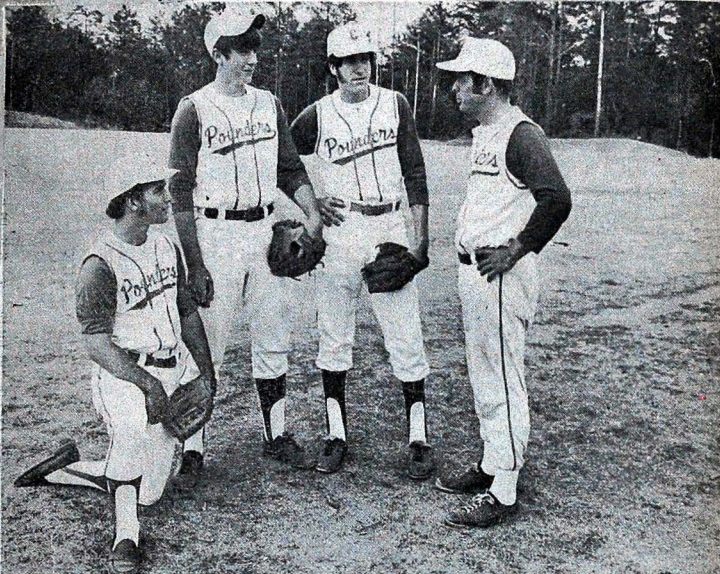
"Entirely one of our finest efforts," said veteran Hixson mentor J. D. Lewis, shaking his head in a sigh of relief. "I didn't think we could do it."

A student will be named to represent Central High at the 1971 Bellamy Flag award to a school in Texas. Danny Sharp was last year's Bellamy representative.

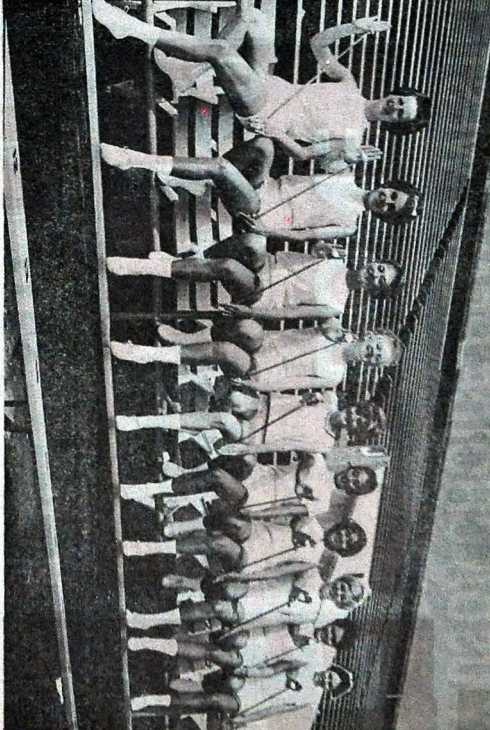

Second Annual USWF Clinic Slated for Baylor in August

The second annual United States Wrestling Federation Clinic, under the direction of Central High wrestling coach John Farr and Baylor wrestling coach Luke Worsham, will be held Aug. 9-13 at the Memorial Gymnasium on the Baylor campus.

"We are very pleased with our staff for this year," said Farr. "They consist of Shelby Wilson, wrestling coach at the University of Colorado; Bert Waterman, wrestling coach at Yale University; Bob Siddens, wrestling coach at West High School, Waterloo, Iowa; Jim Morgan, wrestling coach at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Worsham and Farr.

The cost of the clinic will be \$35 for the entire week. Application blanks may be picked up from any high school or junior high wrestling coach in the city and county or from either Farr or Worsham.

"The object of our clinic is to increase the standards of wrestling efficiency in our schools and colleges. There will be no matching of one pupil against another, for competitive purposes," said Farr.

"Practical work in fundamentals will be the main feature of this clinic. Aggressive offensive and defensive methods will be taught. Individual instruction will be given where possible," he said.

Subjects to be covered will include take downs, escapes, re-

versals, pinning combinations, control wrestling, leg wrestling, floating and control, counters, of the Helms Amateur Wrestling Hall of Fame, and was an assistant coach for the Japanese National Team in the 1963 World Games.

Waterman is a graduate of Michigan State and coached in high school for 16 years before moving to Yale. Twelve of his high school wrestlers went on

Wilson was an NCAA runner-up in 1938 and 1939, and a gold

to place in the NCAA event.

Siddens is probably the best-known high school coach in the nation. He has compiled a 251-242 record at West High. He coached Dan Gable and Dale Anderson when they were in high school. He, too, is a member of the Helms Hall of Fame. He coached 41 state champions and his team won the state championship 10 consecutive times. He officiated in 14 NCAA tournaments.

Worsham has won a number of Mid-South championships and captured the coveted LeHigh Prep Championship in 1970.

Farr won Tennessee state championships in 1963, '64 and '65, and has had 31 individual state champions.

Durby Resigns; Central's Dunn To Succeed Him

Ron Durby, former scholar-athlete at the University of Alabama and assistant football coach at UT-Chattanooga since 1967, is resigning to enter law school. Athletic Director Harold Wilkes announced Saturday.

He will be replaced by a former University of Chattanooga backfield star, Joe Lee Dunn, who relinquishes the head coaching job at Central High after one year. The shifts are effective July 1.

The staff realignment will force a change in coaching duties. Dunn will work with the defensive secondary and head UTC's recruiting, which will become increasingly important as the Moccasin move toward the new 50,000 stadium and 1970 target date. Tom Weathers will be in charge of the defensive line, and S. E. Sullins will work with the offensive line. The job Durby abandons, Joe Gori will continue to work with the offensive backs and Jim Worthington will be in charge of the quarterbacks and split receivers.

"Ron has done a real fine job for us since he's been here," Wilkes said, "and we are all sorry to see him leave. He is a fine young coach and an outstanding individual who will be successful in whatever he attempts. Certainly we wish him well."

"Joe Dunn is by no means a stranger to the program here. I feel he will be a definite asset to the program. We're very proud to have a young man of his caliber with us."

Dunn played several positions under A. C. (Scrappy) Moore. He holds the UTC single-season records for most punts returned. He spent most of his career at defensive safety and tailback.

Dunn, 24 and single, coached a year at Columbus High, where he played, before serving a year on the UTC staff as a graduate assistant. He succeeded E. B. (Red) Etter at Central last fall. In addition to football, he coached baseball and golf at Central.

Dunn said it wasn't easy leaving Central because "the people there have been so very good to me. The hardest part was telling the boys."

But, he said, "when you get an opportunity like this you

have to take advantage of it." Durby, a member of Alabama's 1964 national championship team as a lineman, was an Academic All-Southeastern Conference team selection his senior year. He plans to enroll in the UT-Knoxville law school for the summer term.

"I thought about law school while I was still in college," he said, "but I was married and just kind of fell into coaching. I've enjoyed it very much but I feel if I'm ever going to make a change, this is the time."

Durby said he had no plans beyond law school. "I'm taking it one step at a time," he said. "I may come back here. We really like Chattanooga."

Durby came to UTC in 1967 when Wilkes succeeded Scrappy Moore as head coach. He came here after two seasons on the Morehead State football staff. He was at Jasper, Ala., High before that. Durby is a Memphis native.

Three members of UTC's six-man coaching staff are former UTC players — Dunn (1967); Weathers (1962) and Wilkes (1959).

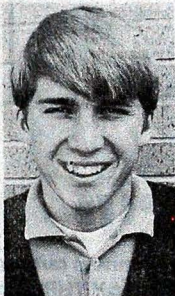
Among teams from outside of the City Prep League who will be participating are McMinn Central, McMinn County, Calhoun and Rhea Central.

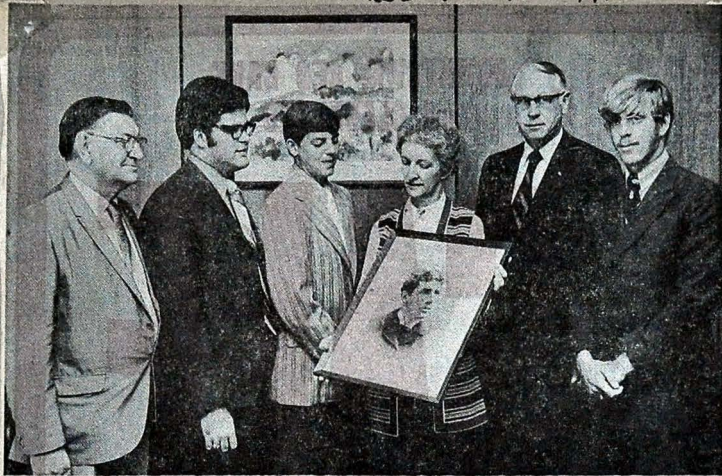

Two of the other three changes involved the Red Bank community. The Hamilton County Board of Education, in regular monthly session Thursday night, confirmed the transfer of Tommy Runyon from Red Bank High School to Central where he will succeed Joe Dunn as head football coach. The board also approved the hiring of former Tennessee football star Derrick Weatherford as coach and physical education teacher at Red Bank.

Ron Cole, who was assistant basketball coach at Central two years ago and has been on a leave of absence for further study at the University of Georgia, will return to Central to the same job he left.

Whether Millsaps will leave the teaching field has not been revealed, but it is known that he will not return as the Lions' baseball coach next year. Millsaps could not be reached for comment.

Millsaps, a basketball star at Soddy-Daisy and later an outstanding baseball performer at Carson-Newman, began his coaching career at Signal Mountain Junior High. After a highly successful five years as basketball coach at Soddy Daisy Junior High, he transferred to Red Bank High seven years ago.

He was head basketball coach at Red Bank for four years and three years ago became the school's head baseball coach. His baseball teams compiled a 33-15 record which included a second place finish in the district in 1969 and the third place this year.

Red Bank principal W. G. Eldridge would not comment on the plans of Millsaps, but did praise Runyon and Don Patterson, who earlier resigned to become athletic director and head football coach at Ringgold. "I think it is a tribute to our program," said Eldridge, "that these fine men who are leaving us have received a promotion in their field. They did a fine job for us."

Eldridge was equally high in his praise of Weatherford who will become Red Bank's head coach.

CENTRAL WHITES, BLACKS IN FIGHT; PATROL MOVED IN

Millsaps, Other Faculty
Members Intervene—
No One Injured

By MICHAEL LOFTIN

Six patrol cars from the sheriff's department were dispatched to Central High School Wednesday afternoon after Negro and white students engaged in a brief skirmish following a walkout.

The groups were separated by principal Hobart Millsaps and other members of the faculty and no injuries or property damage were reported. No one was arrested in the incident, which occurred just after the beginning of the sixth period.

Classes will be held today, Millsaps said.

It was the first disruption with racial overtones since 1969 when the school was moved from Dodds Avenue to its new building at Harrison.

Two In Fight

Supt. Sam McConnell said the trouble began during the lunch period at noon when a Negro and a white student exchanged words and engaged in a brief fight.

Both youths were disciplined but blacks gathered outside the school in the courtyard and asked to talk to Millsaps and a sister principal Stanley Farmer.

The two met with the blacks in the gymnasium, Millsaps said, both individually and collectively.

Some whites were outside the school when classes changed for the seventh period, the principal related, and about 12 Negro and white student engaged in a brief fight.

Asked for Police

McConnell said that when the lunchtime incident was reported to him, he requested Sheriff Ewalt to keep a patrol car in the area of the school but to keep it off the grounds.

"We could sense the tension after the second fight," Millsaps said, "and I requested that more patrol cars be sent to the school."

This request was relayed to McConnell, who passed it on to Ewalt.

Among those responding to the call were Ewalt, Chief Deputy Jack Russell and Harry White, a Negro civil process server for the department. White was instrumental in cooling the tempers of several black students, it was reported.

Patrol on Duty

Students with cars were dismissed and members of the sheriff's patrol stayed until other students had been placed on buses and sent home at 4 p.m.

Millsaps said he did not know if the incidents were related to the civil disorder which has plagued Chattanooga since Friday.

There were a lot of rumors, he said, such as reports that the National Guard was on the campus, that it was stationed near the school or that a male student had a pistol in his car. All were unfounded.

"There has just been a little bit of general unrest," he said. "It was spasmodic and tempera-

ing. A committee report is expected on Friday.

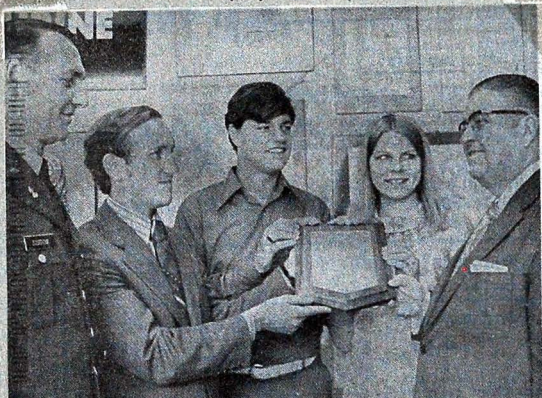
McConnell said most of the complaints by black students were that they had no one to

relate to, that no one could listen to their problems.

McConnell and Millsaps met late Wednesday afternoon to discuss plans to head off any further trouble this morning but the plans were not disclosed.

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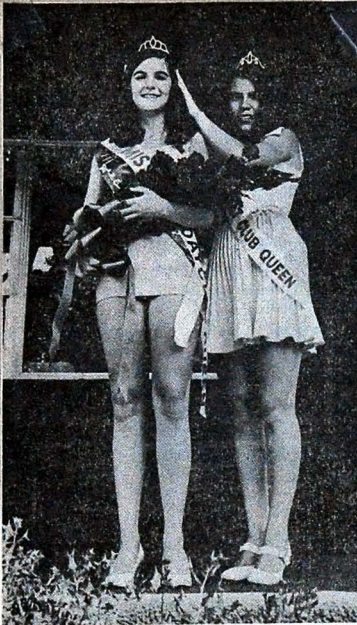

80 Students Suspended In Central Disturbance

All, Mostly Black, Taken to Juvenile Home, Charged With Truancy or Disorderly Conduct in Class Boycott

By MICHAEL LOFTIN

Approximately 80 students were suspended from Central for Wednesday. Cases are now High School Thursday morning docketed about two weeks in a second day of racial ahead.

The students, about three-fourths black, were transported to the Hamilton County Juvenile Home and charged with truancy or disorderly conduct. They later were released in the custody of their parents.

The suspensions followed two incidents near the close of school on Wednesday. In the first, a black and a white student engaged in a fight in the cafeteria. Later that day, about 20 students were involved in a brief skirmish and were separated by faculty members.

A spokesman for the juvenile court said Thursday afternoon parents were notified and picked up their children after "intake information" was received from each student.

All of the students will receive a hearing but none of the cases

The students may return to class on application to the superintendent of county schools.

The day began quietly at the high school, with a large crowd of white students congregated in the front parking lot and about 75 blacks in the cafeteria.

About 9 a.m., the whites moved into their home rooms but the blacks, shouting slogans, moved through the halls and outside, declaring they were leaving the school because no one would talk to them.

Outside, the blacks engaged in a brief conference and several decided to return to class because they feared they would not be able to graduate if they were suspended. One girl said she was not about to

"throw away 12 years of school for nothing."

The other blacks, after being told of their suspensions by Supt. Sam McConnell, moved back through the school and boarded a bus parked at the rear. The bus, designed to carry 66 passengers, was full.

Principal Hobart Millsaps delayed the beginning of the first period class until about 18 white youths returned to school and were suspended.

Nonstudent Seized

One white youth, Leo Nance, 18, was arrested under a recent state law when it was discovered he was not a student at Central. He later was released but received a stern reprimand from Sheriff Evatt and told not to return to the campus.

Evatt was one of about 15 officers, including an FBI agent, who converged on the scene in response to a call from Millsaps. A patrol car escorted each bus to juvenile court.

In a statement to the remaining students over the school's public-address system, Millsaps urged them to accept responsibility and go to their classes quietly, reminding them that only a few days remained in the school year.

McConnell told the students he regretted that "maximum action" had to be taken against the suspended students. He urged the students to be interested in their own welfare and "complete a good year."

Courtyard Fills

Millsaps then released the students to their first-period classes but almost immediately the courtyard in front of the school was filled with students, most of them discussing the students who had been bused away.

Many apparently were convinced the blacks had been allowed to go home and said so angrily.

Joe L. Dunn, a coach and mathematics teacher, jumped up on a wall and urged the students to settle down and go to class. He also attempted to explain the sequence of events that occurred during the home-room period.

Millsaps also attempted unsuccessfully to persuade the students to go to class and was met with loud groans when he referred to a student advisory committee on racial affairs. Another student also was shouted down by the students.

One incident particularly incensed the students.

When Nance was arrested, he was searched and placed in a county patrol car. A television cameraman, Tommy Eason, later persuaded Capt. John Holl of the sheriff's patrol to remove Nance from the car, refrisk him and place him in another patrol car while he (Eason) shot news film of the action.

When a student asked Millsaps about this, the question was greeted with loud cheers.

Eason told Evatt later that two students asked him to take it easy and that one, while walking away, mentioned

"blowing up the television station."

After a while, the bell rang for the second period and Millsaps told about 100 students in the commons area that "if you are going to second period, go now. Otherwise, I'll be forced to suspend you."

Minutes later, a mustachioed youth jumped up on a wall and told the students to go to their second-period class.

This statement was greeted with shouts of "no, no."

But the youth continued: "Go to your second-period class and then we'll walk out at third period. If we get the whole school out, there's no way they can suspend us all."

This prompted cheers from the group, which then dispersed.

However, the proposed mass walkout did not occur.

Three Chattanooga High School stars, two from Kirkman, were picked in baseball's free agent draft, which concluded yesterday.

Catcher Rick Duncan, of Central High, was selected in the 12th round by the San Francisco Giants for their Fresno club. Billy Joe Matthews, Kirkman's all-around star, was picked in the 13th round by the Oakland Athletics for their Coos Bay farm. Kirkman's Mike Thomas, an outfielder, was taken in the 33rd round by Bakersfield, a Los Angeles Dodger affiliate.

All three boys when told the news of being selected were thrilled. None have been contacted by the pros yet, but indicated they were interested in signing.

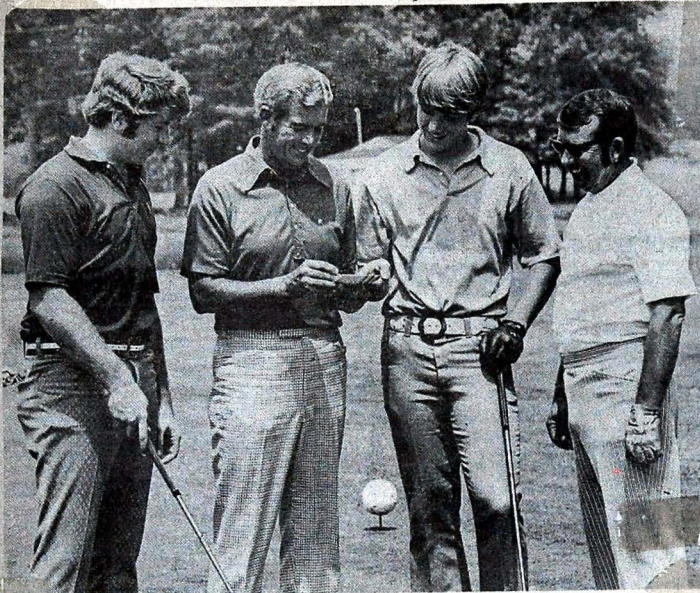

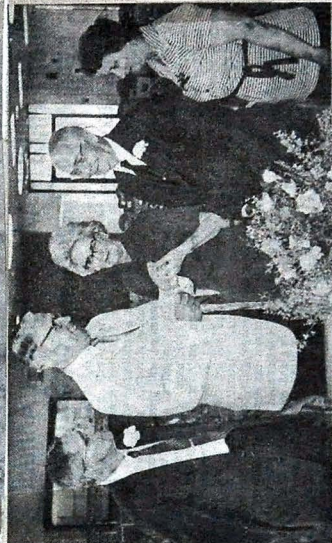

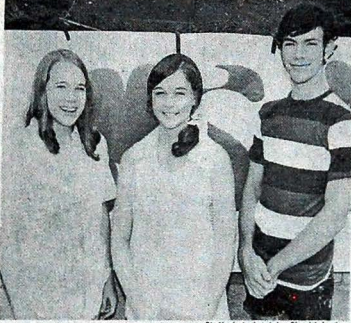

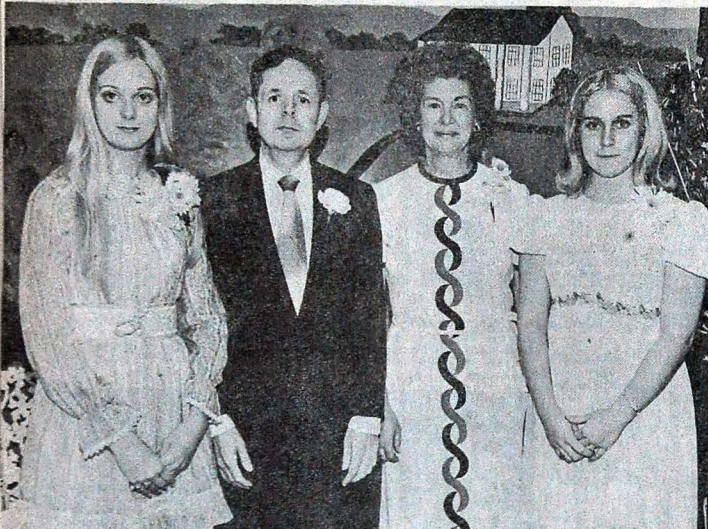

Applications to UTC Have Tripled

Jack Henderson directs what must be one of the few operations in Chattanooga that can say business has more than tripled in the past two years.

Director of admissions and records at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Henderson supervises a staff of 27 and oversees a budget (for both the admissions and records offices) of about \$210,000.

Last week Henderson explained some of the facts of life of college admissions both nationally and at UTC. How things changed since UC went public in 1969, who gets into college now, who is most likely to stay there and how the admissions operation works at UTC were part of the ground he covered.

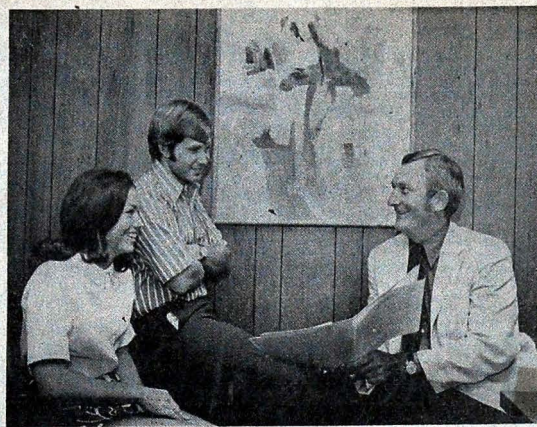
Since UC added a middle initial to its name two years ago, enrollment has shot up from about 2,500 to a projected total of 4,427 this fall, and the number of people applying to UTC has "a little more than tripled," Henderson reported.

Faculty size has more than doubled, said Henderson, and "we now have a bachelor of science in engineering and we are expanding and broadening our offerings in other departments."

All of this has somewhat changed the way the admissions office operates.

"The admissions office is in a sense the sales office of the university," said Henderson, noting that it is his department's job to explain the academic and social life the university has to offer.

Henderson tries to see to it that someone from his office visits every high school

in Tennessee each year, and though the effort may seem excessive, he feels it's worth it. Since UTC is the newest part of the UT system, Henderson believes the school should make an extra effort to make itself known to the people.

"We feel like we owe it to the taxpayers of Tennessee to inform them so they consider UTC when they make their choice," he explains.

Who is accepted into UTC and who stays there once admitted?

Henderson said experience

has shown that students should have an American College Test composite score of 17 (out of a possible 36) or a C average in high school to succeed at UTC.

The school normally admits only those applicants — about 90 per cent — who can meet these standards.

Henderson said that only about 45 per cent — close to the national average — of the students who begin at UTC last until graduation. Not all of these fall out, he explained. Many transfer or drop out of school only for a while.

UTC does not keep figures about the comparative success of men and women, Henderson said, but nationally the average man is somewhat more likely to have a better record in college than in high school and to finish college than is his female counterpart.

Where does UTC's student body come from?

About 80 per cent of UTC students are Tennesseans.

In the fall of 1969, the school took 75 per cent of the Hamilton County high school graduates and about 40 per

cent of city high school graduates.

The job of processing the approximately 4,000 applications the UTC admissions office receives every year is a big one for a staff of 27, but much of the paper work is done by the university's central computer.

Henderson said the machine does not make the decision about whom to accept or reject, but it does do a great deal else.

As information about a student comes in — his initial application, test scores and high school transcript — the machine stores them away and notifies admissions personnel when the applicant's record is complete.

Then admissions counselor takes over. The counselor checks the completed file to see if the student meets UTC admission requirements and to decide if the ones who are accepted should be classed as a Tennessee or out-of-state student.

But the machine has the last word. Every letter of acceptance sent is written by the computer.

The Chattanooga News called the class, "the largest in the history of Central" and stated that "it was the finest of its kind in the history of being the finest that have ever been held by the school."

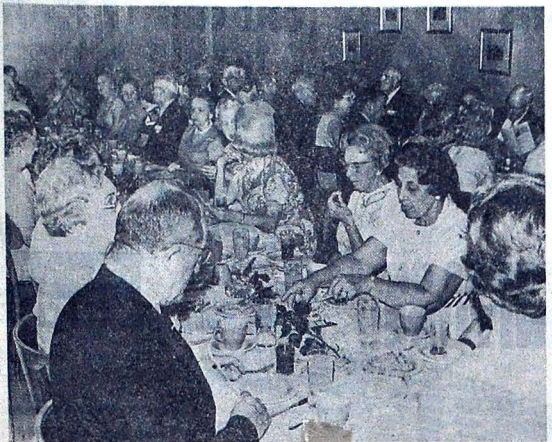

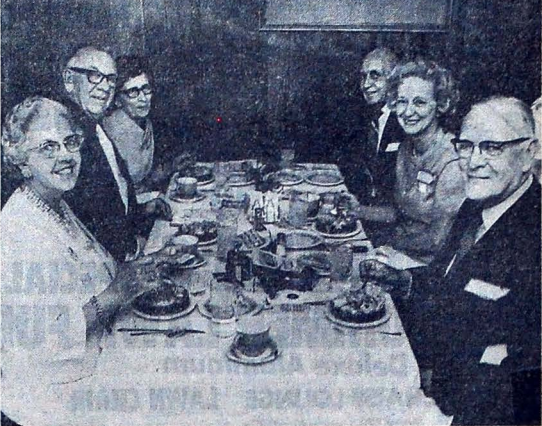

UTC Tops His Varied Interests

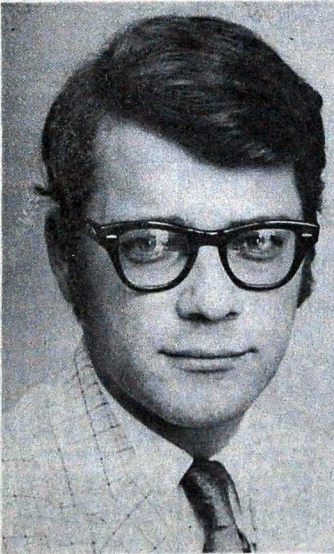

UTC Tops His Varied Interests

His academic record tends to support this conclusion. An alumnus of UTC, David recently received his master's degree in political science from the University of North Carolina. He is thinking of starting work there on a Ph.D. degree. Meanwhile, in addition to his other duties at UTC, he is teaching a political science course as an instructor.

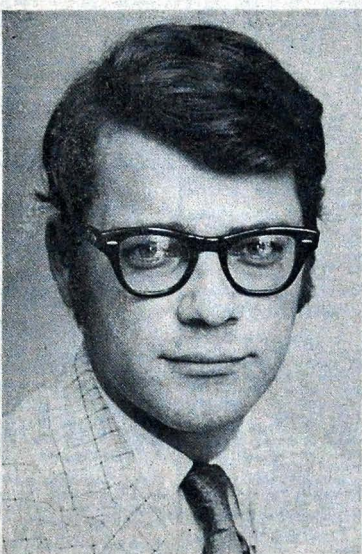
The thought of active participation in politics intrigues David, particularly at the urban level. He wrote his master's thesis on the two Chattanooga-Hamilton County campaigns for metropolitan government. But the intellectual challenge of a university campus may prove to be more appealing with his desire to teach.

Working his way through school exposed David to a variety of jobs — and he found them all interesting. He has worked as a shoe salesman, car salesman, furniture salesman, employe of an investment banking company, college teacher and newspaper reporter before returning to UTC. He also supplemented his income during most of these jobs as a professional musician. He had his own dance band combo for several years and booked his own dates. He led his group with his trumpet, often pointed at the heavens and pouring out melody like the Angel Gabriel. Thousands of Chattanoogaans have danced to his music and his success strongly tempted him for a time to a career in that field.

But no matter what he did or how interesting he found it, some force always pulled him back to the university. He enrolled as a freshman when it was still the University of Chattanooga. He was married on the campus in Patten Chapel by President LeRoy Martin; he left after three years to support his family; returned later to get his degree, and taught freshman English in the UC Evening College before finally returning in 1968 as administrative assistant to the president.

"One of the problems of college education today," David believes, "is that too many people think of it as vocational training, the guarantee of a job. Actually, a college degree is no longer a job guarantee, nor should it be. Countless men have proved in this country that business success is not dependent upon a college degree; and countless holders of colleges diplomas have revealed that they are not necessarily a mark of education. We tend too much to specialize; we turn out experts in limited fields who can easily become lost in the exchange of cultural ideas."

He notes that in Europe for centuries men have been educated for vocations at the high school level, but at the universities, where they may

specialize later in some field of science, they are first challenged by comprehensive, wide-ranging studies.

When asked if, in his job as director of public relations, he considers himself an image-maker for UTC, David acknowledges the phrase is descriptive but it obviously makes him uncomfortable. "Image-maker" seems to invoke certain Madison Avenue connotations implying something less than the truth.

"I prefer to think of myself as a representative residence," David asserts. "My job, as I see it, is to provide information as accurately, as comprehensible and as widely circulated as possible. UTC is a public institution and we're accountable to the public."

"I think we present our best image by making available true and complete information about the university, what it is doing and what it plans to do. We also should introduce some sense of perspective in the relation of the university with the community. For instance, riots on a New Mexico campus don't mean that the UTC campus is being burned."

David had to get his own perspective in focus when he returned from Chapel Hill (home of the University of North Carolina).

"When I was a student at Central High School we had more students than the university. When I got back from Chapel Hill I found that both the student body and the faculty had doubled. Last semester we had an enrollment of a little over 4,400; this fall we'll have between 4,800 and 5,000 full- and part-time students."

"The physical look of the campus is changing rapidly. We have a new science building in use, money has been appropriated for a new \$5-million library and for a \$3-million classroom structure, and we hope soon to

get approval for a \$2-million dormitory complex and a 30,000-seat athletic stadium. And it should be borne in mind that the university has a current payroll now of nearly \$5 million.

"Above all, we must remember that we have students at UTC who wouldn't be in college at all if it weren't here. Already we have some 400 Vietnam veterans and some 400 black students. From now on we'll have a real educational opportunity in Chattanooga for all."

A native Chattanooga, David was born May 18, 1941, oldest of the three children of Rufus Bogart and Marian Elizabeth Orwein Parker. His brother Kenny is now a professional musician in Nashville and his sister, Patricia Ann, 14, is a student at East Ridge High School.

His father is an engineer with the Louisville & Nashville Railroad. When David was a youngster he took him for a brief ride on a switch engine and David will never forget the power of the diesel locomotive.

As a boy David and his family lived on Mulberry Street in Highland Park "when there was still a sense of community life." His maternal grandparents lived a block away and an aunt and uncle lived only two blocks distant. His cousin, Bill Orwein, about the same age, was like a brother. Although the Parkers moved to East Ridge when David was 11, he went to Central High along with most of his neighbors.

At Central David began to show the first signs of political acumen. He was elected class president three straight years. He was elected to the National Honor Society, captain of the band, a delegate to Boys' State; he won honorable mention as an honors student in the National Merit Scholarship program

and was named Central's torchbearer at graduation exercises. He was Key Club president and was elected Key Club treasurer for the Kentucky-Tennessee district.

A short time later he happened to see her get off a bus and he drove her home. She invited him in for lunch. They were married Nov. 3, 1962. 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At one time he held four different jobs. David played baseball and football for a couple of years at Central, but pulled a ligament during a football game. It pretty well finished him with team sports. But he married into a tennis family.

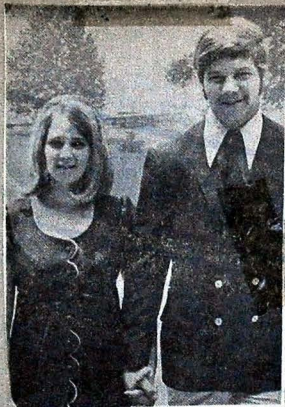

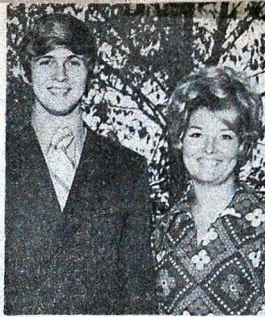
