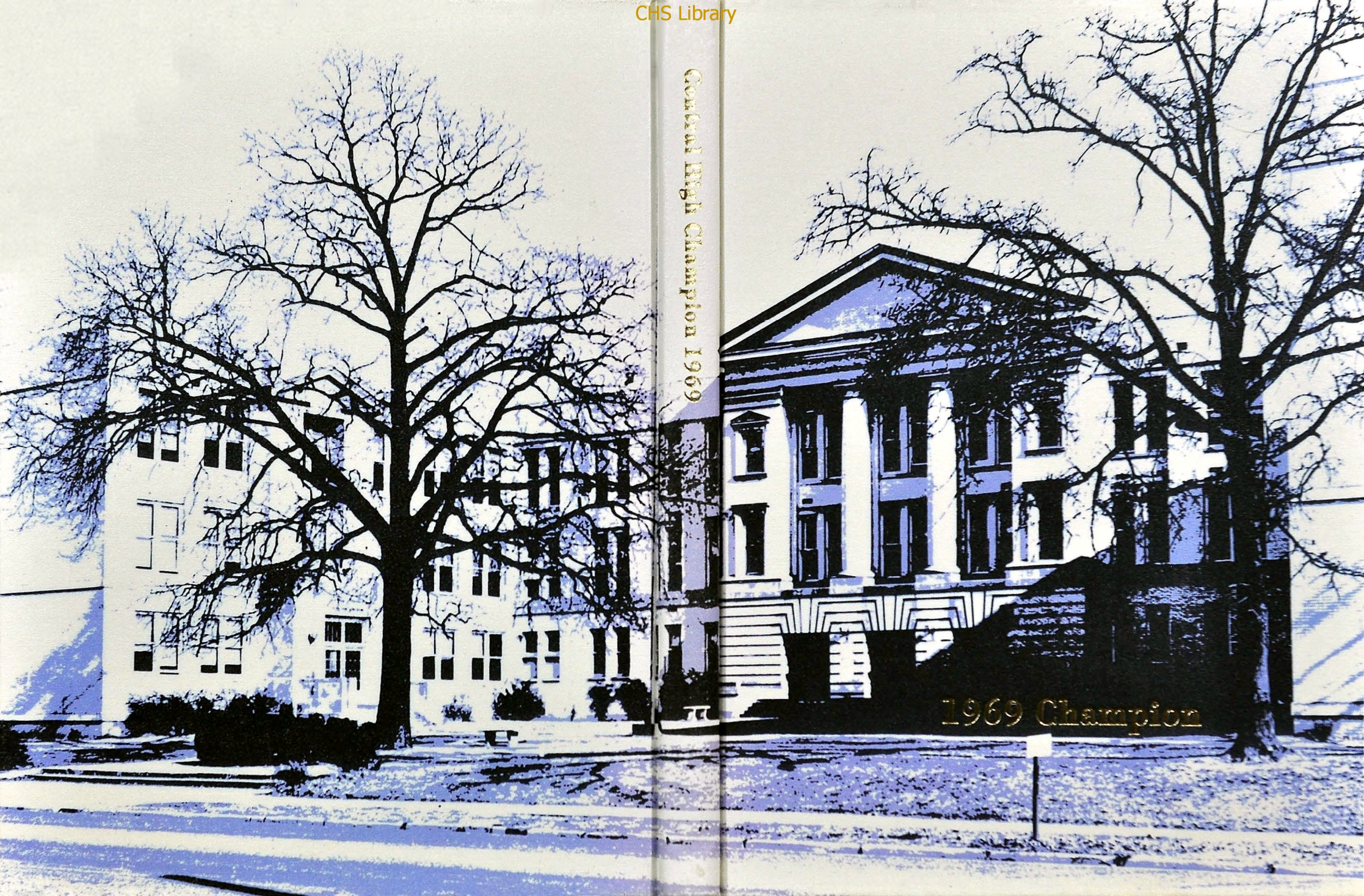

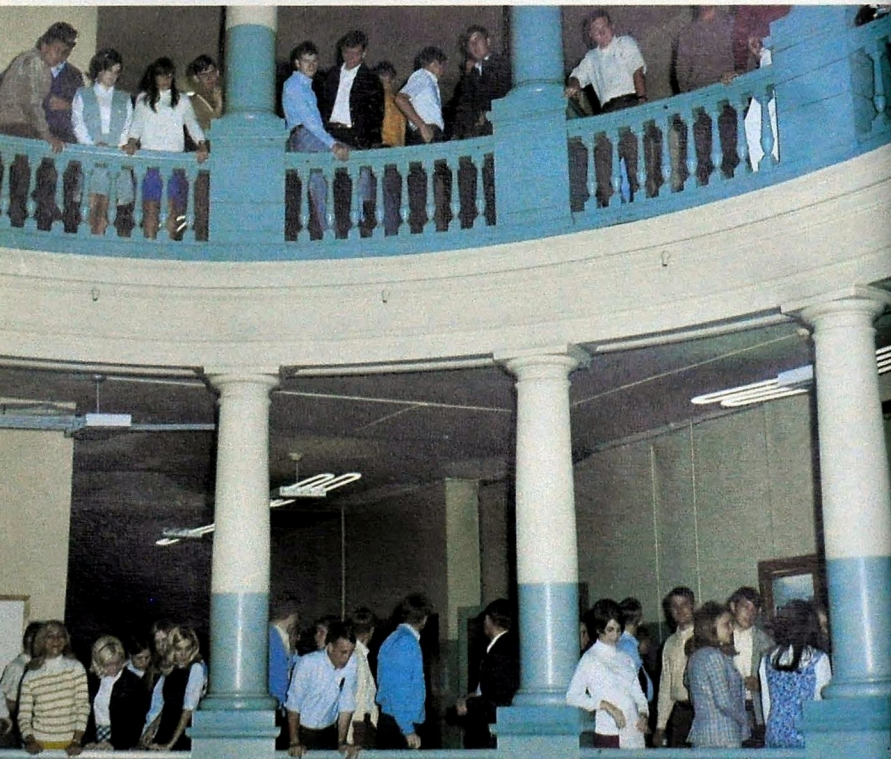

Where Dreams Were Molded and Spirits Matured

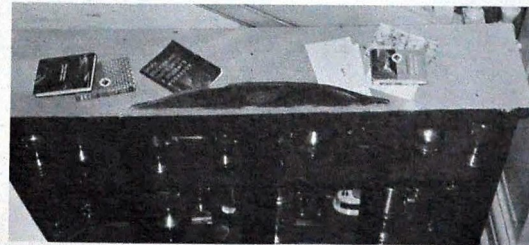
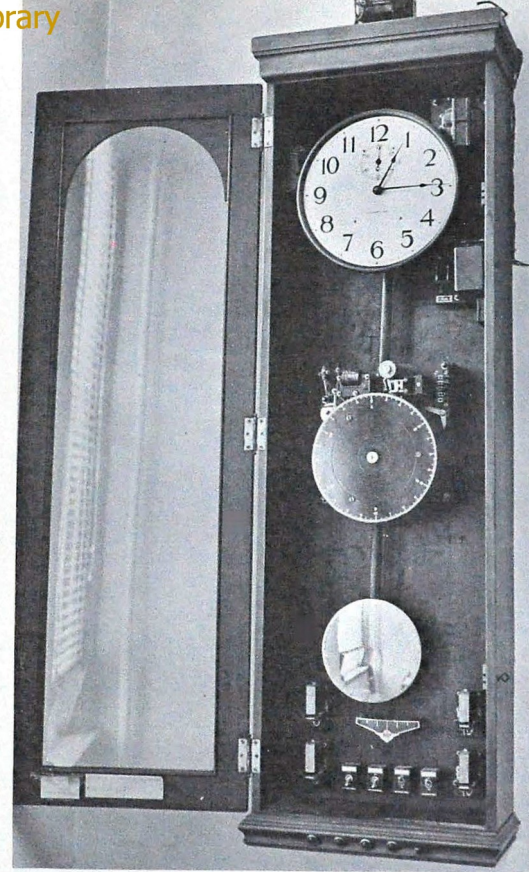

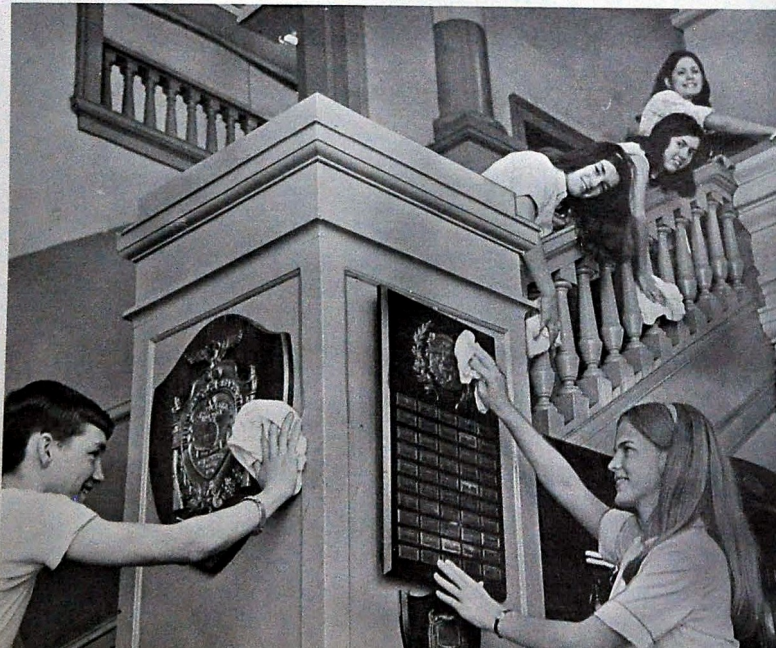


Tradition Is Recognition of the Past

Without these various kinds of competition the best cannot be brought forth; and the true winner cannot be proclaimed. Competition is the medium, the road, and the glimpse of success.





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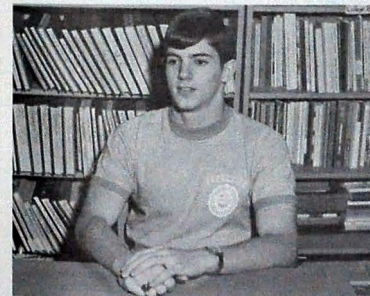

The Class of 1969 Chooses Fifty-Eighth Dedicatory

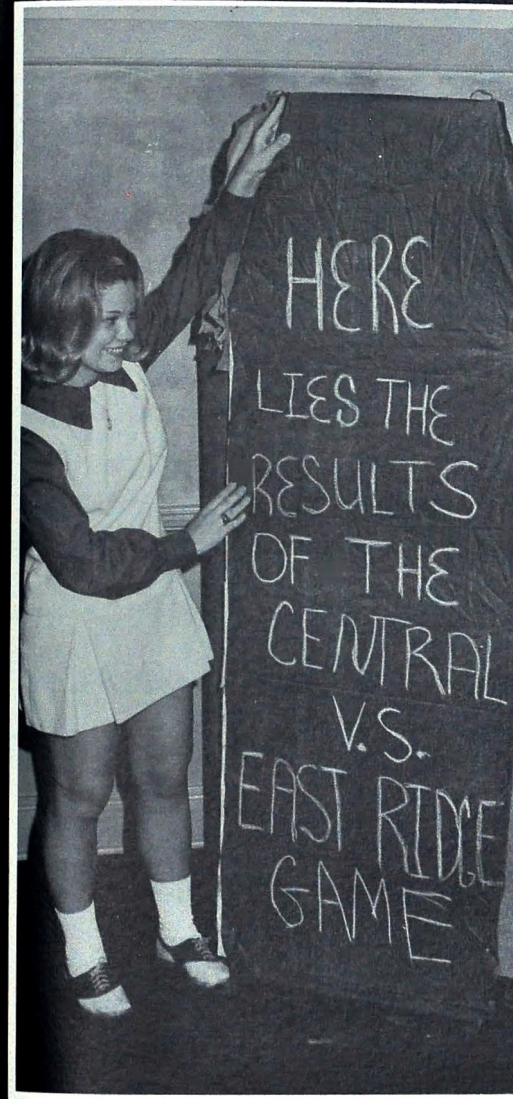
The heritage of Central High is rich in Mrs. Flora Ware's ancestry. Beginning with her father, W. Sherman Beck, who served on the Board of Directors in 1907, she became familiar at an early age with Central High School. In the first year of Central's existence, Mrs. Ware's sister, Anna L. Beck, and brother, William C. Beck, entered the ninth grade. Graduating from Central in 1926, Mrs. Ware attended Duke University, the University of Tennessee, and Martha Washington College. In 1931 she received her Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Chattanooga. Returning to Central in the fall of 1931, she began her teaching in mathematics. Among her numerous activities at Central, Mrs. Ware is sponsor of the National Honor Society and compilation chairman for the tenth grade. Not only does she serve Central daily as a faculty member, but she is also active in the Alumni Association, of which she is secretary-treasurer. For her many years of dedicated service, the class of 1969 has chosen to honor Mrs. Flora Ware.

In 1963-64 Central became the proud recipient of the National Bellamy Award. This award, created by Miss Margarette S. Miller of Portsmouth, Virginia, is to acclaim Francis Bellamy as the author of the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America. The bestowing of this honor upon Central was due to these ten qualifications: principal's proficiency, alumni participation, ROTC and Girl's Battalion, Bible classes, faculty, public relations, administration's attitude, and the Honor Code. This year, 1968-69, Hibbings High School, in Hibbings, Minnesota, was the recipient. David Ashley, accompanied by Mr. Millsaps and Superintendent Sam McConnell, represented Central at the presentation of this year's Bellamy Award. Central High School joins with other schools in congratulating Hibbings High School for its distinction as a National Bellamy Award winner.

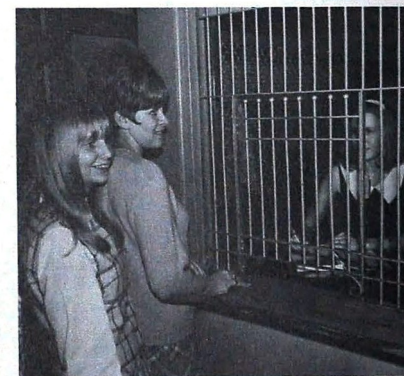
New Students

After Summer Fun Adjustment Becomes A Difficult Task

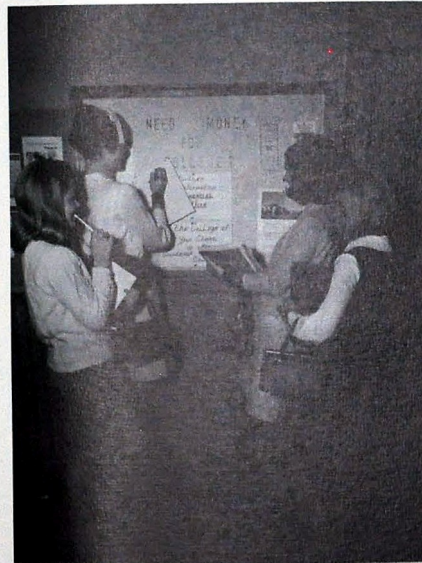
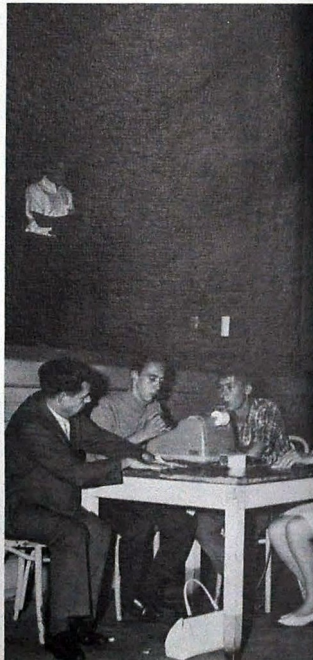
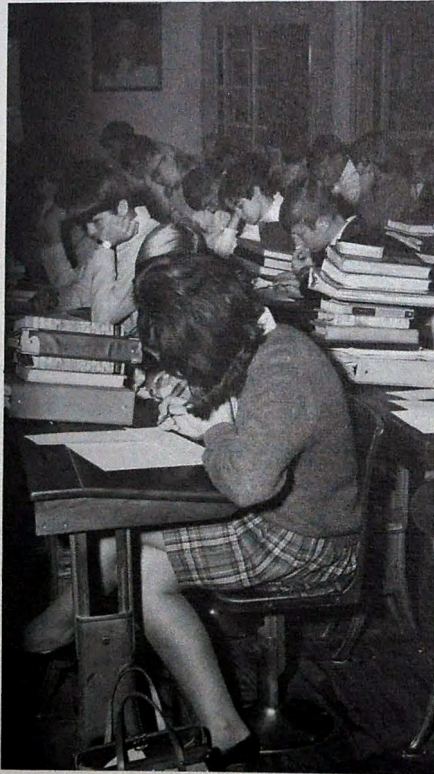

Unseen Tasks Add To Assistant Principal's Load

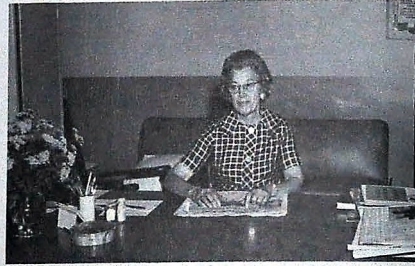

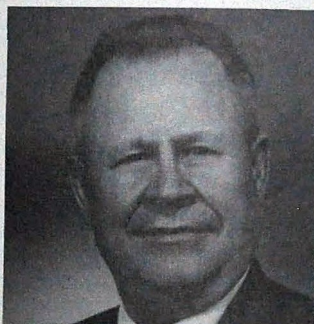

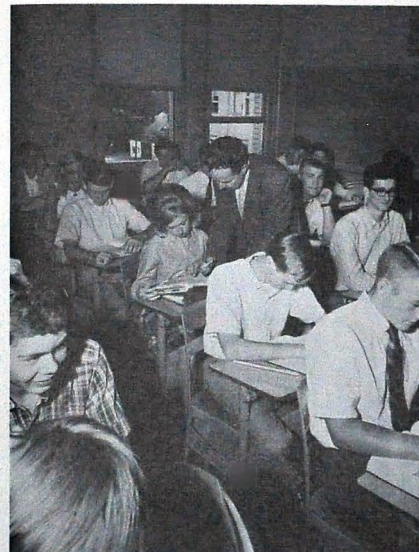
New Challenges Are Offered in Math

The curriculum places the proper amount of stress on developing (1) understanding, accuracy, and facility in the fundamental process of computation; (2) ability to use the problem-solving method; and (3) an understanding of the nature and structure of mathematics so that students can apply it to new areas. The curriculum includes processes of modern mathematics upon which technical progress depends. Attention is given to principles of mathematics and applications are made within the learner's range of interest and understanding.

Willing Counselors Aid In Curriculum Planning

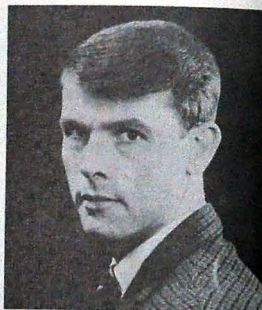
Guidance is an organized program through which we help boys and girls understand and use their potentialities. Counselors are willing to assist students with problems related to choices of curriculum, academic progress, and college or career planning, as well as personal problems which may affect the student's adjustment. Mrs. Okrasinski is the director of the program at Central, with Mr. Wood assisting. Guidance services focus upon individual pupils and are designed to aid students in their learning about the complex and changing world of opportunity.

Home Economics Instills Basic Domestic Skills

Good homes are the smallest vital unit of our American democracy; thus democratic ideals have a beginning in the family. Home economics' education should help family members to have some understanding of the problems of others as well as those of their own. The course offerings at Central High include Home Economics I, II, III, IV. Each year is comprehensive in nature and includes goals and objectives proposed in a sequence of increasing difficulty. A comprehensive course includes family relationships, child care, textiles and clothing, food and nutrition, home furnishing, and home management.

Art Department is a Media For Developing Talents

The Art Department of Central High School tries to encourage appreciation, stimulate interest, and instill understanding and knowledge of art among students and faculty. The curriculum stresses active participation in various art projects, but study in the academic areas of the subject is also emphasized. Basic courses within the curriculum are drawing, design, painting, sculpture, and crafts. Projects in other art and craft areas are also introduced according to the interests and abilities of the students.

Modern Equipment Aids In Foreign Language Study

The function of language is to communicate ideas. Therefore, in the foreign language department our objective is to enable students to understand, speak, read and write the foreign language. At present we are offering two years each of Spanish, French, and Latin, but expect to expand this to three years. Since there is a definite correlation between foreign language study and academic success in college, we cannot over-emphasize the foreign language program in the high school.

Varied Business Courses Are Offered

The Business Education Department's primary objective is to prepare students for office positions; however, the students are encouraged to further their education when it is at all possible. The standards of the Business Education Department are maintained at a high level so that students will be well-prepared when they leave Central. The courses offered are as follows: bookkeeping—two years; business law; clerical record keeping; general business; office training; salesmanship; shorthand—two years; typewriting—two years.

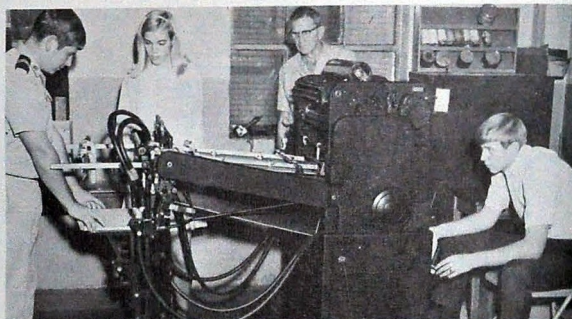


Industrial Arts Prepares Pupils for a Creative Future

The Industrial Arts Department includes mechanical and architectural drawing, blueprint reading, woodworking, printing, and auto mechanics. In architectural drawing one learns the basic fundamentals of mechanical and architectural drafting. Wood shop teaches him the basic theory necessary for the handling of tools and mechanics of woodworking. In printing one learns to set type and to operate the presses and other equipment, and auto mechanics teaches him to use the tools and to repair the different units of the automobile. A major may be obtained in any combination of industrial arts courses.

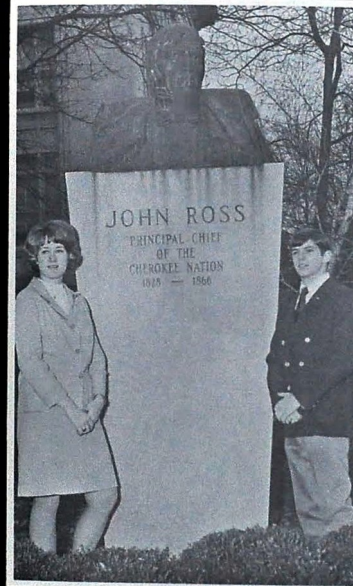

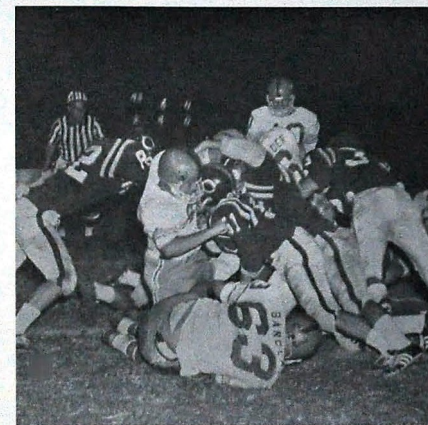

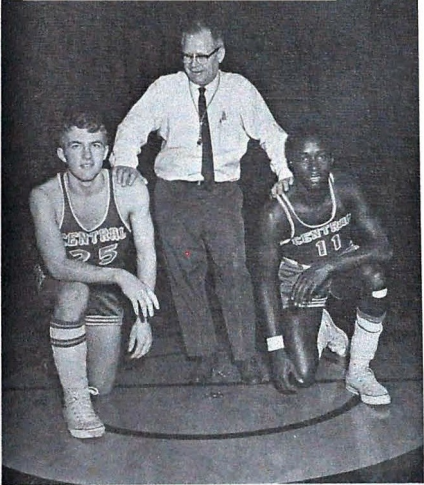

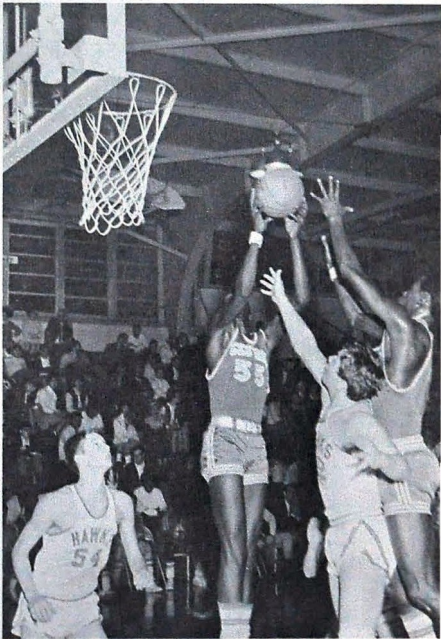

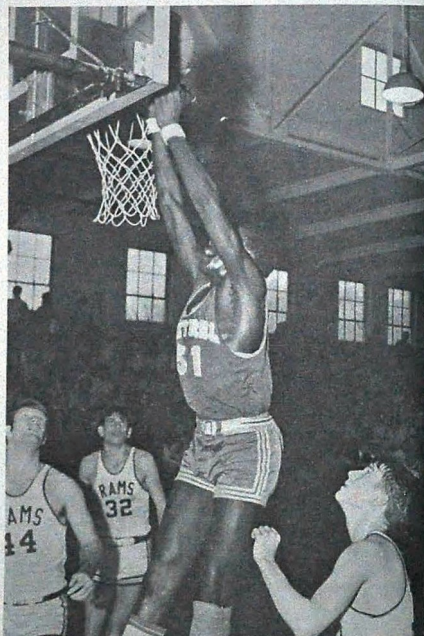

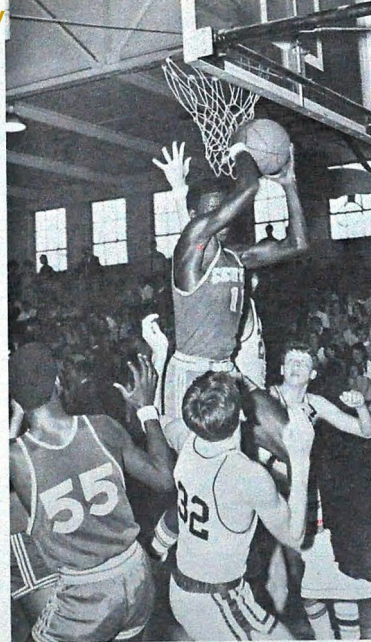

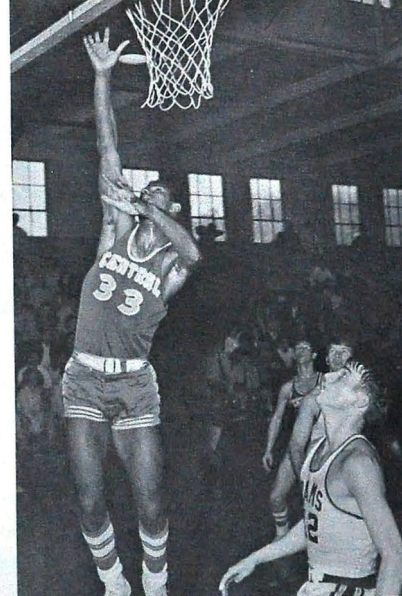

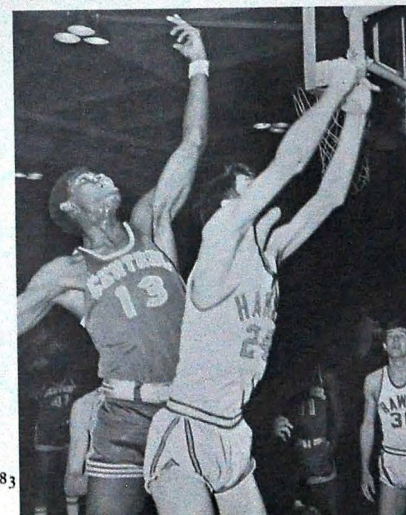

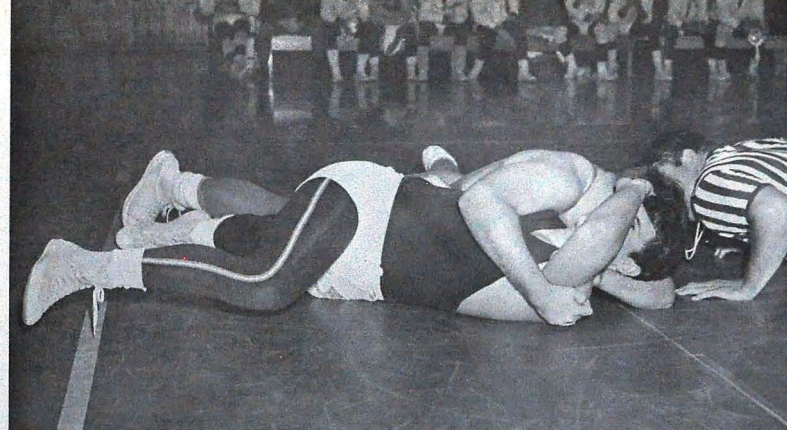

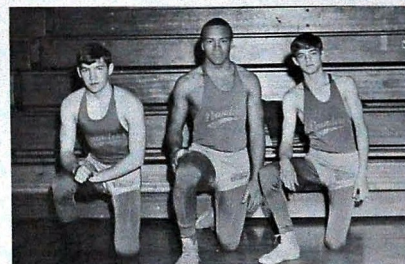


Co-captain David Ashley works for reversal against City's Doug Bailey in the 141-pound class.

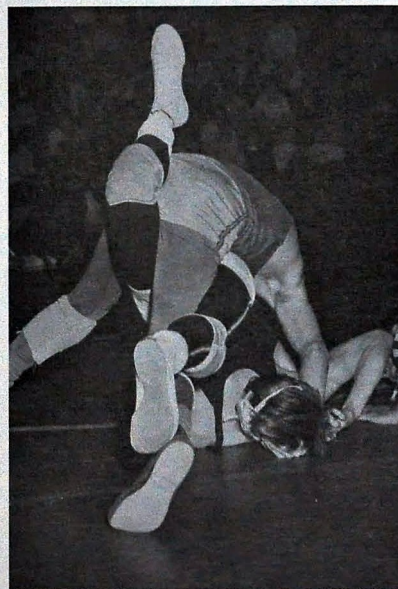
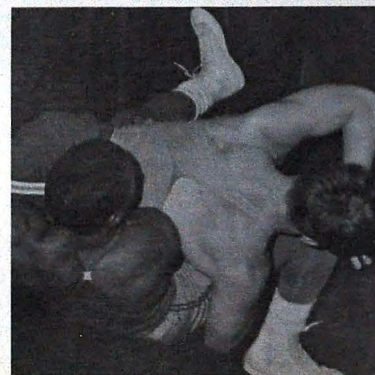


Heavyweight Mike Underhill pins his opponent's shoulders to the mat for a quick five points.



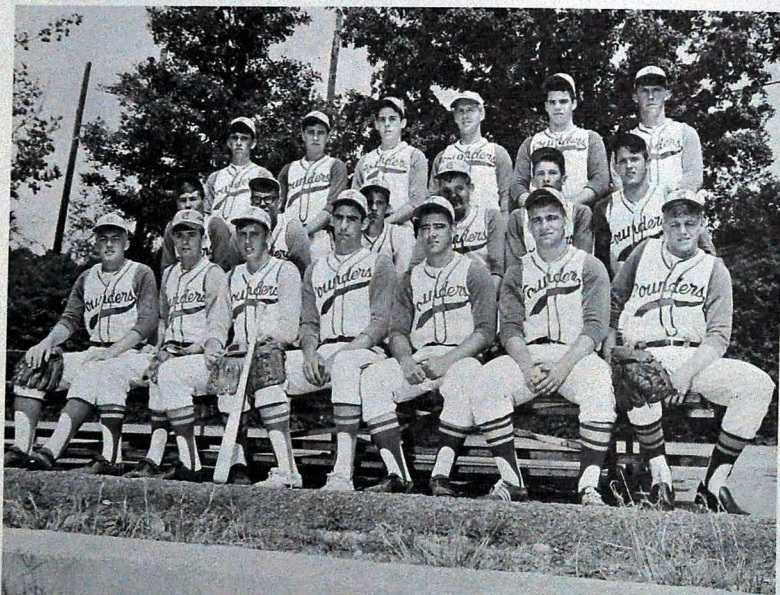

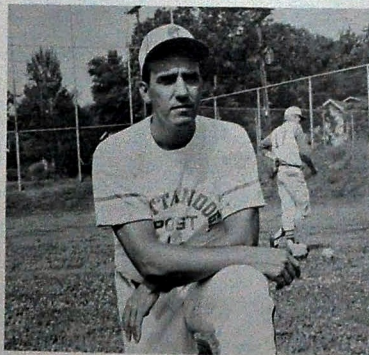
Central Diamondmen Take Third Place in H. I. L.

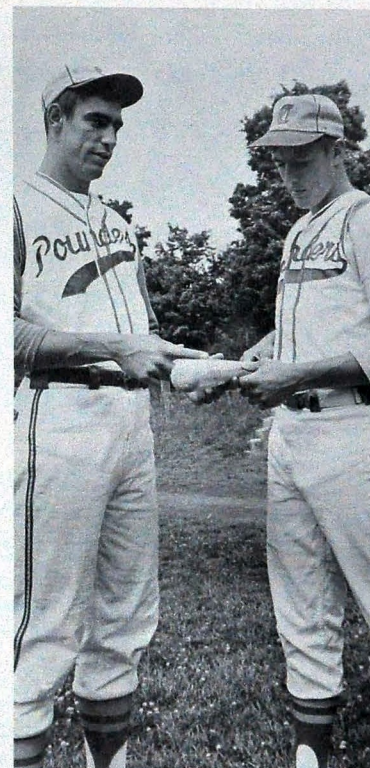

We could have told of the multitude of athletic awards won just this year—HIL grid championship, sixth place in the AP football poll, and a high state ranking for the wrestling team.

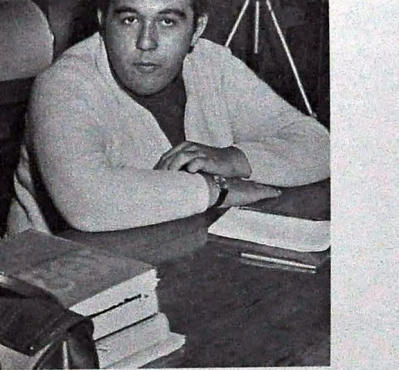
We could have told you all that, but we didn't. We don't like to brag.
