







Her Sons and Daughters Seek to Learn by Various Methods




















Mrs. Louise Caudle Receives 1971 Champion Dedicatory from Seniors






Making known school activities is one of the functions performed by Mrs. Caudle's Publicity Staff whose members included Pat Jolley and Rita Wilhite.






Awareness of Social and Community **Problems Brings Reaction from Centralites**

Another fumble by the Irish led to Hunt's second touchdown. With the score 40-0 reserve fullback David Martin carried three Irish defenders past the goal line from two yards out for the final Pounder score. Late in the game the Irish finally scored against a rugged second team. Outstanding defensive stars included Kilgore, Odmann, Gulas, Harris, and Hicks.

On October 30, the Pounders met with the East Ridge Pioneers. Central fans were kept on their feet as the Pounders were defeated. Nevertheless, it was an explosive game. First to score on a 40 yard run were the Pioneers. Then on a Pioneer kick-off the Pounder offensive started a touchdown drive that could not be stopped. Jim Hunt's run in the end zone put Central on the board. Tommy Youngblood's kick was good and Central was ahead 7-6. Late in the first half, the Pounders were stopped one yard short of the goal. 8,000 gridiron fans watched while the mighty Pounders were defeated by City's Dynamos whom Central had dominated for the past 31 years. City took the opening kick but the immovable Pounder defense stood fast so that the Dynamos could not score. Some time later, the Dynamos fumbled on their own 11 which Central used to advantage. Iim Hunt carried to the 6 and Randy Harris finished off the other five for a Pounder TD. Although the try for the extra point was no good, Central led 6-0. City, now scared, roared back to score and the board read City 7. Central 6. Time after time through the rest of the game, Central tried to score but the Dynamos held fast. City then established a running and passing game which led to three more touchdowns. City finished on top.










