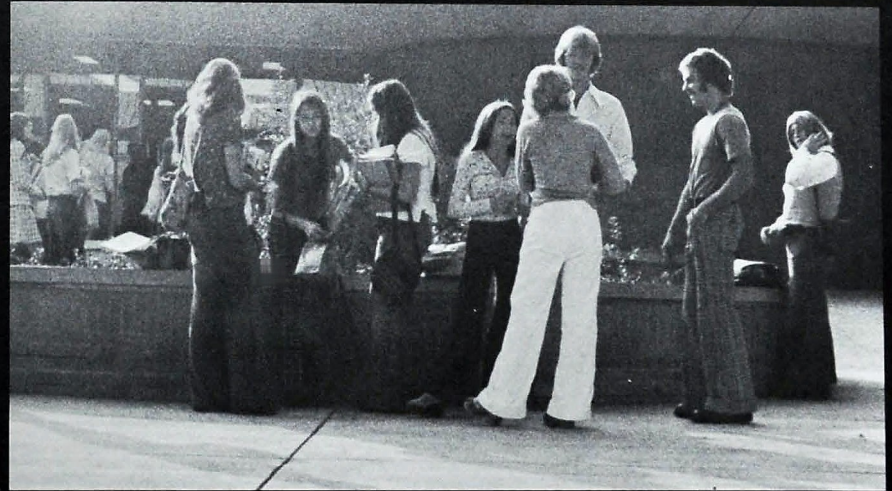

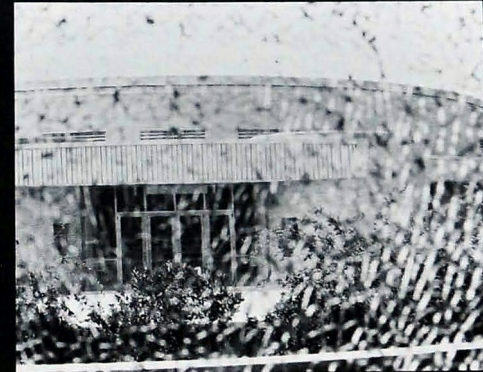
Despite the bad days, with a spirit of cooperation, Centralites strove for brighter tomorrows.

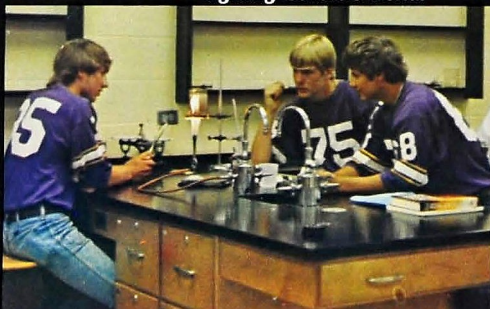

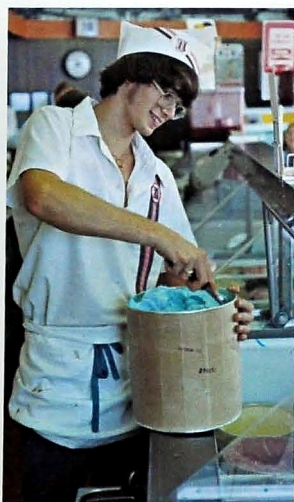

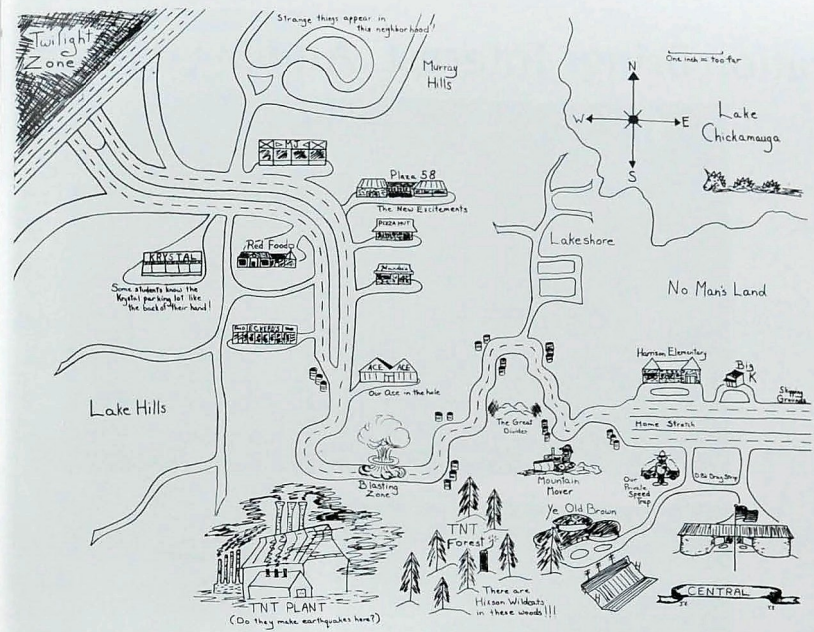
Students, Teachers Emerge in Community Concerns

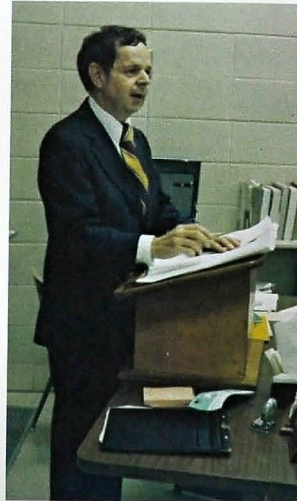

Due to the March flood, many faced a disaster as water from the Chickamauga Creek covered yards and crept into some houses. Roads were blocked and students and teachers were stuck at home for a short rest while the waters slowly left their houses and the blocked roads.

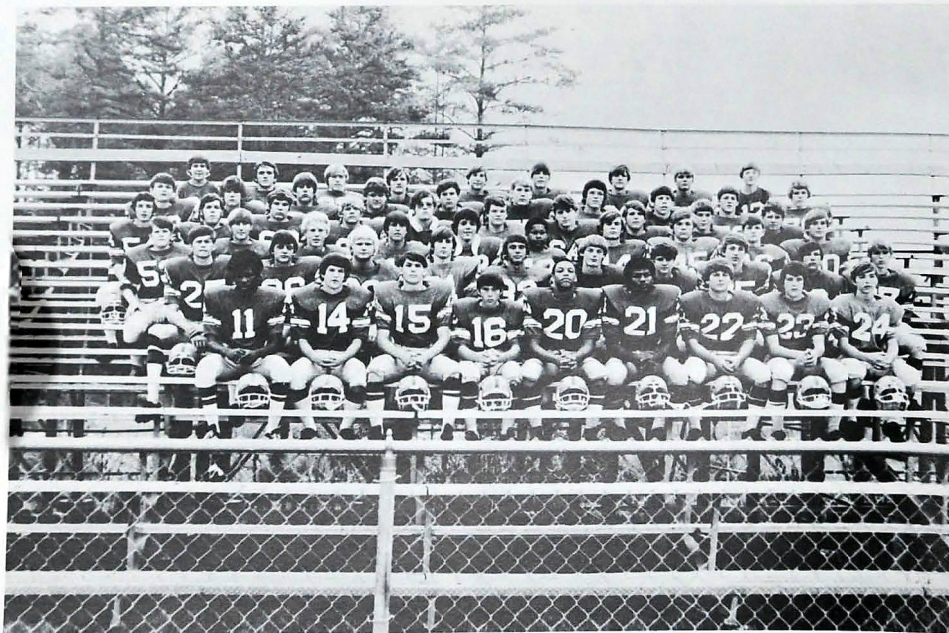

Defense Is Key to Pounder Success



Central High School played one of the roughest schedules in the state this year, with two games in Nashville against Nashville McGavock and Nashville Overton. Only eight starters had returned from the previous year, and most of the team's size was lost through graduation. Although the Pounder's offensive line was at first inexperienced, it improved tremendously during the early part of the season and was much quicker than the 1972 line. Central's offensive attack had its hopes placed on the running of junior fullback Paul Forgey, who was plagued by a knee injury as a sophomore. He was one of the steadiest and most dependable runners on the team.

Central's defense was anchored by senior Eugene Nye and junior Jon Garrett. The linebacker positions were considerably readjusted due to a knee injury to Steve Wallace during the Bradley game. Senior Clay Payne was moved up from defensive halfback, and Ben Holt filled in for Wallace.

Again as last year, Central's defense has been the key to Pounder success. In games against Nashville McGavock and Bradley, two teams with powerful running attacks, the Pounders limited McGavock to just over a hundred yards and stopped Bradley for less than a hundred yards.

Central Drops First Two Games

With a powerful running attack, Nashville McGavock defeated Central in the season's opening game. McGavock dominated the first half, scoring 15 quick points. Central fought back early in the second half with a touchdown pass of 25 yards from Bruce Conrad to Lewis Hall. Trailing by 15-6, the Pounders mounted two long drives only to stall on fourth-down plays. Junior Paul Forgey led the Central rushing attack with 60 yards. As the final horn sounded, McGavock scored on a 13-yard touchdown pass for the final score of 22-6.



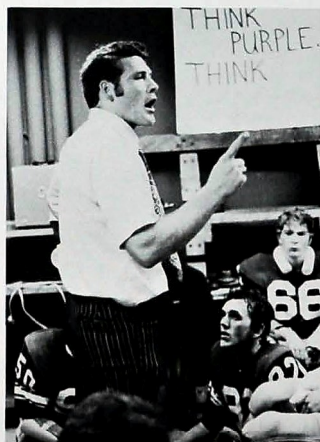
Central, marred by fumbles and interceptions, lost its second game of the season to Bradley County. After recovering a Central fumble, Bradley moved the ball to the 4-yard line and kicked a 21-yard field goal. The Pounders fought back, driving to the Bradley 33 and 38 on their two possessions of the second quarter. However, unable to score on either of the drives, they trailed by a score of 3-0 at the half.

In the third quarter, Bradley scored two quick touchdowns, one coming on a 3-yard run and the other on a 30-yard pass. Central started its only scoring drive of the night on the following kickoff. They drove to the Bradley 22-yard line, with help from a pass interference penalty. With the ball on the 22, wingback Warnie Shaw took a hand-off from Bruce Conrad and threw it to Bobby Benedict in the end zone, making the final score 17-6.

Pounders Lose Two Squeakers



By a single point, Hixson escaped the Central eleven in a tight, defensive game. Both teams had chances to score in the first half, with Central getting the ball to the 4-yard line and Hixson to the 8-yard line. A 7-yard loss and an incomplete pass in the end zone spoiled a Pounder touchdown.

Midway in the fourth quarter, Hixson scored on a 9-yard run and kicked the extra point that proved to be the margin of victory. Central bounced back on the ensuing kickoff and drove 66 yards for the score. During the drive, Herman Grier ran for 30 yards and Tommy Stevenson caught a 30-yard pass from quarterback Bruce Conrad. Paul Forgey capped off the drive with a one-yard plunge for 6 points, but the tie was not to be as the snap from center sailed over the holder's head. In the 7-6 loss, the Pounders were led on defense by juniors Mike Wilson, Mark Lawrence, and Lewis Hall.



Central suffered its second straight one-point loss in the opening home game against Tyner. Statistically, the Pounders dominated the game, doubling their opponent in first downs and total yards gained. Central took the opening kickoff and sent Paul Forgey and Willie Chestnutt, who both gained over 100 yards in the game, into the Tyner line eight straight times for good yardage. With the ball at the 18, Forgey sprinted around right end for a touchdown and Central led 7-0. Recovering a Central fumble, Tyner drove 36 yards to the end zone and took an 8-7 lead at half time.

In the third quarter, Willie Chestnutt put Central ahead 15-8 on a 54-yard scamper down the sidelines and a two-point conversion run. After a Pounder drive stalled, Tyner drove for a touchdown and trailed by only one point. On the two-point conversion try, the Tyner back was hit at the line of scrimmage and fumbled into the end zone. Tyner's center fell on the ball for two points, and Central took a 16-15 heartbreaking loss.

Central Keeps Spirit, Despite Losses

Unable to mount a rushing attack, Central lost to Red Bank in a game of long touchdowns. In the first quarter, Red Bank threw a 36-yard touchdown pass on a fourth-down play. Central threatened twice in the first half, but the two drives were halted by a fumble and a fourth-down loss.

Red Bank scored 16 more points in the second half, before the Pounders could mount a touchdown. Late in the fourth quarter, Rod Croft hurled a pass to Tommy Stevenson who then lateraled to Warnie Shaw, and he raced to the Pounder 25-yard line. Two plays later, Croft hit Bobby Benedict in the end zone for the touchdown. Paul Forgey ran for the two-point conversion to make the final score 23-8.

Brainerd spoiled the Homecoming game for Central, defeating them 34-7. Central was already handicapped due to the loss of key players Herman Grier and Steve Wallace. Three touchdowns were scored by Brainerd in the first 20 minutes of play, two after recovering Pounder fumbles and one on a 90-yard run. With Central trailing 21-0, Paul Forgey ramblled 53 yards around right end to set up Central's lone touchdown. Sophomore quarterback Rod Croft hit Larry Barnes on a 7-yard touchdown pass and Danny Crosland added the extra point. Brainerd added two fourth-quarter touchdowns, one a spectacular one-handed catch, to finish the scoring for the night.

Although Central rushed for over 200 yards in the game against Soddy-Daisy, they were defeated 15-13 on a third-quarter field goal.

Central scored first, after Kenny Lusk recovered a fumble at the Trojan's 13-yard line. Four plays later, fullback Paul Forgey rammed over from the 2-yard line, and Central led 7-0. Soddy-Daisy, passing on every play, scored on a short touchdown pass, but trailed 7-6.

In the second quarter, Central recovered another fumble at Soddy-Daisy's 38. On the first play from scrimmage, sophomore quarterback Rod Croft hit Bobby Benedict in the end zone for six points. Soddy-Daisy, continually passing, scored again and trailed at half time 13-12.

Throughout the game, Central moved the ball with ease, but many drives stalled due to fumbles and fourth-down plays. A Soddy-Daisy field goal early in the second half proved to be their winning margin.

Purple Socks Pioneers, Bows in Final Two

Central, registering its first win of the season, crushed East Ridge by a score of 28-14. On their second possession, the Pounders drove 47 yards in 12 plays to lead 6-0. After intercepting a Central pass, East Ridge drove 38 yards for a touchdown to make the score 7-6. However, the lead lasted for only 14 seconds, as Warnie Shaw took the ensuing kickoff and raced 90 yards to the end zone. Shaw danced around right end for the two-point conversion, and Central led 14-7. Seconds later, Jon Garrett recovered a Pioneer fumble at the 29-yard line. It took just four plays from there, and Paul Forgey plunged over from the 2-yard line for the score.

Leading 20-7 in the third quarter, Central ground out 69 yards to score again. Fullback Paul Forgey, who scored three touchdowns in the game, rammed over from the 8-yard line, and Shaw made the two-point conversion. East Ridge scored a late fourth-quarter touchdown, but that was as close as they were to come. In the 28-14 victory, the Pounders were led on offense by Paul Forgey, Warnie Shaw, and Larry Barnes.

Despite an excellent defense, Central lost to arch-rival City by a score of 14-7. City scored first on a 60-yard dash and moments later, had a first-and-goal situation at the 4-yard line. Here, the Pounder's defense stiffened and held City on a fourth-down play at the 1-yard line.

Late in the second quarter, City fumbled a Central punt, and Warnie Shaw recovered at the Dynamo 45. With 10 seconds left in the half, quarterback Rod Croft threw to Tommy Stevenson at the 15. Stevenson then lateraled to Warnie Shaw, and he raced to the end zone. Central led at half time 7-6, after Mark Matlock kicked the extra point.

City took the lead midway in the third quarter by driving 45 yards in eight plays. After City scored, neither team could mount a drive because of superb defensive play by both teams. Outstanding on the Pounder's defense were Clay Payne, Eugene Nye, and Danny Crosland.



Central finished its season with a 1-9 record, losing to Nashville Overton 33-0. Overton, ranked second in the state, scored the first four times they had the ball and led 27-0 at half time. Following the second half kickoff, Overton drove to their last touchdown for a 33-0 lead. After this, Central's defense stiffened and shut off Overton's offense for the rest of the game. During the fourth quarter the Pounder offense came alive and drove to the 18-yard line, but the drive was stalled on a fourth-down play. Larry Barnes was the top Central rusher with 42 yards on seven attempts.

"From the Bellamy presentation, I profited by the experience with people, and was exposed to different ideas," stated Roy Martin, after his trip to Springfield High School in Springfield, Vermont, for the annual presentation of the Bellamy Award. 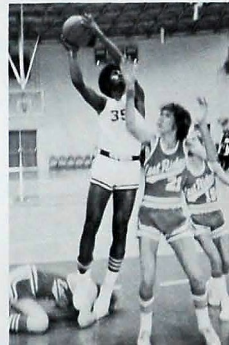

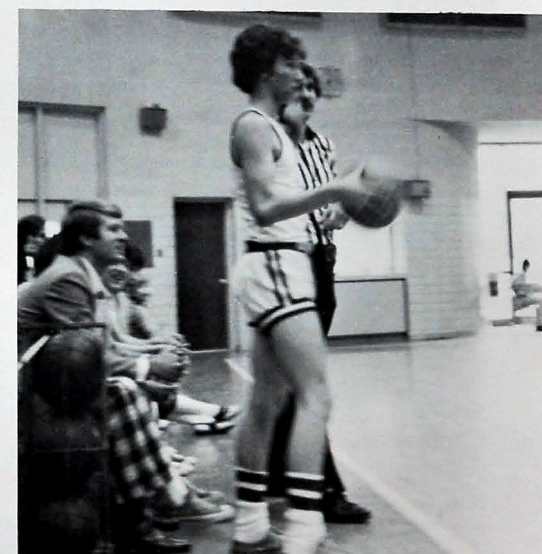
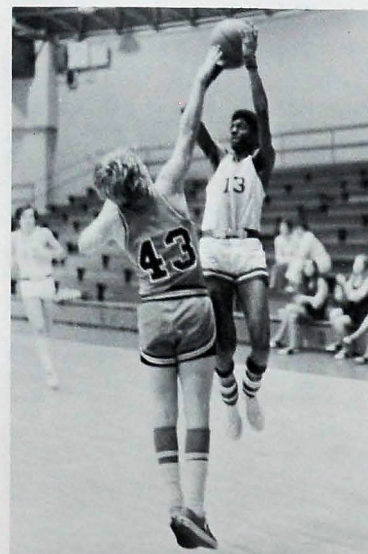

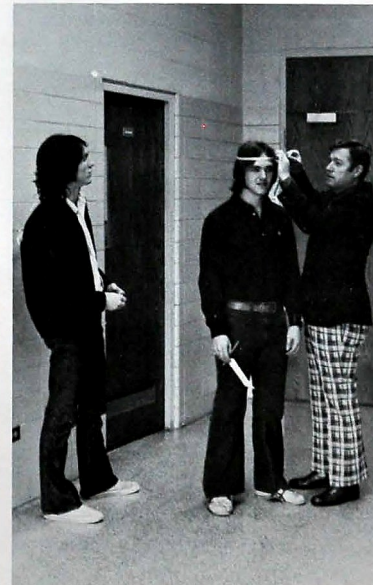
Plans and dreams for the future were mixed with the last-minute reflections of school dances, clubs, cheering the purple and gold, and the security CHS brought for three years.

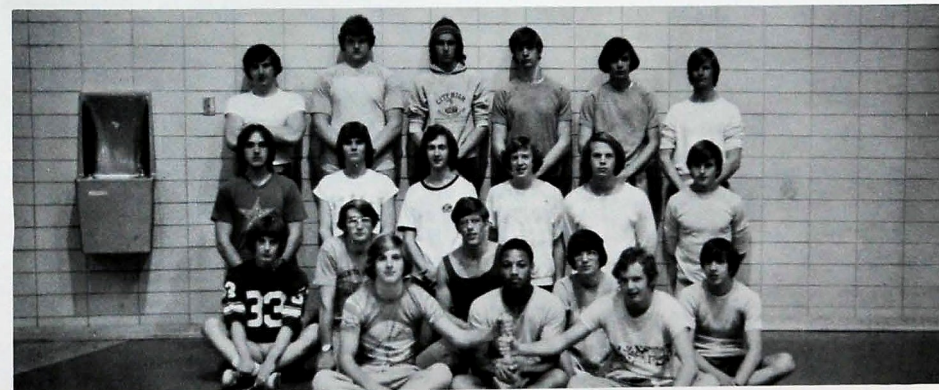

Two Instructors Direct Volleyball Team

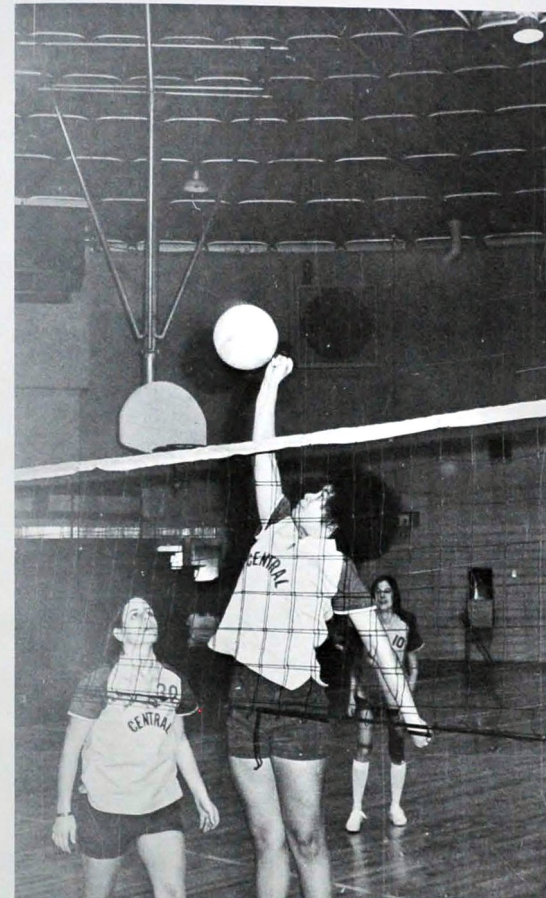

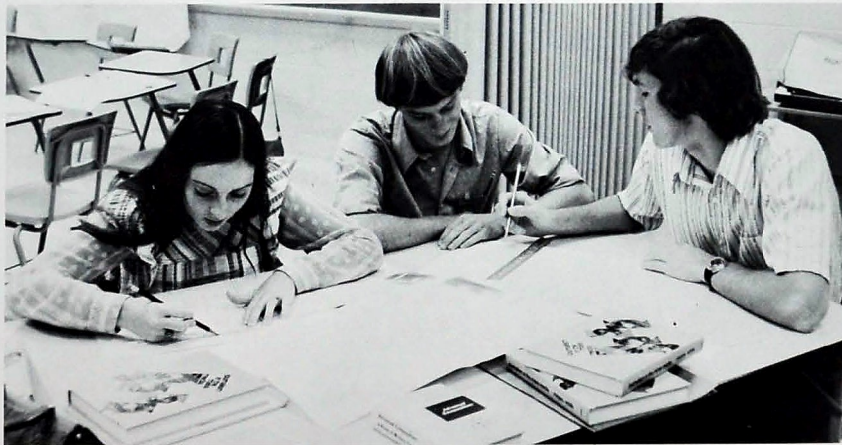

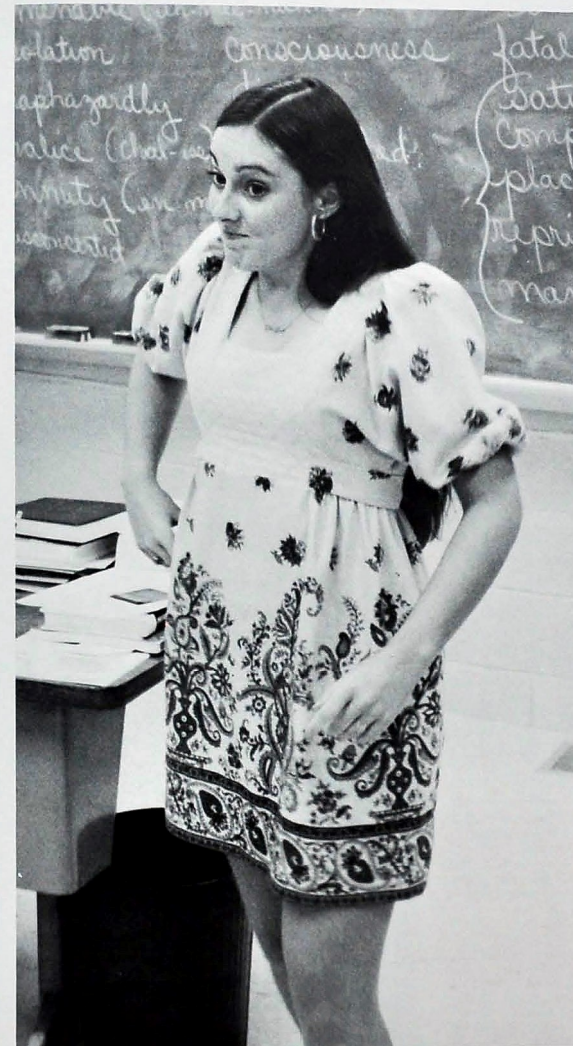

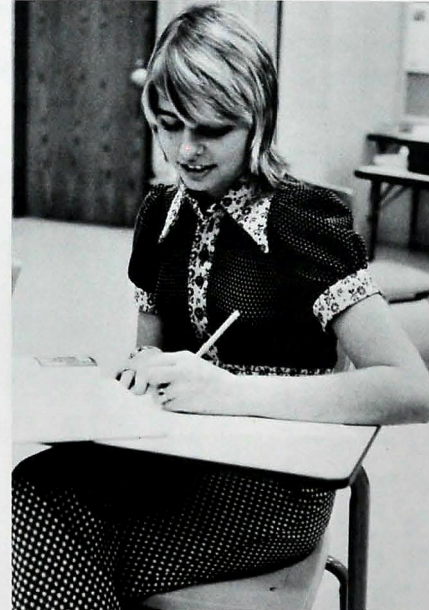


PWI Experiences Provide Basis for Yearbook

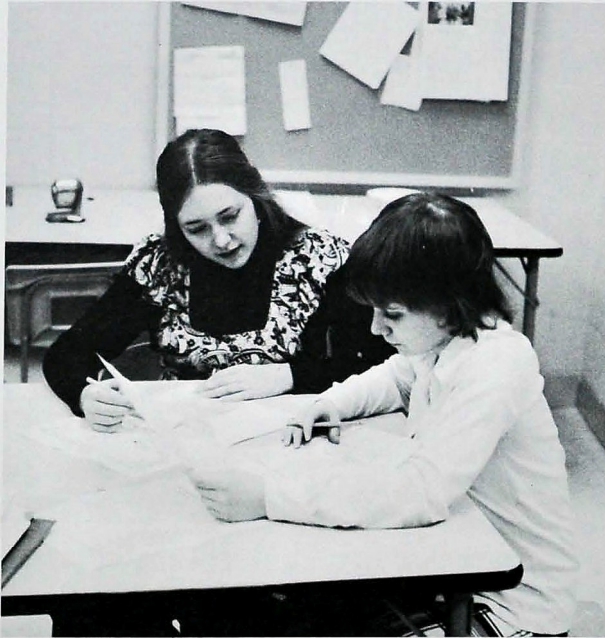

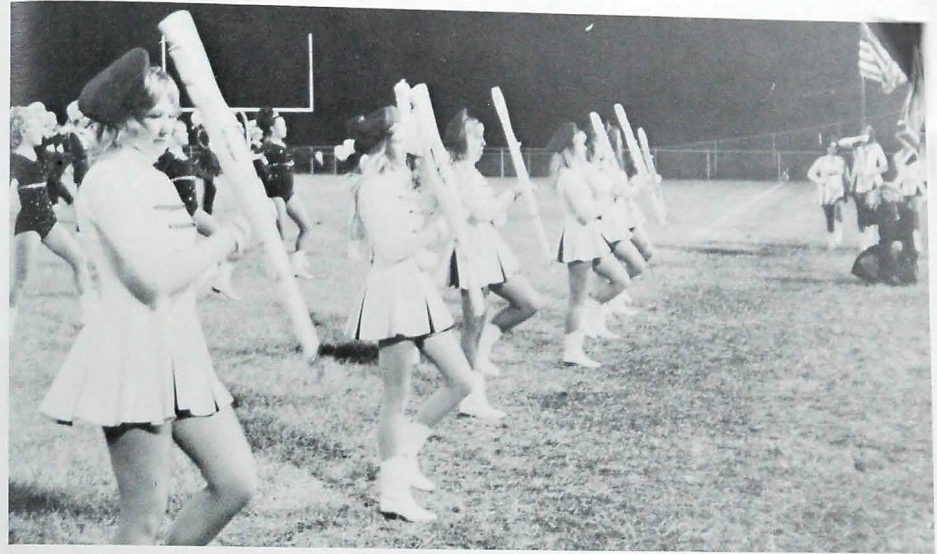

In October when we competed at Bradley County High School, our first feelings were those of jittery anxiety. But after winning a superior rating, we were filled with joy and plenty of spirit.

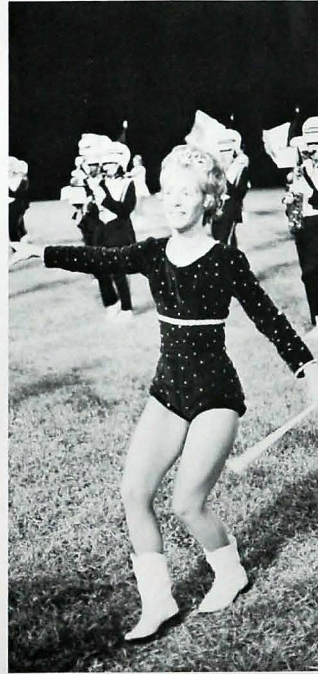

Despite Weather, Flags Wave On

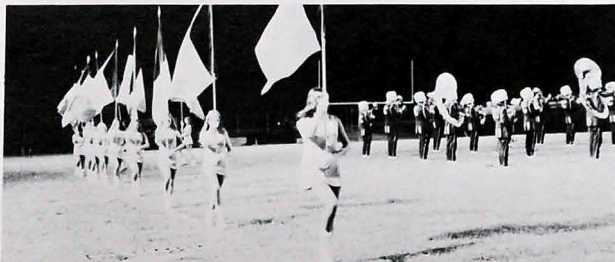

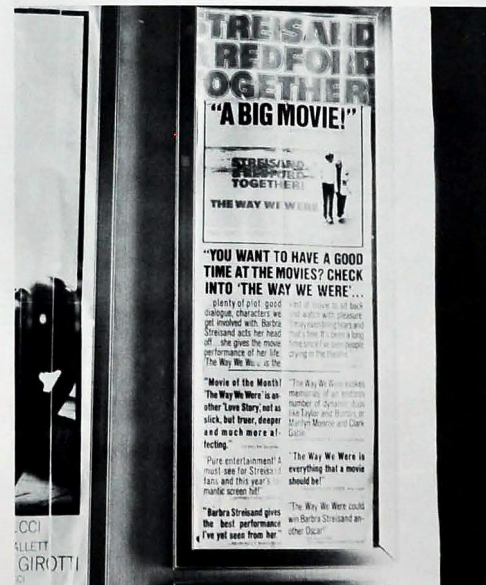

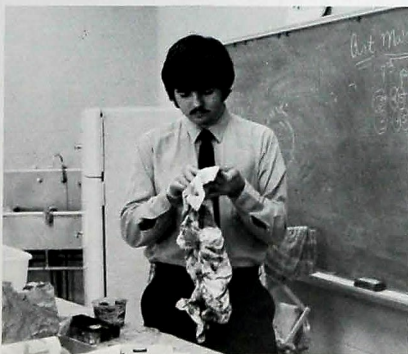

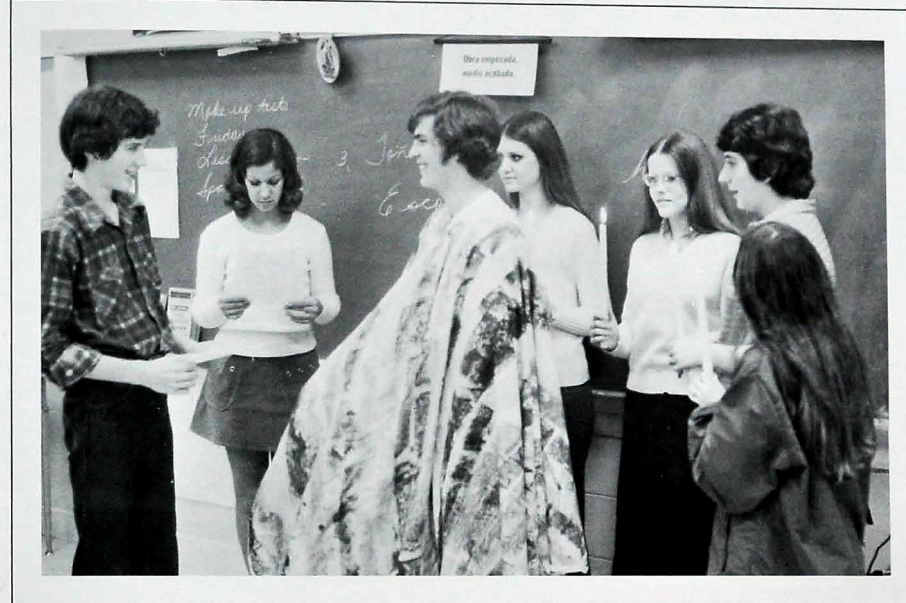

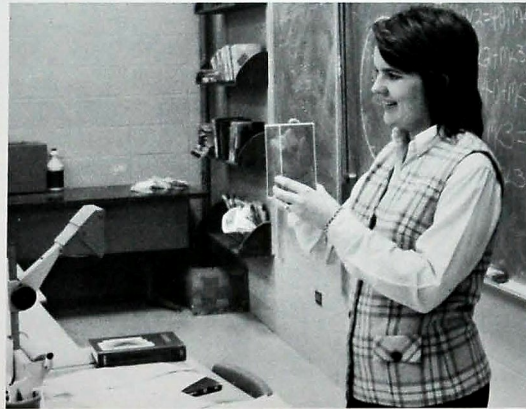
Science, Math Departments Gain Materials

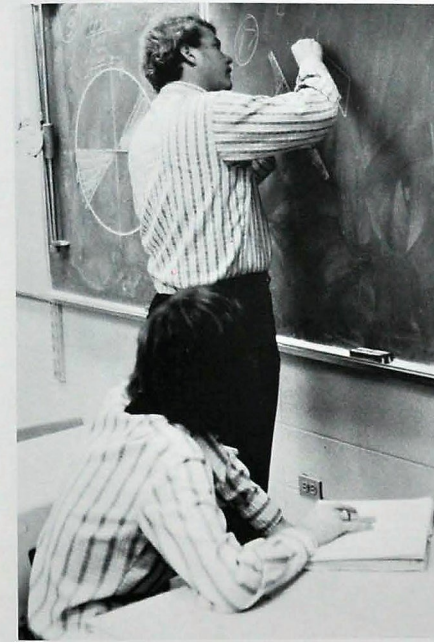

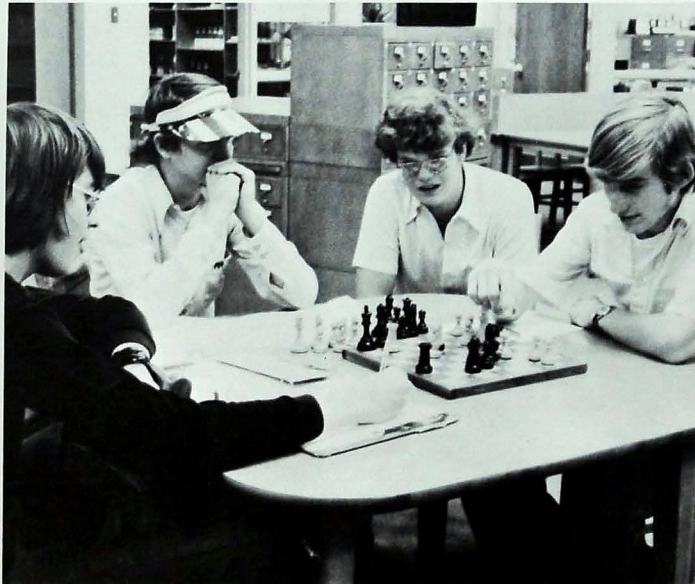

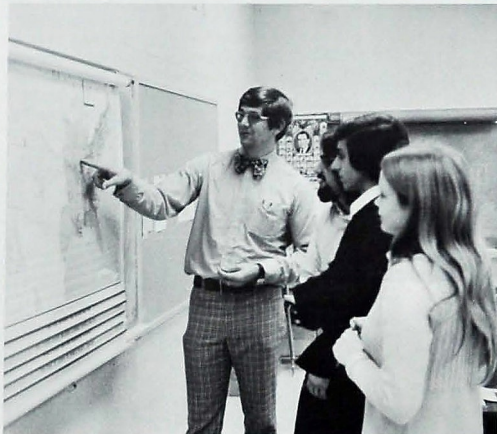

Social Studies Extends to Sophomores

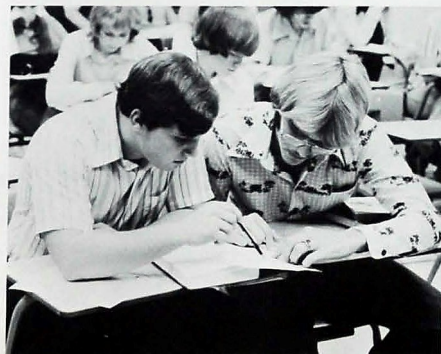

"The History of Satan" and "Creation vs. Evolution" became new units taught in Bible class. Maps, movies, and filmstrips were used to illustrate new topics.

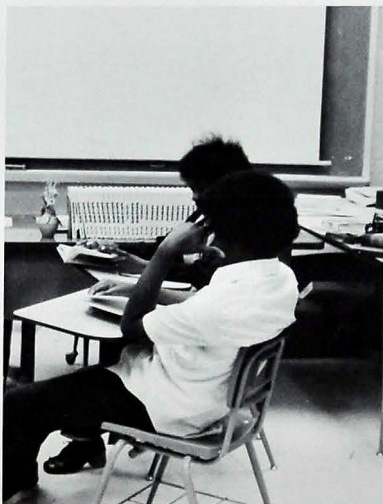

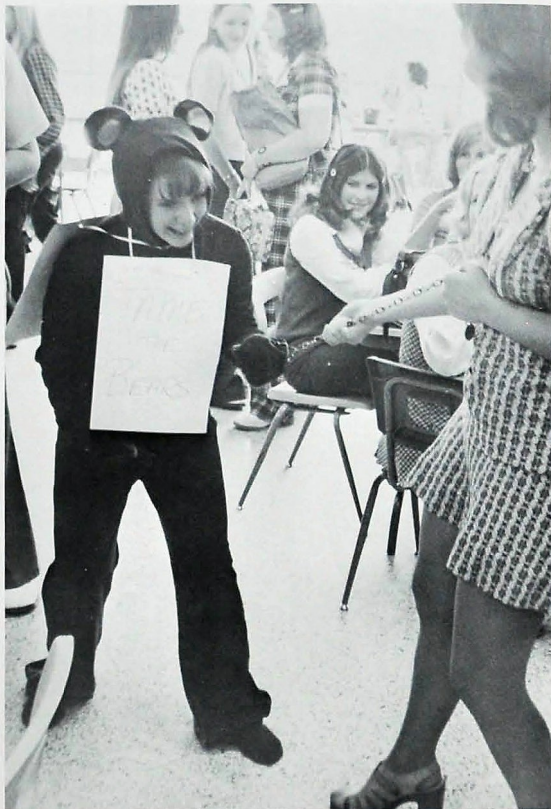
Although it was a sales project, selling megaphones was also our way of selling spirit to the student body to urge them to yell a little louder.

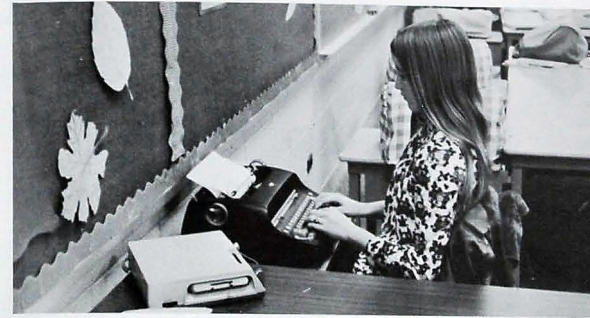
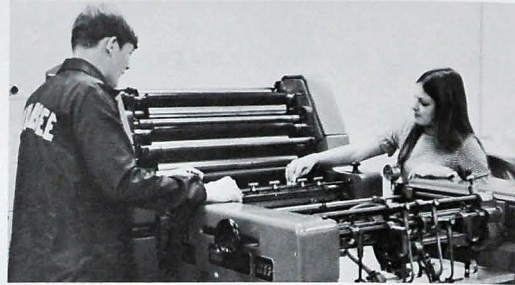

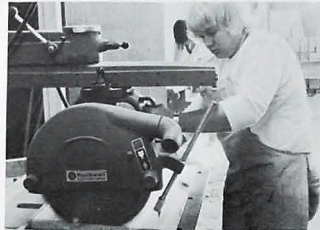

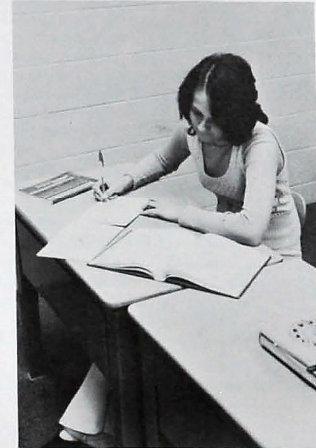


TOP LEFT: As Connie Winston draws a flange coupling, she asks the assistance of Buffy Hoge.

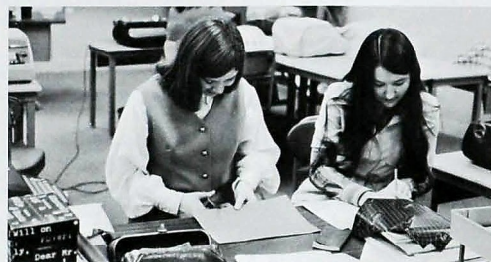

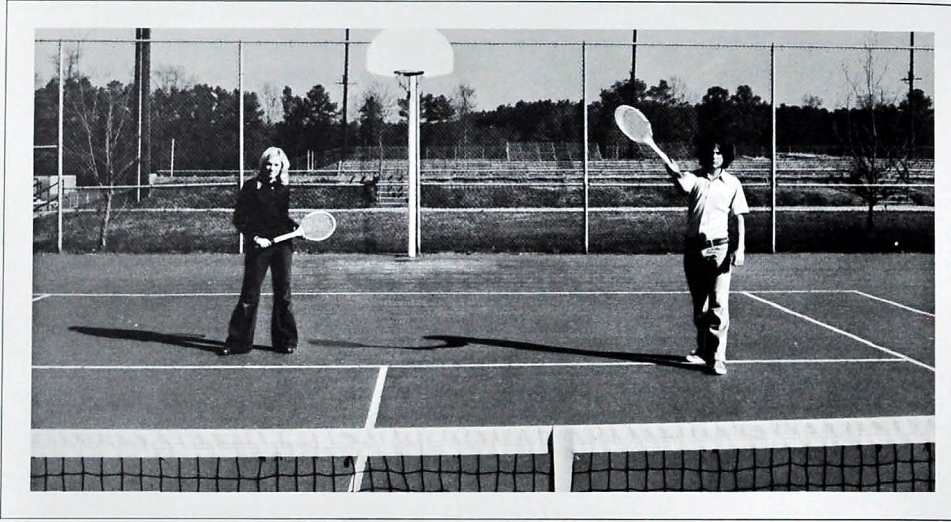

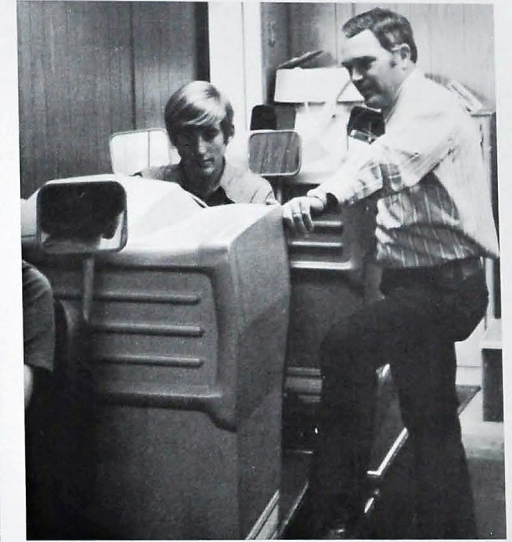

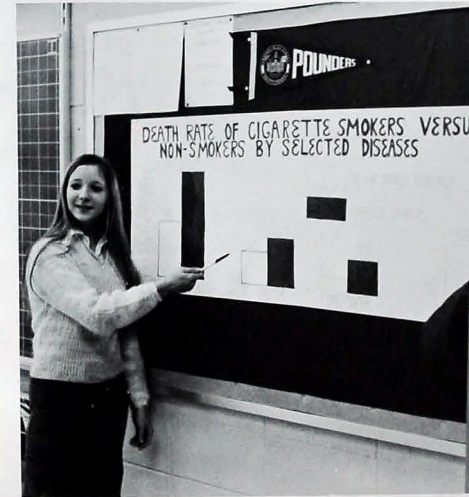

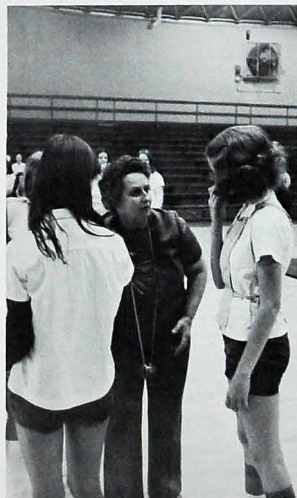

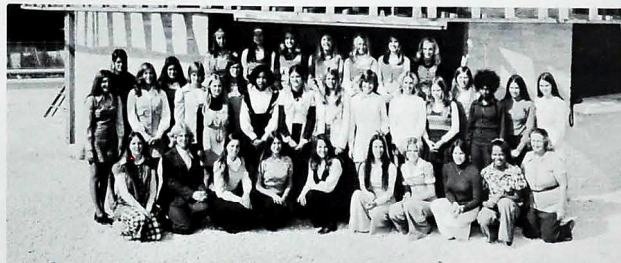

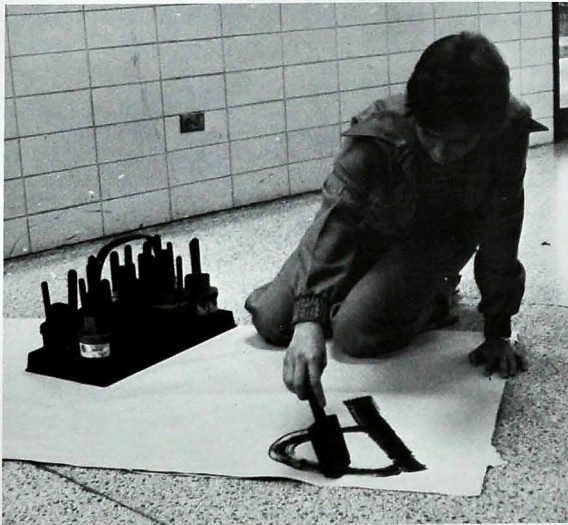

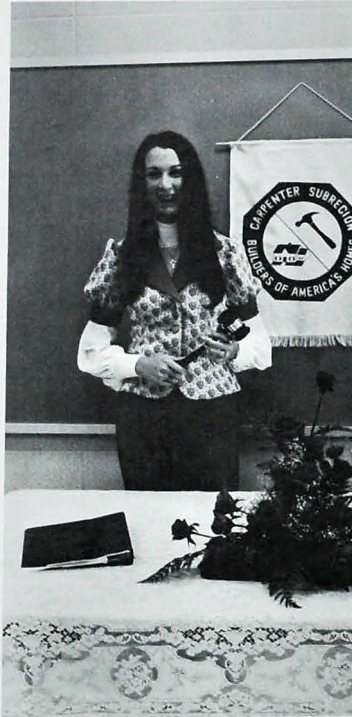

Field Trips Bring New Interests in Home Ec.



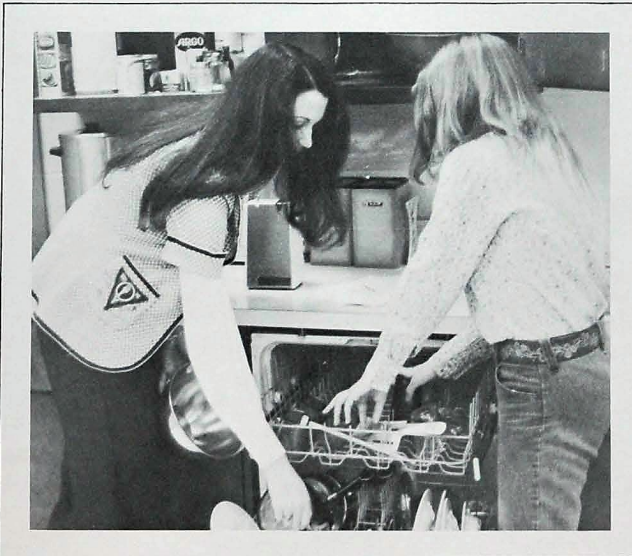

Basketball, Beauties, Christmas Party Unfold As Main Activities

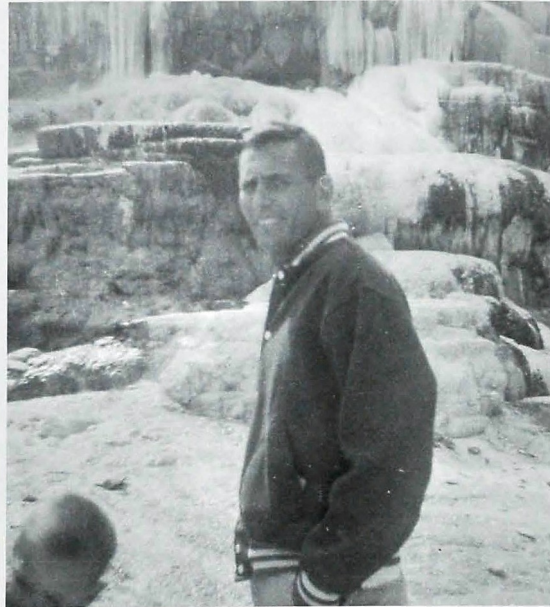

Guiding students and ushering in the pods was our way of spending time with students in a type of service. We on the Guidance and Usher Staffs enjoyed working for the Central faculty and students.

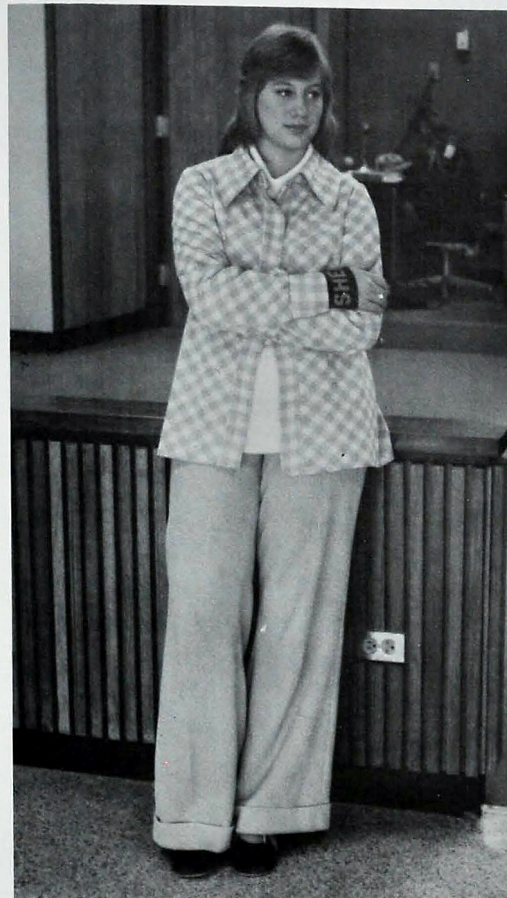

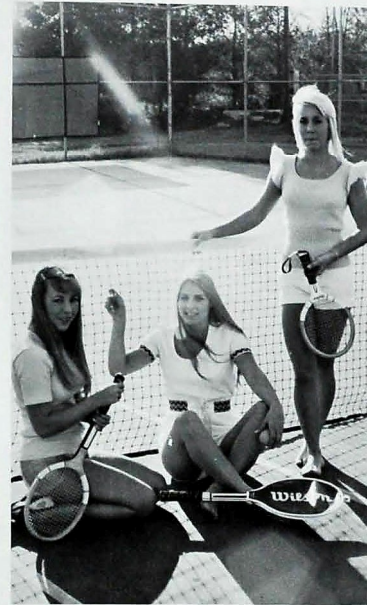

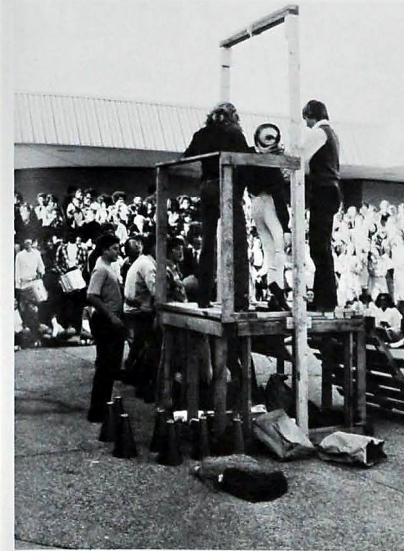

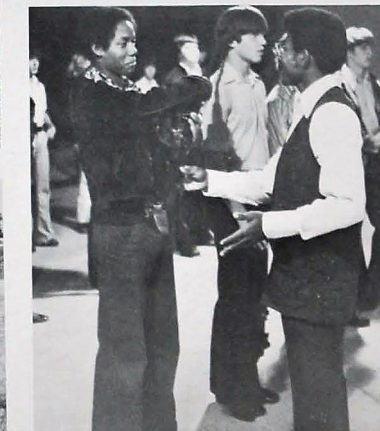

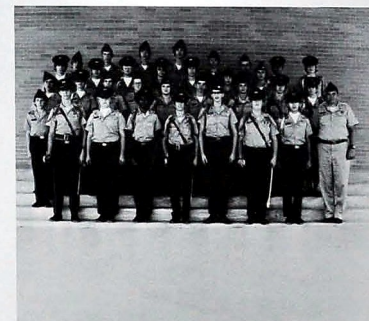

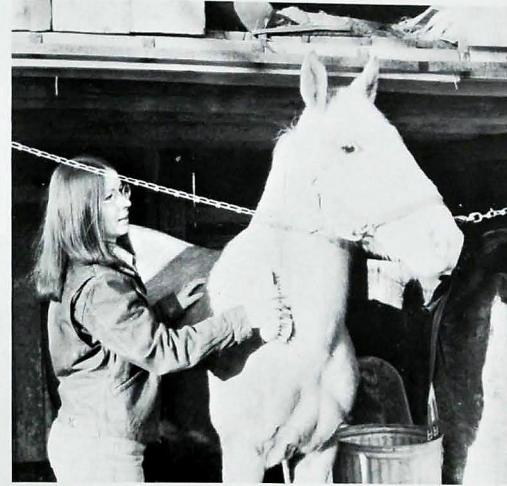

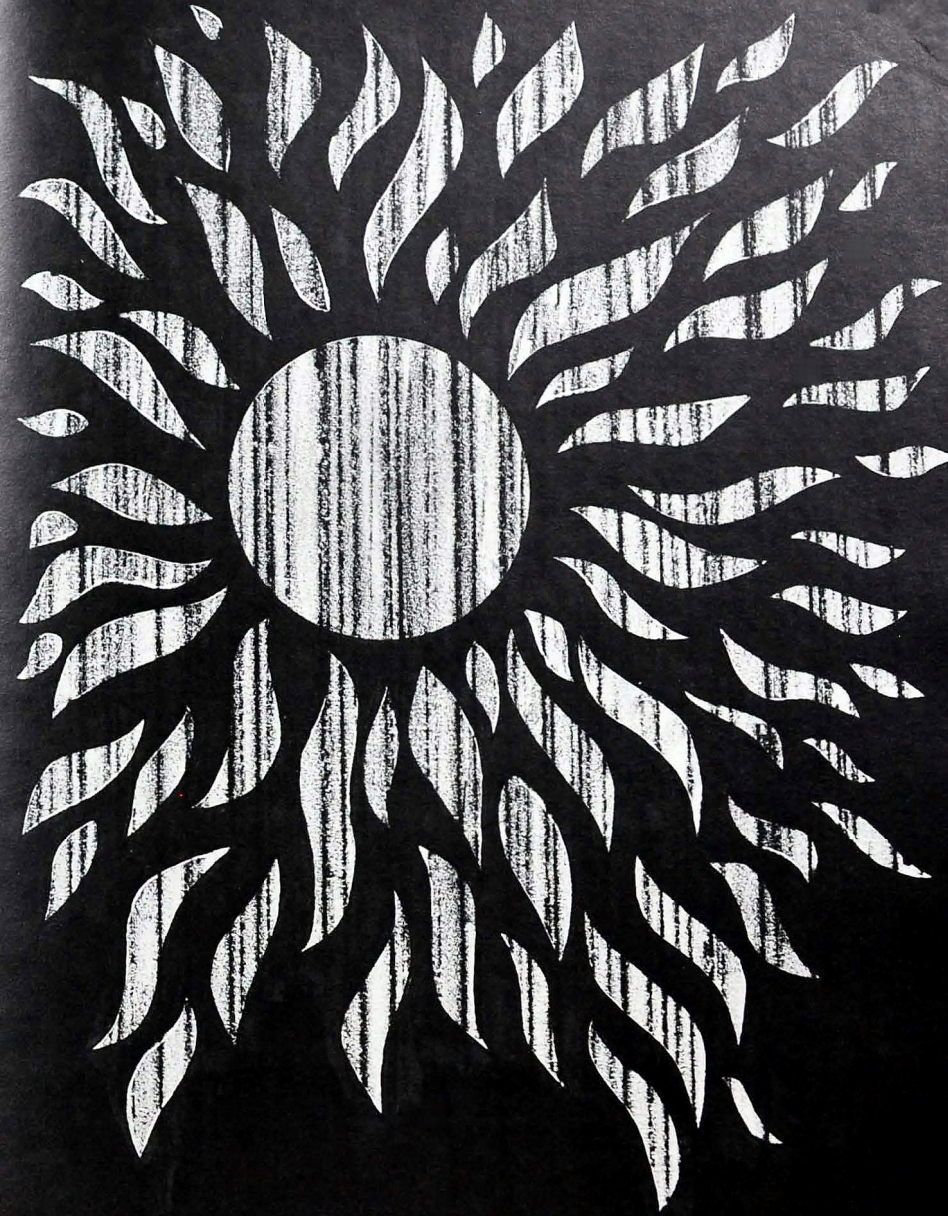

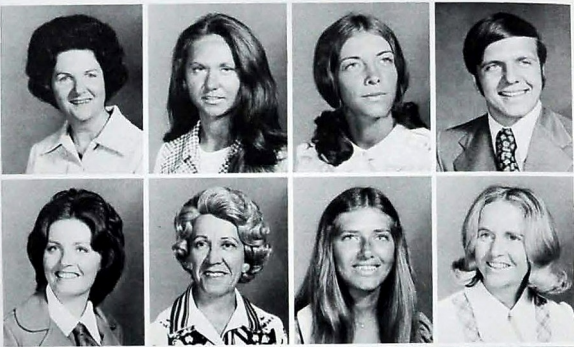

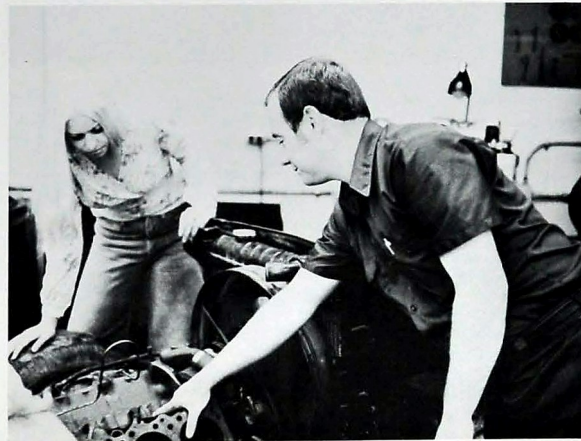

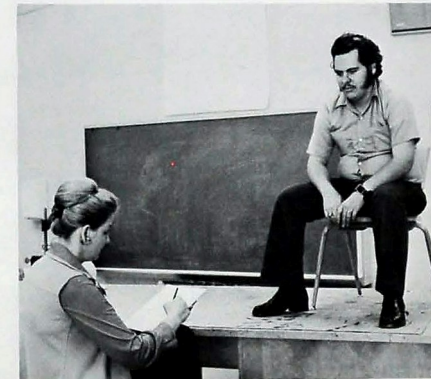

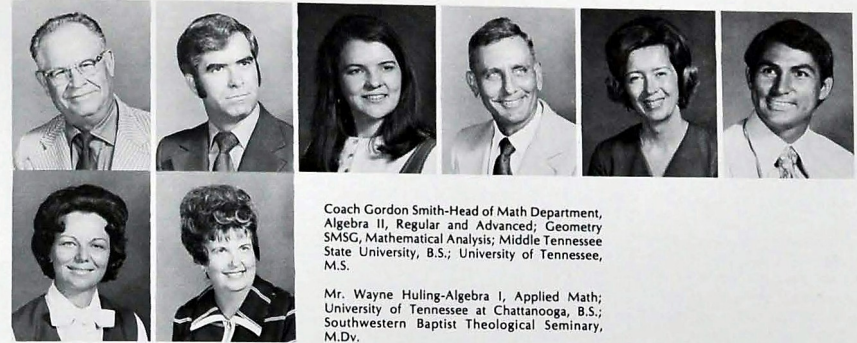

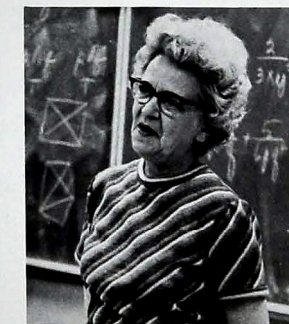

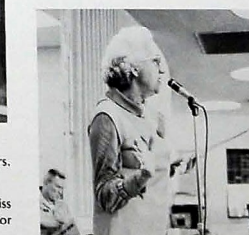

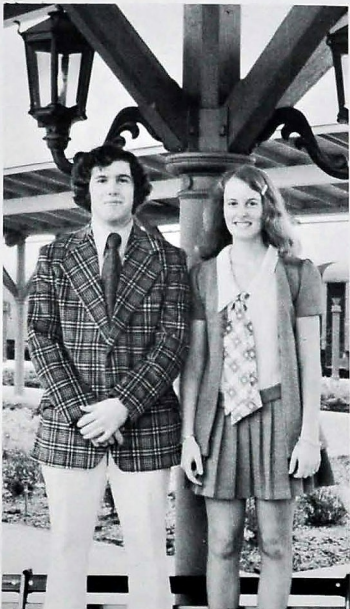

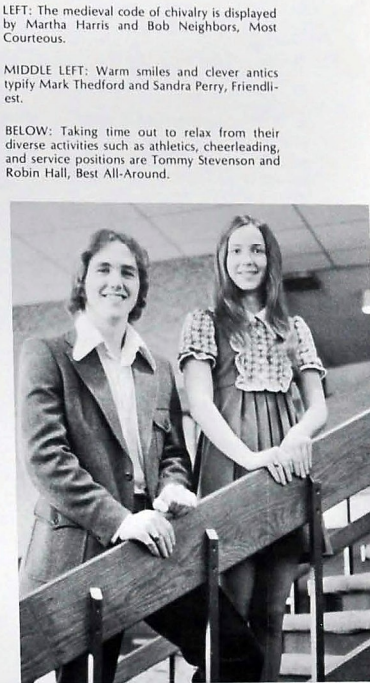

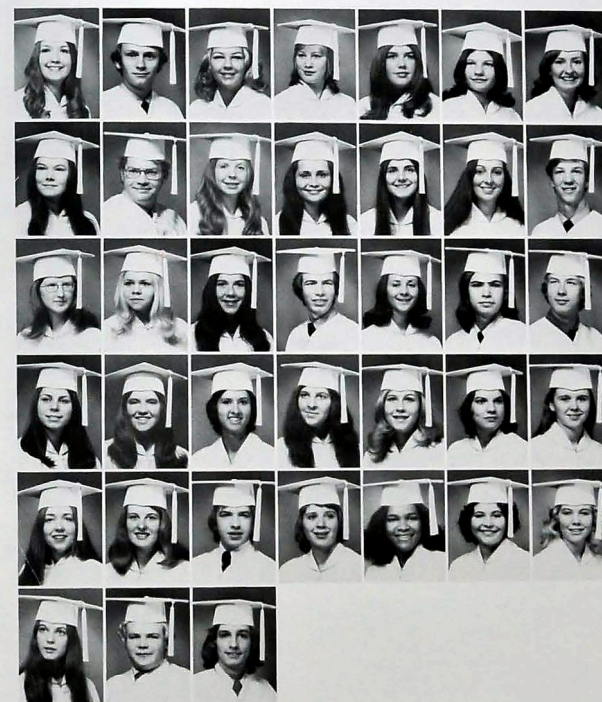
Studentry Views Inductions

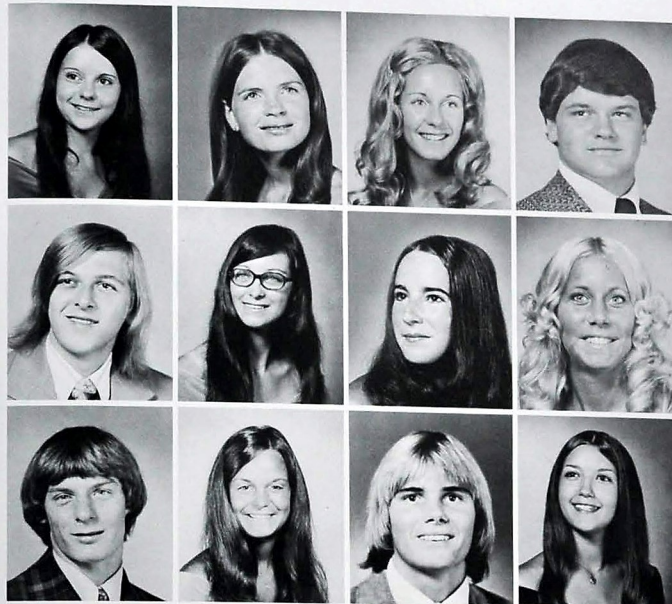

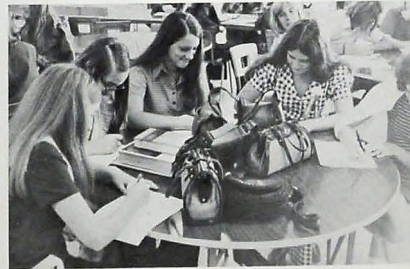
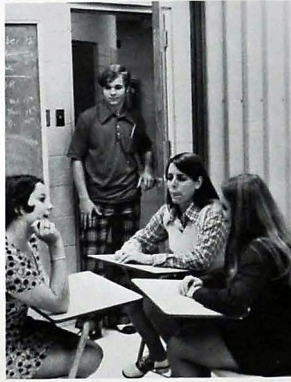

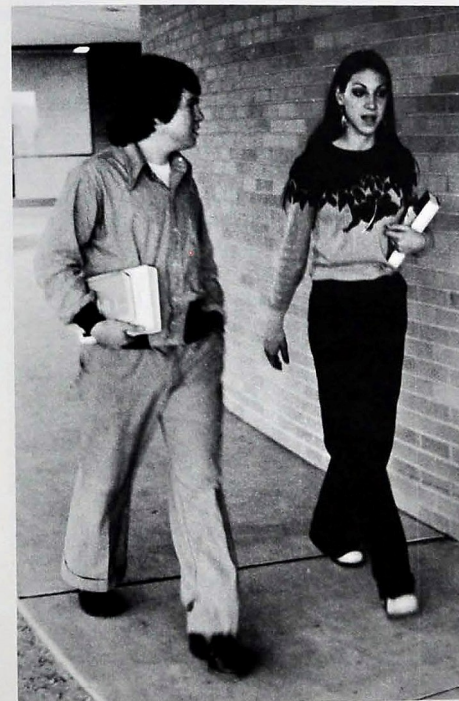

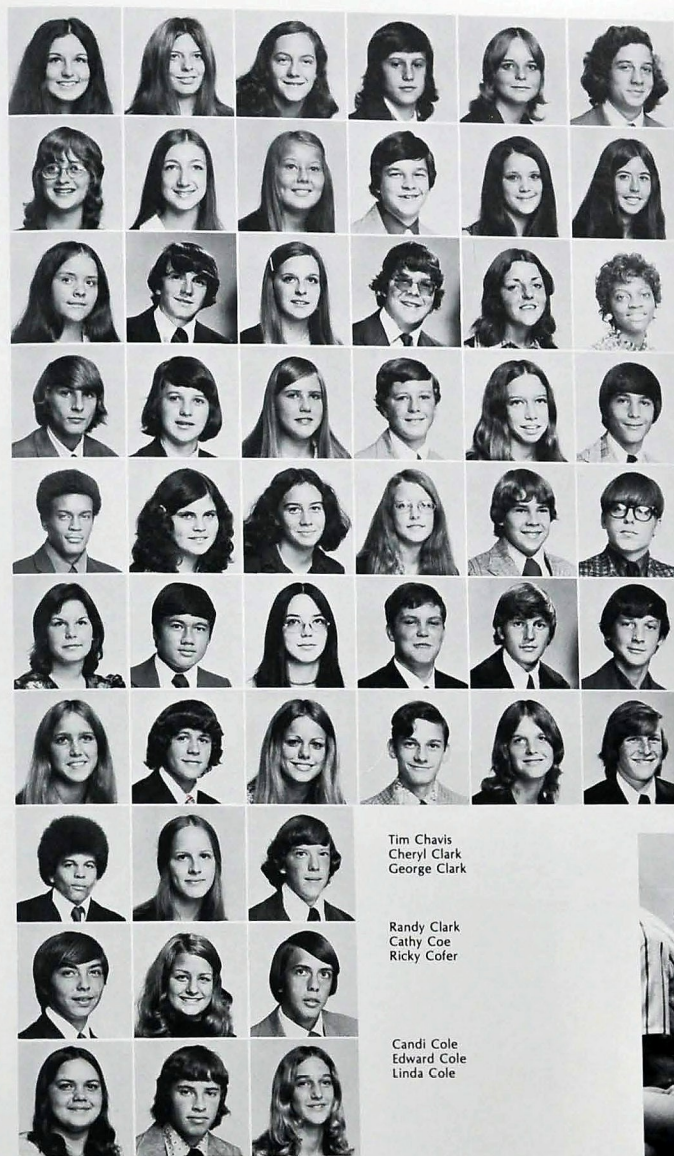

ABOVE: Marching is one of the basic fundamentals stressed to 161 sophomore boys in ROTC classes.

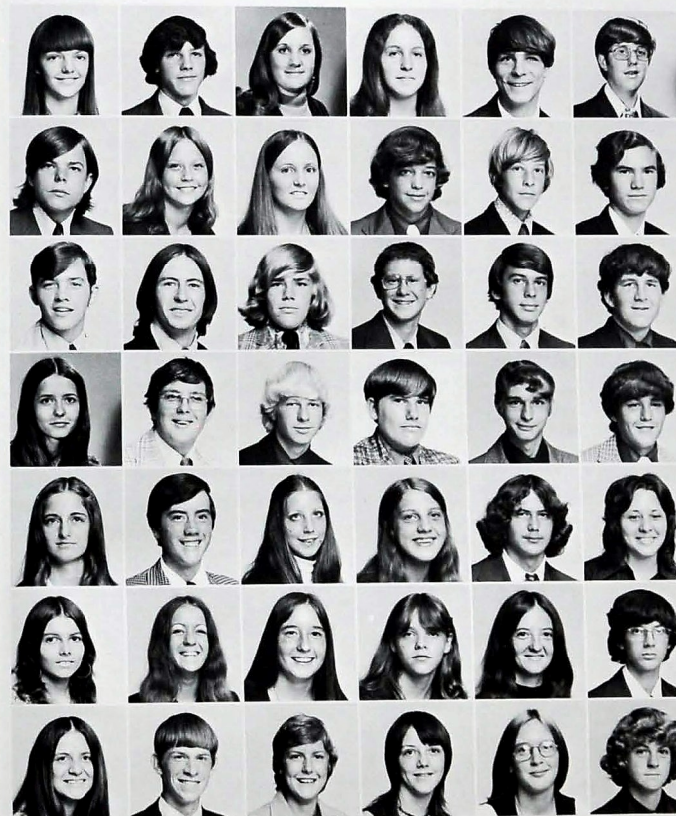
Class Follows New P.E. Programs

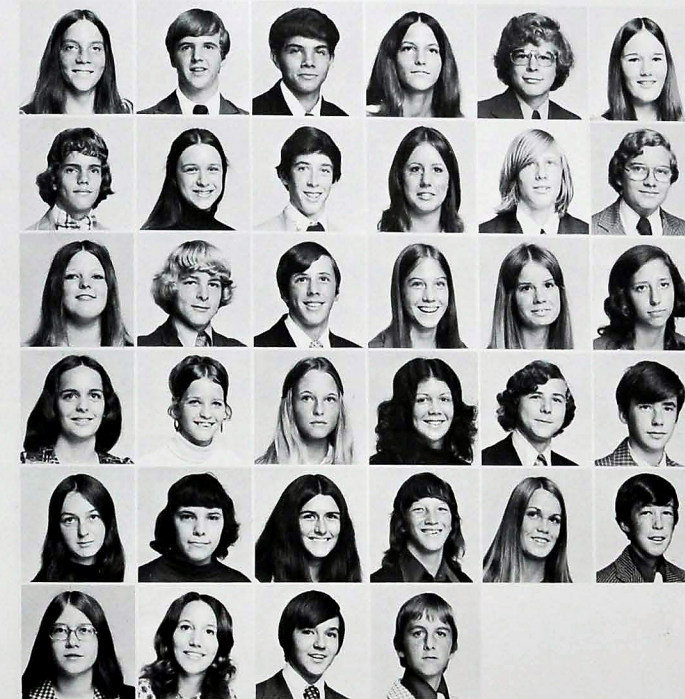


New Class Takes DAT

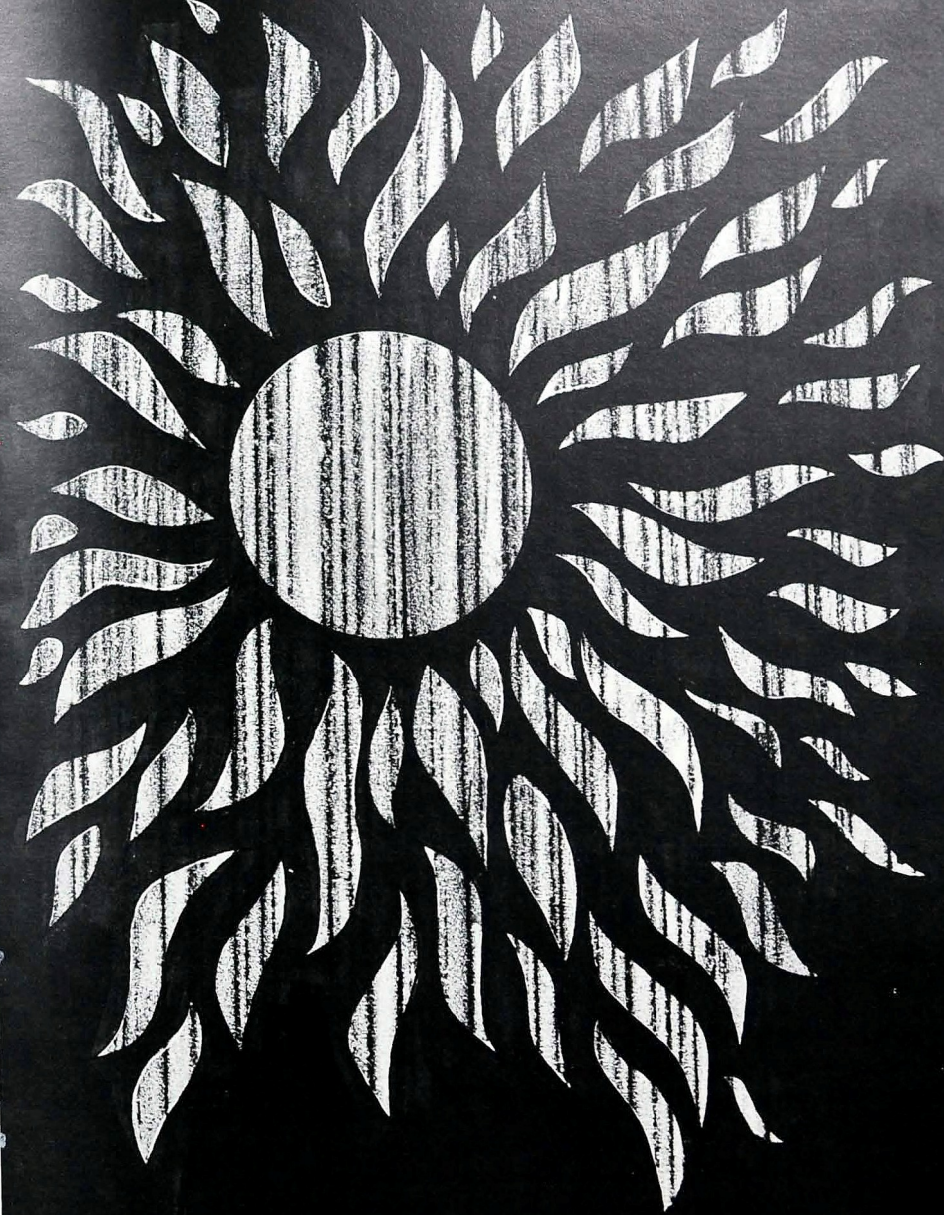

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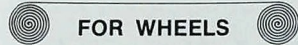
