
























LAST BLAST















Tri-Hi-Y conducted spirit and excitement. They began in the summer by painting winning signs for the football season. They received many "Best Sign" awards for their efforts.


In December, the club got together and updated the Hello Centrals. This provided an accurate directory for the students and helped Tri-Hi-Y raise money for their banquet.


