
VIOLENCE IN IRELAND — Unrest continued in Ireland. Belfast was the center of violence as noting tore through troubled Northern Ireland in the



Fun And Games



Kevin Dodson, with escort Chari Cross, is named the 1981 Homecoming King by Y-Teens during the Powder-Puff halftime.



Jan Williams blocks Stacey Croft while Leigh Shumaker runs for the senior's winning touchdown.







Celebrating Seniors


Belle Of The Ball





This would be the moment of glory for the '82 class as the thrills and frills of Senior Day '82 came to a close.



















Coach Rundles stated "Our success is because they worked together as a team. I'm very pleased with them and feel that they worked hard enough and deserve everything that they have achieved."








Fire Works

The Party's Over


