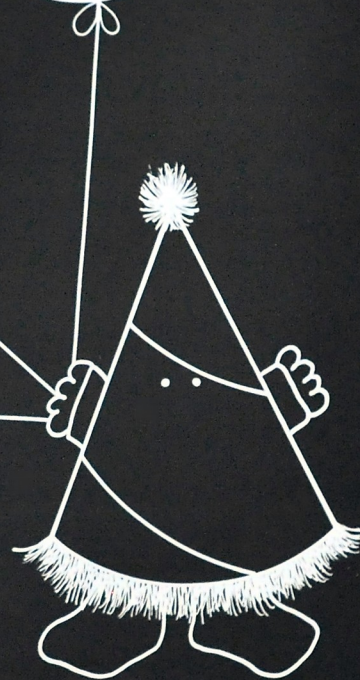

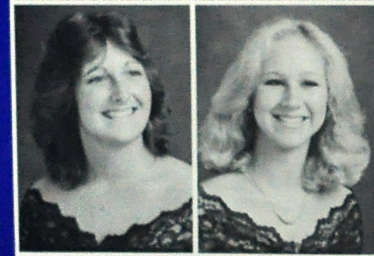
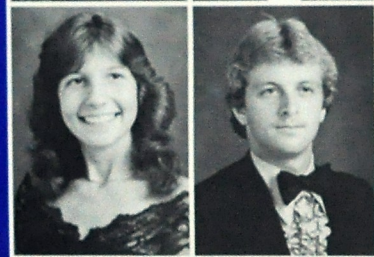
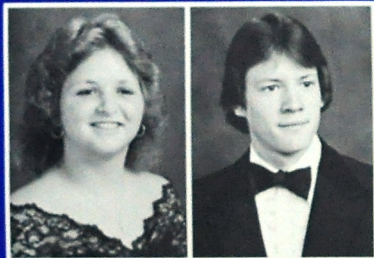


CELEBRATORS

Trying to make a decision about their future plans changed the seniors' lives from a lively celebration to serious post-party blues.



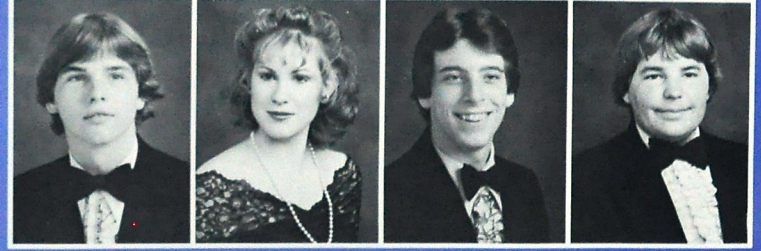
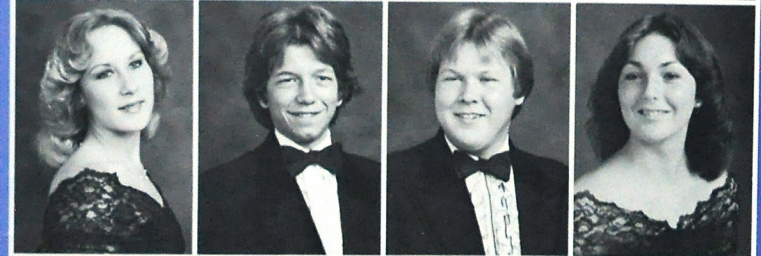
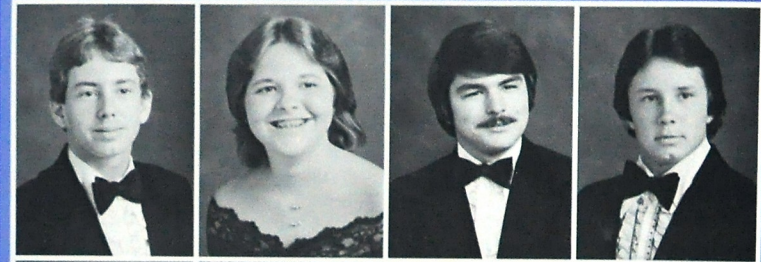

Honored Guest

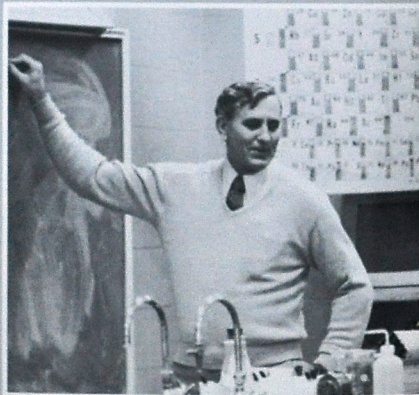

Of his nineteen years at Central, being the honored guest had to be one of the highlights of his career.



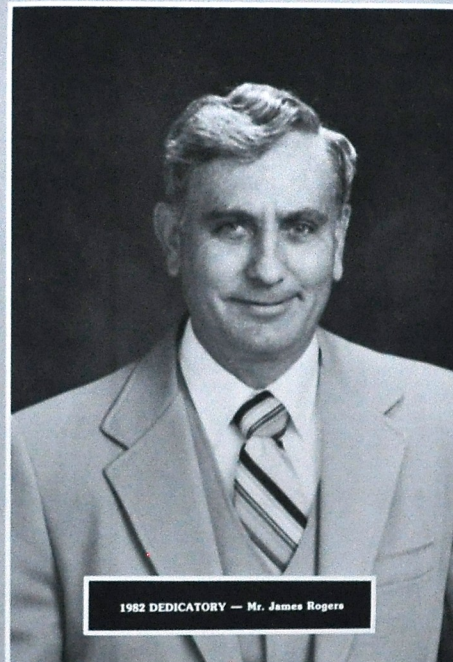

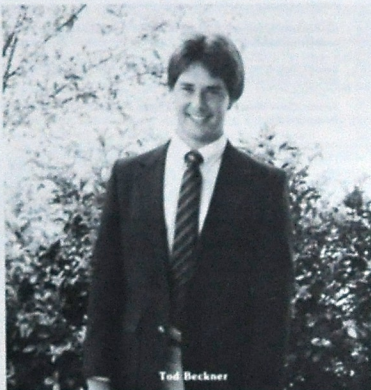

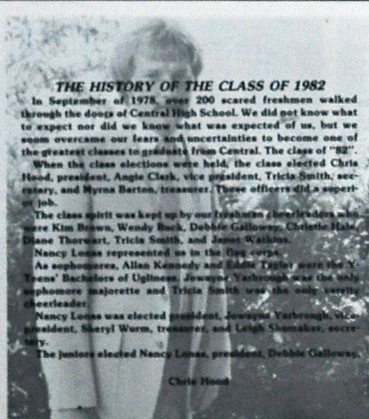

THE HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF 1982

In September of 1978, over 200 scared freshmen walked through the doors of Central High School. We did not know what to expect nor did we know what was expected of us, but we soon overcame our fears and uncertainties to become one of the greatest classes to graduate from Central. 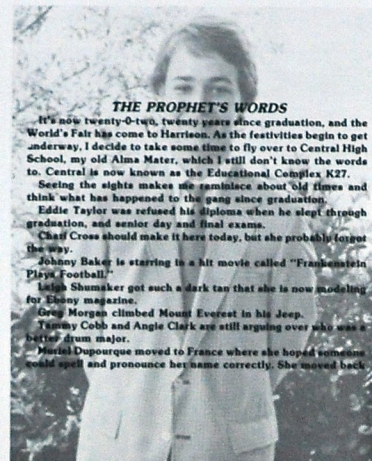

Paul Horton moved to California with the proceeds of the Fall Festival. He later said, "Ha, I guess I fooled them."

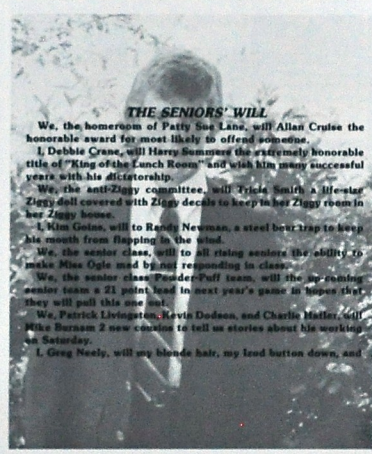

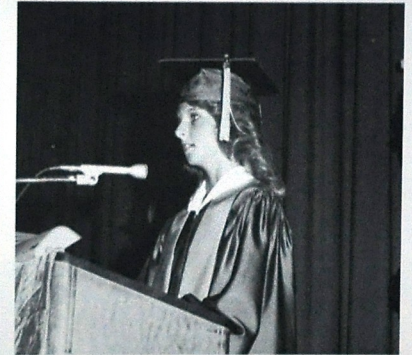

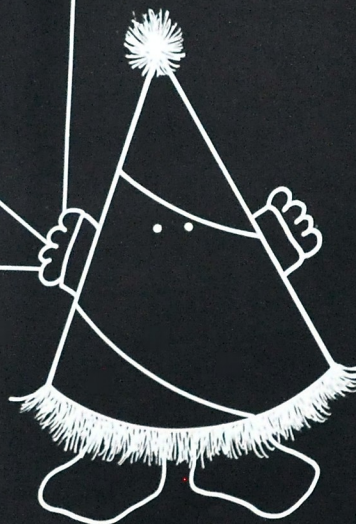

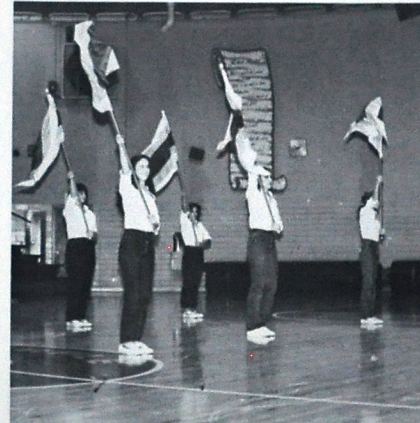

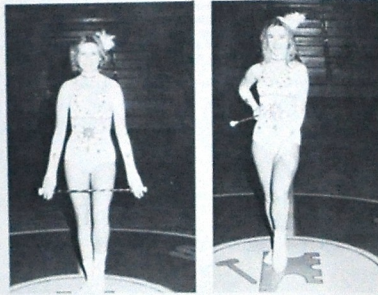
The hours of practice made the majorettes' line sparkle. They twirled during the halftime activities of both football and basketball games.

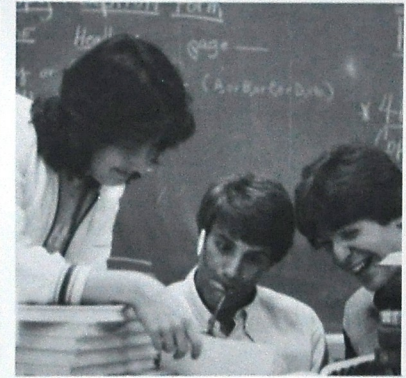

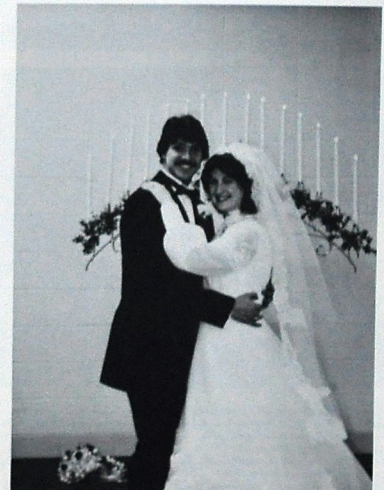

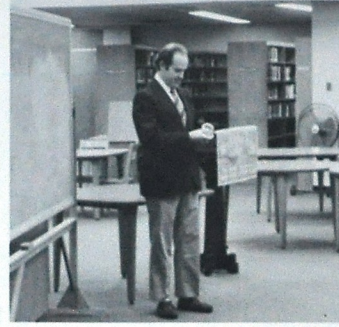

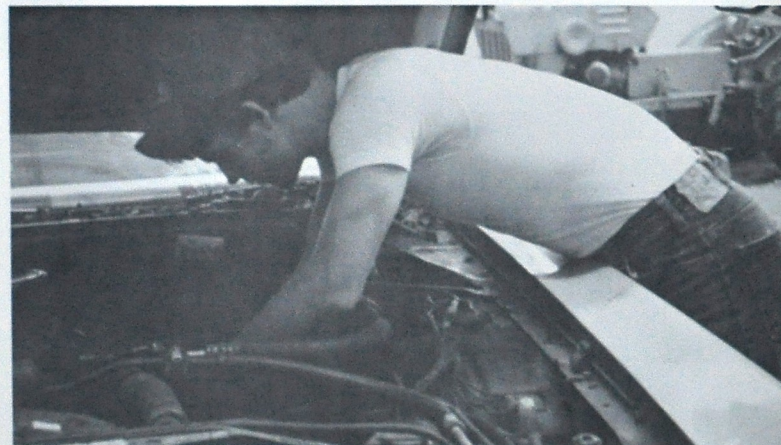


Party Hearty

Central students had the choice of going to the morning

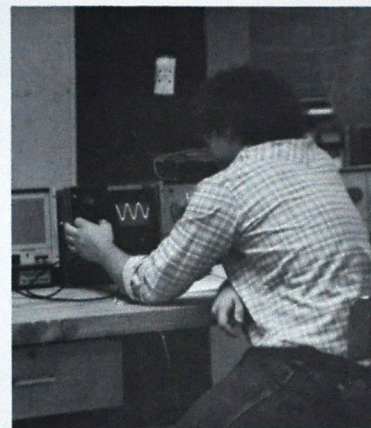

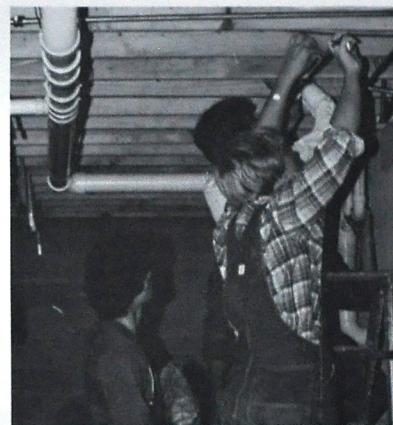

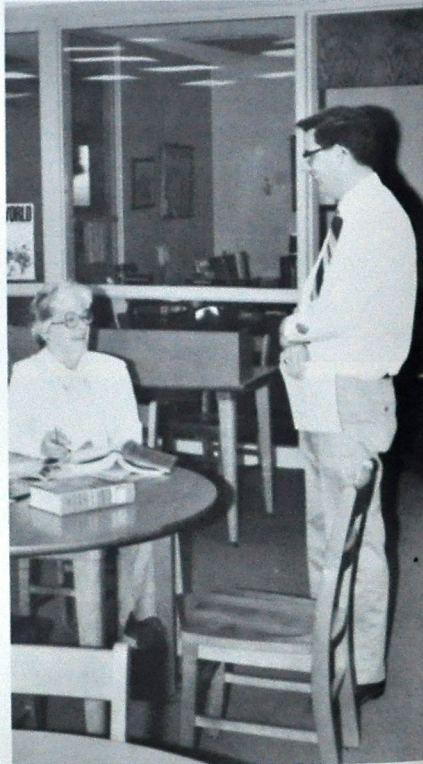

As in previous years, Tri-Hi-Y was filled with thirty little angels. The group's purpose was to set a Christian attitude in their activities which entertained the school.

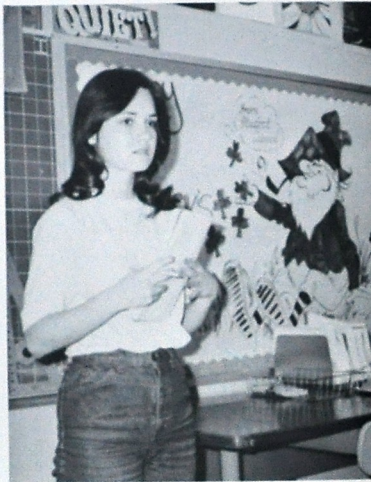
They participated in making signs for sports, decorating basketball player's lockers and surprising their Secret Brothers with homemade cookies — "what angels!"

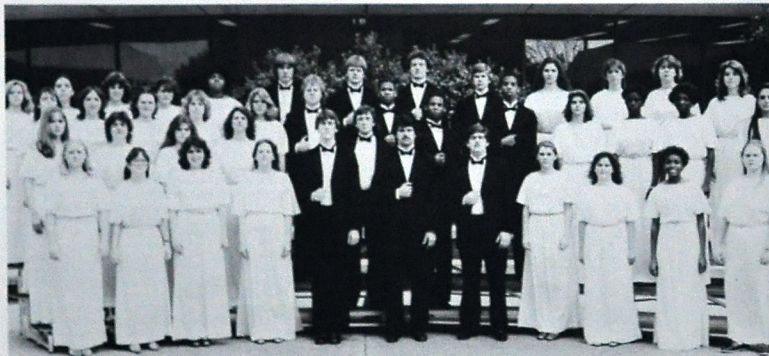

The football team started slow with two losses but then came back strong to end up with an even 5-5 season.

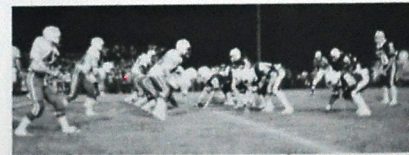
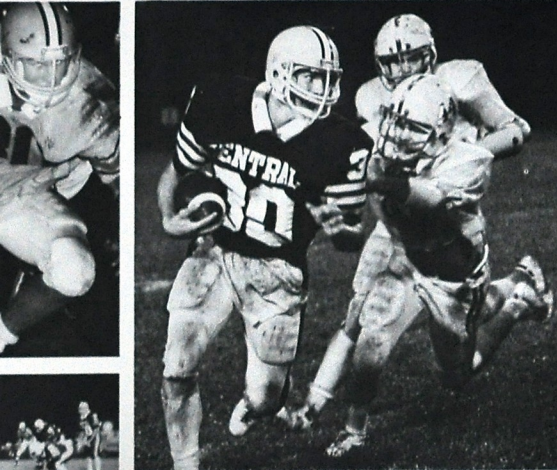
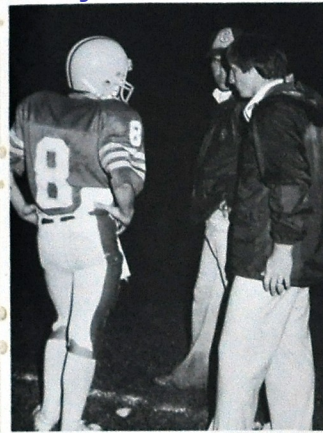

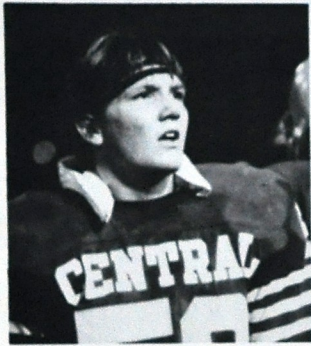

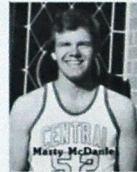

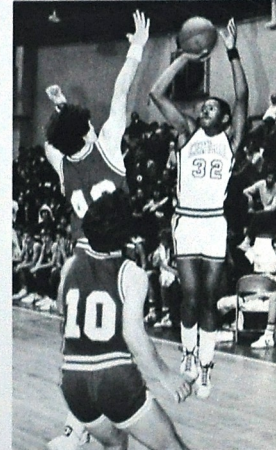

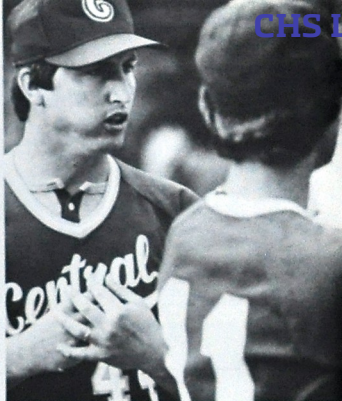

Coach Rundles stated "Our success is because they worked together as a team. I'm very pleased with them and feel that they worked hard enough and deserve everything that they have achieved."



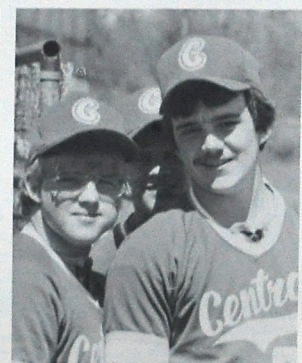

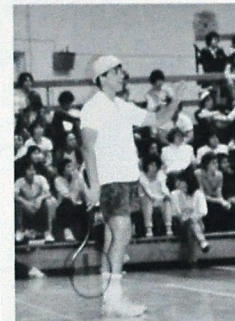
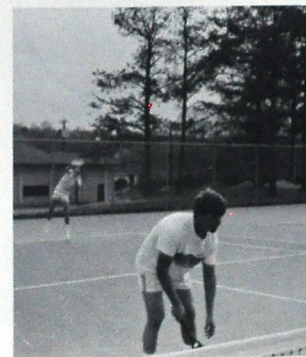

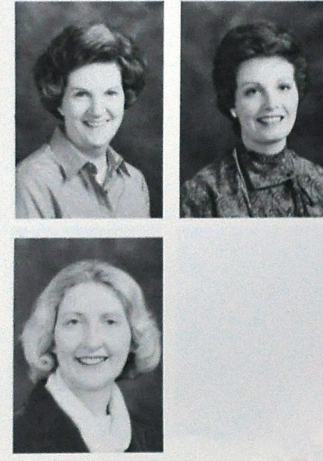

The year began with D, E and G Pod faculty entertaining the party guests. These teachers took time to plan activities for special events.

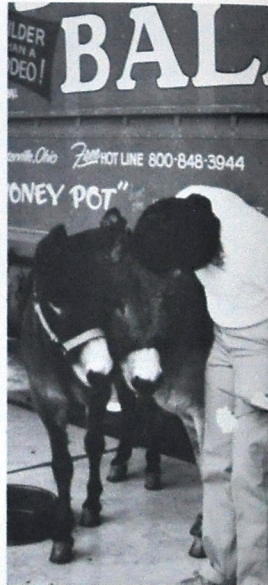
