

EXPANSION UNDERWAY




WELCOME WEEKENDS







Opening Central's football season, the Purple fought McGavock's Cougars but lost by a score of 30-0.

In the opening quarter, McGavock's Kevin Gray jaunted four yards to score their first touchdown.

Fourth quarter, Tony Waddell of McGavock intercepted a pass from Central's Rod Croft, which gave McGavock their final touchdown.

Sophomore Tommy Cope rushed 65 yards in 13 carries for the Purple Pounders.

A fighting Central team went down in defeat as they lost to Bradley 21-7.

On the first play of Bradley's second possession, the Bears' quarterback fired a fifty-seven yard touchdown pass.

When Central received the ball at the Bradley thirty-eight yard line, the Pounders capitalized as Warnie Shaw sprinted twenty-six yards for the final touchdown.

With a fine performance the Purple Pounders upset Hixson 12-7.

Hixson scored first on a fiftynine yard run. Central came back after an interception with a score on a thirty-two yard play ending with Warnie Shaw hitting Bubba Joynes for the touchdown.

Central's final score came after Bruce Conrad hit Mike Wilson for twenty-four yards and then Conrad muscled in from one yard out.

The Pounders stifling defense was led by seniors Ken Lusk, Mark Lawrence, and Jon Garrett.

Central showed new hope for the season as they stomped Tyner 28-0.

In the opening period, Jon Garrett recovered a Tyner fumble at the Ram 24. After four attempts, Paul Forgey reached paydirt.

In the second period, Central received the ball at their own 29. The Pounders marched 71 yards for their second touchdown.

Warnie Shaw moved the Pounders to the Ram seven after a blast of 50 yards. Forgey scored again.

Following an interception, the Pounders went on to complete a 21-yard pass play. Then Conrad hit Joynes for another touchdown.

Central's final score came when Shaw rushed in over left tackle.

OCTOBER OBJECTIVES






Fumbles and interceptions took their toll when the Pounders met the Lions at Red Bank.

Bad luck again fell on the Pounders and the Lions had control of the ball most of the remainder of the game. The final score was 39-8.

In the final half, Central fumbled the kickoff on the thirty-one yard line. The Pioneers quickly took advantage of this by marching in for the score.

Central scored again on a pass from Warnie Shaw to Joynes, making the final score East Ridge 28, Central 14.



BASKETBALL GAINS




















In order to modernize the science and mathematic departments, many changes were made in both. The changes involved implementing new courses, inviting guest speakers, and using many types of visual aids.





TOOLS FOR TRADE AND BUSINESS










CHANGE IN FHA



In 1916, an experimental ROTC program was set up at Central; on December 29, 1919, this program was officially commissioned by Congress. The chain of command instituted in 1916 has been followed up to the present time.

Although most decisionmaking was guided by ROTC instructors, the brigade staff was responsible for the efficient management of Central's brigade.

Three battalion staffs carried these decisions down to the battalions, where individual officers made the decision known to companies and special teams, such as the military band, color guard, and rifle team.

Organized in 1923, the military band has performed in the Presentation of Sponsors each year since that time.

The color guard was set up in 1924 as the drum and bugle corps and was not referred to as the color guard until 1929, and has participated in the Presentation of Sponsors yearly.

In 1923, the rifle team was set up as a preparatory drill team for cadets who might enter W.W.I. Competition has since been set up, pitting Central against other schools with ROTC rifle teams. In 1974, firing became a varsity sport.

An Officer's Club was organized in 1928, and though sponsors had existed since 1921, they were not made a part of the club until 1933. In 1945, the club was chartered as the Disc and Diamond Club. The membership requirements have remained the same, as has the function of the club. It is responsible for planning the Military Ball or Banquet.





In preparing Central to receive students in September, the administration found the enrollment unstable. This was due to the vet unanswered question of annexation of areas in which many Centralites resided. These students enrolled at Central, but many of them were told, after attending here for two weeks, that they were ineligible to attend Central.

Before 1974, Central had never closed its doors to any student. But in 1974, a ruling was made by the Hamilton County School Board that students zoned for city schools could not attend Central. Against this ruling, Dr. W. Hobart Millsaps spoke to the school board on September 12, arguing in favor of the students. The ruling, however, remained, with a few changes.

That the instability of the enrollment and the addition of a freshman class had not evoked other related problems pleased Dr. Millsaps and Coach Stanley Farmer, who commended the faculty-student rapport.

In the subjects of general business and general record keeping, Miss Rose Ann Conner was the teacher.

In mechanical drawing were Mr. Ed Hoover and Mr. Gordon Mason, who was also the woodshop teacher. Both the mechanical drawing and the woodshop courses applied math to the various learning activities. In the classes of Mr. Wayne Dockery and Mr. Hilman Mayfield, students studied auto mechanics and printing, respectively.

Because the rooms previously used by them in C Pod were needed for social science classes, Coach Tommy Runyon, driver's education instructor, and Coach Paul Barnett, health and boys' physical education instructor, held their classes in G Pod. Coach Mike Ricketts also taught driver's education as well as boys' p.e.

HOME ECONOMICS, SCIENCE

Because of an increase in school enrollment, Mrs. Alice Davis became a much-needed addition to the home economics department. Mrs. Davis trained students in Home Ec. I and advanced textiles classes. Mrs. Patsy Williamson, head of the home economics department, was the instructor of Home Ec. I and III, while Mrs. Janette Crawley directed Home Ec. II students. Mrs. Crawley also introduced male students to the domestic arts in bachelor survival, a course offered for the first time at Central.

The increase in the number of students at Central also affected the science department, of which Mr. James Rogers was head, and taught practical chemistry, chemistry, and physics. Students under the tutelage of Mr. Walter Blanks, Miss Janet Stanfield, and Coach Paul Barnett learned the basics of science in general science classes. Coach Jim Shaeffer taught general biology, as did Mrs. Darby Marable, who also directed the advanced biology class.





CENTRAL SCHOLARS




















SUDDEN OUTBURST FOR SPIRIT OF '76





Despite the crowded conditions due to the addition of a ninth grade, there always seemed to be room for one more person and an opportunity for him to achieve in academics, athletics, and activities.


Named as National Merit Scholarship Semi-Finalists, seniors Gloria Colston and Edward Wheatley made a place for themselves in academics.

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
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
